Enjoy!

Bideford Folk Club

Bideford Folk Club members have been singing and making music together since September 1995. We meet every week on a Thursday evening in the upstairs room at The Joiners Arms, Bideford. Different members of the club MC the evening, putting their own stamp on the proceedings which, unless we have a 'special guest' usually takes the form of a singaround.

Everyone who comes has the opportunity to perform and although our roots are in traditional music we welcome any contributions, whether they are contemporary songs, any other song genres or personally written, it all adds to the rich mix of the evening. We also welcome anyone who just wants to sit and listen or join in with the choruses. There are lots of great 'open mikes' and music sessions in pubs locally but not that many opportunities to really sit and listen to traditional and contemporary songs or air your song to a listening audience. Bideford Folk Club gives you that opportunity and every Thursday night is different depending on who comes so the range of music and song is very diverse.

About eight times a year we organise concert nights featuring national and international guests with support from club members. It has long been our policy not to charge a ticket price for concert nights and we rely on weekly collections and your generosity on the night to pay our guests.

Recent guests have included John Kirkpatrick, Peggy Seeger, Martin Wyndham Reed, Jim Causley, The Young'uns and John Connolly. We have some great guests booked for this year too including Nancy Kerr and James Fagan, Pete Morton and Pete Coe.

Shammick (a local name for Combe Martin)

Shammick Accoustic

Acoustic was started in 2002 to provide a monthly environment, mainly for Combe Martians, as they are known, in which to share songs, words and music; to provide somewhere for people to perform, and to encourage them to do so, whatever the acoustic genre. In addition, there would be the occasional 'visiting performer' who got the chance to do rather more numbers than the rest. That still happens on the 2nd Saturday of the month, but in 2007 we added concert nights on the 4th Saturday of the month to widen people's experience of the good acoustic music that is out there, and to encourage local performers to construct a 'set' of three items to perform in front of an audience (not just in a singaround situation). Since then, there has been a wide range of guest artists, both national and international, from unaccompanied traditional singers to singersongwriters, and from blues to small choirs anything really that provides both excellence and entertainment. They don't necessarily have to be big names – we hope that our audiences trust us enough that they'll give anything a go, knowing that it will be good quality music. Many of our audience aren't 'folkies' anyway, so even some big names on the folk scene won't necessarily be known to them. If we feel that an artist has the ability to share their skills with others, we arrange a workshop day or afternoon, which hopefully enables people to develop their performance/ song-writing/knowledge from someone who really knows what they're talking about!

Occasionally, we put on 'Shammick Abroad' concerts in South Molton, which usually bring in a somewhat different audience, and from further

afield.

Why do we do it? Because we love to enable people to perform, particularly if they've not done so before, and to do so with confidence, and because we want to introduce people to the music of artists that we rate highly. We couldn't do it without others lending their support and their time, so our thanks to them – they know who they are.

Folk Music at The Plough Arts Centre

Situated in Torrington The Plough Arts Centre is an excellent venue for folk music in North Devon. Some of the South West's finest have played in this highly regarded, intimate space including Show of Hands and (patrons of The Plough), Seth Lakeman, Jim Causley, Jackie Oates, the Carrivick Sisters, Jenna Witts, Nick Wyke and Becki Driscoll. The Folk Orchestra of North Devon (part of the WREN project is also based here).

On a wider scale The Plough has been a stage for the likes of Fairport Convention, Finbar Furey, Lughnasa, Ralph McTell, Maddy Pryor, Brass Monkey, Waterson Carthy, Roy Bailey, The Unthanks, Boo Hewerdine, Aoife Clancy and Wizz Jones, Eddie Reader, Karen Tweed to name just a few. Many of these artists have been return visitors. Future visitors include Kathryn Roberts and Sean Lakeman, Kieran Goss, Miranda Sykes and Rex Preston and Wild Willy Barrett.

The Plough offers two platforms to showcase visiting artists – either the 240 seat auditorium or the more intimate gallery with monthly gigs for up to 50 people. It continues to be a beacon for folk music in this corner of Devon and is always keen to support local artists as well as the more renown singer/musicians from further afield.

And that is not all! North Devon morris sides include Bideford Phoenix, Tarka Morris, Exmoor Border and Red Petticoats. Concerts are held in Chittlehampton Church near South Molton - acts include Issy Emeny's folk choir on April 25th and Phil Beer on April 25th. Beaford Arts co-ordinate a range of local events - ed

Interview with Phil Beer

Phil made time for a chat before his recent solo gig at Colebrook. He is a busy man: after this current solo tour he is doing a series of gigs in March with the reconvened Phil Beer Band, the Feast of Fiddles tour in April, and two Folk Boat cruises in June and August (see Phil's website). Show of Hands is taking a break from live performance (while Steve Knightley is involved with his solo 'Home Grown Gig' tour of village halls and pubs) but they are busy recording their contribution to an 'alternative' WW1 commemorative album. And, in his spare time, Phil is moving house and rebuilding his recording studio!

At Colebrook I asked Phil about his early musical influences and his West Country roots. He explained that he is one of a whole generation of guitarists inspired by Davy Graham, in particular his 1965 album Folk Blues and Beyond: the title indicates the eclecticism that is also characteristic of Phil's music. Cocaine and I Can't Keep from Cryin' Sometimes (by Blind Willie Johnson) are still part of Phil's repertoire. The American singer Hoyt Axton was also an important influence. Phil discovered him through his parent's record collection of American groups such as The Kingston Trio: Axton wrote their hit Greenback Dollar and it is his version of The Blind Fiddler which is still a staple of Phil's repertoire.

Phil started going to folk clubs when he was 15 or so: he has fond memories of the early days of The Jolly Porter and singers such as Dave Lowry and other former members of Iscafayre, and he thanks them for introducing him to traditional English song. Pleasant and Delightful and Abroad for Pleasure remain part of Phil's repertoire. Phil grew up in Devon but his mother was from Falmouth: after singing hymns in the Methodist chapel on a Sunday the family would gather round the piano to sing a whole variety of songs - some taken from The Cornish Song Book. Phil points out few of these songs were, in fact, originally Cornish: Ralph Dunstan 'borrowed' them from the Cecil Sharp collection and changed references and place-names to make them sound Cornish! Rhythm Methodist (2005) is probably the album that best demonstrates the range and variety of Phil's music: it includes my personal favourite, The Holy Brook. This is a poem by the Gloucestershire poet Frank Mansell set to music by Johnny Coppin, telling of a Cotswold lad who loved his native land but never returned to it after the Second World War. The brook, however, 'forever new and yet always the same' symbolises the continuation of the spirit and the natural world – and, one might say, of folk music too.

Phil insists that he is not a traditionalist, but that the important thing about music is that it has 'roots', whatever or wherever they may be. And what is so important about musicians like Phil and Steve is that they are as happy to play in pubs, small clubs and village halls - where the local tradition of simply getting together to play and sing continues – as they are in big venues like The Albert Hall as Show of Hands (with the wonderful Miranda Sykes). The Phil Beer Band – 'folk-roll with a strong American flavour' as Phil describes it – will be playing at The Plough in Torrington on 28th February and 1st March. Phil is also excited by the prospect of a Show of Hands gig in the new Sam Wanamaker Playhouse in September. But we are fortunate indeed to have them here in Devon, connected with their roots and with us.

Feature Winkleigh Morris Music Marathon

It wasn't quite like waiting for a disaster to happen in that for some time I'd toyed with the idea of doing a marathon music session in aid of something. I'd even mentioned the concept to a few friends earlier in the year. When the call for international aid to the Philippines came in the wake of the devastating typhoon, a possible fundraising event was therefore already in mind, in outline at least.

At the next practice night after the typhoon Winkleigh Morris readily supported my suggestion of a sponsored music marathon. Karen, one of our new recruits, immediately offered the use of the skittle alley at her pub, the Seven Stars, and Sunday 1st December was agreed to be the best day for all of us. Ideally I would have preferred an earlier date which would have provided a more rapid donation of funds, but a least we had more time to arrange publicity, seek out sponsorship, and consider the logistics of the actual day.

While my original thoughts had been for a 24 hour marathon, a 12 hour session, to coincide with the pub's opening times, seemed to be much more manageable. I suspect otherwise I would have been playing to myself through the small hours of the morning with little prospect of raising any more cash for the extra effort and loss of sleep.

Apart from our own musicians we had little idea of how many other people would turn up to play or listen. On the one hand we had to be prepared to keep going on our own for the whole twelve hours if need be, and on the other to avoid umpteen repetitions of Oyster Girl and other popular tunes by a succession of itinerant musicians just calling in for an hour or so. I decided that each tune should be played only three times through, except, possibly if someone was singing words to a song with more than three verses. I estimated that we would get through a maximum of 30 tunes an hour, unrealistically assuming continuous music with no beer breaks, no loo breaks or whatever! I drew up a large chart with titles of some 360 tunes that, between us, I was confident Winkleigh Morris musicians could play. I also left space for the titles of other tunes which we might remember or that other visiting musicians might offer. Each tune was to be recorded on the chart once played.

With several hundred pounds promised in advance, we were assured that the event would succeed in its fund-raising objective. Come the day, we started with a core of four Winkleigh Morris musicians, and were soon joined by other musicians and singers from from Winkleigh and David Goddard from Exeter Morris Men. Despite having informed all the local media, only Okehampton Times sent a photographer to cover our activity (see front cover). Several people could only dip in and out for various parts of the day but we never had less than three musicians at any one time After lunch, kindly provided by Karen from the pub, we were pleased to see Pete & Nicole Mac. from Exmouth. Sue Mentz and Caz. a musician with Great Western & Raddon Hill. They provided some accomplished instrumental variety, and a bit of respite for us 'residents', for most of the afternoon.

After Karen had again fed us, the evening reverted largely to the stalwarts from Winkleigh Morris. We performed a couple of dances in the bar – in addition to a jig from Sue Hamer-Moss and Appalachian stepping from Susie Golightly in the skittle alley earlier in the day. Just as we were beginning to wind down with about half an hour to go, we were revitalised by the appearance of several members of the Bondleigh Band, a group of local musicians who enabled the marathon to end on a real high. We had clocked up about different 280 tunes - there was some uncertainty whether we'd missed noting down one or two, and a feeling that one tune had been repeated at some stage.

The sponsorship money took a little while to filter in, but with generous donations from many individuals, from Cogs & Wheels and Tinners Morris, from sponsors signed up by Winkleigh Morris members, and even from a gentleman up country who had seen our publicity on the internet, the total sum raised came to £1,200. I'd like to thank everyone who made the whole day really worthwhile through sponsorship, participation and logistical support!

And I have no plans to attempt a 24 hour marathon in the future!

Dartmoor Folk Festival

Top local and national artists will headline at the 37th Dartmoor Folk Festival, which will be held at South Zeal, near Okehampton, on August 8, 9 and 10.

Artists announced, to date, include: New Rope String Band (Friday), Lady Maisery, Greg Russell and Ciaran Algar (winners of the BBC Young Folk Awards 2013), Vicki Swan and Jonny Dyer, The Old Fashioned, Bill Whaley and Dave Fletcher, Chalktown and Pete White's Suitcase Circus. Other artists attending include Trevor Organ's Cracking Crockery, The Dartmoor Pixie Band, Tony Beard, Entertainingly Different, Dave Wills, various morris and dance teams, plus more to be confirmed.

The festival will include a packed programme of concerts, a ramble on Dartmoor, a ceilidh, folk service, craft displays, dances, a Children's Festival, a Dartmoor Fayre, music hall, pub sessions and music, song and dance workshops. Competitions include the Dartmoor Broom Dance championships and Dartmoor Stepdance Championships.

It was 37 years ago that the festival was founded by the late Bob Cann, who lived in the parish of South Zeal. He had the dream of a folk event on his doorstep that would help to revive and preserve the traditions of Dartmoor.

It was the traditional music, dance, song and crafts of the area that formed the basis for the first festival and they still remain for the association which runs the festival today. Since it was founded it has grown so that it can invite some of the best folk artists around, whilst maintaining its reputation for being a relaxed, friendly and

traditional festival.



Jacqueline Francis takes a personal look at the feast of folk events at the South Brent Festival


Where to go? The weekend's coming and nothing's planned; everyone's wanting something to do. You want fun for kids and adults, value for money, easy access and weatherproof enjoyment. An advert in the paper and a poster for a Folk Festival may tempt you to chance it. I advise caution! Folk may be bad for your health.

I am a Folkie. I recognised the symptoms early; piles — heaps of songbooks, spots— solo spots making me itch to take to the stage, and a rash of guitars across my walls. In preparation for this coming season, I've stocked—up on throat pastilles and corn plasters (South Brent Christmas ceilidh crippled my corns). I tried a tablet to ease my folk-itis; taking it to download folk tracks—only fed my addiction and I felt bound to note some events for the year.

April 26th, folk singer Jim Causley and poet, Matt Harvey are at South Brent Village Hall. This will be followed in October by Jackie Oates in concert . What a feast, and all in one village!



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Obituaries

Shiela Sibley

Sheila died in January 2014. She was a well respected and accomplished accordionist, bandleader and composer of folk dance tunes.

Sheila was born in London in 1931 and grew up in Romford, Essex. She came to Sidmouth with her mother, to join family who already lived there. During this time she met her husband Dennis and they made their home in Sidmouth.

Sheila always had a love of music and in the 60's started to play the piano accordion. In 1965 she teamed up with Eric and Linda Kitchener to form the Woodpeckers band. For a number of years in the early 70's they played for Tea Dances at the Ham Marquee during the Folk Festival and were billed as 'Sidmouth's Folk Band' in the programme. They were almost the resident band for the Salcombe Regis Club (now Sidmouth/Sidford Club) - Aileen Wills often calling with them - and for open air dancing in the Connaught Gardens, Sidmouth on Friday evenings in the summer.

When Eric and Linda retired Sheila continued to play, for example at Willand Folk Dance Club alongside George Godfrey with Ron Beeson calling. In the 80's she formed her own band – Pieces of Eight. The band played at Willand, Sidford and Aylesbeare Folk Dance Clubs. Sheila always encouraged newcomers to play folk music and was generous in inviting them to join in with the band, which at any time may have included between three or eight players. The band played at gigs throughout the county.

As well as being an accomplished accordionist Sheila also composed a number of lovely dance tunes, some of which are included in a Folk Dance publication. She was also a musician with the Devon Oak Clog Dancers and composed some dancing tunes for them. To this day Sweet Coppin ladies dance team always finish their 'dance outs' with her tune Sibley. She was generous in sharing her compositions and her collection of music, especially so when she stopped playing her accordion regularly several years ago due to failing health. Her own huge collection of music was all written neatly by hand - long before the computer age!

It is with sadness I write again so soon about the death of another member of the Greensleeves Country Dance Band. Mick, as he was known. died on Jan.3rd after a prolonged period of ill health. Mick was first and foremost a dancer. His introduction was at a youth club in Exeter in about 1952, when I, as a newly "approved" E.F.D.S.S. teacher was given my first challenge - to try and get them dancing. From there Mick soon moved on to join St. Wilfreds C.D.C. (later to become Pinhoe Square Eights) and it was here he linked up with the Band. He became "approved" himself and when taking one of D.C.C.s Further Education Classes for Ide W.I. in the late 1950s he met Ronnie who had gone to swell the numbers and meet this nice young teacher – and they were married in 1960. Mick also became a superb Morris and Sword dancer after joining the Exeter Morris Men in the late 50s, was a teacher and caller, a member of the Devon Folk Company, represented Devon at the Albert Hall Festivals as well as being one of the founder members of the Exeter Folk Song Club, singing solos with his guitar as well as duets with me! Folk dance and music was his life long passion and when his health deteriorated he and Ronnie took up modern sequence dancing which they continued until quite recently.

To me, Mick seems always to have been there and we who knew him will always remember him with affection and our thoughts now are with Ronnie and his family.

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Wreck off Sicily

Andy Clarke and Steve Tyler

I know local man Andy Clarke as an excellent guitarist and Steve Tyler as a brilliant hurdy-gurdy player also based in Devon who – with a small band – plays for great Balkan and Gypsy dance sessions in Exeter. He has been a member of bands Wendigo, Angles and Daughters of Elvin, playing everything from medieval tunes to French dances, Scandinavian polkas and English folk tunes. Andy now helps to run the Totnes folk club, and is also a fine singer whose voice is perfectly suited to the songs they have chosen. Tunes in which the hurdy- gurdy predominates alternate with songs, and Ruth Clarke plays fiddle on some of the tracks, adding another texture to the mix.

I am not sure whether this is their first (recorded) collaboration, but it works brilliantly; the hurdy-gurdy and cittern (played by Steve) providing a subtle and unusual accompaniment to Andy's voice and guitar on some of the tracks. Andy has done his homework, going back to the Baring-Gould collection for original words and adding traditional tunes or writing his own. Songs from the collection include the title track, collected from the farm labourer James Parsons of Lewdown, the poem Childe the Hunter collected from the Dartmoor poet Jonas Coaker set to a tune by Andy, the singaround favoutite Bell Ringing, and a lovely version of The Unquiet Grave, here called Cold Blows the Winter Wind with the addition of a fine chorus. The tunes include a French bourree written by bagpiper David Faulkner, the Playford tune Half Hannikin, two Danish polkas and Steve's tune The Wendigo, inspired by a supernatural tale by Algernon Blackwood.

I hope this brief review gives some idea of the versatility and skill of these two musicians: for me, the strongest tracks are the haunting and powerful songs Poor Labourers (from an 1845 broadside), Wreck off Sicily, and Cold Blows the Winter Wind, and the tunes which prompt memories of dancing to the hurdy-gurdy! Highly recommended.

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Sing a Full Song

Miranda Sykes and Rex Preston

Sing A Full Song was released in April 2013 just before Miranda Sykes and Rex Preston embarked on a tour with Show of Hands. As the support on the tour they received great acclaim. In 2014 they are touring as a duo, and by the time that this issue of "What's Afoot" is published they will have appeared in a number of venues in Devon. No doubt they will have wooed a larger group of followers and added to their ever growing high reputation. It is well deserved.

For almost a decade Miranda has become a familiar figure to many as the virtuoso double bass player with Show of Hands. She has also worked with a number of other well known people among them Leon Rosselson, Reg Meuross, Roger Wilson and Stefan Hannigan. In 2006 she released a solo album Bliss, delighting her audience, and an EP, Sweet Pea. Meanwhile Rex Preston, having moved to Bath to study music, attracted attention for his multi-instrumental talents, his arranging and his ability to adapt to a number of musical genres. He has subsequently worked with several acts in the traditional, celtic, bluegrass and blues fields.

The album opens with the gentle strains of the mandolin introducing the soaring voice of Miranda, so appropriate for the song, 'Little Bird'; a similar arrangement and setting occurs on a later track 'All This Time'. Both give the listener a sense of grounding. Alongside these there is much variety. Playful numbers include the only traditional song, 'Lady Isabel and the Elf Knight'. For most Miranda takes lead vocals with Rex adding harmony on occasion; on two, 'How Soon How Long' and 'Mysterious Day', this is reversed and the powerful voice of Rex is heard to full effect. There is only one instrumental track, 'Red Prairie Dawn', a toe-tapping, superb performance, blending styles and giving centre-stage to their instrumental skills. On some they are joined by Grant Gordy on flatpick guitar. This is their second album as a duo. It is hoped that more will follow and that they continue to work together for many years to come.

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

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Review Wait for no man

This collection of songs and ballads, mainly from Yorkshire and the North East, has a reference to time passing. Many of the songs have a nautical flavour with some new compositions mainly written by Paul, and some older traditional songs all performed in a true folk style. Paul and Liz have very similar sounding voices and on the tracks where they sing together, as they are always in unison, they can sound uncannily like one voice. The songs are often unaccompanied, but some have also the lovely sound of the Wheatstone 58 button Maccann duet concertina.

Track 1 'Come See the Boys Go Round' is one of my personal favourites. Written by Paul, it is a homage to the longsword dance, and the refrain of 'raise the shining rose' referring to the tight lock of swords (hopefully!) being raised during and at the end of the dance. 'Green broom' tells the story of a young man looking to enjoy his wife's riches, while the 'Seven King's Daughters' is an unusual version of the 'Outlandish Knight' from Virginia in the USA.

'Ravenser Odd' tells the tale of a mythical town of drowned sailors beneath the waves of the North Sea off the Humber mouth. It is a very macabre story sung in a sombre voice. 'Boggle Hole Pirates' is a traditional sounding song written in recent times by Roy Blackman, and carries on the nautical theme of smugglers with a good tune and memorable lyrics.

'Nevison's Ride' is a take on the story of Dick Turpin the famous highwayman, which Paul accompanies with the concertina giving a good imitation of the horse's paces, all in a good catchy tune – another of my favourites from the CD. 'The Three Ships' taken from local legend continues the story of the three kings being carried by three ships to their burial place in Cologne Cathedral, while the final track written by Paul 'God Speed the Plough' rounds off the 'Time and tide wait for no man' theme very aptly.

I would recommend this CD to anyone who enjoys traditional songs sung in a simple and largely unadorned manner by two strong singers with an obvious love for their subject matter.

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This Love

House of Hats

Skipping through this initially and listening to it again from start to finish, it didn't seem anything close to being folk and I was concerned about reviewing it for What's Afoot. However, House Of Hats, do make an effort to let some of their folk/roots influences seep through their more pop-oriented sound. Aside from that, it is a pretty good album!

House Of Hats are a Brighton-based band and part of a thriving music scene. They seem to be pretty successful, owing to their intelligent implementation of an eclectic mix of music influences. The band line-up consists of Noddy (the female singer), James, Alex and Rob. The main instruments are acoustic guitars, piano, bass and drums, but fiddles, mandolin, melodeon and banjo are added to some of the tracks giving them more familiar folk-sounding influences.

To describe their sound is quite difficult, because of the mix of influences - perhaps a complicated hybrid of Fleetwood Mac and Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young, with shades of The Civil Wars and a toneddown Mumford & Sons with a female singer and without the banjo. Individual influences also seep through, ranging from Bob Dylan to Bob Marley with Ella Fitzgerald somewhere in-between. Their sound is easy to digest, a warm jangly summer pop/folk, with plenty of pleasant vocal harmonies. If there was a bone to pick with this album it is that its strength becomes a weakness as they seem to be over-reliant on their harmonies. Yes, the vocals sound really nice, but it would be nice to have some tracks sung completely solo as I think the lead singers are perfectly capable of carrying a song to the end and making one or two of them a bit more personal. Despite the variety of musical influences at the band's disposal this weakness makes it sometimes difficult to distinguish one

song from the other or, for that matter, pick out a stand-out track or tracks from the album.

I really enjoyed listening to this band, however, and would be interested in seeking out their future releases, to see where their developments take them. For those that enjoy and have an eclectic ear for this type of roots music this album is bound to please. For more pure folk enthusiasts you're probably wise to avoid this.

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Pennymoor Singaround CD

The Pennymoor Singaround is the longest running folk song club in Devon, at least under the same name. After a break of a few years at the Black Dog Inn, it has now returned to its original venue, the Cruwys Arms, Pennymoor. For just on 35 years it has kept the same format – no guests, just a friendly gathering of singers and musicians in the bar or skittle alley all ready to contribute their song or tune when called upon by the MC. Several of the current regulars were there at the beginning – Clare Penney (whose late husband, Ken, started the Singaround), Len & Cissy Christopher, Margaret Palmer, and musicians John & Wendy Wilson.

It's surprising that a recording of a typical Pennymoor Singaround session has not been produced before. Thanks are therefore due to the Henrywood family for their efforts in capturing an iconic part of the Devon folk scene.

Apart from Jim Causley, none of the performers on this CD are professional musicians or singers and most have never been previously featured on an album, This gives a tremendous variety in the material presented and demonstrates that there is a wealth of talent amongst the 'floor singers' who are the backbone of folk clubs. In a short review it is not really possible to comment separately on every singer's contribution, much as I would like to do so. Those people already identified above ably offer a well-known song or tune while others render one of their favourites – Jon Shapley with Lavenders Blue, Paul Snow with The Brave Deserter, for example. I love the Graeme Miles song, Where Ravens Feed, sung here as well as anybody I've heard by Kath Parry. If you remember the days before Honiton, Exeter and Okehampton had a by-pass, you'll appreciate the humour of the Miles Wootton composition sung by Ross Causley.

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Old England's Ground

This CD is for those who love traditional songs, well sung in the old fashioned way. Nick has an excellent voice which he uses well – the sort of voice which easily masters the chattering masses at the bar during a live session. Nick has selected unusual songs sung in a deliberately stripped back, traditional style, which works very well with the excellent vocals. Some tracks are just with his voice and others accompanied by his exquisitely sensitive guitar playing. The vocals are excellent - clear with good diction – every word can be heard. Nick's variations of tempo and volume give the CD an added dimension of interest and variety. He says that he has been taught by the old masters of traditional song – and it shows!

Nick has carefully and lovingly researched his material and chosen unusual songs he likes or finds interesting or different. Each song was recorded in a maximum of two takes – sometimes only one – so seeing Nick live (which I have not yet done) should be a real treat.

My personal preference is accompanied song, so I tended to prefer these tracks on the album. My favourite tracks were 'The Blacksmith' – a melodic song of slighted love, gently rendered with beautiful guitar accompaniment;' Through Bushes and Through Briars' – a more upbeat song of the impact of (possibly) unrequited love from a woman's point of view; and 'Just as the tide Was' – a sailor's love song. Nick is too modest about his abilities to sing this and I really liked his new arrangement as his chords created a musical surprise.

The CD and notes are very tastefully produced, complimenting the album, and have a lovely glossy feel. Nick's very personal introduction warms you to him and the album and each song is carefully documented.

All in all – a delightful album for those who love to hear traditional songs sung in traditional style.

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
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Review The Good Red Earth

Freshly Ground

Freshly Ground are a group of friends and singers, mostly based in the West Country, brought together by Issy Emeny: they comprise Issy and her husband David, Graham and Sandy Ball, Tim Brine and Sue Franklin, Sue Cook, Bernard Coulter, Gaynor Hughes, Linda Van Eyken and Vicky Wiggins – all strong singers, several of whom have made their own valuable contributions to the folk scene.

They have obviously had fun drinking coffee and singing together in harmonies arranged by Issy for both traditional songs and her own material. In her sleeve notes, Issy admits that arranging folk songs for choirs is treading 'dangerous ground', and I must confess to preferring the ad hoc harmonies created in a pub song session to the tightly arranged and- to my mind – rather contrived versions of traditional songs - such as John Bull, Widecombe Fair and Hey John Barleycorn - arranged for this CD. Martinmas Time and The Keys of Canterbury work better with the range of voices, emphasising and enhancing the dialogue upon which these songs are based.

Of Issy Emeny's own material, The Reddleman (inspired by the character of Diggory Venn in Hardy's The Return of the Native) is the song I enjoyed the most: it captures the strangeness of this lonely man and the harmonies work well. The Last Tommy is a poignant reflection on war and the causes of war, written just after the death of Harry Patch, the last surviving soldier from The Great War.

Arrangements such as these will inevitably be a matter of personal taste: I would have enjoyed some accompaniment to some of the songs, which would have created a bit more variety – many of the singers are also strong instrumentalists. But there are many ways of performing and enjoying folk music, and I am sure this CD will be enjoyed by many.

In Devon the main form was the apple tree wassail which was celebrated around Torquay, Exeter and East Devon; while in Somerset they were mainly found in the South, West and Centre. This was the West Country's main apple tree wassailing area, yet it survived only at Carhampton, West Somerset. In the late 19th century in Cornwall and Gloucestershire it was mainly a house visiting custom; Somerset had both types and Dorset had neither. A generalisation but close to the truth.

Although wassailing the crops, particularly apple trees, has been reported over the centuries from many places, the revival started in the heartland at Dunkeswell in the 1950s and the re-awakening with Chanctonbury Ring Morris Men in the 1960s. Taunton Cider revived wassailing in the 1970s and Whimple in the 1990s. The distinction drawn between revival and re-awakening is whether, or not, there is previous experience of the custom.

This book is about the re-awakening, where almost any part of the traditional formula of apple tree + cider + guns + song can be substituted, modified or extended to create an event. Additional characters are numerous, from a wassail King and/or Queen onwards. An internet search in 2012 – 2013 found over 200 public wassails taking place from Penzance to Edinburgh.

The seed (pip?) of this great reawakening came with the setting up of the first Apple Day by Common Ground in 1990, followed by a number of books, ending with the Community Orchards Handbook (2008). In the words of the Carhampton song the wassail can be said "to bloom well and to bear well". For anyone wishing to start an apple tree wassail this is essential reading.

Live Venue Review

When a Brewery Really Rocks

Every Thursday evening the Red Rock Brewery near Bishopsteignton hosts a live music session. in the outer lounge of the Old Workshop, adjacent to the microbrewery. The converted barn is about 20 x 20 feet square with a mix of stools, chairs and armchairs plus standing room. The session is totally acoustic - no mic, no amps – with a very informal, friendly "in your own front-room" atmosphere. Folk is a strong element but it can cover anything from blues, bluegrass, delta blues, old English traditional, sea shanties, gypsy jazz, popular songs and rock n roll . Guitar+Vocals seems to be the popular form of performance but there's usually violin/fiddle and double bass.Other instruments welcome – the more variety the better. A capello is also welcome.

The format - from 7.30-ish onwards until 11pm - is two songs per set (performances) then onto the next performer(s) in order of turning up. We usually get two sets in per performer (two rounds) in the night - with a jam session in the last half hour, time permitting. Performers have to be committed enough to wait for over an hour between their sets.

John Morey usually MCs the evening to keep things moving, until the jam session in the last half hour (time permitting) to ensure everyone gets a fair shout. But if individuals want to ask for support during their own sets, there are plenty of musicians who will join in on specific numbers (e.g. if you want a bass, or fiddle accompaniment.).

Typically evenings have been running at 10-14 individual performers per night on a regular basis - a slow night is 8 individuals playing. All performers - and non-performers - are welcome, particular more young 'uns. Singer-songwriters welcome. With beer at £2.50 a pint it cannot be bad! Forty Years a Dartmoor Legend

The Kelly Quarry Blasters

The KQB's have been around Dartmoor for over forty years and Peter Mason has produced the D.V.D which is directed expertly by Steve Price with all profits going to the Lustleigh society.

The D.V.D is continuous with no tracks and is a story of the group from its inception in 1972 to the present day. The story is told with archival material and excerpts from a concert in Lustleigh in 2013. This is backed up by filmed interviews with the past and present members of the band and other local characters such as Tony Beard, Bill Murray and the late Bill Cann.

The band's line up is Richard Prince/Guitar /vocals, Dave Wills /Tea-chest bass / vocals, Len Harvey /Vocals and stories, Carl Allerfelt and Rob Murch, Banjo and vocals. Ex band members appearing are Mike Baker, Mike Price and Sid Matthews. Richard Prince has a powerful rich voice and plays excellent guitar accompaniment. Len Harvey and Dave Wills are the comedians and story tellers in the group whilst Rob Murch and Carl Allerfeld are superb musicians on fiddle and banjo respectively

The T chest /bass is a giveaway in that to start with, the group performed skiffle music, popular in the 70's. Remember Lonnie Donnigan? There are good old folk standards such as Whiskey in the Jar and the whole film is expertly linked by stories and sketches. Len and Dave Wills are hilarious and I was in stitches when they sang Old MacDonald had a farm. The group manage to entertain the punters but at the same time they are also having a good time themselves and this is very apparent in the film. The DVD has a very Dartmoor-ish flavour and interviews take place on moorland farms with the background of the moor.

I thoroughly enjoyed this film and recommend it for sheer enjoyment. I must say that the editing is superb and the music, archive material and stories are smoothly linked. I have seen it three times and as Bill Murray says in the film: "You know the punch line of the joke they are telling but it is still funny when you hear it!"

Review

Phil Beer

at the Acoustic Warehouse

The Acoustic Warehouse is an Open Mic club which has found a permanent home at the Passage House Inn (*see ad*) which has allowed it to expand to occasionally showcase professional live acts. An intimate venue, it was quite snugly packed on this occasion for a well known local artist. Not only does Phil live relatively locally, he also grew up in the area and there were tales about his past, including the involvement of the pub and Teignmouth, just down the road.

Most will know Phil for his work with Show of Hands, although he has a pedigree which goes back to his duo with Paul Downes back in the 1970s and includes a period in The Albion Band, yet his interests are far more eclectic than this and that was reflected in his choices of material. We were treated to Willing and Crow on the Cradle from the Show of Hands set list as well as shortened stripped bare version of The Falmouth Packet/Haul Away Joe in which the audience provided the backing vocals in style. But we also had a variety of blues, a Hollies number, a Nic Jones song (Warlike Lads of Russia) as well as some modern songs of quality.

Phil is an entertainer and a musicians musician all rolled into one. His banter was interesting. funny, informative and nostalgic. His choice of material moved seamlessly from one style to another, providing variety. His array of instruments which he had brought along were all played including the ukulele which he featured with humour and panache, moving from telling us about the (spoof) origins of the instrument to playing the tune Banish Misfortune on it seamlessly and following that with an O'Carolan tune after telling us that the harpist actually played two ukuleles stuck together! But of course, the fiddle, the mandolin and three different guitars were also featured. One was left with the impression that Phil just loves playing music and enjoyed the gig as much as Martin Gosling his audience did.

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Steeleye Span

Wintersmith

Wintersmith is a collaboration between two leading exponents in the world of the arts of the past half-century, the folk/rock band, Steeleye Span, and the fantasy writer, Terry Pratchett.

Having been ardent followers of each other for many years, the idea for this project developed when Steeleye Span played at Terry's sixtieth birthday party. The title, Wintersmith, comes from Terry's thirty-fifth Discworld novel and conjures up a world of fantasy, mystery, intrigue, and excitement. We immediately want to start on the musical journey ahead and know more.

The listener is captivated from the dramatic opening bar of the first track 'The Dark Morris Song', an example of the classic Steeleve Span style, folk rock at its best. With great effect the next track, the title tune, is mellower and commands greater attention to the lyrics. The story is starting to unfold as is the musical journey. Excitement and high energy tracks are complemented with hauntingly beautiful songs such as 'You', and the gently lilting 'The Good Witch' and 'Hiver' both sung by Maddy Prior in a light upbeat way, with understated accompaniment. Drama and higher energy return with 'Fire & Ice' and 'Crown of Ice', with an unaccompanied song, rhythmic and slower, 'The Making of Man', between the two. The story continues, the music and songs lead us on, delighting, thrilling and surprising us until

the final track 'We Shall Wear Midnight', and the close.

With the wealth of talent that Steeleye Span has, the songs and one instrumental number 'The Dark Morris Tune', are all arranged, written and are performed to an exceptionally high standard. Recently Steeleye Span has expanded from the four-piece band to a six-piece one with new members, Pete Zorn and

Julian Littman. For this project they were also joined by Bob Johnson on vocals, John Spiers on melodeon, and Kathryn Tickell on Northumbrian Pipes. A special guest appearance is made by Terry Pratchett, whose original creation and insight inspired the project.

This is a concept album. The thought, collaboration and dedication that must have gone into the concept to produce such a work is evident throughout. Each number could stand on its own and, in time, several numbers will become well-known as a separate entity. However, the album as it stands gives the feeling of being one work, a whole: sit back, be drawn into another world and enjoy it.
