Ed: Having myself enjoyed the energising fun of public ceilidhs over much of Southern England in my time, I was delighted to find that Devon boasts two excellent examples of the genre, when I moved here a few years ago. From my experience of organising them, I know about the hard work and frayed nerves in case there are insufficient numbers to pay for the band! So, for this edition's special feature, I decided to ask the organisers to tell us more about their ceilidhs and why they do it!

Great Western Ceilidhs Simon Spoerer says..

Great Western's annual series of ceilidhs for 2013/14 opened its doors with the fabulous Flash Company on 9 November. That will be followed by Asha on 14 December, The Ship Band on 15 February, Monty's Maggot on 15 March, and Bedlam on 26 April. As usual the dances will all be at Bowhill School, Buddle Lane, Exeter (EX4 1JT for the satnay), and run from 8 til 11:30pm.

Great Western took a bit of a loss during 2012/13 and are being a bit more cautious this year. They get no funding, grants or other support, and their policy of bringing mainly national festival bands to Exeter can be (and was!) risky. GW surveyed their audience at the end of the summer and a lot of people gave some useful feedback. Being friendly to singles and encouraging to newbies through a variety of small but important touches featured large, but the basic message was more of the same please.

Flash Company are a successful, well established local band with strong links to GW, and feature the driving mania of Bob Powell's flying melodeonic fingers. Asha are festival regulars with a strong national following, a huge repertoire, and calling from the lovely Jackie Allen (Token Women). The Ship Band are a new departure for GW but incredibly well known across the country; as comfortable in a small Irish venue as a huge festival marquee, this one will be something completely different. Monty's Maggot also have close links to GW through dancer and musician

Jeremy Tozer; the band are getting a lot of attention and bookings, having started over a pint at the White Hart Inn, Moretonhampstead. Then, finally, it's BEDLAM! The perfect name for a great band with a wall of sound.

And let's not forget the unfeasible, astonishing GW raffles! Where do they get those prizes!? All topped off with break time floor spots from some of Devon's (and parts further off's...) best dancers.

Bideford Ceilidh Club Ceilidhs *John Blackburn says...*

I had always been interested in English Folk Music and dance, but it was not until I moved to North Devon in 1975 that things really took off. My first attempt at organising ceilidhs was at the various schools where I worked. I then joined the Barnstaple Morris Men, and became more heavily involved with Folk activities.part of which involved the organisation of occasional ceilidhs. Bloatertown Band was formed in 1977, and after some time as a musician in the band, I eventually became their regular caller. After 36 years we are still going strong.

When I retired early from teaching, this gave me the opportunity to start up the Bideford Ceilidh Club, which meets on a weekly basis. The Club organises about six ceilidhs a year, playing host to some of the best bands in the country, including The Bismarcks, Random, Steamchicken, Bursledon Village Band, The Geckoes, Captain Swing, The Watch, and several others. I must confess that this allows me to indulge myself by calling with some of these wonderful bands.

Calling gives me immense pleasure, whether it's for a school PTA, a wedding party or a Festival crowd, from serious dancers to a hall full of drunks. Over the years I've had lots of fun, loads of laughs and not too many mishaps. I sometimes have to completely change my intended programme depending upon the crowd that I am presented with, but that all goes with the territory. Also, in the

game of calling, one can never stop learning from others. There are always new and more effective ways to describe a dance, a step, a figure, etc.

It is encouraging to see the number of new young callers and bands on the scene, which will certainly help to safeguard the future.

I still have the same enthusiasm that I had all those years ago, and intend to carry on for as long as possible.



By the time this issue comes out, many of you will have seen the BBC4 documentary (The Enigma of Nic Jones – Return of Britain's Lost Folk Hero - ed) about Nic Jones broadcast at the end of September, which focussed on his recent comeback after his slow recovery from the road accident which nearly killed him in 1982. I have always loved his playing and singing, and the songs - such as Master Kilby, Flandyke Shore, Canadie –i-o and Annachie Gordon - which he gave to the folk repertoire, so you can imagine how thrilled I was when he agreed to an interview for What's Afoot.

I went to see him and his wife Julia at home in the village on the southern fringes of Dartmoor where they have lived for the last 8 years, and the 'interview' turned out to be more like an informal chat between old friends, made comfortable by cups of tea and dog Charlie on the sofa. Nic is a gentle and modest man who seems happy to be as well as he is, able to sing and perform with his son Joe on guitar and Belinda O'Hooley on keyboard - he says that his right hand is too slow to obey the instructions from his brain to enable him to play guitar in public. But his voice – older as it sounds, as it would be for anyone after 30 years - has the same slightly raw, haunting and emotional quality as it did in the heyday of Penguin Eggs, and there were tears in my eyes when I heard him open his recent Sidmouth concert with the enigmatic Master Kilby.


Nic talked openly about what he remembers of his recovery and his current condition. But I wanted to focus on the music. Nic says that although he was always happy to be a folk musician – despite the range of his influences, from flamenco to Ian Dury - he did not want to be labelled as a 'traditional' singer. For him, folk music is about people living in the present, and at the time of his accident he was focussing much more on songwriting. This is something he has returned to recently: for example, with the song simply called 'Now', inspired by the writings of Ekhart Tolle and emphasizing the importance of living in the

present. His favourite band, Radiohead, could hardly be described as 'folk', but Nic agreed with Julia when she said that their song 'Fake Plastic Trees' (which Nic can be heard singing on YouTube) is a 'folk song for the future'.

Remembering Martin Carthy's account of the power and synergy of performing with Norma and Eliza, I asked Nic about his experience of playing music with his son Joe: he said that as a son learns to speak by listening to his father, it is not surprising that their phrasing and intonation is so similar, making it easy for them to sing together.

Nic's memory was obviously affected by his accident and he needs the words of his songs in front of him on stage, but at the Sidmouth concert I noticed that when they sang Oh Dear Rue the Day Nic was watching Joe very closely, and wondered if he was lip-reading. Nic and Julia explained that his sense of timing - he used to sing just after the beat of his guitar – was affected by the accident, so on that song he needed to take his cue from Joe to get the harmonies right.

I asked Nic if he had any plans for a new album: both he and Julia insisted that would only happen if Nic felt he has enough good material — and Nic also says he is too lazy! Julia and Nic have a small mail-order company called Mollie Music which sells the CDs which are still available and newer compilations of live performances. Nic dislikes the new hi-tech recording systems which, he says, 'lose the emotion' of the songs. This is a quality which, I feel, Nic will never lose: different and deeper now, after the trauma of the accident and the slow years of recovery.

Nic now wants to sing songs which mean something to him and say something about the state of the world. He would hate being thought of as a prophet or teacher – a folk-singer is only a man doing his job, he says – but the words of Now do seem to be an important reminder to all of us: 'Be still somewhere, each moment aware, that now is here, so simple and so clear' ... thank you, Nic.

Sea Ilfracombe

Sea Ilfracombe has the sub-heading of 'the most diverse maritime festival in the country', and this fourth year certainly proved to be that, and a glorious success! The weather was generally kind, although on the Friday evening, spectacularly proving just how stormy it can be at sea!

With a week of creative workshops for children and young people preceding the weekend, culminating in processions and performance on the Saturday, the weekend is designed to appeal to all ages and all interests. Visual arts of many kinds were on show, from professional artists and local schools; with workshops, guided rambles, gig rowing, yacht racing, lifeboat trips, sea watches, model boat sailing, sea food tasting, sea angling, pirate events, to name but just some of the many activities.

Then, of course, there was the music – lots of it, with performers from far and near, and plenty of opportunities for others to join in. It kicked off with a maritime party on the MS Oldenburg, anchored in Ilfracombe harbour, hosted by the irrepressible Martyn Babb, in the midst of the most spectacular lightning storm most of us had ever seen! The other two days saw singing on the Old Quay and in the street, sessions in the pub (including a special for 'Salty Sea Ladies'!), performances in the Landmark Theatre complex and the Yacht Club, and a final, very atmospheric concert in the Lifeboat House.

Anchors Aweigh, a local shanty group were there, along with long-time favourites at Sea Ilfracombe, Monkey's Fist from "oop North". New this year, also from the North, were Four 'n' Aft, two duos

(LocTup Together and Steve Dawes and Helen Pitt) who work together at many maritime festivals here and in Europe. From Kent came Malcolm Ward, a fine singer and duet concertina player with a very varied maritime repertoire, and Helen North, a singer-songwriter and guitarist who runs a sail training trust, and whose love of the sea is well-reflected in both her humorous and more serious songs. South Devon's shanty group, The Old Gaffers, joined in on the Sunday, and local performers Ian Hudson, Andy Barnes, Pam'n'Al, Roger Cockram and Tom & Barbara Brown were also in evidence over the weekend.

Sea Ilfracombe gets no formal funding, and relies almost totally on minor sponsorship, collections and sheer goodwill, but this year's enthusiasm and success is inspiring the organisers to move heaven and earth to make sure it continues.

Teignmouth Folk Festival

Seventeen years ago Anne and I were approached by a local Rotary club member who was interested in starting a folk festival in Teignmouth. We both hesitated before committing, but decided to give it a try. After a few fund raising Ceilidhs and a small grant from the local council, we put on our first festival weekend, albeit on a small scale. We broke even financially so had decided to try again the following year. The festival has grown beyond anything we could have imaged in those early days into something our committee are really proud of.

Teignmouth town is ideally suited for a festival with good level dance spots and a perfect outside stage arena in the Triangle, where a dozen or so Morris sides perform along with local acts. For the past three years a Pipe Band has led the procession on Saturday morning - always popular with the locals. The Carlton Theatre, the venue for all our main concerts, is an old style theatre and sadly is planned to be replaced at some point. We hope this will be put on hold for a while. Our

main drawback is not having the best of venues for a Ceilidh but we have a brilliant nearby campsite.

When we first started it was great to offer slots to the many excellent local folk performers. Most years we have a local band for our Saturday night Ceilidh. It has always been our policy to introduce artists and bands that you don't see at some of the other local festivals and we are very proud to have been able to book bands such as Malinky from Scotland and the Danish Trio Habbadam and to get such comments as "how did you manage to get them" and "absolutely brilliant" make it all worthwhile.

We made a special effort for 2013 - the fifteenth festival - and I feel we had a good balance. Our Friday concert featured Emma Sweeney, Matheu Watson and Jim Causley so it was a very popular concert. Bringing The Tannahill Weavers from Scotland for a one off concert was something I would not have thought possible in the early days. The popular Geoff Lakeman was the ideal support. Andy Irvine, supported by local Uilleean piper Nick Scott, and Mike Cosgrave were a huge draw for Sunday afternoon and they did not disappoint. It was great to get the comment from one person "that was the best concert I have ever been to".

Provided we can balance the books each year with help from our New Year's Eve fund raising Ceilidh and support from Devon Folk and local businesses, we will continue.

Dartmoor Folk Festival - This year, the mayor joined in!

The Mayor of West Devon was impressed by the crowds who went along to the three-day Dartmoor Folk Festival held at South Zeal, near Okehampton, during the weekend of August 9-11 2013. Cllr Bill Cann, who performed the official opening of the festival, gave an impromptu demonstration of his Dartmoor Step Dancing skills. Mr Cann put in an admirable performance on the 15 inch square board on top of an old wagon, despite admitting that he had not performed the dance for more than 25 years! In his opening speech he said he was especially proud that his late uncle, Bob Cann, was the founder of the festival 36 years ago and commented on the huge success of the event, now continued by members of his family, friends, an Association and volunteer helpers. He assisted his Auntie Joyce, Bob's wife, in presenting the Dartmoor Step and Broom Dance awards.

One of the country's finest multi-instrumentalists, Jim Moray "kicked off" the event with a concert on the Friday evening followed by a ceilidh with the Dartmoor Pixie Band. The rest of the weekend included a packed programme of concerts, dances, children's festival, pub sessions and music and song and dance workshops. Artists attending included the Old Swan Band, Brendan Power and Tim Edey, Jim Causley and Lukas Drinkwater, Trio Threlfall, Lauren McCormick Band, Peter and Barbara Snape, Gadarene, Keith Donnelly, Tony Beard, Entertainingly Different, Dave Wills, plus morris and dance teams.

Spokesman, Alan Quick, said: "It has been a tremendous festival with a record attendance. Most of the concerts were full and dances were very well attended. The weather forced us to move the Dartmoor Fayre into the marquee part way through the programme on the Saturday but it was all moved within just a few minutes and the event continued. The festival has grown over the years and attracts some of the best folk artists around, whilst maintaining its reputation for being a relaxed, friendly and traditional festival. It is deeply rooted in the heart of the Dartmoor community and is keeping traditions alive."

The festival receives generous financial support from Devon Folk, Devon County Council, West Devon Borough Council, Willand Folk Dance Club, The Dartmoor Society and Bodmin Folk Club.

- Any person paying an annual subscription for What's Afoot (currently £5)
- Any person paying the annual Devon Folk membership fee (currently £2)
- . Any club engaged in folk activities in Devon, on payment of annual fee (currently £10).
- · Any member of EFDSS living in Devon, and any affiliated EFDSS club in Devon

The Club membership fee includes 3 issues per year of What's Afoot, sent to two nominated members of that club, who receive Devon Folk membership benefits on behalf of the club.

Individual members of the English Folk Dance & Song Society living in Devon are automatically entitled to free membership of Devon Folk. There is no need to register. Clubs in Devon affiliated to EFDSS are also entitled to free club membership of Devon Folk but are required to register names of two contact person. There is no free magazine entitlement for EFDSS member or for nominated members of EFDSS affiliated clubs, for whom the normal magazine subscription rates above will apply.

All member clubs must provide names and contact details of their two members who will receive Devon Folk membership benefits on behalf of the club. This also applies to EFDSS affiliates.

Dave Alford



The death has been announced of Dave Alford "The Dartmoor Bone Rattler", from Okehampton, who first learned to play the bones at the age of six years. He had a natural sense of rhythm and was encouraged to play by his grandmother, who would accompany him on the piano, ensuring he kept strict time. Practising to Victor Sylvester's Band on the wireless also helped him hone his skills.

He was in demand to perform at concerts and on the radio. It was at a concert at Gidleigh Village Hall that he met his future wife, Monica, and while he was performing at The Royal Albert Hall in January 1953 that he received the news that their first child, Crispin was born - he really made the spoons ring afterwards!..He was a regular performer at the Dartmoor Folk Festival for many years.

He was born on November 7 1927 and passed away on October 3 2013.He is survived by his wife, Monica, children Crispin and Carolyn, four grandchildren and two great grandsons.

Dennis Darke

An appreciation by Aileen Wills

We report the death of Dennis Darke with sadness. He had an amazing knowledge of music for dance, which came from his father, whose piano playing was much in demand for singalongs in local pubs. When he was 14, Dennis inherited a piano accordion and taught himself to play it. In 1936 he joined "Bertino's Accordion Serenaders". Then he formed his own dance band "The Collegians". Eventually he was persuaded to play at a Church country dance - an increasingly popular social event. He used the music in the dance manuals of the time - and he was hooked! Before long he formed the Greensleeves Country Dance Orchestra (later 'Band'). It went from strength to strength with musicians coming and going over the years, including his very musical family, but Dennis went on forever! He led them at dances, festivals, recording studios, 120 BBC radio Barn Dance broadcasts and much. much more, using composed tunes and his own arrangements of traditional music. His foot tapping popular tunes made any dance go with a swing and his love of songs from the shows crept into all his performances. His knowledge of their source and that of the traditional tunes was exceptional. If there was anything you wanted to know, "ask Dennis". Throughout the country Dennis and his Band were renowned. After playing the newly released Lord of the Dance tune for 1500 children dancing on Exeter Cathedral Green, he adopted that as the Band's signature tune.

Dennis was Secretary of the EFDSS Devon District Committee for 12 years, served on the SW Regional Council for 25 years, was on the EFDSS. National Executive, was awarded the Devon Folk Award and the Sidmouth International Award for outstanding services to Folk. He was still a Vice President of Devon Folk and the Willand Club.

Dennis was born on 22nd November - St.Cecilia's Day (the Patron Saint of Music) - also Cecil Sharp's birthday, so he certainly achieved his destiny in the folk world. His music will continue to be played worldwide through his recordings - that inimitable sound which could only be Dennis.

I was privileged to work with him for over 50 years - still seeking his knowledge right up to his death. Like many others I was proud to have known him and share his love of music for dance.

Reg Meuross

Somerset-based singer-songwriter Reg Meuross has been on the music scene for over twenty-years and in that time has released six critically-acclaimed solo studio albums.

His sixth release, Leaves and Feathers, released this year, is no exception and from that album the song My Name Is London Town has been treated to this single / EP release, featuring 4 other songs from Reg's impressive back-catalogue.

The title track itself is a captivating song written about his reflections on London life. In it's lyrics he conjurs up many characters who have lived or passed through the capital ("Dick Whittington", "the whitechapel murderer" to the "Smithfield fishmonger" and the "sharp-suited broker").

But all these are merely characters within a character, if you will - London itself. The title itself suggests that London is a living breathing entity and has a stronghold and perhaps influence on the

people who reside within it. It's a cracking song, delivered simply with an easy going fingerstyle guitar, reminiscent of people like Ralph McTell, allowing the song's lyrics and story to punctuate without attention-seeking instrumentation to overwhelm it.

Reg, however, is joined by guest musicians such as, among others, Jackie Oates on Violin, Bethany Porter on Cello, Miranda Sykes on Double Bass and backing vocals and Roy Dodds on Drums and Percussion, all providing tasteful backing.

At the end of the day, however, the song is what matters with Reg and the five songs on this single are all powerful and unique in subject matter. In Lizzie Loved A Highwayman, he interprets the Dick Turpin legend, partly from the perspective of Turpin's wife Elizabeth Millington, which shows how smart a songwriter, historian and indeed storyteller he is. His songs often convey religious or spiritual undertones too (And Jesus Wept, The Man In The Moon).

Of course there are many other fine songs in his repertoire not featured on this release, including the crowd pleasers, Birmingham Hotel and It's Me Or Elvis, but otherwise the selection, hand-picked by Reg himself, is very strong and mixed. For established fans of Reg Meuross, there won't be anything new to offer, unless your a completist. But for those novices wanting a taster this is probably a good place to start.

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Review Poachers Bold

The Duncan McFarlane Band DUNXCD028

It's been a few years since 'All Rogues and Villains' (the DMcF electric band's last CD), so I awaited Poacher's Bold with eager anticipation. Duncan is particularly clever in taking traditional tunes and giving them a fresh, modern, upbeat feel without losing the character of the song. He is also a brilliant songwriter, breathing life into his songs with his own personal joys and sorrows. On this CD, there is an amazing breadth of Duncan's original repertoire.

The dark 'To The Chevin' is based on his personal experience of bullying in the workplace, which I first heard at Otley Folk Club in 2008. 'For Jane (Tomlinson)', is an incredibly moving tribute to a brave woman, with stunning vocals and hauntingly sensitive guitar playing – definitely recommended to listen to this one quietly at home first!! Jane reached the national press a few years ago for her bravery doing sponsored fundraising marathons when she herself was terminally ill. Apparently this song nearly didn't get on the CD – thank heavens (and Jane's family) that it did! At the end of the CD, is the now customary bit of jollity – the Drinking Song.

As always, Duncan's vocals are exceptionally clear and the storytelling in his songs is unsurpassed. The CD insert contains summaries of the results of his painstaking research, which is definitely worth reading – and his lyrics are full of social commentary on current and past issues, ranging from Anti War protests (Ribbons Fall), to poaching (the title track – Rufford Park). There is no doubt that some of the songs take a lot of listening to (I suspect deliberately), but are well worth the effort, especially if you like your music to make you think.

In my opinion, the use of strong rhythms and stark chords on the electric guitar effectively created a desolate and windswept atmosphere – for example in Boys of Bedlam and The Weight of it All. The fiddle arrangements, played clearly and beautifully by Anne Brivonese, as usual, have lovely uplifting harmonies on some of the softer, easier listening tracks such as Ribbons Fall I challenge you not to start tapping your toes on the two instrumental tracks – definitely worth promoting the sound check track 'Harvest Home'!

So all in all, if you like modern, electric arrangements with great storytelling and brilliant musicianship, you will love Poacher's Bold!

On the Doorstep RMBCD1305

When I was asked to review this CD my first comment was, "Are they still going?" since I remember them from way back in the late 60s or early 70s as a well-respected harmony group, more or less contemporaries of The Young Tradition, The Watersons, The Songwainers and The Valley Folk. And I remember their first album, The Cheerful 'Orn, though somehow my copy has disappeared.

Well it seems that the group has kept going through various changes of line-up from those early days with three other CDs to their name apart from their latest. And they've shrunk from a six-piece group to a trio consisting of Chris Orme, Stephen Bailey and Phil Hardcastle.

Their harmonies and much of their material, however, remain rooted in the English folk tradition. Strange to say, vocal arrangements that would have impressed me no end forty odd years ago now seem rather dated and artificial on several of the traditional songs, such as Poor Old Horse, Through Bushes and Through Briars and a very dirge-like John Barleycorn. That said, there are some excellent tracks that provide important colour and contrast. The fourteenth century round, A Robyn, is delightful and the final offering, a carol from Wiltshire, just named Second Carol, really appealed both to me and to my wife, who is a West Gallery singer. The updated New January Man, written I guess in the aftermath of an extremely wet year, raised a chuckle. Other songs which I particularly enjoyed were the Sydney Carter's nostalgic Putting Out The Dustbin and, from Kentucky, Roll On John.

Review When Every Song was New

Mick Ryan and Paul Downes Wildgoose WGS393CD

Paul Downes and Mick Ryan were born in the same year, and as Mick explains in his sleeve notes to When Every Song was New, the idea behind this album was 'to return to those songs which were, almost without trying, absorbed from the folk scene during these early, formative years.'

Paul is Devon born and bred and started singing at the age of 13 in the Exmouth folk club and later at The Jolly Porter: Mick was a regular at the Swindon Folksingers' Club, and is now probably best known as the composer of folk operas such as The Navvy's Wife and The Pauper's Path to Hope. His sleeve notes explain fully and generously the sources for the songs on the When Every Song was New album: many are versions of wellknown traditional songs such as One Night As I Lay On My Bed, The Lover's Ghost and You Rambling Boys of Pleasure. Exceptions include a lovely version of Dave Goulder's The January Man, sung much more up-tempo than is usual, and Mick's own Summerwater and the title track of the album

Paul and Mick both have gentle, mellow voices and Paul is, of course, a beautiful guitarist. This album is the product of their 'shared musical experience and culture': it is pleasant and enjoyable to listen to, but, I feel, falls rather into the 'easy-listening' category of folk music – a little bland for my taste, anyway!

Paul Downes strikes a more distinctive note in the first track of **The Boatman's Cure**, with the powerful John Richards song Honour and Praise, followed by the beautiful Farewell Nancy. I Hate the Rain is a strong performance of a song about the extremes of wealth and poverty written by Bob Kirkpatrick, and with Down Among the Ruins Paul reprises a song he performed in Mick Ryan's The Pauper's Path to Hope. I also enjoyed the instrumental tracks, Braunton Burrows and Lamorna Cove (written by Paul and named by Steve Knightley of Show of Hands).

Paul has performed with Phil Beer, who plays violin and mandolin on this album: Jackie Oates, Keith Kendrick and Maggie Boyle also make musical contributions. Paul is currently touring with Maggie and some of you may have caught them at various venues in Devon, in what promises to be a great concert. I would recommend this album more strongly than the Ryan-Downes collaboration.

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Review Doodle i Doe

JigJaw

Doodle i records 001

"Singing for dancing, dancing for singing." I was excited to be offered this CD for review as I have always felt there is a special magic when people are dancing to a voice rather than a band, there is an intimacy and a connection with the song as it is made tangible through the dancers that always seems to me to be greater than the sum of the parts. In this case the parts are vocally superb with Rosie Dais, Frances Watt, Janet Russell and Kerry Fletcher.

The sleeve note says, "JigJaw combines the percussion and passion of dance traditions with vocal harmonies in a tight, scintillating quartet of singing and dancing talents!" With an extensive use of vocables (I had to look it up, it describes nonsense syllables used in music) often to set the dance form and the rhythm for the dancers then some or all the voices move into the song, often in harmony, often with continuing vocable support.

The range of dances is extensive, from Schottisches to the Gay Gordens by way of BourrÈes and 5-time Waltz's, all are performed exclusively by voice. The tunes and songs are quite an eclectic mix as well; for example for the Gay Gordons set there's Burn's song, "Willie Brewed a Peck o' Maut" then a tune, "Barren Rocks of Aden" and finally a Glasgow music hall song, "Swing Yer Maw." Alongside this and keeping the rhythm Rosie and Kerry are both dancing Appalachian steps – but in different styles.

I think you would need quite experienced dancers to reap the benefits of JigJaw, they are as far removed from the more raucous ceilidh bands as you can imagine. I can't remember who it was told me about their grandfather who played the fiddle for local dances. These were held in a two-storey barn. Apparently he would start the dancers off on the ground floor, then the dancers

would take over the tune singing and he would climb the ladder to the upstairs and start the second group dancing.

Again from their sleeve notes they say, "Singing for dancing traditions, are a true expression of social cohesion, happiness and the fun people can create for one another out of nothing!" It is true; this is a very, very happy CD. If you aren't dancing then JigJaw playing in the background will put a splash into the washing up, put a spring into the hoovering or make a long journey fly by. Finally, "JigJaw" what a great name if you sing for dance, it says it all and shows the care that has gone into this CD. I will definitely try and catch them at a festival, and would strongly recommend you look them up on the Internet, hear this CD and then buy it; it will put a spring in your step and make you smile.

Acoustic Warehouse, Newton Abbot

A very new venue, the Acoustic Warehouse in Newton Abbot is an Open Mic club which has moved around a little over the last year or so, struggling to find a consistent venue in these troubled times for pubs. It has now found a permanent home at the Passage House Inn which has allowed it to expand to occasionally showcase professional live acts. As well as this there are planned workshops with some of these artists.

The venue is a comfortable room which filled easily with an audience of about 30/40 people. There is no operating bar in the room, so no extraneous noise. The evening started with local support act Paul Holden who is a relatively recent resident in the area and all I can say is the Sussex's loss is our gain. Paul played a well thought through set of songs well suited to his voice and clever guitar style. Some of his songs are self-penned and these are witty numbers, well deserving to be sung alongside other material he has learnt from the likes of Tom Paxton and Mark Knopfler. The set had good dynamics, with light and dark, humour and tragedy.

We swiftly moved on to the first set from Phil and Hannah, being told that they would play two sets with a short break so all could get more drinks if required. Now I have seen this duo before, but that was nearly two years ago. Those two years have brought about a greater maturity in the way they play and interact with their audience. They are now truly great performers and their material has more depth and variety to it. The musicianship is still top notch with Phil leaving people speechless with his harmonica playing, whilst they both sing; accompanying themselves and each other with subtlety and understanding. The end result was an evening of really great entertainment from an act that is set to continue

to wow live audiences for some time to come.

Overall, this was a great value live entertainment evening in a new venue that provides the more intimate style of gig with just the venue it needs. Watch out for more gigs beyond this and for more information

Every Song was New

Review Mynd

Philip Henry and Hannah Martin

Dragonfly Roots DRCD001

What an exceptionally well thought out album this is! The title itself – Mynd – epitomises the care which has been devoted to every detail of its production, as it is not only Old English for 'Mountain', but also for 'Mind'. We are treated to a beautifully branded CD, with an evocative backdrop of Silbury Hill in Wiltshire (the first song). The songs (most of which are original) have been developed around a very broad 'Mind' concept – from memory and remembrance through to thought and consciousness. Overall it has a gentle, calming and reflective feel – the ultimate panacea for a stressful day at work!


But it goes deeper than that – each song has an interesting and unusual story behind it – some from centuries gone by (such as the Nailmaker's strike, Song for Caroline Herschel) and some extremely current (such as the haunting 'Last Broadcast' which tells the story of Marie Colvin, a journalist killed in Syria in 2012). I would strongly recommend reading the accompanying booklet (it is a little tricky to extract from the inside flap of the CD) while listening for the first time.

Hannah has a beautiful, rich soulful voice, which she uses to create the timeless atmosphere of the songs. Philip's accompaniments are sensitive and enriching. He plays a large and unusual range of carefully chosen instruments to support the mood of each song. There has clearly been a lot of thought and attention to detail – for example, the percussive drops of water falling in Waterland. My particular favourites are the Song for Caroline Herschel- an exquisitely delicate arrangement with beautiful harmonies - and the delightful Miss Wilmott's Ghost - a happy, cheeky little story which will appeal to all the gardeners among us.

I loved the concept of this album and applaud Philip and Hannah's exceptional talent. My one slight issue is that I felt that one or two of the songs (particularly in the middle of the album) were a little too laid back for my personal taste.

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SW Federation of Folk Song Clubs 50th

The early 1960's saw the start of what is now commonly known as the folk revival. Song clubs sprang up all across the country and the Southwest was no exception. This was in no small way due to the efforts of the late Cyril and Rosemary Tawney who, without transport of their own, travelled around helping local enthusiasts to set up clubs. Cyril was present at the opening night of the Jolly Porter club in Exeter in 1963 and was often seen at the forerunner to that club, held in 'The Left Bank' coffee bar at the top of Paris Street on a Friday night.

There were soon clubs established all across the South West, from Swindon and Bournemouth and Poole in the east to Bodmin, Plymouth and Wadebridge in the West; from Cheltenham and Barnstaple and even Cardiff in the North, to Exeter and Exmouth in the south. There were no folk song festivals at this time to showcase artists (Sidmouth was a dance festival) so around 1964 several of the clubs started to talk to each other about booking artists on a circuit to offer a regional tour and thus get economies of scale. Thus was born the 'South West Federation of Folk Song Clubs'. One 'unknown' artist booked by the Federation was Paul Simon, with one club paying him £10 although his agreed fee was £7, - "because we thought he was good!"

It was in 1965 that Halsway Manor was purchased to be developed as a residential National Folk Arts Centre. Situated in the beautiful Quantock Hills in Somerset this seemed a logical venue to hold quarterly meetings to discuss artists and other relevant issues. The quarterly meetings rapidly developed into a" must attend" weekend of song and fun, with committee members from clubs attending the formal Saturday afternoon business, but dozens of club members descending on Halsway for the song

sessions, and other activities which developed. Initially each club would organise a Saturday evening event but this was often upstaged by informal song sessions in the nearby Carew Arms in Crowcombe. Sunday would see a morning walk on the hills, followed by a further session before departing after lunch. Many long lasting friendships were made at this time. Sadly, after a few years the Federation broke up as the larger and richer clubs wanted to book bigger and more expensive guests which the smaller clubs couldn't cover.

Meg Rose and I ealised in 2012 that 2014 would be 50 years since the start of the Federation and we thought the occasion should be marked. Following discussions with Halsway management the weekend of 14th to 16th March 2014 has been agreed for a celebration of those heady days. This will include song sessions, talks on the history of the Manor and the work of the Federation, an exhibition of photos and memorabilia, and the chance to walk on the hills and to reconnect with old friends. Anyone wishing to attend the weekend should contact Halsway direct (see below) for accommodation or Camper van pitch, or pay £5 per person for each session. A full programme will be published in due course. Meg and I are anxious to contact anyone who was around at that time and to view any old photos, posters and even recordings from those club days (I have the Paul Simon night in Exeter). If you have such info or memories contact Meg or myself.

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
