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

I have often felt that Sidmouth is thought of by Devon folk people as a festival one *goes to*, rather than being *a part of*. So I was delighted when the director, John Braithwaite, welcomed our approach to sell What's Afoot at the opening free concert, including an invitation to the preceding gathering for friends of the festival. At this point I should thank my 'partners in crime', the brilliantly proactive Mary Marker (*see also page 8*) and Jane Snow. Thank you ladies! It was also great to see Devon friends in various roles in and around the festival.

And what a triumph the festival was! 60 years old and counting. Acts old and new, and any excuse for a party. The new 'Hollywood' style 'Sidmouth Folkweek' sign in sky-high lettering on the hill opposite the campsite greeted newcomers emphatically. The columns scattered over the town with pictures from times gone by and comments from most of the doyens of the folk world, were truly fascinating. A huge effort orchestrated by John Dowell, who ran the festival for many years.

For those seeking nostalgia, there were many old favourites to enjoy. Steve Knightley, Oysterband, Andy Cutting, Martin Carthy, Pete Coe, Martyn Windham Reed, The Old Swan Band, Gas Mark 5, Paul Hutchinson and many, many more. The special thing about Sidmouth is that there is something for everyone, and I felt that the balance between comforting old favourites and exciting new acts was just about perfect.

Sidmouth has always been a great dancing festival and this year was no exception. In celebration of the 60 years of Sidmouth, all the dance teams made their way to the Connaught Gardens to give a free performance in glorious

sunshine to a packed lawn filled with festival goers and holidaymakers alike. Such a brilliant advert for the festival and hopefully one which will be repeated next year.

For youngsters, the gorgeous weather was a bonus. It was delightful to wander through the wonderful space that the festival creates in the Blackmore Gardens and watch children learning Maypole dancing - or to take a peek into the intensely creative and talented Shooting Roots sessions for young adults at the Arts Centre.

I personally chose to wallow in nostalgia. The Ovsterband concert was a rousing powerhouse with wonderful songs both old and new. Steve Knightley managed to convey the personal touch of his Grow your Own Gig tour in the Ham Marquee: no mean feat. Sidmouth Sunday is my favourite day as I love the opportunity to dance on the seafront surrounded by all the morris teams. I never miss the John Gasson jig competition. John was tragically killed in 1987 travelling to Sidmouth and the competition is in his memory - see Morris Matters for more. I decided to re-introduce myself to Playford dancing after about 40 years, with the fascinating set of workshops going through the different books chronologically - the more complex dances being a real mental challenge after a rousing Late Night Extra the previous night!

So all in all, the usual fab festival with something for everyone. Even if you don't buy a ticket, the atmosphere in the town is really special: music from most of the pubs, a buzzing and pretty well regulated craft market, really good quality healthy food and well designed chill areas. So what are you waiting for?

Kate Nye reflects on her weekend at Dartmoor festival

It was so nice, after several years absence, to return to Dartmoor Folk Festival, the friendly little festival after Sidmouth. I visited with a totally new perspective. I have, in the past, attended festivals with the sole purpose of personally playing as much music as possible in sessions. This time, I brought no instruments and attended as an observer / listener.

I was lucky enough to see The New Rope String Band on the Friday evening in the Marquee. I haven't laughed so much in years. They are a hilarious mix of wit, slapstick and great musicianship. Brilliant fun. They were followed by the robust and bouncy Dartmoor Pixie Band for the late evening ceilidh. I've always loved the 'Pixies', they make me wish I could dance!

On the Saturday, after having a leisurely rummage around the craft tent and chatting with some friends I watched the step dancing competition (*won by Jason Rice: ed*), The standard of dancing was superb as usual. Speaking of dancing, I caught up with a local morris side, Winkleigh Morris, who were on fine form.



Celebrating Cicely Fox -Smith

Remembering the legacy of the author and poet at Bow on June 21st. Alaw Quick, Sylvia Watts, Melanie Henrywood and Mike Warmanshare their memories of the day,

As the midsummer sun blazed down on Bow, over 100 people gathered in the Village Hall to begin our celebration of the life and work of Cicely Fox Smith. A year or more of planning was culminating in what was to be a marvellous day.

Cicely Fox Smith was born in Lymm, Cheshire in 1882, but settled in Hampshire after the First World War. She was prolific in the works she created, which have long been a source for folk performers.

Nowhere in Bow had she been commemorated as a writer until a special day was held in the village in June to mark her significant contribution.

Sylvia recalls: 'Several of us strolled to St Bartholomew's churchyard for the Commemorative Ceremony via Cicely's home, which she had shared with her sister Madge. The daughter of the current residents laid wild flowers on Cicely's grave: due to diligent research Mel Henrywood ascertained for sure that it is also Madge's (Margaret Scott Smith) resting place, and her name will be included on the stone. The Rev Anthony Geering, Prebendary of Exeter Cathedral, led us in a beautiful ceremony, which included a Celtic invocation known as a Caim, a New Zealand version of the Lord's Prayer, and we 'clipped' the grave – a West Country custom. A young lady from Bow laid some wild flowers, we all sang the Farewell Shanty, and the church bells pealed in celebration.

We then repaired to the Village Hall once again for a cream tea repast. Danny McLeod, a singer and writer from the North East and a passionate authority on Cicely Fox Smith and her work, led a discussion group. This brought to the fore just how unusual a woman she was, succeeding in a man's world and convincing her readers that she must be a man. There was a poetry competition which was taken up with enthusiasm. The remit was to write on one of Cicely's main themes – the sea, World War 1, nature, children's poetry, sometimes with humour. The winning poem - 'At the Memorial Stone' is reproduced on page 11, by kind permission of the author.'

This was followed by a concert to celebrate her life and work and to mark 60 years since her death on April 8, 1954. The concert featured songs and readings of Cicely's poems. Performers included Martyn Wyndham-Read, Tom Lewis, Peter and Barbara Snape, Moira Craig, Joyce and Danny Mcleod, Bill Wilkes and Jim Saville, "Shake a Leg" Jackie Williams, other singers from around the country and local singers from the South West, including a local resident who read the dialect poem "The Old Cob Wall". Cicely's poems have been an inspiration to folk singers who have adapted her work, adding tunes to her poems to create songs evocative of this golden age.

The Cicely Fox Day project was initiated by four folk friends, Mike Warman, Sylvia Watts and Dick and Melanie Henrywood. Melanie said: "It was a brilliant day - superb weather, magical graveside ceremony, fantastic concert and memorable singaround". Sylvia adds: 'The aims of the day were to provide a more fitting headstone for this notable poet, author and traveller, and to enable a wider audience to appreciate her work. Judging from comments on the website, those aims were truly realised.' Many, many thanks to everyone who gave freely of their time, their talent and their skills in bringing this project to fruition. Thanks to one and all it was an absolutely brilliant day'.

Cicely left a legacy of books and 650 poems that capture the essence of the last years of the 19th century and the first years of the 20th century. Mike Warman continued: 'Her work is not as widely read and known as she might deserve! She wrote about the sea and it is mainly these poems which have been set to music and are widely sung in the UK, US and Australia. She was quite a character-speeding round the Devon lanes in her Morris Minor'.

A 52-page souvenir booklet "Celebrating Cicely", was published to mark the occasion. A DVD and CD of the celebrations and about the life of Cicely is being professionally produced.

AT THE MEMORIAL STONE

I saw them though I know you will doubt it: The fifteen held in 'in grateful memory', Shuffling into line, looking down at their boots, Awkward in rough tunics, too big, too small, Stitched by the resentful fingers of girls Waiting for the dark factories' hoots. Belts were pulled tight on skinny waists, Shoulders sagged with the Lee Enfield weights. A voice – the assured tone of the squire class – Called their names: a roll call of the local Yeomanry: Metherell, Hayman and Holmes, Murrin, Down, Luscombe and the Edworthys, Local lads who had it all before them. The names hung in the moth-busy air. A sharp order, backs straightened, webbing creaked And eyes now looked beyond the granite stone. As one they turned and as one they marched off Down the dark, dripping lane back to their homes Of silence, low ceilings and blackened hearths And sleeping strangers barely remembered By longing hearts. And did we deserve them?

Have we done our best? Would we make them proud?

Gig Review

Steve Knightley's Grow Your Own Gig Magelake Hall, Uffculme, 4th July 2014

Nícola Kíngwas lucky enough to get to one of Steve Knightley's acclaimed Grow Your Own Gig concerts. Here are her impressions:

This gig was one of a series of 'Grow Your Own Gig' concerts which Steve has been doing in village halls all over the country this year, beginning with one at the folk club in Kenn in January which I was also lucky enough to see. Both Steve and Phil Beer, as well as doing big concerts as Show of Hands, believe in taking their songs back to the communities which provide their inspiration, doing small intimate gigs which involve their audiences and keep them in touch with their roots in Cornwall. Devon and Dorset. Steve's backdrop for the gigs on this tour is a black and white drawing of a Dartmoor kitchen: Steve joked that he always expects Phil to come walking across the moor towards the window of the kitchen, and onto the stage ...

Steve's set included 'Black Night in Yeovil Town', the true story of how he and Phil had a close escape from a local thug whilst trying to buy fish and chips after a poorly attended gig in the town of that name. 'Transportation' tells the story of sheep stealers who cleverly evade the police when their van breaks down on a rainy night on the A30, and puts the crime into historical context by thanking their good luck for not being caught in the days of transportation 'down under': this song got the audience joining in with the chorus straight away. Steve's dry humour comes through in these songs based on his own - or local -experience, and also tells the moving stories of a couple drowned in the River Dart which 'every year claims a heart' and a gamekeeper related to Steve who found himself facing the guns in the battle of the Somme. Steve referred to the album 'Centenary' which Show of Hands were invited to make as part of the commemoration of World War One, and sang the beautiful Requiem, a version of Wilfred Owen's 'Anthem for Doomed Youth'.

Steve includes traditional songs too: a lovely version of 'Twas on One April Morning'

which he learned from the late Tony Rose, and 'Renardine', which he accompanied on the quattro, a small instrument from Venezuela rather like a ukulele. One of the most surprising songs of the set was a powerful blend of Dylan's 'Boots of Spanish Leather' and 'Try', a song by one of his teenage daughter's favourite singers, Pink. For the encore, Steve performed one of Show of Hands' now iconic songs, 'Arrogance Ignorance and Greed'. He introduced it by wondering why there are now so few protest songs in the vein of the early Dylan and Bruce Springsteen: there was a door on either side of the stage at this venue and as Steve sang the song he turned to one door and then the other, looking for Bob and Bruce, and had the audience in stitches - and gasps of admiration – as he sang one verse in the voice of Dylan and the other in that of Springsteen. A friend who has only recently 'discovered' Steve and Show of Hands said to me after a gig at Sidmouth that she thought Steve was an English Springsteen – I hope he would take that as a compliment! There are more gigs to come, and Steve said that he thought the theme of the next series might be songs of the sea, with a new backdrop to match – I am looking forward to that one!

Looking Back in Time - 1950

Whit Monday Morris in Devon

Colin Andrews was fascinated to discover Helen Conant's report of Whit Monday morris dancing in Devon, from the July 1950 edition of English Dance & Song. He has kindy shared this extract:

The coast of Devon was alive with gaiety when the Devon Morris Men, headed by Nibs Matthews, toured Musbury, Seaton, Beer & Sidmouth on Whit Monday. The tour started at Musbury at 11 am. The older Morris team, composed of Bill Leaker, Maurice Buckland, Peter Fox, Eric Langford, Robert Robins and the M.C. started the day by dancing Bledington Trunkles in front of the village petrol pump – quite appropriate since petrol had just come off ration.

The party then left for Seaton in many cars, some decorated with coloured handkerchiefs. The very exciting performance by the younger team of How D'ye Do Sir thrilled a thousand onlookers. Members of the younger team were Gordon Deacon, Tony Blake, Allan Kennedy, Bob Rundle, Leslie Meigh and the M.C. who seemed to classify for both age groups. The fool, Dick Witt, danced his jig while the man-woman, Dick Davey, looked on approvingly.

At Beer the large crowd arrayed itself on the steep bank overlooking the harbour. The angle of the bank, however, was unfavourable to the tin colectors who performed their duty under most adverse conditions.

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At Sidmouth the Morris Men danced to over 1000 holidaymakers, and caused quite a disturbance when the man-woman tried his skill in Leap Frog. Constant Billy, Gallant Hussar, Lads A Bunchum and Getting Upstairs were well performed by young and old teams.

Many general dances were enjoyed by all. The contingent from Dartington Hall found themselves on a jetty at Sidmouth dancing to Winsome Bartlett's pipe & tabor, with a considerable crowd interested.

Colin Andrews adds:

The Devon Morris Men were the predecessors of the Exeter Morris Men. Bill Leaker, Dick Davey and, occasionally, Tony Blake, were still dancing when I joined Exeter MM in 1973. Eric Langford was one of the founder members of Dartington MM

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Dorothy Margaret Brook, always known as 'Margaret' to us, was born on the 5th January 1932, at Sherdon Farm, Exmoor.

Margaret was always very proud of her Exmoor roots and shared many of her early memories with us. Her grandfather would warm his cider by the fire, sit her on his knee and sing "Jim the Carter's Lad". She told us tales of her father driving the ponies from Exmoor down to Bampton Fair for sale, often doing so as an introduction to the song, helping her audience engage in the excitement and importance of the occasion.

At the age of 9 she moved to Chawleigh in mid Devon. This was to be her home for the remainder of her life. At the same time she kept her close links with family and friends on Exmoor, and continued to contribute to the great singing tradition of the area along with her cousin Dick French and friend Jim Sanders; a tradition that is alive and well today.

Margaret's personal passion was her singing and storytelling. Much of her repertoire was 'absorbed' in childhood where she was the star performer at many a family and village party, but she never stopped adding to it, drawing from local sources such as Walter Keenor and Jean Webber. We first met her in the 1970's through Sam Richards who at that time was collecting songs from Exmoor and Mid Devon.

I first heard her sing in the barn at Westland at a very early Pennymoor 'Song and Ale'. We knew at once she was something very special. Margaret 'delivered' a song – never just 'sang' it - something we could all perhaps learn from. Her involvement in, and enthusiasm for the song conveyed itself to her audience so that everyone shared in the pleasure. Those sparkling green eyes were irresistible, and she was able to get away with the cheekiest of stories!

The sharing of songs and stories then became a two way experience and Margaret was able to draw upon new material resulting in an impressive repertoire. However, all her material, no matter from where she chose it, was delivered in her own inimical style. She was a great member of Pennymoor Singaround, participating



in all concerts and activities and was particularly happy to involve herself in charitable fundraising events

Her authenticity was recognised by many and we are fortunate that she was interviewed for radio and television, including a documentary of her life on Exmoor. Her songs and stories have been recorded over a period of 50 years, from Sam Richards in the 60's through to Ross Henrywood this year. We are grateful for their foresight.

Margaret was a joy to know. Her pleasure in song and storytelling was a reflection of the pleasure she took in life. She will be missed by all who met her. Her legacy is the gift to us of a strong and enduring folk tradition. Let this be her testimonial.





Steve Gill

We are delighted to welcome another new contributor - Geoff Lakeman - to What's Afoot, with his eloquent and honest review of Steve Gill's great new CD.

Tucked away in south Devon meet mild-mannered & modest Steve Gill who has in this recording weaved a musical tapestry including tunes and songs from Britain and further afield into twelve tracks. For me Steve is one of the most respected folk musicians in the West Country and with "Light and Shade" you could say he has come out of the shadows.

The listener is sucked in from the start with three Northumbrian Polkas with bouzouki & fiddle accompaniment. More strings in the mix would have been good but let's give the lad a chance, he's only getting into his stride! Devon ditty "Penny Wager" follows with Morris-like Anglo concertina backing, which is measured - not plodding. This song will appeal to those of you who like a flutter. Three Irish slides next were recorded in Exmouth (honest) and this set took me back to Doolin, County Clare. Shutting my eyes and remembering the set dancers kicking up the sparks in the local pub. Uncluttered concertina accompaniment again on a Bill Worsfold's love song from the North Island of New Zealand. Track five & Steve plays three jigs on the whistle, with a novel ghosting effect slightly behind. And then my favourite track which I have seen Steve perform live is his self-penned "Painted Stations". Is that a tear in my eye or a bit of coal-flecked steam as I listen suffused by a mantle of nostalgia? I rode the footplate as a boy and remember G.W.R "God's Wonderful Railway". Steve has a dig at that nasty Dr Beeching whose cuts signalled the end of steam, not to mention hundreds of branch lines.

Steve plays atmospheric harmonica as he covers Ashley Hutchings' "Wolfe". A bit of harmony singing here would not have gone amiss. A gentle one-row melodeon leads us into a Newfoundland Waltz, then a gear change to a Galician polka. You won't stay still on this one; but I feel more syncopated mandocello strumming would have made it even punchier. Anglo concertina again on Graeme Miles "Old Man of the Sea". Steve tell me his first every song with a box. A Welsh gem "Edward Evans' Delight", followed by a moving lament, written by Pipe Major W Ross, about the de-population of St Kilda in 1930. The tasteful hint of keyboard drone in the background makes this track quite hymnal. Final track and Steve and his helpers aim for ramming speed - or as near as they get to it. It's time to get ver hobnail boots out again for three classic Kerry polkas. The set DOES build, with fiddle and bouzouki joining in, but I would like it to have swelled to an even bigger climax. It left me wanting more... and yet that can't be bad can it?

"Light and Shade" is a thoroughly professional recording, well -aided by musicians like Andy Clarke, Sophia Colkin, Martyn Cornelius and Susie Trezise, Producer Aaron Aldred should be proud of what he has teased out of Steve at his Exmouth studio. There's no doubting the competence, understanding and integrity of his music-making, but when you can play as well as he can, next time let's have the brakes off, turn up the volume a bit more and let rip.

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Far Distant Stars

Lynne Heraud and Pat Turner Wild Goose WGS404CD

Lynne and Pat perform an impressive range of material, from traditional ballads sung in close harmony to self-penned humorous songs via contemporary folk classics. I have heard them several times at Pennymoor Song and Ale and Sidmouth, and they are always entertaining and their harmonies beautiful.

This CD has a similar range: traditional songs include Poor Murdered Woman, Sheep Crook and Black Dog and I Must and I Will Get Married, and there is a beautiful version of Anne Lister's Moth. Lynne has written a haunting tune for Ruth Cornford Mitchell's poem of The Great War, 'He Went for a Soldier', and Pat a beautiful song in memory of Lynne's youngest son Tom – called, simply, 'Song for Tom'. Some songs, such as this one, are performed with gentle guitar accompaniment, others with accordion, and others a capella.

'Mr and Mrs Smith' is a 'genuine' music-hall song by Lee and David, here given a sharp and effective rendition, and 'Mr Double-Barrelled' is a song by Lynne in music-hall vein about the 'upwardly mobile Betty Smith'. Lynne and Pat are not afraid to use the habits and complaints of 'women of a certain age' as material for their songs, such as a tendency to back-bite and gossip in 'Secrets', and the problem of Stress Incontinence in a song of that name: this witty song is made all the funnier by being set to a tune reminiscent of a tragic ballad – "now I live with my condition and my gussets reinforced".

Although songs such as these are probably best heard live (when they have been known to provoke hysterical laughter) they are also well worth listening to on CD, as are all the songs on this album – strongly recommended!

TWO'S COMPANY

I didn't expect to see a Celtic harp on the table outside the village pub at Iddesleigh. Tempted to investigate apres-morris I yielded to further temptation by purchasing this CD. And I'm pleased I did. There is something inherently peaceful about a harp (is that why angels have them?) and the twelve instrumental tracks of harp music, occasionally supplemented by bodhran, guitar or fiddle are delightfully soothing. Several tunes are well-known - Lowlands of Holland, King of the Fairies, Searching for Lambs, and The Parting Glass - but there are also a couple of Chloe's own compositions. Most enjoyable.

TOM GOBLIN Gwilym Davies

This CD is Gwilym's first solo album for 12 years - although it's not entirely solo since his wife, Carol, joins him on some tracks, and there are guest appearances, mostly as instrumental



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accompaniment, from Terry Brenchley, Roger Mills and Geoff Ramshaw.

The songs reflect Gwilym's considerable experience as an avid researcher and collector for nearly 50 years. They include some he learnt first-hand from Appalachian singers and appropriately accompanied on banjo, another (Long A-Growing) from Harry Brazil, a member of the gypsy family with whom he spent much time recording songs and tunes, and several traditional songs from his native Hampshire and adopted Gloucestershire. Only two songs could in any way be classified as modern but even these (Tony Dean's Following The Old Oss and Gwilym's own setting of the folk tale The Deerhurst Worm) are stepped in tradition. His Cotswold morris background is not forgotten, with a worthy rendition of Gallant Hussar and Black Joke

Although some arrangements come over better than others, the standard of singing and presentation is very good, with a good deal of thought given to making the material on the CD really entertaining.

HOT AIRS Treewind TWD 018 Fendragon

I love everything about this CD - the real foottapping music, the sleeve notes with, source, rhythm, & number of times through (useful for callers!), and the illustrations on cover and disc itself. But then I would expect nothing but the best from Mary Humphreys, Anahata, Gina & Dave Holland who make up the band that emerged over ten years ago from the musicians of Gog Magog Molly. Many of tunes are taken from manuscript collections, some unpublished, and on these the line-up is mainly fiddle, melodeon, keyboard (piano style) and whistle or flute. However, for the couple of Playford offerings - Childgrove and Nonesuch - hurdy-gurdy and cello are in evidence. The opening track features two polkas from Colin Cater. Though the Bampton Ouaker often gets played at ceilidhs it's rare to hear the Welsh Cuckoo's Nest (Nyth Y Gwcw). A great album for listening to, or for dancing.

Just Another Day: Songs from Minehead then and now

Tom and Barbara Brown

Wildgoose WGS406CD

Tom and Barbara Brown have become immersed in the seafaring history of the West Somerset and North Devon coast along with the traditions and songs associated with it. After the highly acclaimed series of CDs Short Sharp Shanties on which was recorded the entire repertoire of Watchet shantyman John Short, this album comprises eleven of the songs that Cecil Sharp collected from two retired sea Captains in Minehead, Robert Lewis and John Vickery, plus three that Tom and Barbara wrote for the Minehead Harbour Project.

The songs from Lewis and Vickery were diverse and by no means all maritime, some are rare, some more well known. Of those chosen for this CD the maritime songs include 'Spanish Ladies', 'The Sea Captain', 'Franklin', and 'The Greenland Fishery'; while those associated with the land include 'The Bonny Bunch of Roses O', 'The Lark in the Morn', and 'The Devonshire Girls'. Many of the songs can be heard on the folk scene today, rarely are they heard in these versions. Both the opening and closing tracks, 'A Minehead Lad' and 'Just Another Day' were drawn from the Minehead Harbour Project. They set the scene perfectly at the same time as setting the strong performance style that persists throughout. The other taken from the project is 'Heave Away My Johnny', new words by Tom put to a tune that Sharp Collected from Cpt Vickery.

Every track is refreshingly varied with strong vocals and accompaniment. Careful thought has gone into the arrangements. For the recording Tom and Barbara were joined by an array of talented friends: Barry Lister, Matt Norman, Paul Sartin, Keith Kendrick, Anahata, Brenda Burnside, Jon Dyer and Mary Eagle all make contributions. Finally credit should be given to Doug Bailey for another excellent production from Wildgoose.

'Bite' Size CD Reviews

SASSAFRAS TEA Appaloosas

Appaloosas are a Dartmoor-based 3-piece group who specialise in American Appalachian, old-timey & bluegrass music. This is the 2nd album from Peter Acty (vocals, guitar, banjo), formerly with Magpie Lane, his daughter Eliza (lead local, guitar) and Plymouth folk stalwart, Stephen Potter (fiddle, mandolin). No Dartmoor dialect influence here - it all sounds pretty authentic with a raw edge to the vocals and some pretty nifty finger work over the strings. Though I'm not particularly au fait with this genre nowadays, tracks like Wildwood Flower, The Cuckoo and Muleskinner Blues brought back pleasant memories of my first forays into folk clubs some 50 years ago - before I 'discovered' the English folk song scene.

OLD VIRGINIA Rattle On The Stove Pipe

If the Appaloosas' CD whets your appetite for the foot-tapping American country-style music then Old Virginia will certainly provide a feast. The arrangements are very slick, with well-structured variety in the instrumental accompaniments, as one might expect from such seasoned performers as Dave Arthur, Pete Cooper and Dan Stewart who make up the group. My impression is that this new album is even better than their previous one which was reviewed a while back in What's Afoot. Again, New River Train I recognised from the 60's - incidentally when Dave Arthur was at the time performing largely traditional English material!

The Dollymopps

Wild Goose WGS397 CD

The Dollymopps are Justin Smith, Dorana Philpott and Virgil Philpott and all three sing in harmony on all except two tracks. I found the Dollymopps really refreshing, the harmonies are great, there's loads going on if you concentrate and really listen but for me the joy of their performance is the songs. Unlike many harmony groups they never compromise the song with the harmonies, the song comes first and their delivery of the songs is delightful; the harmonies adding interest, strength and colour to the performances while preserving the life and vitality of the songs. As the name of the CD suggests The Dollymopps are bringing to life songs and poems from the Isle of Wight, resulting in the rare privilege of a CD of traditional material where every single song will be fresh and new to most of us on the mainland. All but two of the tracks are sung in harmony, the exceptions being a tune- "The Loyal Isle of Wight Volunteers' Quick March" -superbly played on guitar by Virgil and "Jonas and the Devil", where a single voice is enhanced by guitar accompaniment.


Among the traditional songs are two poems from Percy Stone's collection with tunes written by the group "The Recruiting Sergeant" and "Newtown Randy." I particularly enjoyed these songs and would never have known that the tunes were not traditional, the tunes fit the poems with the ease that usually only comes from a few hundred years of singing. Sources for the traditional songs include a number from the George Gardiner collection, among them the familiar yet intriguingly different "From Spithead Roads" and the beautiful "Gypsy Girl."

Ron Taylor and Jeff Gillett

Buy It, Try It and Never Repent You Wildgoose Studios - WGS400CD

Ron Taylor and Jeff Gillett have performed together for more than 20 years and are well known as excellent performers of traditional songs. Surprising then that this is only the second CD they have made as a duo. Ron is one of England's finest interpreters of traditional song while Jeff has a well-deserved reputation as a superb guitarist and accompanist, so you know that when you see them together you are in for a treat.

And indeed, for anyone who loves English traditional song this album is a treat; superbly recorded and engineered by Doug Bailey, with haunting and sensitive additional instrumentation from Gill Redmond on cello (listen to "Banks of Green Willow"), Becky Dellow fiddle, Steve Tyler hurdy-gurdy and Katy Marchant recorder and bagpipes. Everyone involved has brought the song to the fore; the instruments provide a setting for the words and melody. Accompaniment is an art in itself, and Jeff Gillett demonstrates his mastery, with a few well-chosen notes establishing the emotion of the song, catching your interest or unsettling the listener depending on the setting.

Ron sings all the songs with an easy grace and such clarity of diction that the story goes straight into your soul and sparks your emotions with these timeless tales of love, deception, loss and danger.

The choice is excellent with a mix of very well known songs such as "Lovely Joan", "Reynard the Fox", "Sir Patrick Spens", "Rambleaway", etc alongside the less familiar "Stormy Scenes of Winter" from Novia Scotia and "Holland's Leaguer" from a 1635 broadside about the closing of a notorious brothel.

It is always difficult to comment on style, personal taste being so variable, but I found the whole album very measured and rather constrained, nobody is taking any risks here, nothing suddenly leaps out and grabs you. This is a celebration of the songs themselves but taken as a whole I found my attention wandering with nothing to grab me back into the CD. If you treasure traditional song at its best you should have this in your collection, and live they are truly a wonderful experience, so as the title says, "Buy It, Try it and Never Repent You."

Off the Beaten Track: The Village Hall Set List

Steve Knightley

Hands On Music HMCD38

For much of 2014 Steve Knightley decided to take a break from the usual frenetic tours of big venues, large audiences and loud concerts and embark the 'Grow your own Gig' project - see Nicola King's feature on p 12. By playing as a solo guitarist and singer in village halls and smaller venues the length and breadth of England, he would be in touch with his audience and adapt to the requirements of the venue and the organisers. So popular has the tour been that he has decided to extend the tour and is taking bookings for later in 2014 and into 2015, resuming after a tour with Show of Hands. Even then he is unlikely to be able to meet the demand. Off the Beaten Track is the album of the tour. It is the set list, or at least a selection from it.

As at a live gig Steve divided the recording into two parts. Whether you have been fortunate to be at one of the concerts or whether you hope to do so during the coming months, you can sit back and feel that you are there. The easy, relaxed, delivery of an evening spent in a village hall is conveyed through the CD. This, however, makes the sheer brilliance of Steve as an instrumentalist and folk singer lull you into forgetting how much thought and work has gone into creating this performance. This is Steve going back to his roots, the foundation on which later developments in his musical journey has been based.

Writing his own songs Steve maintains the English traditional song in its true sense. Themes that have formed the core subjects in song and rural life over the past few centuries continue to be relevant: villainy, characters who are both loved and despised, unrequited and requited love, rustic idyll. Steve covers them all, in a twenty-first century way. The lyrics tell a tale that never ceases to amuse and enthral while the accompaniment is in a traditional style with the natural influence of contemporary life

These songs would be relevant in many places, for those of us living in the West Country there is the added pleasure of being able to picture the exact scene or relate to the area or event, possibly the person. Set 1 commences with 'Widecombe Fair' and is followed by a track about social standing, love, (very) rough justice and the River Dart's legendary need to take a heart each year. Thus the scene is set. The same set includes 'Broomfield Hill' (trad. arr. Carthy) and fine tracks that illustrate Steve's skill as a writer as well as a performer. The final track in this set is 'Raining Again' and includes the memorable line "The neighbours came in 1910, Round here that means they just moved in." Set 2 includes a further five songs by Steve; plus 'Twas On One April's Morning' (a tribute to the late Tony Rose); 'Try / Boots of Spanish Leather' (a tribute to Bob Dylan) and 'Reynardine' (trad. recon. Lloyd). The last track of the album is 'Country Life', an anthem to the declining countryside, a fitting conclusion.

This is an excellent album in every way and will become a "must-have" for all devotees of folk song. The concerts will continue to attract large audiences.

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'Bite' Size CD Reviews

HUMS ANCIENT & MODERN

SAM 0011

Gren Morris & Sam Stephens

This album offers an unusual combination of a powerful voice that sounds almost classically trained and imaginative guitar accompaniments, which are sometimes jazzy & bluesy. Initially I wasn't impressed but with a repeat playing, I've become more appreciative. There is certainly an eclectic mix of material. The pairing seems to work better on the 'modern' songs - the unaccompanied harmony in Merlin's Song by Graham Pratt is excellent, and the last track is delightfully tongue-incheek. I wasn't quite so keen on Gren's rendition of traditional songs, apart from the Streams of Lovely Nancy, which features concertina and guitar accompaniment. The CD is worth listening to. It was recorded live – I'd be interested in seeing a live performance.

THE OLD ROADS COS329CD

The promotional notes for The Old Roads: Early Folk Music don't quite match up to the content of this CD. The instrumentals, on bouzouki, cor anglais and small pipes, are very good and for the most part give an 'old' feel to the music. I'm less convinced about the inclusion of some of the songs — When First To London seems quite out of place, and, although the ballads Lord Ronald and The Lailly Worm have a long pedigree, I wasn't taken by their presentation. The last song, Cavalilly Man, was interesting however — a completely different ballad to that which Strawhead included on one of their albums. Strange, too, that essentially the same tune, Taxim/Taqsim, with different instrumentation introduces two of the instrumental tracks.

This is a delightful CD recorded in Exeter by a local singer, and sold with all proceeds going to the charity MIND in Exeter & East Devon. Mary was once a regular on the Exeter Folk Club scene, performing and recording a cassette as Trouble At The Mill with Linda Bowers but she has only recently started singing at clubs again after a long break. All songs (except percussion on the final track) on the album are unaccompanied and some - the traditional Tarry Trousers, Dougie Maclean's Caledonia, Paul Simon's A Church Is Burning, and the Tim Edward's Ladybird - feature Mary's daughter, Anna Langley-Smith singing in harmony. Very effectively too! Mary is perhaps best known for her rendition of bluesy & swingtime numbers, such as Lullaby of Birdland and Irving Berlin's Blue Skies, to which her very melodic contralto voice is well suited. Enjoy Mary's singing and support a worthwhile charity.



What a delightful album! The twelve songs provide a lot of interest, with less familiar versions of Scarborough Fair, Twa Corbies and High Germany, some superb original songs in Ruardean Bears and Little Tommy Jones, both based on real events and excellent renditons of The Watchet Sailor and Sweet Carnlough Bay. I loved the tongue-in-cheek Half Hands Around about a female wishing to join an all-male Morris side - quite different from the close parody of the Female Drummer which I heard sung on the same theme at Sidmouth this year. Alison's clear & melodic voice is very pleasant to listen to and Jack's accompaniments (and occasional vocals) provide a perfect balance, with concertina & melodeon much in evidence. There is also whistle on some tracks - it works very well with Bear Dance following the song about a bear. I think I detected a harmonium and a piano as well - unless Jack has got one of these electronic squeezeboxes that can imitate almost any instrument.

Tarka Morris Men, after 22 years, have decided to hang up their bells and retire. This picture taken on Sunday 28th September, on their final tour. Thanks to all past members for their friendship, and good loyalty humour.

Competitions in Morris dancing are often a cause for lively debate. On the one hand are the people who feel that Morris dancing should be kept as an amatuer social pursuit, as that is part of its charm. Others feel that competition is healthy, as it preserves standards of dance and encourages larger audiences. Certainly, the John Gasson jig competition does the latter!

Held during the first Sunday of Sidmouth folkweek, the competition has not failed to fill the Blackmore Gardens marguee since it moved there from the Manor Pavilion Theatre a few years ago. John Gasson was a morris dancer who loved [solo] jig dancing, but was tragically killed on his way to Sidmouth in 1987. The competition was established in memory of him and has been held at Sidmouth every year since then.

Dancing takes place in the middle of the marquee, with the audience (including 4 judges) sitting around the edge. Competitors are of all ages -

from 14 to (umm - around) 70! Dances should not only be technically excellent, but the dance should be 'performed' in the available space, with an excellent interaction with the audience, and in strong partnership with the musician. Yes, there can only be one musician! There are single jig (one dancer) and double jig competitions. Dances may be new or traditional, but must be in the style of Cotswold or Molly.

What is brilliant about the competition (apart from the incomparable Chris Rose's MC'ing), are the inventive and mature winning performances from youngsters - musicans as well as dancers. Those I saw winning a few years ago, come back as judges, start new teams or invigorate existing ones. Fantastic!






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
