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Special Feature John Jones & Reluctant Ramblers Two Moors, Two Seas tour through Devon

Intrepid What's Afoot reporters, Jackie and Bob Patten, Colin Andrews, John Kennaby and Sue Hamer-Moss attempted to follow John Jones and his group at the end of May as they rambled and gigged at such diverse venues as Barnstaple Beer Festival, Plough Arts Centre at Torrington, Tally Ho, Hatherleigh, Drewe Arms, Drewsteignton, Barrel House Ballroom Totnes, Watermark Theatre, Ivybridge and the Swan at Noss Mayo, near Plymouth.

This is their experience....

It takes a very special gift to create magical performances at such varied venues as a beer festival, a formal theatre, a tiny local pub, and a modest back room with a handful of chairs. Add to that walking 20 miles before each gig. Add to that performing at the above listed venues on successive days. If you missed the wonderful John Jones and the Reluctant Ramblers and their unfailingly friendly and inclusive band of followers as they passed through Devon, you missed a real treat.

John Jones, lead singer of Oysterband, is also President of the Powys Ramblers Association. Five years ago, he conceived the idea of fulfilling his passion for going around the UK on foot to seek out living villages with a heart and soul in beautiful, out of the way parts of England. This year, his Two Moors, Two Seas tour involved a week-long walking tour from Barbrook to Noss Mayo during the day, with evening performances at venues along the way. Starting with a couple of fellow Oysterband members on the first tour, the core group accompanying John has grown to around 35 people of all ages – from as far afield as US and, Denmark as well as all over the UK. Some go every year. As well as walking well over 100 miles with John, most of the group go to each of the gigs. Just a quick bit of maths suggests that the most avid followers will have been to over 20 gigs – and they all want to come back for more.

It is easy to see why - the breadth of repertoire; the relevance of the lyrics; the soaring crescendos that engage the most obdurate local; the contrast between delicately accompanied traditional songs and pulsating, energetic folk rock at its best. The arrangements are brilliantly conceived to reflect the mood of each song – for example: the wild and ethereal fiddle in Ghost of the Village, the scrummy rich bowing on stand-up bass in new song 'I'll be your Ferryman', the delicate accompaniment to 'Banks of Sweet Primroses' beautifully sung by Rowan Godel or driving percussion on the rousing up tempo numbers. These are just examples - every song added something special.

John is fantastic at understanding and engaging his audience and was unflappably courteous at all times, even when confronted with the unexpected, alcohol fuelled intervention!

Jackie and Bob Patten were at the Plough Concert - and said:

'John Jones & the Reluctant Ramblers let us all share a part of their walking and music holiday through Devon. Not only did we feel the holiday spirit we were also given an evening of superb music. John Jones lyrics touch everyone, storytelling about contemporary life and our country in song at its best. The traditional material alongside this complemented it perfectly. The sheer pleasure that they had on stage enveloped the auditorium too. Sitting with some of the walkers we felt as if we had been walking with them all day!'

Colin Andrews came to the morris dancing, concert and ceilidh at the Drewe Arms -

'With an iconic folk band and morris dancers at a popular Dartmoor pub on a fine evening in May, a good audience would surely be expected. But for something really special add in a well-publicised coast-to-coast walk by the band's leader and his followers, for which the pub was the chosen venue for the fourth night's stand. John Jones, along with over 40 supporters and fellow musicians, had already walked 20 odd miles that day from Hatherleigh to Drewsteignton. Far from being dead on their feet, John and his itinerant band of 'Reluctant Ramblers' (some also members of Oysterband)

gave an energetic performance in the packed function room of the Drewe Arms. Not just a concert, like their Monday show at Torrington, but a spirited evening which added playing for a ceilidh.

Beforehand, in the village square, the crowd were entertained by Great Western Morris Men and Tinners Morris Men. John Jones declared he was in some ways returning to his roots, as he was an original member of Great Western and involved in the early days of the long -running traditional folk song club at the Jolly Porter in Exeter.

The band's concert programme included several traditional songs, some with a gentle guitar and fiddle backing, others with the full folk-rock treatment that is more characteristic for John's own well-crafted compositions. From impressive percussion and fiddle led backing group, supported by guitar and double bass, the band transformed seamlessly into a very danceable ceilidh band with John driving the traditional tunes on melodeon.

When I eventually crept away, exhausted even though I hadn't walked further than from my car, that cosy function room was still rocking and swaying with people all thoroughly enjoying the evening.

John Kennaby was at the Barrel House Ballroom 'Another amazing evening with John Jones and his stunning band. This was a full set performance, and it was also being filmed for future promotion. It was a fully packed house with all tickets being sold, so this and the filming of course added to the atmosphere of the event. John opened the show with Walking through Ithonside, a beautiful ballad about walking along a river in his native Welsh border country. This was followed by a great rousing chorus song,

John's own composition Black and White Bird is based on a local true story and is another up lifting song from this wordsmith and great singer. The second half of the show opened up with the Wanderer which always goes down a storm with

Spirit of Dust.

the knowledgeable audience of Oysterband fans. Great set of songs by John and Rowan's superb soulful singing also added to the variety of the evening. The evening climaxed with a rousing rendition of the old Animals pop hit, 'We gotta get out of this place', and then ended with a magical finale of a whispered song that lead John and the band off stage, and out into the cool night air. The audience there knew that they had had a good time, full of wonderful songs performed to John's normal brilliant standard.

Dartington Playford 40th Anniversary

The Folk Dance weekends at Dartington came into being 40 years ago at the suggestion of Eric Langford, the Deputy Warden of the Devon Centre for Further Education, which was then based at Dartington. Even before the war Eric had been a keen folk and Morris dancer, and when approached for an idea for an activity to occupy a weekend in January, saw the potential of Dartington as an ideal location for a weekend of folk dancing. Eric immediately got in touch with his friend Tom Cook who agreed to come and call and Joan Winsor and Jimmy Coleman provided the music.

During the Saturday afternoon of that first year, Tom Cook treated participants to a lecture on Playford style dance. It was also at his suggestion that callers were asked to come for two consecutive years so that they could acquaint themselves with the weekend during the first year and then relax and enjoy the second. The list of callers is impressive and includes, among many others, Tom Cook, Pat Shaw, Colin Hume, Peter André, Charles Bolton, Robert Moir and Philippe Callens. have included Joan and Jimmy, mentioned above, as well as Gwyn George and Hilary Hudson, Denis Smith and, more recently, Deo Volente. Over the vears dancers have come to the weekend from far and wide and there has usually been a waiting list for places.

As Dartington was a College of Arts in the 1980s, the dance weekend was always held in January, when the students were away, as accommodation was needed for 72 dancers – as well as callers and musicians. In 1988 Eric organised a summer folk dance course in July– Tom Cook again calling and Jimmy Coleman and Gwyn George playing. It was popular but many preferred their winter 'break' as there was so much else going on in the summer.

Bad weather has succeeded in disrupting the Folk Dance weekend only twice in the past 40 years on both occasions it was almost snowed off. The first time was in 1982 when many people from a distance didn't make it and the second in 2010 when neither the caller nor musicians could get there. Generously, Robert Moir, who was one of the guests, took over the calling and Gwyn

George – another guest played the piano with Hilary Hudson, a local, on the violin. It has been cancelled on only one occasion, That was in 2000, when new central heating was being installed in the Great Hall and, not only was the floor being taken up, but there were deep trenches outside. Bob Franklin, the organiser at that time, arranged a dance for disappointed locals, and anyone else who could get there, in a local village hall.

In 1983/84 the Great Hall and most of the rooms in the east and west wings were not available as one of the Elmhirst family was staging an opera in the Great Hall and the cast needed accommodation. So the dancers were asked to use one of the studios in the Dance School, a little way down the drive – obviously not as spacious or gracious as the Great Hall but better than not having the weekend.

Eric, with the support of his wife, Muriel, organised the weekends, until he died in 1994. He was succeeded by Bob Franklin, another well-known and respected dancer and caller, who took over the organisation for the next 10 years In 2005, Patricia Reid took over the organisation and put in 9 years of very hard work which meant the weekends went smoothly on although things at Dartington were changing rapidly as it was turning into a conference centre – a very different ethos from an Art College. Then this year, 2014, Kathy Dunce organised the 40th anniversary dance weekend,

Sidmouth - How things were

For those of us who were not around 60 years ago - or at least not going to festivals(!), Alleew Wills, one of the original organisers, presents a fascinating insight into the very first Sidmouth festival. Thanks to John Dowell, a former director of the festival, for a copy of an (the?) advert from 1955. ed

With the 60th Sidmouth Festival fresh in our minds it occurred to me that many people will have no idea of its humble beginnings or even believe how things were then.

I was a member of the Society's staff working in Exeter for a formidable lady called Margaret Grant, who was the S.W.Area Organiser. She was so well thought of as a dance teacher and organiser that many young members of staff were sent to her for training. For many years the Society had run a two week summer festival at Stratford on Avon but it was time to move on Could a similar event be held in the South West? In 1953/4 Margaret and I set about exploring the possibilities for such a festival Councils had to be approached, venues adequate and accommodation available. Finally Sidmouth was decided upon as having everything such an event would need. We reserved hotel, boarding house and B & B accommodation of varying prices (definitely no official camping sites).

In 1955 the first Sidmouth Festival was held – directed by Margaret Grant and Nibs Matthews. Dancers had to apply and pay to come. For the whole week the fee was £4 for a pair or £2.10s for a single man or £2 for a single woman (this was because a man had the opportunity to dance Morris and Sword which a woman could not do in public then).

If you were a single and wanted accommodation we would match you up with someone of the same sex to share a room and we would match you to a dancing partner whom you kept for the week. No foreign teams then of course. The Manor Pavilion was booked for the week for rehearsals for the "shows" and for social gatherings. Emphasis was on dance performance since shapes, rhythms and steps flowed within the show. If your dancing was not up to scratch a "special" job was found for you

selling programmes, shaking a collection box or even in a Fool's costume with the obligatory pigs bladder! Daily performances were given in the Connaught Gardens and on The Ham and opened with Winster Processional along the sea front followed by dancing for the public

The Festival did move to Exmouth for one, maybe two years but the atmosphere was wrong and it soon returned to Sidmouth.

Oh happy days.

There are not too many occasions when you can say that it was a perfect weekend, but our Sixties Folk Song Revival Reunion Weekend at Halsway Manor on 14th- 16th March, was just that. Genial company, a beautiful venue, friendly ambience, fantastic singing sessions, stories, reminiscences, meeting up with friends old and new, lovely meals, comfortable accommodation, good beer and even beautiful weather! It couldn't have been any better! It all went with that apparently effortless smoothness that means that someone has worked very hard behind the scenes for a long time i.e. our hosts Meg Rose and Bill Crawford, (aided by friends and family). The friendly Halsway staff made us all very welcome and made our stay very comfortable.

Friday night was our meet and greet, with much poring over the photos of many of our number 'from the old days' which Meg and Bill and others had gathered together and displayed in Halsway's wonderful folklore library. In some of these photos people looked very young in comparison to now, especially Paul Simon at the Jolly Porter! After our first good meal Bill hosted a great singing session in the bar. When the session officially ended, there was much more singing, chatting, beer and whisky till late for the stalwarts.

Saturday was a beautiful day, and we had teas and coffees outside, strolling around the beautiful grounds with their carpets of cyclamen, daffodils and the white blossom of the blackthorn. Ted and Ivy Poole (Swindon FC) led the reminiscences session in the bar, sharing their memories of the early days of the South West Federation of Folk Clubs. They told anecdotes about the many guests they had booked for their club in Swindon over the years. Other club organisers shared their memories too.

After a good lunch, Dave Longly and Meg Rose hosted a 'Desert Island Discs' with Ted and Ivy Poole choosing their favourite recordings of folksingers they had booked for their club – including, for example, the McPeake Family and Bob Davenport - along with more reminiscences and anecdotes. Dave Longly played the music for us. After that, Taffy Thomas MBE talked about his amazing, embroidered silk 'Tale coat' and told a couple of his mesmeric stories about some of the creatures portrayed on the coat. After tea, Bonnie Sartin gave an interesting talk about the history of Halsway Manor, the library and the Federation.

Then an influx of us went down to the nearby Carew Arms for a rousing song session and a pint, competing with the rugby and a wedding! Back for dinner, followed by a brilliant, lively song session in the bar led by Dave Lowry. Once again, people stayed on till late, singing and drinking.

As expected, (the clue was an amazing deep red mackerel sky at sunset on Saturday, and a huge full moon into the bargain,) Sunday was another beautiful, sunny day, if a bit blowy. We set out on a two and a half mile walk up to the top of the Quantocks, along the ridge with stunning views of the sea and the distant Brendon hills and Exmoor, then back down to Halsway in time for another wonderful singaround in the bar. They never seem to last long enough. After a 3-course Sunday lunch, served so nicely by Halsway staff, we were treated to a showcase of award-winning young musicians playing and singing in the bar, introduced by Diggory Rose. We heard from Gavin Davenport, Amy Davenport, and James Findlay and friends. We felt our folk heritage was in very safe hands for the future.

Everyone thought it had been a wonderful weekend. When asked whether we would like to do it again next year, there was a resounding 'Yes'! So put 17th – 19th April 2015 in your diaries now!

Interview Miranda Sykes and Rex Preston

When this issue of What's Afoot reaches its readership, Miranda Sykes & Rex Preston will be mid-way through their 2014 tour. It finishes at the beginning of October when Miranda joins Show of Hands on tour. Find their tour dates in our STOP PRESS section.

We had a chance to meet them before a concert that they gave at The Plough, Great Torrington, in April. They were obviously enjoying the tour, a fact that was evident to the audience during the concert as well as when speaking to them. What people of Devon will be proud to know is that they now live in the county. Having had cause to come here regularly they found that it is a very easy place to be creative, with a good music community and a sense of place that is an asset both to their work and personally. Future plans include building on this environment and letting it play a central role in their next recording.

Such talented musicians and performers individually, as a duo they are flourishing. If at least their immediate future is with a base in Devon and being influenced by the present surroundings and music community, what have been the influences that meant that they reached this position?

Both were xposed to a wide range of musical genres from childhood. Classically trained from the age of eight, at the same time Miranda was taken to folk clubs by her parents from a very young age. She was encouraged to learn a song for a folk club and having done so once, began to build up a repertoire and to gain confidence in performing, so while developing virtuoso skills on the double bass that lifts the instrument to levels seldom heard, she was honing her incredible voice skills likewise lifting singing to a magical level. "It went from there really, making connections with people. I played in various different bands - Celtic bands - and then met Phil Beer. That was my link with Show of Hands." Miranda has subsequently toured with the band for ten years.

Rex is largely self-taught. Having gained wide acclaim for his superlative talent on the mandolin, it is interesting to learn that he first played the piano. His mother played the piano and his father

the banjo. It was at the age of ten that he took to the mandolin. His father encouraged him to play at every opportunity by taking him to folk and bluegrass sessions, giving him a taste of what it is like to play in public. It was, however, music technology that he read at Bath. The mandolin was always by his side and having spent the first ten years of his adult life pursuing a career in electronics, he realised that what he really wanted to do long-term was play the mandolin. In truth he admits that before he graduated he had decided that electronic music was not going to be his future and he was playing mandolin in a local band called The Scoville Units.

It was through The Scoville Units that Miranda and Rex met, when Miranda was hired as a 'cadet': "to cut a long story short, that band disintegrated but me and Miranda carried on and here we are". Double bass and mandolin is not a natural combination, yet it works with tremendous success. Rex also plays bouzouki and tenor guitar. Not only their instruments but their voices complement each other too, with Miranda taking most of the lead and Rex harmonising at times; when Rex does take the lead it is equally powerful and commanding.

To date they have produced two albums, the first very simply 'Miranda Sykes and Rex Preston', the second 'Sing a Full Song'. The tracks comprise songs that they have liked and decided to arrange to suit them drawn from a wide number of sources. The choices provide the audience with so much to think about, enjoy and re-visit. Seeing them live on this tour enhances the fact that they speak through their music. For their audience being part of that sharing process is a privilege. You have the impression that each time you listen to them, it will thrill you, you will feel part of it and be a party to their enthusiasm.







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Gig Review

Living Tradition

Barbara Brown reports on a brilliant Devonshire Association initiative to showcase local folk artists.

The second Living Tradition concert, organised by the Music Section of the Devonshire Association, was held at Sampford Peverell on the 15th February. For those not familiar with it, the Devonshire Association, which celebrated its 150th anniversary last year, exists 'for the advancement of science, literature and the arts.' The Music Section is only two years old and concerns itself with song and music of whatever genre that is indigenous to, or inspired by, the County. As last year at South Molton, the Living Tradition concert set out to present a wide range of traditional and contemporary material from Devon within the broad genre of 'folk'.

The concert was well attended, although several people had cried off in anticipation of bad weather. Sadly, Amy Birch, who was to have sung songs from her family's longstanding tradition, was unable to come to the concert due to ill-health in the family.

The concert opened with Becki Driscoll and Paul Wilson, both of whom work with Wren Music, a development agency which teaches and encourages people to sing, play and write songs and music throughout Devon. Paul (on accordion and guitar) and Becki (on fiddle) presented lively sets of tunes – some traditional, some self-penned, but all of which have found their way into the repertoire of tunes found at sessions throughout the county.

Ben Campbell followed with a superb set of modern songs all of which concerned tales and legends from Devon – from the history of a copper mine to the heart-rending story of Kitty J. Although not a native of the county, Ben has made Devon his home and his love of the county inspires his work. With his soaring voice and well-crafted guitar work, the audience were entranced.

The second half opened with two singers whose presence on the folk revival scene in Devon goes back to its very foundation (although they were very young when they started!). Bill Crawford and Dave Lowry gave the audience a delightful set of traditional songs, sung unaccompanied, both serious and humorous, including the Westaway's version of Widecombe Fair – delightfully confusing those members of the audience who were not familiar with it as it features a different set of names to the more familiar version. Their interactions on stage added a further dimension to the entertainment.

Last, but by no means least, came Paul Downes. Paul is a professional musician and singer, rooted in his native Devon, who delights in the traditional songs from the area and who has developed an international reputation as a singer, musician, accompanist and musical director (and Exeter Chiefs' No.1 fan). His set, utilising both guitar and banjo, included Cyril Tawney's Oggie Man which he had arranged especially for the concert. Paul's set, and the concert itself, finished, appropriately, with The Bellringing – one of the most famous Devon songs collected by the polymath and one-time President of the Devonshire Association, the Rev. Sabine Baring-Gould.

Demand from the audience suggests that there will be another Living Tradition concert in 2015, and in line with the principles behind it, the Music Section will be looking to hold it in another part of our huge county. The concert showed how our folk music traditions continue to evolve over time - may they never stagnate!

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Wild Goose WGS 401CD

What an excellently crafted CD this is! Each song has been diligently researched and carefully arranged. There is a lovely mixture of jolly toe-tapping tunes and atmospheric strings, with a generous North Devon flavour to the lyrics. Nick and Becki expertly mix their own compositions with arrangements of traditional songs resulting in a cohesive and eminently listenable-to CD.

The music is, however, much, much more than jolly tunes. It can be enjoyed on a more sophisticated level. Every single note is as clear as a bell. The deceptive simplicity of the arrangements enables each instrument to have an important part to play and gives the harmonies a balanced crispness, which is exquisite. Nick and Becki's expertise gives their sound a funfilled confidence. They play with a complete togetherness - exciting rhythms and subtle little key changes here and there - including the listeners in their fun but keeping them on their toes.

Each of the tracks has its own excellent reason for being enjoyable, so it is difficult to pick favourites. I particularly enjoyed the traditional medley of jigs, as there were so many different musical surprises – not least the slightly tongue in cheek reference to Status Quo - although there were at least 4 chords in Nick and Becki's version of "Burning Bridges" (aka 'Darby Kelly')! 'The Cornwall Apprentice' is beautifully arranged, with strong, driving chords to match the vocals. It's followed by a delicately played hornpipe set with its carefree play on rhythms and little key changes, all supported by ultra-crisp bassoon from Becki. I defy you not to go round the house singing 'one, two, three, four, five, six' after listening to 'The Torrington Ringers'. The beautifully slow and slightly melancholy strings on title track, 'Handful of Sky' transport you to the top of a windswept hill with consummate ease, providing a brilliant contrast to the previous iolly jig track.

What I really appreciated about this album was the thoughtfulness in music and voice

arrangements which complement the subject matter in each of the tracks, and the composition of the album as a cohesive whole, including Hilary Bix's imaginative cover.

With this CD, Nick and Becki extend an invitation to a personal music party – accept and enjoy!

Review

Exploring Folk Fiddle: An Introduction To Folk Fiddle Styles

At first glance this book looks and feels good. Despite the front cover being a fiddler playing a beaten up old fiddle, the matt finish gives it a very contemporary feel. If you're like me and you like to get lots for your money, then you're onto a winner here. It's a substantial volume at 208 pages. The layout is good, not too cluttered and the music notation examples are clear and easy to read. There is also an accompanying CD.

Although an 'introduction' to folk fiddle styles, this is definitely not for beginners of the instrument. To get the most from this book you need to be playing already and able to read music. The author states that the basis of the book is the 'Irish fiddle tradition'. I personally didn't find it 'too' Irish in its focus. There are techniques and tunes here from the Old-Time, Cajun, Scandinavian, Scots, English, Eastern European and Klezmer traditions. Each chapter discusses a specific topic and there is a lot of detail. There are chapters on the structure, rhythm and origins of tunes. Other chapters focus on ornamentation, bowing and getting the 'right feel' for the music. There are also chapters on modes, scales, open tunings, improvisation, playing sets, playing for dancing, playing in sessions and a whole lot more.

The accompanying CD has Audio tracks and Mp3 tracks that can be played on your laptop. In total there are nearly 100 tracks of tunes and examples! It's quite refreshing that some of the tune examples used are a little unusual and not the well worn standards that you might find elsewhere. 'The Beeswing Hornpipe' by the 19th century Newcastle fiddler James Hill, (in the not very often folk fiddle used key of B flat), being an example that is now in my repertoire. Overall I found this an excellent book for different styles and techniques that I'd thought about trying but never got round to. A really useful resource that can be worked through chapter by chapter, or dipped into now and again to work on a specific aspect of your fiddle playing. Excellent stuff!

Great with hops Full of spirit Goes down well

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
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www.bidefordfolkfestival.co.uk Hilary Bix 01237 470792 I recently heard Belinda O'Hooley and Heidi Tidow perform some of the tracks from this album at Starz Bar in Exeter, the venue for The Exeter Folk Project, started by Nic Jones' daughter Helen. Belinda, who plays piano, keyboard and accordion, has also played with Nic, as well as The Unthanks and Jackie Oates: both she and Heidi have powerful, haunting voices which work brilliantly together, and they held the audience at the intimate venue spell-bound.

Most of the tracks on the album were written by them, and several, including the title track, are firmly based in their Huddersfield home. The Hum refers to the background noise of a factory and is based on a conversation they had with a neighbour who is trying to sell her house: viewers are put off by the noise, but for her (and Heidi and Belinda) it is the hum of working and community life. Summat's Brewin celebrates the local breweries which not only provide real ales but also help to keep the community alive: 'Come one, come all raise your glass/To save the grand old local pub: Common beer not corporate!' Here the duo use the refrain from a traditional song collected by The Copper Family, 'Oh good ale, though art my darling', and at their gig they also performed a couple of traditional songs a cappella. Their strong political stance comes through on many songs, including Coil&Spring (with lyrics by Boff Whalley) which celebrates the protest of the Russian band Pussy Riot.

Two Mothers, probably my favourite track, is a moving song written for Jackie Oates whilst she was working on her Lullabies album: the tune is based on the lovely Celtic air 'Eochall' and tells the story of one of the many babies taken from their poor and unmarried mothers and sent to Australia for a 'new life' filled with 'sunshine and oranges', which often turned out to be one of virtual slavery. This tale has a happy ending, however, as the baby finds 'new hands, a bottle, kind eyes and a strange lullaby', and now has a child of her own. The album includes Ewan McColl's Just a Note – the note being a letter written home by a man who has had to leave

Ireland to work as a road-builder, and a powerful version of Nic Jones' Ruins by the Shore. It ends with the delicate Kitsune, based on the Japanese legend of a 'shape-shifter' woman who turns into a fox: her lover waits for her but finds the dead body of the fox by the roadside.

There is a real range of feeling and sound on this album: it was produced by Gerry Diver who also plays fiddle, guitar and bouzouki, and Belinda exploits the full possibilities of the keyboard to create very different atmospheres for each of the tracks. But having heard them live and unaccompanied, I can also say that O'Hooley and Tidow use their voices as powerful and enchanting instruments as well – now that I have got to know CD, I am eager to listen to their first award-winning album, The Fragile.

Still Going Strong

Twenty years since they were formed, the Other Band can certainly claim to still be going strong. They are a popular group in their native Cornwall, and make forays from time to time for gigs across the border into Devon. Mike Smith, their lead accordionist, was formerly with the Thunder & Lightning Band which had close associations with Carn Brea Morris.

Although they have previously issued a couple of CDs of live recordings, this is their first studio recorded album. The ten tracks feature a number of Mike's own compositions, a few tunes by other composers (for example, Last of The Summer Wine theme tune, and The Camels Are Coming from Peeping Tom's Ian Wilson), and some evergreen traditionals such as the Dorset 4 Hand, Soldiers Joy & Rakes of Mallow.

With a formidable line-up, consisting of Nina Hansell (fiddle), Fi Fraser (fiddle), Sue Harris (Hammered Dulcimer), Katie Howson (melodeon and harmonica), Jeannie Harris (melodeon) and the ubiquitous Gareth Kiddier (piano), one can hardly expect to be disappointed.

Predictably, this CD has lived up to all expectations. The music is vibrant, exuberant and infectious, guaranteed to tempt the most reluctant dancer to get on their feet.

Every one of the thirteen tracks is excellent for both dancing and listening, and has been selected to provide a full selection of dance rhythms and lengths. There is a good selection of tunes, from traditional to the recently composed. These are well researched, and come from a wide range of sources, including various far-flung partss of the British Isles, plus the US and Australia. Two tunes, "Howson's Hoolie" and "The Whetstone Reel", are composed by band member Sue Harris.

The tunes are played in a straightforward, nononsense style, with every instrument playing an equal part, driven along by Gareth Kiddier's strong, rhythmic piano.

Unusually for me, there isn't one track that I didn't like, or that I felt was just there as a make weight, but if I had to choose a personal favourite, it would be "The Lost Jig" (track 2), a tune collected from Charlie Batchelor, a fiddle player from New South Wales in Australia.

This CD makes great listening and also serves as a valuable resource for dancers, musicians callers and dance club leaders.

If you haven't heard Polkaworks yet, try and get to one of their ceilidhs. If you can't do that, buy the CD. Better still, do both!

I suspect, as she also comments, a few of the tunes will get 'nicked', as none of them are bog standard session pieces, but highly attractive, foot-tapping melodies. The only well-known offerings are three songs (The Old Mill Stream, Down By The Sally Gardens, & Tramps and Hawkers) featuring a guest appearance by Bob Davenport, probably the best traditional singer from the folk revival.

Folk at Flavel

A new series of folk concerts was launched at The Flavel Arts Centre in Dartmouth in April called "Folk at the Flavel".

The brain child of Peter Johnson and Jonathan Needs of local promoters "Dart Gig Promotions", the aim is to bring some of the best folk performers in the UK to the venue and the first three concerts in the series have been announced. It started on Thursday 10th April with a performance by the brilliant Martin Simpson.

September 13th will see the renowned trio Coope, Boyes and Simpson at The Flavel performing their show in remembrance of the fallen in the First World War, In Flanders Field.

Barry Coope, Jim Boyes and Lester Simpson first came together in 1990. Since then they have garnered a terrific following leading to two nominations for Best Band and Best Album in the BBC Folk Awards. In Flanders Fields takes its name from the poem written by John McCrae who was killed near Yprès in the First War. The production is a tribute to lives caught up in the War to end all Wars and brings together the poetry of the era, the biting humour of the soldiers on the Western Front and the music of the time.

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Review

Mick Ryan

A Day's Work (1st Performance)

Lympstone Village Hall 29/4/14

Cast: Maggie Boyle, Heather Bradford, Paul Downes, Pete Morton, Matt Quinn, Greg Russell and Mick Ryan.

2014 will see many events commemorating the centenary of the start of World War One. We already know the story, the horror, the sacrifice and the wanton disregard of lives seen as expendable by those in power. Deeply rooted in our cultural psyche 1914-18 stands as the benchmark of horror against which all other conflicts are judged. Mick Ryan originally wrote and performed "A Day's Work" in 1995, but has rewritten it for this centenary year. "A Day's Work" is described as a 'folk opera' but this is as misleading as calling 'Warhorse' a musical. This is a play, superbly acted, telling the story of three voung men taken off to war and the impact that has on their families, with the added texture and insight that song and music brings.

I am usually uncomfortable when singers try to act; it takes great skill to enable an audience to see beyond the performer they know and become involved in their character instead. Many folk plays I have seen suffer from poor pace, stumbled cues and self-conscious performances. "A Day's Work" is the glorious exception. The acting is superb from everyone. Mick has assembled an outstanding cast who are "right" in every way; their physical appearance, their mannerisms and body language reinforces their characterisations, so we are with them every step of the way. Coincidentally, they are also all fine singers and instrumentalists so the vocal performances and arrangements are outstanding.

The play is in two acts, the first Christmas 1914 when the war has started but involved only regular soldiers or volunteer. Village life for the three main lads continues as normal. We see them performing a Mummers play, with nice sideways swipes at the conflict illuminating the absurdity of it all. Gradually their positions become clear but they are swept up and Act Two sees them eighteen months later at the front line. Each of them has a personal journey of discovery, but I won't give away the dramatic climax mid act. Greg Russell had the whole audience riveted; you could have heard a pin drop, with his singing of 'The Lark Above the

Downs.' What a fabulous voice this young man has, absolutely spell binding. Maggie Boyle as Mary, the mother of one of the lads, held us in the palm of her hand with her performance of 'Another Harvest'; solo in Act One then in duet with Mick Ryan in Act Two.

The play opens with Paul Downes catching our attention with edgy guitar and the song "The Foe." 'The Foe' who is loathsome and blindly hated, telling us that 1914-18 is an allegory for all the current and recent wars, so this is not just ancient history but relevant to our lives and our Heather Bradford plays Maureen, the narrator, who links the scenes with pithily cynical insights, keeping the pace and giving us time to reflect between scenes and songs. Pete Morton, Matt Quinn and Greg Russell are the three lads from the village whose journey to manhood this story tells. Paul Downes, as well as providing the heart of the musical arrangements also contributes a vicar and an officer to the plot, obviously type casting for Paul.

Like every good play there is contrast and variety, light and dark, humour and poignancy. The pace of the acting is varied and so are the musical styles and rhythms of the songs. Although all the words are by Mick Ryan (with the exception of Cicely Fox-Smith's Home, Lads, Home) six of the songs have music by James Patterson, Sarah Morgan or Steven Faux, bringing a wider range of musical styles to play.

By now you will realise that I was pleased by the evening, as was everyone else in the packed hall. All, who had seen the 1995 play, agreed this production had brought it to life anew, so, even if you did see the original production, I would strongly recommend you to see this show; nothing else this centenary year could express better the complex feelings we all have for this dark time in our history, and the ongoing bleakness that is war. In my opinion "A Day's Work" is the undisputed 'hit' of 2014 and deserves a universal audience. Finding a performance of "A Day's Work" takes

If you weren't in Launceston Town Square on Easter Monday morning you surely missed a treat, for on that day, each year, Trigg Morris Men from Bodmin Town and thereabouts give us a magnificent display of Traditional Morris Dancing. Up to 30 dancers and musicians, all in black breeches, (long black skirts for the lady musicians), white shirts, white socks, black shoes, baldrics embroidered with traditional emblems, bell-pads on their legs, and, to crown it all, straw hats bedecked with fresh spring flowers of every hue, arrived at 10.30 am. What a beautiful sight! Many people had already gathered to await the arrival of the team which processed from the Coach Park, along Westgate Street, musicians playing, and into the Square, accompanied by our very own Town Crier, Mr Robert Tremaine. He delivered a superb welcoming speech and announced that this 2014 visit is the Team's 42nd vear to start their tour in Launceston, and they've never been rained off! Now there's a record!

The Traditional 'Obby Oss' in long black cloak and wooden 'horse's head' trotted among the onlookers, approaching all the young folk, who stroked and caressed the wooden head, to everyone's delight.

The Bagman, ex-dancer Vic Legg, that well known 'folk' figure from Bodmin, in his black breeches-suit trimmed with red braid and his black 'topper', conducted proceedings as Master of Ceremonies, introducing the dances and, as usual, throwing in many a Cornish joke to the amusement of the crowd! At one stage the Morris Men invited younger folk from the audience to join in the dancing which they willingly did, to rapturous applause.

The musicians, whose leader is Mr Chris Ridley, play such sweet lilting music and consist of three accordion players, and one each of concertina, recorder, washboard and cymbals players.

People in Chagford, Moretonhanpstead and the Devonshire Inn in Sticklepath were treated to a real spectacle of Morris Dancing by Great Western Morris and their guests, Glory of the West, Seven Champions and Fools Gambit. Great Western's performances are always great entertainment and this was no exception. There is a great age range in the side and it is a credit to them all that the energy (not to mention the leapfrogging!) was consistently high throughout. Their guests were not to be outdone. Glory of the West danced some really elegant Cotswold-style dances, with Seven Champions Molly providing a brilliant contrast with their inscrutable faces and hobnailed boots. Fools Gambit are a fantastic young side, with an infectious joy of dancing, excellent togetherness and wonderfully high jumping.

After a couple of great displays, the weather turned nasty, but that did not stop the dancing, which was successfully adapted to the small confines of the Devonshire Inn's public bar. I must also mention their very special coach driver who kicked off the lunchtime session at Moretonhampstead. No surprise really, as he is also a Winkleigh Morris man!

The tour proceeded to Lyme Regis on the following day and the customary dancing on Exeter Quay on Whit Monday.
