

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

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Writing Songs - Dick Henrywood

I am not a songwriter but I have been involved in folk music since the famous folk revival of the 1960s and have many great memories. Nick Jones in his heyday is possibly the most precious, but others include the Young Tradition, Carthy and Swarbrick, Tom Paxton, the Ian Campbell Folk Group, the Dransfields, Bert Jansch, John Renbourn and Jacqui McShee (Pentangle), the High Level Ranters, Tony Rose, and even Diz Disley. Down the years I was influenced by Cockersdale (before the untimely death of Keith Marsden), and also mourned the passing of

Folly Bridge, possibly one of the best harmony groups not to have achieved real recognition (and through whom I met Melanie). Inspirational songwriters include Keith Marsden, of course, but also Graeme Miles, John Conolly and Bill Meek

But enough of these rambling reminiscences, my own contribution began at the Imperial College Folk Song Club where I was initiated into the folk world by two fellow-freshers from the North-East and soon picked up a guitar. Yes, we all did in those days, and I trundled off to Cecil Sharp House for a few lessons.

I remain very glad that I learnt to play various finger-picking styles, clawhammer and others, and was never led down the strumming route - no hobby horses there! Fortunately it was not long before I developed an interest in the concertina. I never was any good at tuning guitars (no electronic tuners then), even my Levin Goliath. Concertinas stayed in tune and seemed a lot easier to carry around. I was lucky to pick up a decent Lachenal Excelsior in a junk

shop in West Bridgford for the grand sum of eight pounds, and even luckier to get it restored and tuned by Harry and Neville Crabb for another nine pounds. That is another fond memory, visiting the Crabbs in their ancient shop in Islington, very much a Victorian Aladdin's cave. Long gone now, of course.

I performed at the college club for six years or so, initially as a duo with my late friend Paul Steer, but with others too. I remember many of them and have recently discovered that one, Chris Flegg,

in jazz and blues (www. chrisflegg.com). When I look back at my early song books I am struck by the very wide range of material we chose but it was all typical of the era - Irish songs of resistance alongside the blues. traditional English folksongs, American material, protest songs from singer/songwriters.

has gone on to some success

a fair smattering of music hall and other comic numbers. It was a fantastic experience.

It was during my time at college that I wrote my first song. One Christmas I was inspired by an article in the Telegraph Magazine (December 1967) to assemble a song about a Christmas tragedy in 1847 when the frigate HMS Avenger was sunk off Algeria. The song was of no great distinction then, partly because I stole a tune from a pop song of the day called 'Seasons in the Sun'. Much later, in 1993, I decided the words were worth rescuing and wrote a new tune and chorus, so my very first

song, 'The Loss of HMS Avenger', still survives.

At that period I started to write several other songs, but never really finished any. I was, and remain, inspired to write choruses, but find it much more difficult to assemble verses. I still have fragments of songs about May Day (dating back to its introduction as a Bank Holiday in 1978), pottery workers (allied to my involvement in antique pottery), cutlers in Sheffield, and even a virtually complete monologue chronicling Albert (he of the lion at Blackpool fame) and his career as a Morris dancer. Do such fragments qualify me as a song writer? I think not!

A more determined effort at song writing dates from October 1990. I visited the Bygones museum in Babbacombe, near Torquay where they have a recreated Victorian street with various shops packed with products of the time. I remembered a similar display in the Castle Museum in York and also visited the Opie Museum of Packaging and Advertising, then in Gloucester Docks but now recreated as the Museum of Brands in Notting Hill, London. Other memories were of the corner shop in Oakdale, near Poole, where I hefted boxes of deliveries around the local area on a butcher's bike. This all came together in the song 'Soft Shoe Shopping'. I have to explain that the title refers to women being despatched to the local off-licence to fetch a jug of beer for their man, quaffing half of it and getting it refilled to take back home, all this done in their carpet slippers. The song was well-received by inhabitants of the older generation (where I now seem to reside).

This was followed by a more productive period whichsaw 'Pierhead Painters' written in February 1991, 'The Gleaning Bell' in December 1991 and 'Brusher Mills' in January 1992. 'Pierhead Painters' was inspired by a small collection of naive ship portraits I had assembled, and 'The Gleaning Bell' was written specifically for Melanie based on the four ages of woman, four colours, four elements and four seasons. It has been well-received now that we perform it as a family with Melanie and son Ross providing accompaniment on the handbells. 'Brusher

Mills' was inspired by old postcards (yet another of my interests) depicting the snakecatcher and his grave in the New Forest. That started off with a tune supposed to be based on a slip jig in 9/8 but ended up as a rather odd slow waltz.

'Shun the Drink' appeared in July 1994. It is a spoof temperance shanty which we then sang in the Theatre Bar at Sidmouth Festival. I didn't know it at the time but discovered much later that it had been recorded by Roger Smith who took it back to the shanty group Hanging Johnny to be featured in their act and on an album 'The Sea Quell' issued in 1996. (I still await the barrow load of royalties . . . !)

Then followed a lengthy fallow period which only ended when I finally managed to finish 'Both Barrels (NatelyScures)' in May 2008. I won't bore you with the full story of the 1994 edition of the AA Road Atlas and the long list of humorous double-barreled village names it yielded, but suffice it to say that the song has elicited quite a few laughs, which is very encouraging.

A string of half attempts has followed, choruses mainly, in my usual fashion, with one or two promising ideas. A harvest song and the story of the devil's stone seem the most promising. I find writing words really hard, and the teacher's comments in my school reports keep returning to haunt me — "This boy will never write" and "Must try harder"!

So there you have it — seven songs produced over nearly fifty years, and now eight years since my last. If you are interested you can hear them all on our family CD 'Spirits Flying High', or if a fiver seems too much, you can hear them free on SoundCloud (www.soundcloud.com/dickhenrywood). Comments would be welcome, but if you like any of them, please sing them. Like Steve Thomason I want our music to be live, and kept alive.

In With Both Feet | Jeremy Child's | Folk Dance Page

I've just returned from a tour of the US where I have been both calling and dancing. One of the things that struck me during my time there are the differences between their approach and ours: Dances run longer (14-18 times through), are generally simpler, almost always have partner swings, and the caller is expected to shut up after a few times through so the dancers can enjoy the band. More striking, and the focus of my column this issue, is their approach to gender neutrality.

how to move away from the traditional, gender focussed names we assign to roles. Popular suggestions include Jets & Rubies and Leaders & Followers. All have pros and cons, and so far there are no generally accepted new terms. Many suffer from still having Male and Female overtones (which of Jets and Rubies would you say was "Male"?) as well as similarity to other terms that a caller might use (lead and follow, for example).

Traditionally, many forms of folk dancing (Squares, Contra. Ceilidh, Playford) have defined roles that are referred to as Gents and Ladies, which were danced by men and women respectively. As social and demographic changes meant more women danced than men, it became acceptable for women to dance the Gent's role, but not vice-versa. With the onset of gender equality in society as a whole you now find men dancing as Ladies, but only occasionally and usually by younger members of the dance community. With the modern social trend of movement away from binary gender identification and towards a more fluid approach it is perhaps time we at least caught up with "dance whichever role you want".

One of the difficulties of making the switch is that dancers need to know what role they're dancing. Even if you replace "Ladies Chain" with "Chain", the dancers need to know which of them is expected to initiate the move. If dancers are going to swap roles during an evening, which must surely be the goal of true role independence, they need to be comfortable with dancing both roles, and always aware of which role they're currently in.

There has been much correspondence on SharedWeight (a callers' discussion group) about

In the US the approach to this takes many forms. At an advanced contra session at the wonderful Glen Echo, my first two dances were with men, both of whom asked me to dance. The dancers have a wonderful phrase "Dance with whoever's coming at ya" - in other words trust the people you're dancing with to get it right, so don't flinch if a man comes towards you in a chain. This has

led to a practice of "switching", where a couple will change roles at different points during the dance, often after a swing. This is quite fun to do, and I had one memorable dance where neither of us knew which role we would be dancing for the next time through until the very end of the swing. This proved confusing to our shadows as they weren't always going to meet the same people (as a matter of courtesy if you're going to switch in a dance

which has a shadow interaction you let them know beforehand). Interestingly, this dance was still called using "Ladies" and "Gents" as role descriptors. One thing at a time...

My next encounter was at a birthday party where both the celebrants were leading members of the Lavender Country and Folk Dancers (Icfd. org), an organisation of gender free dance clubs. Originally created to provide gay dancers with a safe place to dance, it now provides gender free dancing for all. Whilst many of the guests at the party were seasoned gender free dancers, not all were, and a significant number of people were non-dancers – at least at the start!

The approach the party organisers took was to provide lanyards for people to wear. They were made from playing cards, with a blue and a red side, on which was attached a Heart (red) or Diamond (blue) shape — Hearts and Diamonds being their designated role specifier. The idea was that you chose a role to dance, often in agreement with your partner, and set your lanyard accordingly. This served as an indicator to other dancers and reminder to you — and if you changed roles mid dance you merely flipped your lanyard. It worked very, very well, with both dancers and non-dancers taking it effortlessly on board.

So that's the US – what about the UK? Well, what do you think? What does your club do? Does it have an agreed approach to "dance any role you like"? Has it even considered it? Do let me know ... @devonfolk.org.uk



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
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BILL & MEG'S TRADITIONAL SONG WEEKEND HALSWAY MANOR 2016

Once again, we had a brilliant, convivial weekend at Halsway Manor. The house wraps itself around you when you arrive, and you feel immediately at home. A blazing fire in the hall warmed us as we met old friends again, and Meg and Bill gave us their usual warm welcome, as did the Halsway staff.

Friday night's Song Session in the bar, run by Bill Crawford, got the weekend off to a rousing start, with lots of our favourite choruses, especially after 10.00. Bill, Dave Lowry, Dave Griggs, Diggery Rose and others stood at the bar and led the singing. A prodigious amount of real ale was imbibed, and a few of us stayed up singing songs and being very merry till 2.00 a.m.!

Set up by our excellent breakfast on Saturday morning, we listened to a fascinating, well-prepared talk by our guests Tom & Barbara Brown about John Short of Watchet. We were given a detailed account of his 60-year career as a sailor and shantyman on many multi-sailed ships, illustrated with photos and recordings of the shanties from the set of CDs 'Short Sharp Shanties', featuring various singers. A detailed biography entitled 'John Short of Watchet 1839-1933 was published by Tom and Barbara Brown in 2014.

Mo Keast ably led the midday song session in the bar, which started off a little mournfully (perhaps a few hangovers?) then picked up.

After lunch it was Tom & Barbara's 'Desert Island Discs', hosted by Meg Rose and Dave Longly. This is where we really find out about the lives of our guests. Tom and Barbara have done so much work with community groups and schools over many years and have been involved with numerous projects. 'We love the baggage of traditional songs', said Tom 'our intangible cultural heritage is what it's all been about' i.e. they have been involved with putting those songs into context with many community projects,

such as: Maritime museum, This Farming Life archive film, Short Sharp Shanties, 150 years of song in villages on Exmoor, the Minehead project (when they were commissioned to find/adapt/write songs) and many others.

Their first choice of song was The Padstow Old Oss team, led by Charlie Bate, performing live at the Albert Hall. This was chosen because Tom played in the band for many years, after auditioning in front of Charlie and other key members. Another highlight was a gospel, deep South version of what is now an endemic song in Cornwall called 'Honey Honey', an early version of 'Little Eyes'. Their selection included a Mozart piece ('a bit like English-style fiddling', said Tom), and the tear-jerking 'Crossing the Bar' by Jeff Warner.

The books they would take to the island were Bronson (a book of tunes to fit the Child ballads) and Dickens. For their luxuries, Barbara said she would take a dog because 'at least you'd have somebody to talk to! Tom would take a magnifying glass because 'you can start a fire or make a telescope to look at her on the other island!'

After tea on Saturday, Doc Rowe presented a random choice of 'vintage' photos and informal film footage of younger versions of very well-known artists, many from the West Country. Highlights for me were a sweet film of a smiling Mark Bazeley as a child playing a concertina, quite overwhelmed by enthusiastic applause; a hilarious film of the Kippers singing 'Wild Mounting Time', their comedy timing immaculate as ever; and a moving film of Tony Rose's funeral with some familiar faces listening to Cyril Tawney's beautiful rendition of 'Sammy's Bar'.

The lively Saturday evening song session was run by Bob and Gill Berry. A big raffle was held first while we digested our profiteroles, which raised a rich seam of fantastic songs we have - only two songs were repeated over the weekend.

On Sunday morning the group divided into walkers led by Bill, going up the Quantock Hills in some fresh but dry weather, and the Ballad Session, led by Sue Burgess. You don't get many ballads to the hour, but some good songs were sung.

Then Doc Rowe presented some interesting old footage and photos of Mayday traditions from all over the country, from Padstow and Helston to Minehead, Hastings, Whitby and all points North. It started with a film of a very energetic 'oss' at Padstow, and showed May Queens, Robin Hood, Jack in the Green, Morris dancers, and the tradition of the Maypole, including vintage footage of the tallest maypole being erected, though Health & Safety are having a big impact on this event.

A good Sunday lunch, served by the charming Halsway staff, was followed by our last Song



Zesty Playford?

This letter was received from June Backway. Any comments will be considered for publication.

In April I went to Halsway Manor for the weekend of Playford dancing. This event was formerly the Devon Playford weekend, organised by the then Devon County Club, and up to this year it was well attended by members from our old club. Sadly this year only four of us were there, following last year's weekend when some were less than happy with the differences we experienced.

This was due to some changes in style, and certainly to the faster pace of the music, which did not go down well with everyone. The faster pace does not allow for the graceful movements of these dances, and the more experienced dancers found it a little more tiring, thus less pleasurable. The reason for changes is the claim that research had been done, and this was how it should be. Did not Cecil Sharp do research?

During this latest weekend the expression "Zesty Playford" was mentioned - which some of us had never heard before. It seems to follow events such as "The Playford Liberation Front" which advised experienced dancers to go with open minds... and we are told, is intended to attract younger people to Playford dancing. I have my doubts, as speeding up the music will make no difference. Young people are likely to do these dances only when they are taught in the right way and included in general folk dancing. Many of us learned them in our youth, when the name Playford meant very little, if it was mentioned at all. Unfortunately Playford dancing seems to have a "fuddy-duddy" image - so wrong.

Turning these dances into the romps seen at other events, will spoil them and turn older people away after having kept them alive for many years. I cannot help thinking Margaret Grant could be spinning in her grave!

There is a mixture of age groups at many Playford events, and the newcomers benefit from the help from experienced dancers. Many come to Playford dancing later in life, as somehow it is discovered by those who are newly retired. Better late than never.

ROSIE FADE BAND Battlestorm

Exeter-based Rosie Eade has been on the acoustic music scene for a number of years and I was first introduced to her performing at various local folk clubs. Even back then she demonstrated a versatile repertoire from traditional folk, rock & pop, self-penned songs and even punk and world music.

Here then, on Battlestorm, is essentially what you get - an interesting mix of styles and genres that, unfortunately, may not appeal to some readers of this publication. First off, Battlestorm is not as lushly-produced as I expected it to be. which is a good thing, keeping things as minimal as possible.

The four-piece band consisting of Rosie (Guitar, Vocals), Steve Matthews (Mandolin, Tenor Guitar & Washboard), Niall Robinson (Cajon, Tabla, Drums, Banjo & Vocals) and Simon Stanley (Bass & Vocals) do a sterling job backing her eclectic songwriting styles and there is especially some tasty Mandolin playing from Steve and percussion from Niall.

Most of the 12 songs on the album are selfpenned and are essentially thematically-linked dealing with varying degrees of mental and physical battles, even if some are based in fairytale as in Cinderella Sticks The Knife In. Rosie has a talent for offering a unique twist on traditional fairytales and folklore and has turned the story of Rapunzel on its head too in the past. Mirror also has a slight take on an element of Snow White, of course. The song is broken into two halves, one a little more gentile and atmospheric and the second half, the mirror's reflection if you will, a Patti Smith-esque rocker.

My favourite song lyrically, as well as musically, is the title track, a moving and powerful portrayal of someone caught in a traffic jam caused by an ambiguous car crash whilst a relative miles away is concerned for their welfare and cannot contact them. There are shades of Sandy Dennyera Fairport Convention, particularly in the verses, and a slight dashing of Patti Smith in the vocals as well. That kind of mix may taste sour to some of you but on this track it works very well. Personally, I would have loved to hear some strings on this track, violins and a cello perhaps. as I think it lends itself to that.

Some of the tracks don't really work for me and when she delves too deeply into Patti Smith territory in the middle, the album loses some traction, though to be fair these additions do help to give the album a wider musical palette.

Rosie's voice, though versatile and strong, can become a bit squeaky at times and other times her lyrics are a bit incomprehensible, unless you follow along with the booklet. An example of this is on the complex and fast-paced Cinderella Sticks

The Knife In, an ambitious progressive blend of Indian music, punk and folk.

One of Rosie's musical influences is Kate Bush and you would definitely guess that even if the album didn't boast a version of her *James & The Cold Gun*, with added mandolin to try to make it more folk-based.

But how much folk does the album really have to offer? Well, perhaps not too much, for most of you.

Steve Matthews' mandolin steers some of the songs closer to that territory than they otherwise might be, particularly on the upbeat *No Greater Love* and the final track, *The Fire*, one of her earliest and best songs, which mixes her influences well and throws in a clever and surprising use of Reggae in one of the final choruses.

For those wanting something a little more on the traditional side listeners may want to skip straight to her tasteful version of lan Sinclair's *The King's Shilling*.

From a musical stand-point this collection of songs might mess with your head with their shifting genres but as long as you have an open mind and an eclectic taste in music, which covers everything from folk and world music to rock and punk then you will certainly take something away from this album.

Highlights: No Greater Love; Battlestorm; The King's Shilling; Your Face Smiles; The Fire.

VICKI SWANN & JONNY DYER Paper of Pins

Another outstanding CD from this popular pair. It commences with a first song that depicts their own special sound. The CD continues with a selection of songs and tunes covering a variety of subjects from a coal mine disaster to weddings.

The Golden Glove is a version of the popular theme of the lady rejecting the squire for a farmer. This is followed by a sadly true traditional song telling the story of the Blantyre coal mine disaster in 1877. The rest of the CD is a mixture of traditional lyrics - Daddy Fox & Paper of Pins - and original ones mainly penned by Jonny Dyer - Friends' reminding us of our needs for these people, The Bold Fisherman & All Hail - interspersed with tunes penned by Vicki Swan or Jonny Dyer or jointly arranged. What an array of talent on such a variety of instruments! The final tracks are titled "The Wedding Suite", and take us though a Processional in Swedish tradition followed by the encouragement to move on to the reception. This is followed by the Signing of the Register which is a beautiful solemn piece interspersed with a fusion of two songs from Robert Herrick; and finishing with the celebration tunes of Speed the Plough & Erithway Green which is a wedding dance expertly turned into a Playford style dance by Bob Morgan. This CD reflects the talent and musical ability of these folk stars and I have enjoyed listening to another well constructed CD where English & Swedish music fuse.

PENNYMOOR SINGAROUND 2 PS02

The Pennymoor Singaround folk club have collated a second album of favourites from their monthly sessions. Each folk club has its choice numbers and very often a way of performing, so this is a souvenir from Pennymoor. Most of the tracks were recorded live in the Cruwys Arms, Pennymoor, with additional items taken from recordings made in four homes in the area. The performers and the material come from a wide range of places and sources including Devon, Ireland, Scotland, Sussex and Wales. There is nothing to convey that Pennymoor is in Devon. The interest is in the performance and the performers not their geographical locality, unlike some other recordings made by local clubs.

The opening track is an excellent introduction to the atmosphere of the club and jaunty playing of the musicians and band who come together to play at Pennymoor. They deserve more than one track. The rest of the album highlights different members of the club, sometimes with words of introduction, sometimes not. One song. Shepherd of Aberdyfi, is sung in Welsh by Bill Parry for whom Welsh is still very much part of his life. It provides a contrast and opportunity to think about the lyrical aspect of some languages, the story is conveyed by the rendition, the ballad and the poetic sound. Songs such as Bill Crawford singing Spiders, Slugs and Ringworm, and Pie and Constant Lovers by Mike O'Brien, are interspersed by Bill Bates' Binder String, a recitation by Margaret Palmer, The Return of Albert, a monologue by Alan Davey, and Clare Penney, playing Battle of the Somme. Music Hall sits comfortably beside traditional ballads.

Pennymoor Singaround has been meeting since 1979, with the material and performers showcased on this album it is clear that it is still going strong and continues to have a bright future ahead.

Of the three songs on the beautifully informative CD cover and booklet, one of Steve's own composition *Into the Day*, one traditional *The Nightingale*, but for me *Maples Lament* was by far Steve's best effort and this song by American Laurie Lewis suited his voice much more than the other two.

This CD will appeal to more than just folk enthusiasts and although I have not listened to very much Gypsy jazz, I appreciate it nevertheless. The stand out tracks for me are *Horseshoes* and *Rainbows* which I have heard the band Stocai play and the Breton waltz *La Valse des Pastouriauxis* superb. I was a little disappointed not to have had a reel to finish on the last track of Scottish tunes, *The Mathematician* left me a bit minus.

Book them, you won't be disappointed.

OYSTER BAND This House Will Stand/ The Work Of My Own Two Hands

This double album has something for everyone—including two completely different titles! It gives Oysterband fans the opportunity to collect some of their greatest songs from the last 18 years on one album (*This House Will Stand*). This is classic Oysterband, with soaring melodies, stunning arrangements and punchy rhythms — the ultimate summer feelgood sound. Though this is by no means belittling the superb musicianship and attention to detail which results in this deceptively simple sound. Almost every song has the capacity to enter your personal music brain and earworm you happily for days on end.

The Work of my own Two Hands, by contrast, is a collection which shows the depth and breadth of the band's output in the last 20 years or so - from their own arrangements of traditional tunes (such as the racy banjo-led Sailor's Bonnet and the beautifully sung Bold Riley) to dark, strong original 'protest' compositions. Some are reflective, some experimental, others up tempo like their more well- known work. Many are alternative arrangements of tracks from earlier albums, though there are a few which haven't been on previous albums. Catch some brilliant melodeon accompaniment in Jail Song and the simple strong guitar in Never Left. This album is an eclectic surprise musically as the genre changes song by song. Perhaps there are some of the band's personal favourites which were previously left in the editor's sound desk??? Who knows? Anyway, this album will certainly be difficult to pass up for Oysterband fans, who have 'been there and got the T shirt' with their back catalogue.

Perhaps it is not surprising to learn that Oysterband (or at least the three core members

– John Jones, Alan Prosser and Ian Telfer) will be appearing at festivals this summer with a programme which takes the audience through their 30+ years as a top folk rock band. A great opportunity to enjoy this fantastic music live.

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VIC SHEPHERD & JOHN BOWDEN 'A Motty Down' HATR CD08/LP1982 'Still Waters' - HATR CD011

Reviewing their 2 CDs together is something I have not tried before so here goes.

Has the 33-year gap made a noticeable difference? A Motty Down has quite an American flavour and Still Waters will appeal to Shanty fans. The singing is of a nice quality from both Vic & John and the box playing (melodeon & Anglo concertina) is also of a fair standard. Many melodeon players think they have to get off the bass button as quickly as possible, not so, just listen to Pete Coe & Brian Peters, but this is only a minor observation.

Most of the tracks are traditional on both CDs and it would be fair to say a good choice of material. My favourite tracks would be *Jack the Cowboy* and *The Outside Track* which was taken from a poem by Henry Lawson. There are a lot of chorus bits to join in on, particularly on Still Waters and the occasional instrument added here and there like the Motty Down Band Sound - nice one!

I think the evening would take off if these two came to a local folk club, especially with the Community feel about their material. I like that and hope to one day meet them in person and I don't think the 33-year gap has made much difference.

STEVE TURNER 'Spirit of the Game' LTCD 1105

Having seen Steve on a number of occasions, I was pretty sure from the outset that this recording would be a good one, I wasn't wrong. With lovely added cello parts from Riki Gerady and a surprise appearance on backing vocals from the Wilsons, the rest is what one would expect from Steve, great singing and musicianship, mostly on his English concertina.

The outstanding song for me was *The Maid of Erin*, an absolute gem on a par with Steve's classic rendition of *The Isle of St. Helena* from an earlier CD which must rate as one of the best folk tracks of all time. Most of the songs are traditional, a good idea in my book. I wasn't sure about Paul Metsers' *Lampedusa* which is about refugees sailing to Lampedusa Island and I found the *Plains of Waterloo* a little long.

This CD is part of a wider project documenting Steve's music and story so far and if you buy it there are details so you can send away for a free bonus CD.

A master at work and if you love little boxes this one is for you.

ANDREW JOHN & LISSA 'At Home'

Home for Andrew & Lissa is Aarhus, Denmark. They have played music together for over forty years, toured worldwide, including a UK tour in the 70's with Alex Campbell, and Lissa was bass player with the international folk group, Mosaic.

Though there is one traditional folk song, *Butcher Boy* on offer, the remainder are contemporary, with half the tracks being self-composed. Most notable of these are *Time* and *Two Letters*. The style is easy-listening folk-country music with much attractive piano accompaniments from Andrew. Both of them also play guitar, and there are also guest appearances by other musicians on bass, drums & electric guitar.

For sheer value for your money, this has got to rank as one of the best deals. Not only do you get the audio CD but also Blu-Ray and DVD of the live performance recorded in the couple's picture-postcard home, plus an insert with the lyrics of their songs.

As the song material is largely duplicated on the DVD I just concentrated on the audio CD, so I can't vouch for the quality of the video. I would recommend, however, having a look at the lyrics even before playing the tracks. There's no problem with clarity of the words on the recording but the lyrics are good enough to stand alone for their poetic structure.

A Dance Well Travelled



When I first started calling for dances over thirty-five years ago, I gleaned dances from various published collections, and jotted down on the back of an envelope interesting dances presented by other callers at clubs and ceilidhs. In due course I made up my own

dances, which were published in three booklets (Devonian Double Circle, Exe Setter's Ball, and, many years later, The Contrary Contra). Since these days I do relatively few evenings for experienced dancers, I've forgotten quite a few of the dances which I composed.

It came as rather a surprise, therefore, when I received an enquiry from a folk dance archivist in the United States asking whether I was the composer of a dance called the Polka Dot Polka. Apparently it had gained popularity over there, as an unusual, probably American dance,

of unknown origin, and danced to a modern Appalachian style tune. The dance was, in fact, one of my earliest compositions.

In a further exchange of emails, I was also informed that the same dance could be seen on a video clip of Scottish Folk Dancing. Sure enough, there was the same dance, performed to a Scottish reel, with the characteristic Scottish setting steps and reels.

Both the American and the Scottish correspondents have now been sent facsimiles of the original publication, and will acknowledge me as the originator of the dance.

Well, it's perhaps appropriate to dust it off, and present it once more to an English audience. It should be danced to a ranty reel or polka, similar to the Dorset 4-Hand Reel.

Morris Matters



GLORY OF THE WEST are 40 this year!

The Cotswold women's morris side was founded in 1976 at Exeter University. Their first kit included the University colour green, with white blouse and red skirt. They added crossed baldricks and green tights in 1980. Fifteen years later their kit changed to red trousers, green waistcoats and yellow sash. A radical change of image, took place in 2009 with the kit morphing to all black, just keeping the colours of red, green and yellow in the ribbons. The age range of the current menbership ranges from 18 to 60+, and includes some second generation dancers. Though the dancers are all female, the same doesn't apply to their lively band of musicians.

They have already had some celebratory events, to which former members were invited, but in September they will be hosting a day of dance, probably based around Topsham & Lympstone.

WINKLEIGH MORRIS were undoubtedly the furthest travelled side at this year's Joint Morris Organisations (JMO) day of dance in the city of York, hosted by a local Federation side, Minster Strays. It was quite hard to credit that, at the first stand of the day, down by the river, the flood waters of earlier in the year would have been above our head!

As with a similar event 3 years earlier in Exeter, (hosted by Great Western Morris), the four dozen or so teams were split up into small groups of two or three sides to perform at about eighteen venues around the city, with every team partnered with different sides from the Morris Federation, Morris Ring and Open Morris at each different venue. Even so, meeting up with several of the teams attending only happened at the final massed gathering by the Clifford Tower.

Winkleigh Morris stayed up in Yorkshire for a whole week, meeting up with a practice session and dance swap with Minster Strays on one evening, and on another with Raven Morris, a

steam-punk border style group based in a village near Market Weighton. Both evenings proved lively, interesting and enjoyable.

AUTUMN IS THE BEST TIME to join a morris side, if you feel you woulld like to have a go. Most sides begin their winter practice season towards the end of September or early October. and most of them are very happy to welcome new members. For contact details of a team in your locality see the listings in this magazine or on-line at www.devonfolk.org.uk. There is a good choice between the different styles of dancing -Cotswold, Border, North-West - and some sides also perform Molly, Stave, Longsword or Rapper Sword. Some sides are single sex (though may have musicians of both sexes) while others are mixed. Often a side will have a special 'taster' or recruitment evening for potential new dancers. Exeter Morris Men and Glory of the West are likely to repeat their successful joint taster evening again this year at the Chapter House of the Cathedral. Look our for details!
