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Wassail Wassail

Mark Bailey (front cover picture) donned his Green Man disguise for two separate wassails in January. He has been involved with the Sandford Wassail for several years, and this year played a leading role in a new wassail at Efford (near Shobrooke) with the Exeter Morris Men.

On the evening of Saturday, 16th January, a large number of people gathered at the home of Ann & Jerry Parkinson to wassail the apple trees in their small orchard, and spread the good fortune also to the large commercial orchard opposite. The Exeter Morris Men danced in the Parkinson's barn (photo: back inside cover) while cake was distributed to the audience to identify the wassail king or queen - whoever found the peg of clove in their slice!

Mark Bailey and the wassail queen led a procession along a candle-lit route to the orchard. Cider was poured around the roots of the selected tree, a slice of cider-soaked toast wedged among its branches, and a wassail sung, followed by lots of banging, rattling, shoutingand the firing of a shotgun.

Back then to the barn for some more morris dancing, with everybody joining in the final 'Bonny Green Garters' dance. Feasting, drinking singing, music and general merrymaking continued until late in the evening in Ann & Jerry's house.

We had a fabulous evening. Many thanks to Ann & Jerry for their generous hospitality and flawless organisation. And it all came about through a chance remark at meeting of a walking group just before Christmas.

SANDFORD

On a dark winter's evening in Sandford there is a murmur of excitement building in the square. Through the mist eight flaming torches come into view flanking a mysterious figure with a distinctive green hue. It is a magical scene that has graced the streets of England's cider making counties for centuries. The Green Man is, of course, leading the wassail procession. Wassail, from the old Norse 'vaeshael' meaning good health, has been occurring throughout England since feudal times to bless the orchards and scare

off evil spirits to ensure a good harvest the next year. It has been resurrected in recent years by those keen that these traditions should not fade in the winter night and it is, also, magnificently good fun!

In Sandford, flaming torches guide hundreds of revellers of all ages through the narrow streets accompanied by all sorts of weird and wonderful costumes and traditional music. The crowd gathers in the village square (conveniently adjacent to The Lamb Inn) where The Green Man, encapsulated wonderfully by Mark Bailey, welcomes everyone and begins proceedings. After a burst of Morris dancing, apple cake is passed around, the apple queen is crowned and the wassail song is practiced by all in the crowd. The procession then begins its final leg to the Orchard.

The old traditional orchard has been wonderfully decorated with tea lights and lanterns leading the wassailers to gather around the oldest tree. Scrumpy is returned to the soil and poured around the roots, toast is hung in the branches for the Robin and a tremendous chorus of the traditional song is belted out by the increasingly excited crowd. This is followed by a volley of shotgun fire and everyone making a tremendous din to scare off any evil spirits and awaken the trees from their winter slumber. The bonfire spectacularly roars into life. All of our senses have come alive with the smell of the bonfire wafting through the air and we are handed a warm cup of delicious Sandford Orchards mulled cider.

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
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Everyone is now gathered around the impressive bonfire and the Brown Paper mummers take to their improvised stage. St George and The Dragon is the tale of choice which is hilariously depicted much to the delight of the audience.

As the embers of the fire simmer down and the crowd heads back to the pub for another cider or two, I get a chance to have a chat with Sandford Orchards boss Barny Butterfield who has been the driving force behind bringing the tradition back to life in Sandford. "When we were starting out I did a lot of work fixing up old farmhouse orchards around here and it gave me a real connection to the amazing cider making tradition in the community. It was really something that bought everyone together and something they were deeply proud of," he explains. "Hopefully by putting the time and effort into evenings like tonight we're creating that kind of spirit again". I feel that with Bailey and Butterfield at the wheel Wassailing in Sandford will be a favourite fixture in the social calendar for people from miles around, Wassail!

Jeremy Child's New In With Both Feet Folk Dance Page

I'm Jeremy, your new correspondent. Some of you will know me but for those who don't, I've been dancing folk for about 20 years, and calling for about 10. I run the Exeter Contra series as well as calling at a number of local clubs. My first love is Contra, and after that Modern Western Square Dancing (otherwise known as Chess on Legs). I'm a frequent festival goer, and like to be mentally challenged when I dance. I also dabble in choreography, although most of my compositions end up too difficult for me to dance!

Looking around I see a wonderful folk dance scene in Devon: Ceilidh, Contra, Square, Irish, Scottish, Playford, European, Klezmer, French, Appalachian and many more. The people are friendly, love their dancing, and generally know how to have fun. A quick glance at Flaxey Green's listings shows 20 regular folk dance clubs in Devon or nearby, 47 Callers and over 40 Dance Bands. On top of this there are numerous one off events within the folk world, as well as dances run by non-folk societies.

When Colin and Sue asked me if I was willing to help out with What's Afoot, I said "Yes - but doing what"? I didn't want to do finance or administration (having retired from that), I'm no good at desk-top publishing, and I don't make a good committee member (too fond of my own opinions). After a while cogitating, I came up with the idea of getting more dance stuff in the

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magazine, something I think has been sadly lacking. The committee seemed to like the idea, and, well, here I am.

So what am I going to do as "Dance Correspondent"? The intention is for this to be a regular feature, with the aims of discussing topics of interest and concern to the dance community, supporting and promoting folk dancing within the South West, and occasionally doing something for the betterment of that community. I want it to reflect and address the concerns of the readers, so if you have something to say, please feel free to say it! A few rules though: Don't write in asking me to publicise your club / dance event - the proper place for those is the listings (or pay for an advert!) Morris Dance has its own "Morris Matters" section, so if you write in about Morris, please ensure it's in the wider context of All Folk Dance.

I have a number of ideas for areas the column

The persistent decline in numbers seen by clubs and bands. Where are all the dancers? Clubs are struggling to attract new members. numbers are down across the board, and losing a series like Great Western Ceilidhs cannot be a good sign. Why is this? What can we do to reverse the decline?

Second is Date Clashes. It is almost impossible to find a day that does not clash with something else, especially for regular events. Do we have too many events (and is this contributing to the lack of numbers)? Do our events cater for too narrow a range of styles? Is there any need or desire for some sort of coordination (as they do in other dance worlds)?

I'm going to cover both of these more in the next issue, so if you have any thoughts or ideas, please let me know. After that I'm going to start delving into what the community wants, exploring such questions as:

How far will you travel for a dance? What makes you go to / avoid a dance? Festivals – what do you go to / avoid?

Further down the line I'm planning to look at the differences between folk dancing in the UK and in America (I think there are some practices over there we could take advantage of over here) as well as some of more recent social changes that are starting to affect dance world, such as evolving terminology and the decline of traditional gender based roles and designations in a world where biological gender and social gender are becoming distinct.

If you see me at a dance, come and say "Hi" and tell me what you think.

Along with hosts, Peter, Maggie & Martyn, several other performers - Sue Mentz, Colin Andrews, Charlie & Emma Wilson, and Dave Hoad—were also at the inaugural meeting in November 2012. The club had relocated to the Ley Arms when the room at the nearby Seven Stars in Kennford became unavailable. Many singers and musicians from South Devon and further afield have performed regularly at the club since it started, though John White and Alan Howlett were the only other 'old stagers' for the finale. In recent months, however, Paddy Reardon, (Owly) Dave Ramsden, Joules Jones, Jo, Jill & Tony of the Random Mackeral Band, Paul Hunter of the Whipton Music Club, and Libby (literally just flown back from holiday) have become familiar faces at the club with music, accompanied & unaccompanied song. The evening's line up also included Exeter folk scene stalwart Jackie Williams, former Tiverton folk club organiser, Susannah Billiter, future club guest Simon Barron, and, for the first time, Paul & Chris Woodhouse, whose new club is described opposite.

Hilary Bix: Farewell Dear Friend

Barnstaple Crematorium was packed to capacity, with many people standing and as many again listening outside to the warm and often emotional tributes to Hilary Bix from her close family and friends.

I realised, listening to her brother, husband and sons, that I had experienced but a mere glimpse of Hilary's amazing artistic and musical talents over the many years I had known her. But her warmth and love for family and friends and, indeed, for life itself

were evident to everyone who met her. In the past four years or so, whilst fighting a prolonged battle against cancer, she had remained positive and kept her sense of fun

I first came across her name when we bought one of her iconic hand-crafted alphabet puzzles for our infant son. Soon afterwards, inevitably, our paths crossed on the folk scene.

Hilary & Jerry met in the early seventies at Rolle College, Exmouth. It was almost love at first sight, for they very soon became engaged and married. Hilary decided to apply her creative skills in making educational toys for children rather than working in the classroom, though Jerry did teach for a few years, while supporting her growing business at home.

A large number of friends from the folk song and morris world attended her funeral,




and many more joined the gathering afterwards at the Halsannery Centre, Bideford, to celebrate her life with music, dance, and song. Winkleigh Morris provided the guard of honour at the crematorium, and later performed 'Bixstix', a new dance created especially for Hilary & Jerry. Tarka Morris came out of retirement to dance for her memory.

One can hardly mention 'Bideford' and 'Folk' without thinking of Hilary. For many years she and Jerry have been key people in the running of the weekly

Bideford Folk Song Club. They were instrumental in setting up and running the successful albeit short-lived week-long Bideford Folk Festival for three or four years. Before joining Winkleigh Morris, she danced with Bideford Phoenix. She sang with Shake a Leg, Exmoor Carollers, in a duo with Liz Crow, as well as being a superb solo singer, whether of traditional ballads, comic songs or her own compositions. On of the most moving parts of the ceremony at the crematorium was to hear Hilary singing *The Blackbird*, recorded along for several other songs, at the church on Lundy. Hopefully, a CD will be produced.

Hilary was a very special person. She'll be with us always.

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

This year we are still to the 2016 DERTy in Manchester, so look out for more information to come. For more details on the South Zeal Steppers, go to website



Len Christopher: singer, storyteller ...

... compere, musician, wordsmith and most important of all, dear friend.. Clare Penney asked Pennymoor Singaround members to tell what first came to mind when thinking of him.

Without exception they came back:-


Sense of humour, wit, the warm welcome, enthusiasm, support and encouragement of new singers whether they were aged 8 or 80. Then; thoughtful, kind, tolerant, sense of honour and love of justice, a gentleman.

Len was born in Durrington near Worthing in 1938. He left school at 15 and worked in horticulture for a short while before going into the building industry. Conscripted at 18, he joined the R.A.F. and signed on for 5 years in order to take advantage of the apprenticeship scheme which led to him becoming an aircraft fitter. He met his Dutch wife Cissy whilst posted to Germany and they married in 1960. He returned to the building industry and to Worthing. He and Cissy moved to Devon in 1973.

I first got to know Len and Cissy when they took over the Cruwys Arms in Pennymoor in 1979 where he remained as landlord until 1984. It had become our local when Ken Penney and I moved to Westland in 1969. There was plenty of singing in those years — some of you will remember The Reverend Bill Brewster, Bill Taylor who loved the singing, Cubby Payne, one of our most colourful Landlords, and Jack Maunder who could start a good song though more rarely finish it, but whose step dancing always brought an audience.

However, there was no regular monthly song session until Len became involved. He ran the bar for us at one of our early song festivals and surprised us all by breaking out into song - the one which gives a reason why dogs sniff each other's bottoms when they meet.

Len went on to develop a wide repertoire of songs to add to those from his past. Some thoughtful and poignant, some rousing chorus songs and many that remained funny no matter how often you heard them. Len, Ken and Alan Greenslade formed an informal trio and were



invited to entertain in pubs all over Devon, Cissy and I tagging along, most likely doing the driving.

Ken would start the evening with his powerful voice. Alan had a wide repertoire of funny songs but he also kept a ferret in his trousers which would occasionally poke its little pink nose through the zip

and take a sup of beer out of his pint. Len with his quick wit and ability to win over the most unlikely people would soon have the place rocking with song and laughter.

There was one memorable occasion in Southern Ireland, shortly before the troubles erupted again. We had organised a coach trip to Dungarvan in Co. Waterford. Thirty of us stayed in a large hotel and were soon on good terms with the local singers and musicians. Although the sessions were great fun they were also a bit chaotic so Len 'took control'. He decided everyone should have a turn and so when an Irishman got up to sing two songs in a row Len interrupted saying 'Just a minute, it's not your turn' There was a stunned silence, then the Irish man said 'Sure and I have never been asked to desist from singing in my own pub before let alone by an Englishman, and I can't understand why I don't mind.'

The monthly song sessions in the Cruwys Arms begun at that time have never missed a month in the 35 years that followed though we had to move to another venue for a while when the Cruwys Arms fell upon hard times. Len took over the compering role when Ken died and was still doing this in his inimical style into the beginning of 2015.

He enjoyed playing accordion for his own pleasure having learned along with other Pennymoor members from Tish Stubbs and Sam Richards in the mid 80's but could not often be persuaded to play in public.

He was always ready to help with the practical jobs that had to be done in setting up the venue for the Song and Ale and together with Gerald Palmer would happily sit at a cold draughty table on reception when everyone else was enjoying themselves.

In later years more of his time was taken up with farming activities and Pennymoor Village affairs but he never stopped attending and compering the Singarounds and was always willing to play his part in the other activities. He was actively involved in the World War 1 concert performed in many village halls and churches in 2014/15..

Len was aways ready to help Pennymoor Singaround raise money for charity; Air Ambulance, Hospiscare, Church and Village Hall roofs, Cancer Research – the list is endless. He was our compere for many a village hall concert with Margaret Palmer, Jason Rice, Geoffrey Hannaford to mention just a few.

He had great respect for the Devon culture, dialect and sense of humour. He was involved from the beginning when Sam Richards with Pennymoor Singaround produced the annual Jan Stewer evenings – a celebration of the author A. J. Coles who was a school master at Puddington Village School. Len together with Cissy took this forward and as well as ensuring that the tradition continued raised thousands of pounds over the years for the Puddington Village Hall.

With the passing of this extraordinary and talented man, all those in the folk world who knew him and in particular Pennymoor members will remember him with grateful thanks for the warmth and enthusiasm he brought to folk music, and our lives.

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Devon What's Now Afoot

Over the past three months much discussion has taken place to consider how Devon Folk can be more effective in promoting folk activities across the whole of the county. A key factor is the means of communication not only to dedicated folkies but to the wider audience of the general public and various organisations for whom participation in folk music, dance and song may be of interest. Whether the potential involvement may be only as a spectator at a morris display or as a one-off event in school, social club or corporate entertainment, knowledge of what is available needs to be more widespread and readily accessible.

What's Afoot magazine has been the prime means of communication amongst Devon Folk members for 35 years. In that time, it has more than doubled in size and become the main source of revenue for Devon Folk, through advertising and sales almost exclusively via folk outlets. However, it is preaching to the converted, and even within the folk fraternity its existence is far from widely known. Responses to the recent survey (almost all completed on-line), whilst very positive in respect for the printed magazine, nevertheless suggested an ageing readership; almost all returns were from the over-60s, and no-one under 50 replied.

It is intended to make the magazine available electronically by subscription, initially as an email attachment. The printed magazine will continue for the foreseeable future. Ways of expanding its availability through non folk specific outlets are being explored. Though a small team is now working on the magazine production, the search continues for someone to take over as editor, following Sue's withdrawal and Colin's interim return. Enquiries welcome!

Devon Folk has had a web domain (www. devonfolk.co.uk) for several years. Until recently, It redirected to another address but now links to www.devonfolk.org.uk, on which up-to-date information about events, contacts, etc. can be found, together with notices and reviews. It may be that in due course the website will be redesigned, but the content, format, and by implication, the target audience has yet to be

considered in detail. Any input with thoughts and suggestions in this respect will be very much appreciated.

A more recent development is the setting up of a Facebook presence for Devon Folk and for Devon Cool Folk, the latter intended to appeal to the young generation of folk enthusiasts. Visiting and 'liking' and sharing these pages will certainly help to boost their profile. Effective use of Facebook and other on-line social media platforms is a vital means of bringing Devon's folk scene to the attention of people who have grown up with laptops, tablets and smart phones.

The fact remains that there are thousands of people that still just do not know of Devon Folk, What's Afoot, and its web presence. One solution may be to produce an eye-catching leaflet to place, along with the other 'attraction' leaflets in libraries, tourist information centres, pubs, hotels, etc A concerted effort in effective distribution will obviously be required. Volunteers please!

Plans are afoot to make Devon Folk's profile more appealing and more extensive by embracing 21st century technology. There is still much we need to discuss in order to achieve this aim.

On the death of her husband and Dartmoor Folk Festival founder, Bob Cann, in 1990, Joyce took over as the festival's president. She had supported the festival ever since its launch at Wood Country House in 1978, When Bob was awarded the B.E.M, for services to folk music, he particularly thanked Joyce for her support.

Joyce took great pride in that her family and friends continued to run the Festival after Bob's death and that the Dartmoor Pixie Band has also continued so successfully with Mark, their grandson, taking the lead with his wife, Sarah, as caller. The folk music legacy continues with her great-grandchildren, Thomas, Charlie & Laura.

Joyce passed away with her family at her side on January 18th 2016.

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CD Reviews

BIDING TIME BILL CRAWFORD

Exeter born, traditional solo singer and currently a member of the four parta cappella group 'The Claque', MC, folk correspondent, avid trekker, to name but a few things Bill Crawford does. If you don't already know Bill, this fine traditional singer of mainly south west material, has recorded this CD of unaccompanied singing to delight those traditional fans like myself. So many splash the cash to enhance sales by including big stars on their recordings, forgetting when they do a solo performance, many may be disappointed having heard a padded out version first. On this recording I am pleased to say that 100% of what you will hear on the CD is what you would get at a live performance. He does have a little help on the occasional track from Dave Lowry and on some choruses from Eileen Conn, Jackie Williams, 'Ollie' Holland and Penny Rigby, which would probably happen anyway in a sing around or club.

I like the artwork and the inside sleeve notes give you good background information on the origin of all the tracks, many from the Baring Gould collection with details of the original source. I am pleased he has included a track from the late Cyril Tawney.

I would love to have heard a "live" track or two to show us Bill's sense of humour or a song of his own if he has written one - jealous as my repertoire of South West material is so limited.

As for the tracks, I found it difficult to single any out as they were all enjoyable. The Oxen Ploughing song had a verse which was new to me and the lovely Tallow Candles reminded me of Ben Hall and Camborne Hill.

I would urge you to go out and buy this CD and support this traditional style of singing which has stood the test of time and will surely be around much longer than many of the songs from today's songwriters.

THE WHISPERING ROAD SERIOUS KITCHEN WGS 413DC

An enthralling story, told in true storytelling tradition with the requisite simplicity and repetition, beautifully enhanced by the music and song. The storyteller, Nick Hennessey, has a wonderful voice with excellent diction which draws in and captivates the listener, and there are parts of the CD that are almost magical in atmosphere.

The music, influenced by traditional Scandinavian and English instruments, is played with a quality and life one has come to expect from Johnny Dyer and Vicki Swan, and Vicki's songs, sung in Swedish and echoed in English also add to the atmosphere created.

A story that is appealing to young and old alike but, I felt its only drawback is its length. At 72 minutes it can be far too long to listen to in one session. However, since there are eleven tracks it is possible to split into more manageable bites.

This is a quality CD with beautiful music and song and a well-told story.

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Concert Review: Show of Hands

THE LONG WAY HOME SHOW OF HANDS

When I saw Show Of Hands last November I managed to get hold of a pre- release signed copy of this new album. Let me say that I think The Long Way Home is one of the best albums they have made.

I was a little disappointed in their last album, Wake The Union. Despite including some great songs - Now You Know, Aunt Maria - I wasn't that keen on the American direction. I also found it to be a bit bloated and a case of too many guests evaporated the band's familiar live sound. Some may argue that the two albums before that - Arrogance, Ignorance and Greed and Witness — might be accused of the same, but I found the direction of those albums more interesting and enjoyed the heavy production there.

With The Long Way Home Steve and Phil return to their gritty British folk roots, as was intended, and it is like welcoming an old friend back into your home. The album includes some traditional song arrangements (April Morning, for example) and even the more contemporary songs, like the two composed by Chris Hoban, Hallow's Eve and Along The Old Lych Way have a strong traditional feel and fit in well with the general tone. In fact it is the most 50/50 split of Knightley-penned songs and covers on an album since 1997's Dark Fields.

The album is very well-produced by the renowned producer Mark Tucker, who utilizes the modern production tricks and techniques to broaden their sound but in a way that blends in well with whatever Steve, Phil, Miranda or any of their other guests are doing. The production work on Along The Old Lych Way is particularly impressive, creating a wonderfully atmospheric, haunting and beautiful sound. Unlike the last album I never feel like they are running the show and the directness of our leads' instruments are kept in the forefront.

Another bonus on the new album is PHIL BEER! Now, obviously, as a member

of Show Of Hands he is always a highlight but on this new album he is given more to do in the vocal department. He sings the lead vocals on two songs and also takes whole verses in several other songs on the album. It is great to see his vocal talents utilized more and is treated almost equally to Steve. One thing that has confused me though is why he doesn't take a verse in Hallow's Eve when they perform it live?

All the tracks, in my opinion, are truly excellent but my current favourite ones include Hallow's Eve, Hambledon Fair, The Long Way Home, Keep Haulin' and Along The Old Lych Way.

One part of the album that I will pick at is the Morris Dancers' stick percussion on April Morning. I think their inclusion works well enough, particularly on Steve's tune at the end, but the execution of it is a little distracting to my ear. The timing of the stick effects could have been a little better and they sometimes seem to strike at any old time rather than with the specific beats of the song.

For a time I always preferred to hear new Show Of Hands material live than on record but this is a collection of new songs that I feel can easily be enjoyed both at home and live. The Long Way Home has already become highly-acclaimed and is enjoying commercial success so I recommend that you join the hype machine and purchase a copy.

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
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CD Review: Jim Causley

FORGOTTEN KINGDOM JIM CAUSLEY

Hands on Music HMCD41

The 'forgotten kingdom', the title of Jim Causley's brilliant new CD, is the ancient Celtic kingdom of Dumnonia, comprised of presentday Devon and Cornwall, now divided - however, as Jim sings in The Peninsula Prayer, 'the land doesn't recognise the lines that humans draw'. This is the first album Jim has recorded in Devon. and all the songs are his own, although some contain snatches of traditional song or re-tell traditional stories. Jim has gathered some of his oldest friends and musical collaborators for this album, including Nick Wyke and Becky Driscoll, Phil Beer and Steve Knightley, Kathryn Roberts and Jackie Oates, Phillip Henry and Hannah Martin, with Steve Tyler and Katy Marchant adding the more unusual sounds of hurdygurdy, shawm, flageolet and English bagpipes.



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Central to all the tracks, of course, is Jim's voice – variously compared to fruity real ale, nectar, honey or rich chocolate – take your pick!

The album was produced by Phil Beer and Mark Tucker and is comprised of a generous 15 tracks: many celebrate or remember the rural customs, history and landscape of the West Country and their tone ranges from the elegiac and haunting to the comic and bouncy, with influences from bluegrass and music-hall as well as traditional folk and ballads. The album demonstrates for the first time Jim's ability as a lyricist as well as a writer of fine tunes (as on his previous album, Cyprus Well). Reigning Men, a powerful duet with Kathryn Roberts, makes a strong and necessary political statement: 'When despots pass judgements on the flaws of our lives/Judging things that they never have lived'. Home, set to a jaunty tune with an American bluegrass feel asks the important question: 'Do we all have somewhere we belong to?/ Somewhere we tell folks we're from?' and tells the all-too familiar story of townspeople who fancy a country life of 'Period Living and shabby chic' (and I hope I'm not seen as one of them!) replacing the people who really belong there.

The highlights of this album are, for me, Goodnight Ballad, a beautiful farewell- to- lovesong accompanied by the haunting fiddle of Phil Beer, and the elegaic The Pastoria, with Jim on piano, evoking the past and partly-forgotten legends of his beloved Dumnonia, and 'the songs I believed from my time'. Rewind creates the image of a hot and drowsy summer's day with nature the stage for human activity: Jim sings 'to me it all goes hand in hand/The music and the land/Now who could fail to understand/Such simplicity?' - who indeed could fail to respond to the sound of Jim's voice, the beauty and joy of the musical arrangements and the stories and images he creates. I know how long Jim has nurtured and developed the songs which make up this album and it has been well worth the wait.

Concert Review: Fotheringay

Plough Arts Centre Torrington, 12th December 2015

When Sally Barker began to sing Nothing More, the first number of the reformed Fotheringay's concert at The Plough back in December, I could hardly believe that I wasn't hearing the great Sandy Denny herself. Barker's voice has the soaring purity and raw emotion of Denny; Barker and Kathryn Roberts, together with singer and guitarist P.J.Wright (of Little Johnny England, TradArr and The Dylan Project. here taking the place of Trevor Lucas) have joined with three original members of the band - the amazing guitarist Jerry Donahue, drummer Gerry Conway and bass player Pat Donaldson to recreate the sound and play the songs, many written by Denny herself, of the brilliant but short-lived Fotheringay, whose one album was released in 1970. Many years later Donohue re-worked some of their original material and released Fotheringay 2 in 2008.

Highlights of this great concert were, for me, Denny's own songs: the haunting The Sea, sung by Roberts with the beautiful and delicate accompaniment of Donohue's guitar, and given added power by Barker's voice towards the end; Late November; and the traditional The Banks of the Nile, sung as a duet by Barker and Roberts. Kathryn said that Denny had always been her musical heroine, but that she never expected to be singing her songs with members of the original Fotheringay, and this was also a moving

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experience for (probably) many members of the audience who knew and loved Fotheringay and Fairport Convention in the time of Sandy Denny. Some of the songs written and recorded by Denny as a solo artist were also included. including, appropriately, Solo, movingly sung by Kathryn. More upbeat elements were added by P.J.'s rendition of The Ballad of Ned Kelly and Knights of the Road (co-written by Trevor Lucas) and Dylan's Too Much of Nothing, P.J. also added a mean pedal slide guitar to It'll Take a Long Time, beautifully sung by Barker, and the sell-out audience joined in whole-heartedly with the chorus of Peace in the End. The encore. Memphis Tennessee, enabled Sally Barker (who took second place in The Voice in 2014 and also sings with The Poozies) to use the more bluesy, earthy quality of her voice, which apparently moved Tom Jones to tears in the TV contest. This was the last 2015 concert of the band's tour but there are more to come in 2016 - sadly none in the south-west, but do catch them if you can for a powerful and memorable evening.

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CD Review: The Casey Sisters

SIBLING RIVALRY THE CASEY SISTERS

Oldbridge Music OBMCD22

For those people whose only exposure to Irish folk music is the fast and furious pub sessions, where all the reels and jigs begin to sound the same and any songs have a strong influence of the Dubliners, this album will come as a surprise - and a very pleasing one at that! It's truly captivating.

The Casey Sisters (Nollaig Casey, Maire Ni Chathasaigh and Mairead Ni Chathasaigh) are all highly talented performers in their own right, with All-Ireland & Pan-Celtic awards for their singing and musicianship, particularly on fiddle and Irish harp. Nollaig has toured with Riverdance, played solo in over 20 feature films, and recorded or performed with an impressive number of musical celebrities.

I was impresed from the first track, a gentle hornpipe, *The Humours of Castlebernard*, with piano accompaniment, and a more pacy reel. (Castlebernard is in their home town in Co. Cork). All three songs are a delight, but my favourite is

The Bonnie Boy In Blue, which has been passed down in the family.

There is a tremendous variety in the tunes selected, some with a long history and others more recently composed. *Katherine O'Moore* is one of O'Carolan's less familiar tunes to a British audience but very pleasant to the ear, as one might expect. The CD ends will a superb set of of six tunes of their own composition - all very different but all capturing one's attention. The tune, *The Earl of Cork's Allemand*, almost had me reaching for my squeezebox to try to learn it. Some time later perhaps!

This is one album which I guarantee will not disappoint you, whatever your prior exposure to Irish music.

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CD Review: Beamont & Lee

BOXES FIDDLE & DRUMS PHIL BEAMONT & PETER LEE

Phil & Peter are two musicians from West Devon who have been on the folk scene in the county for over 30 years. Phil first played the melodeon for morris in 1972 and Peter only took up the fiddle again nearly two decades after lessons at school. He also plays bodhran.

Their music on this album shows influences both from the playing of Bob Cann and from traditional Irish music. The result is a pleasant mix of attractive tunes. Some, like *Dingle Regatta*, *Walter Bulwer's Polka*, *Woodland Flowers* and *Steamboat*, will be familiar to the ear (even if you don't recognise the name) while others are less well known. Interestingly, it's the first time I've heard *Fanny Power* played as a jig rather than in the usual waltz time - and it works well.

The CD represents good value for money, as the 15 tracks fill up the disc with barely a second between the end of one tune and the start of the next. It's perfect for easy listening, on a long

car journey for example, or pleasing background music for an evening at home in the armchair with a good book and a glass of beer or wine. It's good, unadulterated folk music in traditional style.

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CD Review: Doug Eunson & Sarah Matthews

SONG AND LAUGHTER DOUG EUNSON & SARAH MATTHEWS COTHCD010

Sarah and Doug have already established themselves firmly on the folk club and festival despite the title, there are a circuit - and that's in addition to their other commitments with Cupola, Stone Monkey and Pecsaetan. This, their third album (somehow I The Medway, which I'd heam issed their first), again provides their distinctive blend of great tunes, on melodeon & fiddle, and to a tune by Peter Bellamy. Cracking songs, often in 2 part harmony.

I could see the opening song, In Praise of Alcohol, delivered by Doug with obvious feeling, becoming a standard in morris pub sessions, like Bring Us A Barrel or Good Ale. To further promote the theme, there's another - Good Ale For My Money, taken from a broadside. Even on titles that seem familiar, they have found interesting variants. The Ordeal of Andrew Rose has a more serious tune and gives a fuller account of the brutal torture of a sailor by the captain and mate. It is based on a true incident, and, as this version tells, the perpetrators were convicted on

the ship's return to Liverpool. The captain was hanged.

Apart from the song just described, the whole atmopshere of the CD title is jolly, though despite the title, there are no offerings that will have you rolling in the aisles with laughter. I was pleased they included the song, The Dutch On The Medway, which I'd heard before, but didn't know the title nor its origin. It's a Kipling poem to a tune by Peter Bellamy.

Morris Matters



LOOKING BACK ...

The series of features on former morris sides in Devon continues with two contributions from Angie Guest. Quite appropriately, the foundations for Devon Oak were laid at Acorn House in Thorverton, the home at the time of Rod Ballard, fiddler for Exeter Morris Men, who used to practise just up the road at the Exeter Inn.

Devon Oak Clog Dancers

Devon Oak was formed in the late '70s by wives of Exeter Morris Men, particularly Barbara Chambers, wife of Derek. In their costumes of 'oak brown' and cream they performed ritual, clog and stepping dances including some with hoops and garlands. Devon Oak ladies performed throughout Devon and Dorset, and often joined the Morris Men on their Whitsun coach tours. On summer 'dance outs' it was always fun to join with other teams including Sweet Coppin. In 1989 a visit to Normandy was enjoyed, accompanying a local Twinning group for a Bastille celebration. It was always encouraging to see some children of the dancers performing a Broom Dance and they also joined in with other dances - until they teenagers of course! The group enjoyed a full band often with several 'squeezeboxes' and fiddle. Devon Oak's heyday came to an end in the late 90's due to decreasing numbers.

Flaming Morris 1987 - 2010

Flaming Morris was named after the famous Tar Barrel tradition celebrated on November 5th in Ottery St Mary. Their brightly coloured distinctive rag waistcoats of red, orange and yellow represented the tar barrel flames. They danced mixed traditions and in particular stave dances, a favourite being from Stourton Caundle in Dorset danced to the 'Dorset Four Hand Reel'. The staves were of rough stripped natural wood with a small wooden barrel as a stave head and a mass of red /orange streamers attached. The leader had a stave with a clown's head instead.

Roy Dommett took workshops for the stave dances in January 1991. The team took part in many festivals and events, including dancing out with Sweet Coppin and New Forest Medlars. They also performed Mummers plays and visited Normandy with a local Twinning group.
