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

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When I Can Sing No More

How many of us who are ageing but active folkies give any thought to the probability that one day we may no longer be able to sing, dance or play? Even if we do recognise the possibility, would we

make plans in advance so that we could still get pleasure from our pastime? Ken Hinchliffe has done just that.

When Ken and his wife, Jan, moved to Morchard Bishop in 1997 they both quickly became involved in the local folk scene, and were regulars at Pennymoor and Sticklepath singarounds in particular. He played his English concertina for Winkleigh Morris for a while and enjoyed the song sessions in the pubs after their dance displays in the summer. In 2000 he bought a set of Scottish small pipes which he taught himself to play.

At some point he decided to record some of his favourite songs and tunes, so that he would be able to listen to them if, in the future, he was unable to sing or play for any reason. His remarkable foresight has proved very valuable. By early 2012 Ken was losing confidence in his ability to get his fingers around playing the concertina, and later in the same year he also reluctantly had to give up his beloved bagpipes. He and Jan still attended folk clubs, though with less frequency, and he continued to sing until January last year. Sadly, the onset of Alzheimer's has brought his performing days to a close but he is being well looked after in a care home.

With assistance from Ross Henrywood and friends from the Pennymoor Singarouns, Jan has decided to release Ken's earlier recordings on a CD. All proceeds will go towards Alzheimer's Research UK. A donation of at least £5 per CD is being requested, with an extra £2 for post and packing for mail orders from:

Jan Hinchliffe at 92, Western Lea, Crediton, EX17 3JE. (Over £400 has already been raised - Ed.)

A special evening to launch the CD was held at the London Inn, Morchard Bishop, on Saturday 15th October. with many friends from the village and singers. Paul and Hazel acted as MCs.

Ken was born in Sheffield in 1939. He grew up between two sisters, an older bossy one and a loveable younger one, in a home which had the radio on all day, so he was exposed to music which he loved. He knew the signature tune from every programme - In Town Tonight, Workers' Playtime, Round The Horn, Billy Cottons's Band Show and many more.

As a young teenager he saved up and bought his first instrument, a saxophone, which he taught himself to play. When National Service loomed, he preferred to sign on with the Royal Army Corps, with the ultimate aim of playing in the Band of the Queen's Dragoon Guards. This he achieved after being sent to the Kneller Hall of Music in London and passing rigorous exams. He was able to read music and transpose and play it in any key asked for, for whichever wind instrument he was playing at the time.

Back in civvy street in the late 1960s, he started folk singing, being somewhat influenced by Frank Hinchliffe, his father's cousin, who was from a long line of farm labourers who sang. He went to a number of clubs in and around Sheffield and visited Whitby Festival several times. He was also a keen morris dancer, being a member of Escafeld Morris Men and Grenoside Longsword. He married Jan in 1985 and soon after bought an English treble concertina, followed a few years later by a baritone. Both Ken and Jan continued to go to festivals and folk clubs in the Sheffield area regularly until they moved to Devon in December 1997.

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

Hi Everyone

The summer is over, the festivals are all packed away, and it's back to regular weekly club nights and the occasional Saturday night dance.

So how were your festivals? Circumstances meant I did less Sidmouth than I would have liked. I thought Carol Ormand was OK but not as good as Tom Hinds last year — slightly too much waffle and not such interesting dances. This view was echoed by many - did Gareth set himself a very high bar to beat last year? Geoff Cubitt was a sublime pleasure to dance to as always - surely he must be the UK's best Square caller. The Danish group, Reel of 3, produced some astounding music — and they're back again for Eastbourne Festival next year.

The feedback I've had from Sidmouth-goers on things I didn't see is that it was a bit of a mixed bag. IVFDF goes to the Seaside was a bit flat, with only half the attendance of the previous year. There were also mutterings of some callers not have the experience to be at a festival yet. Against that Geoff's "Learn to Patter Call" workshops were excellent, teaching many callers a valuable skill.

One thing I did notice was how MWSD (Modern Western Square Dance) was infiltrating

Sidmouth. A number of Carol Ormand'sdances featured moves taken from MWSD, and Geoff Cubit's square dance workshops included moves that you wouldn't normally see outside of a proper MWSD dance (e.g. Spin Chain the Gears, for those to whom this might mean something). I have been advocating, without success so far, a return to Sidmouth of MWSD (yes return, it used to be a regular feature). Perhaps it's coming back by stealth? For those of you going to Eastbourne, I will be running two linked "Introduction to MWSD for Contra Dancers" workshops – come and see what all the fuss is about.

Last issue I waxed lyrical about Gender Free Dance in the US and how there is little of it in the UK. I decided that I would do something about this, and have started a Gender Free Dance project (www.genderfreedance.net). Have a look and let me know what you think.

As part of this I'm putting on an LGBTQ+ friendly ceilidh in November. I run a number of dance series and other events as well as calling at local Folk Dance Clubs. As a rule I don't advertise them in this column as I don't think it's the place for them, but I'm making an exception for this one as its aim is to widen the appeal of folk dancing – something we all surely support. The dance is at St Matthews Hall, Newtown, Exeter

on Saturday 19thNovember. You don't have to be a member of the LGBTQ+ community to go, just friendly, welcoming and non-judgemental. See http://bit.do/genderfree for more details and further events like this.

Some of you may have noticed gender free dancing becoming more evident. Gordon Potts called Swanage's Saturday Ceilidh (mostly) Gender free, and I understand there will be

an LGBTQ+ (hence gender free) dance at next year's Sidmouth. Watch this space – this is going to grow and grow.

Finally a rant about dancers subsidising music lovers.Concert bands are more expensive to hire than ceilidh bands and callers, a fact reflected in the price of events (Sidmouth: Seth Lakeman and others £24 - American Dance £12 -Irish Dance, £12 -Ceilidh £10 -Ham Marquee afternoon concerts £16- afternoon dances £10. Fair enough, but the season ticket price is the same whether you go to dance or to listen. Dancers are subsidising the non-dancers. To be fair to Sidmouth the big name shows are not included in a "normal" season ticket, but the imbalance is still there. You can also see it comparing music and dance festivals to purely dance ones: 2 day weekend ticket at Sidmouth £88, at Lichfield £58. 3 day weekend ticket at Towersey £136, Eastbourne £100. My advice: go to the dance only festivals – you get better value for money.

Playford: Zest Addressed

June Backway's letter about 'Zesty Playford' in the last issue generated a certain amount of comment on social media and I was expecting some response from readers of What's Afoot. In the absence of any replies, I'd like to add a few of my own observations.

I am not at all surprised by the appearance of 'upbeat' style of dancing Playford, only that it has survived so long without a modern twist to it

Traditional songs collected by Sharp and others have long been subjected to creative instrumental accompaniment, in some instances virtually indistinguishable from rock music. Ceilidh dance has for many years implied a more vigorous and energetic form of the folk dance that for many years was recognised as the 'EFDS' style. Cotswold Morris (not to mention Border) has seen considerable changes in interpretation since Sharp's time, and the introduction of a whole new repertoire that Sharp would not recognise.

In all of these areas, the 'traditional/original' format still has a strong following not limited to ageing folkies. Regardless of any 'new research' into how Playford was done or any research Sharp may have done in the past on these kind of dances I have no doubt that there will continue to be dancers who wish to preserve the stately and graceful style to which they have become familiar. At the same time, I welcome the new interest in these dances — their fantastic tunes alone deserve wider exposure. If a greater level of active involvement is generated then I believe it is likely that some new followers will be drawn back to look at the way these dances have been done at various periods since their introduction.

Is it possible that 'Zesty Playford' may be commonly adopted in a similar way to 'Ceilidh' to signal a more energetic and upbeat format to the dances?

Miggy Campbell: On Accidentally Becoming A Songwriter.

I think there should be a support group for people like me, held in some scruffy hall or meeting room, where you sit in a circle and confess, "My name is Miggy, and I read poetry."

As a child, poems could delight me, and as a teenager, what had been an occasional indulgence became an obsession – I read poetry every day! after I joined a group of other addicts. We held parties where we read poems, discussed, shared, and took them home to add to already huge collections. We read poems by famous and lesser known poets. I wanted more than anything to be a poet.

When I was eight, my father, then in his sixties, retired from the RAF and with me and my mother in tow, moved to a village in Sussex and banged the door shut on the modern world. This was circa 1960, and unlike my friends with their colour tellies, radiograms and transistors, I had a wind up gramophone, some 78's from the 1930's and early 1950's and a wireless that was permanently tuned to the Home Service. Music was a passion, I listened to military marches, light opera, well known classical works, choral singing, and old musicals, with the occasional 1950's pop song thrown in; an eccentric mix!

The church was the centre of my mother's social world. So I went too, sang in the choir (you were paid sixpence each time you attended) and acted in plays. My mother was also a keen thespian and singer, and provided the background sounds of my life as she sang and recited aloud while doing housework. Much to my embarrassment, she even broke into song occasionally, while out shopping. From her, I learnt songs from Gilbert and Sullivan, Albert and the Lion, music hall numbers, much of Fred Astaire's repertoire, Scottish ballads, Dixieland jazz standards and a few random English folk songs, and all with

absolutely no idea as to their provenance!

Of course I rebelled. By the time I was sixteen or seventeen I had bought myself a record player, had a transistor radio permanently clamped to my ear, went to rock concerts and had begun to frequent pubs, where, for the first time I heard chorus songs thrashed out by men with guitars — Wild Rover, The Leaving of Liverpool. Heady stuff!

I left home and went to college where I found myself in a room next door to a girl who sang at the local folk club. After a while I went with her, and on my first visit came away thinking - this is what I have been looking for. Years later a friend came to a folk club with me just to see what it was like; he put it wonderfully into words, saying "So this is where music and poetry meet!"

It is almost always words that give me inspiration for songs. I wrote my first song after reading a verse from The Song of Solomon, found in a poetry anthology. It sounded like a song chorus, and a tune - very like a hymn tune, stole into my head to accompany the words; I had a sort of light bulb moment, and the verses just followed.

Then I got lucky, not knowing quite what to do with a song of my own, with great trepidation I took it to a folk club where Beggars Velvet were the guests, announced that I had written it and somehow managed to sing it without mishap. Then and there Dave Webber congratulated me on having written it. Later he asked me for it, and this gave me the confidence to dare to think that I could write a proper song. Subsequently I have got to know Dave, Annie and Kathy, and

we have swapped more songs, but I am still completely in awe of Dave!

Sometimes it only takes one or two words to suggest a song. On a walk on the Isle of Wight, I came upon a sign that said Chillerton Down. I began to think of ways you could come down Chillerton Down - jump down, dawdle down (I liked that one), fall down, gallop down -could be a chorus! Straight away I started composing in my head. The tune needed to fall down to accompany the words, but in a jumpy sort of way. A tune began to present itself, and I mentally hummed it over and over again so as not to lose it. Subsequently I have been told that it is in the mixolydian mode. I know nothing of this! Though forced into piano lessons as a child I never learnt to read music, or remembered anything much about theory. The only part of the exams I was good at was the aural test. I do everything by ear. After thinking of a great many ways to descend Chillerton Down, the idea of alliteration occurred to me as quite a fun exercise. I could use more words, make it different for each verse, and at that point decided to make it into the story of a courtship with its ups and downs.

I think because I consumed such a varied diet of

music, song, poetry and rhyme, I am steeped in it, and somehow, over time, every now and then a song arises from somewhere. Sometimes I'm not quite sure if I've written a tune, or simply recycled something I learnt 50 years ago. I have to check with other people – do you know this tune?

My poems are rubbish!

BLACK DOG FOLKLORE

Mark Norman, accordionist with Pigs Might Fly and committee member of the Folklore Society, has recently published a book on Black Dog Folklore. It is a comprehensive study of the image of the Black Dog in folklore, with an extensive gazetteer of UK sightings and traditions. Back to roots for local folk duo



Brixham Folk Club were delighted to welcome Paul Wilson and Marilyn Tucker as guests at the club and for them it was a chance to re-connect with South Devon and many long standing friends.

Paul's comment "We felt really welcomed and delighted that some singers wanted to learn some of our repertoire - that's always a great feeling". Marilyn said "There was a genuine feeling of sharing and enjoying the music together and both of us were impressed with the high standard of floor singers".

Paul and Marilyn are renowned for their strong vocal harmonies and instrumental variety, including guitar and piano accordion. Their wide repertoire of traditional songs, including many from Devon's rich cultural history is complemented by a wealth of new songs and original compositions and in true traditional folk club style we all had plenty of opportunity to join in.

Marilyn's repertoire includes songs from her family tradition and a recorded performance from her has been used by folk star John Kirkpatrick an as example of how folk songs should be sung! Over recent months Marilyn has been developing her singing, writing songs and directing shows like Singing Herstory and Random Melody.

Paul first came to national prominence in the 1970s as part of the Totnes based trio Staverton

Bridge and since then has developed his guitar playing, vocal technique and piano accordion work. He directs the annual Baring Gould Song School attracting students from around the UK and giving many their first encounter with folk music. There are several well-known students of the song school including award-winning singer Sam Lee.


I had the pleasure of presenting Paul and Marilyn with the Devon Folk Award in 2012 in recognition of all their work in encouraging and facilitating folk activities

in Devon.

We were so thrilled for them when they hit the headlines recently having been awarded the gold badge, from the English Folk Dance and Song Society, the highest honour the national body can give. "This was all the more delightful for being a complete surprise" said Marilyn. Together Paul and Marilyn have set up Wren Music as a folk music education organization which over the last 30 years has developed an enviable reputation for delivering quality folk development work in a huge variety of settings. "The success and growth of Wren has outstripped our expectations" said Paul. "Now that's running, we've got a chance to develop further what we were doing before Wren was set up" says Marilyn "that is taking work as performers in our own right."

guaranteed to attract supporters, but Devon Folk always tries to link its AGM to some other folk activity, and move the event around the county. In addition to an evening concert there will be a song and music session in the Plough from 5 pm until 7 pm. It is highly probably that there will also be a dance orientated workshop at the Globe Hotel next door in the afternoon and morris dancing around the town during the day. For those who prefer to be more active, it is hoped to run a ceilidh in the newly restored ballroom at the 1646 Centre, adjacent to the main car park. It may well be the first event in this facility. Further details will be made available as soon as possible.

For anybody travelling a fair distance, make a day of it. The RHS gardens at Rosemoor are nearby and Dartington Glass Factory is always worth a visit.

GRANNY'S ATTIC

Off The Land

WGS 416CD

It's very encouraging that the folk scene continues to thrive with new young folk artistes. The trio, Cohen Braithwaite-Kilcoyne, George Sansome and Lewis Wood, who make up Granny's Attic were nominated for the 2014 Young Musician of the Year award. It's also encouraging that they have turned to traditional sources for their songs, though the album also features several attractive tunes composed by Lewis. I particularly like the slow *After The Floods*.

The instrumentation is very good both on nonvocal tracks and the songs - a pleasing blend of guitar, fiddle or mandolin, and melodeon or concertina. It's rhythmic and complementary to the songs, and they avoid the temptation to try to produce complex arrangements. They approach their material with obvious enthusiasm and drive, although I think perhaps the lead singer on several tracks (the first track and others) has got a bit carried away in trying to make the songs sound traditional. His voice sounds as if he's putting on a folky accent which I found rather irritating. Notwithstanding, the song selection and presentation is good - the haunting Horkstow Grange (with a mention of the character Steeleye Span) and Country Hirings are in my opinion the best.

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NICK DOW On Track – The Very Best of Nick Dow OHM809

Nick is one of those singers whose name has been well-known around the folk club scene for a very long time, but I don't think our paths have ever crossed. If they had, I'm sure I would have remembered, since his presentation of traditional folk songs is quite captivating. He has an excellent, rich mellow voice, never forceful, but very pleasing to listen to, and his uncluttered guitar accompaniment for several tracks blends well with the singing. It's difficult to single out any one song since they are all good but the opening tracks, Through Bushes And Briars gives a superb taste of what to expect from the other dozen songs on offer. Almost all the songs are traditional - you'll recognise names like The Blacksmith, The Nightingale and The Country Carrier. One modern song sounds traditional - The Faithful Horse, written by Tom Walsh and based on a true story from a traveller. The final track, Blue Mountain, is a complete contrast - almost country and western in style, with additional banjo, bass and fiddle backing. Nick could have just as easily been a popular exponent of this genre!

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MARTIN SCRAGG The Turning of the Tide.

Perhaps we throw the word "stalwart" into our conversation or writing too easily but when this CD landed on my desk it prompted me to look up the definition. It means "very loyal and dedicated". The word came from the old English "staelwierthe" which, in turn, translates into "serviceable" "foundation" and "worth".

No better words could describe Martin Scragg who has been a stalwart of the south west folk scene for half a century - and I should know. When Joy and I were still residents at the Herga Folk Club in London we used to visit my parents living in Torquay, where Martin ran one of the most renowned folk venues in Devon, and he kindly gave us a duo booking more than 40 years ago! I was impressed back then by his uncompromising, understated guitar playing and easy singing style and he's incorporated these

effortlessly in this album - a paean, if you like, to his life's work in folk music.

It is a no-nonsense record of absolute traditional folk song classics and powerful modern songs, and as such, is worth the space in anyone's collection.

I don't intend to belittle the rest of the songs on this 15-track CD, but let me say from the start the highlight for me was a stunning trio of songs (tracks 6, 7 and 8) in the middle of the recording.

The ethereal, sonic introduction to Martin's version of Jez Lowe's Small Coal is spine-tingling and the words a real tear-jerker. On the same mining theme, it is followed by the American epic ballad of Joe Hill. As a union member myself I am drawn to this song.....but pushing a pen for half a century doesn't comes close to the struggles of hewing coal underground, or battling for union recognition and better working conditions. Martin's delivery of this song is heartfelt and emotional. (A very tasteful bass line underpinning this track, incidentally.) Completing this golden trio is a song with which I was not familiar Empires of Plenty, written by musical polymath, Sam Richards. It bemoans the passing of our agrarian society and culture and, again, Martin's voice makes the message very meaningful.

Martin has set out to lay down some of the classic trad' tracks of the last half century. And he's a brave man, because Track One is "Rout of the Blues" which, of course, is bound to draw comparison with the Dransfield brothers who made this the title track on their 70's album. But Martin's boldness pays off, and Steve Gill's lifting harmonica gives this song a hum-a-long lilt.

Track two, "The Drowned Lover" has a more gentle, guitar approach but here's an English folk classic again that deserves to be here for posterity. In singing this Martin admits to paying homage to Norfolk's Sam Larner (from whom it was collected).

You don't hear so many whaling songs these days do you? Too non-politically correct I suppose but that doesn't stop Martin from laying down his version of The Whaleman's Lament. I remember sitting a few feet in front of Bert Lloyd at the Herger Folk Club as he sang this song in 1972 and it's a joy to hear such a competent version after all this time. Maggie Duffy, another of our south Devon treasures, provides tuneful harmonies on a couple of tracks and there's also satire as he tackles Leon Rosselson's Little Tim McGuire - about a pyrotechnic child arsonist. There's a gentle wind-down to the album, with Martin singing Eric Bogle's Now I'm Easy. I hope the sentiment of this song is reflected in how Martin feels about his life in music.

One of the musical surprises on the album closes the show -a version of the big hit from the Great Depression, *Buddy Can You Spare a Dime*. Martin does two stand-out things on this last track. Firstly- and full credit here- he includes the rarely-heard verse intro' to the song. The song is all the more poignant when the full lyrics are included. Coming from bleak times, as it did, the song was actually written by a Scotsman, Jay Gorney and New York Jew, Yip Harburg for a Broadway show, so Martin cleverly leaves us with a fun sound effect...but you'll have to buy the CD to hear it.

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SASKIA GRIFFITHS-MOORE Gentle Heart

Hailing from Bristol, Saskia Griffiths-Moore has done it the hard way.

After a background in charitable community work and running her own business, she made the sudden decision to quit her profession and follow her "Gentle Heart" by pursuing music full-time (a brave and envious move indeed!).

With little formal education or no music lessons of any kind, Saskia has solely relied on her loyal audiences. And her audiences have responded, supporting her and keeping her doing what she loves best. And very well she does it too!

Fast becoming a name to raise more than a few acknowledging eyebrows, she keeps busy touring the UK and further afield, sometimes through donation concerts and sometimes for charity. Her approach on how to generate gigs and a sustainable career in acoustic music on her own terms is commendable.

But what of her music or indeed her first solo album, Gentle Heart?

The selling-point for Saskia is her beautiful voice. To call a voice captivating has become a bit of a journalistic cliché but for Saskia it is well-deserved.

When heard live, she can easily hold an audience in suspended animation by her effortless singing and, indeed, her songwriting skills, that are altogether intensely powerful and emotional without ever forcing them to be.

Her guitar style is simplistic but perfect for the gentle (there's that word again), reflective and sometimes bittersweet songs she sings.

Another suitable and, somewhat, necessary cliché when describing Saskia's sound is that it harkens back to the days of Joan Baez, particularly on the album's strong opening track, "In Time".

The album's title—Gentle Heart—perfectly reflects both Saskia's nature and her songwriting.

Saskia describes her music as "Nu-Folk", but

crosses other genres, with a bit of jazz and Middle-Of-The-Road added.

Gentle Heart was produced by Robert N Weil and the production is very minimalistic, with just sprinkles of additional accompaniment of Piano, Violins and Accordion, all supplied by Robert.

And here lies my only major gripe. Sometimes performed in the French style, the accordion sounds horribly processed and manufactured, most likely by a basic keyboard.

Unfortunately, this approach and this sound just doesn't work for me and simply ruins several of the album's best songs. It would have been preferable, to me, if these songs incorporated strings or piano instead, a combination that works on other tracks.

At times the album feels oddly emotionally flat too and she doesn't captivate nearly as well as she does live or on other recordings I have heard.

That said, her voice comes over well enough and the songs speak for themselves, making this a suitable debut to launch her recording career.

Saskia tours solo, with an Americana duo and with an acoustic trio, Saskia And The June Apples and in 2017 she is heading to California and Germany.

The hard work is paying off and the proof is in her performances and writing, a talent that could see her go much further in the years to come.

CUPOLA:WARD Bluebell BETTY02

Cupola have gained a well deserved reputation for their singing and musicianship, and on this album Doug Eunson, Sarah Matthews and Ollie Matthews are joined by Lucy Ward, the young singer-songwriter who also hails from Derbyshire. None of her songs are actually featured on this CD however. The combination is an exciting blend of voices and instruments - fiddle, melodeon, sax, guitar, and others - to present an attractive mixture of songs in their own distinctive style.

I absolutely loved the blend of the beautiful 18th century dance tune, *Cotillion*, played as a backing to the Beatles' *Nowhere Man* – now that takes some imagination, but it really works. A Child ballad, *Willie's Lady* to the tune of a

Breton drinking song is another very effective and unusual offering – though not their original idea. The Methodist hymn, Jacob's Well, is very stirring, in four part West Gallery style harmony. There are some familiar traditional songs including Gower Wassail, Heather Down The Moor, and Sprig of Time and a few more recent compositions, the poignant Keith Marsden song, Normandy Orchards, completing the dozen tracks on offer. My only minor gripe is that I wished they had opened with a song other than Crane Driver, which I felt was the weakest track - I didn't really like their 'rocking' treatment of it. Anyhow, the rest of the album more than made up for it.


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CROWS Time To Rise Wildgoose WGS415CD

The quartet Crows enjoyed a high level of popularity in the late 1970s and 1980s for their rousing four-part harmonies and well-arranged accompaniments. Mick Ryan and James Patterson were with the line-up throughout, but original members, Ralph Jordan and Jon Burge, moved on to play with other groups, and were replaced at various times by Dave Bordewey, Jim Younger and Steve Faux. The group enjoyed a brief reunion in 2014 to perform at Sidmouth in a memorial concert for Ralph.

The album includes tracks from their two vinyls released in 1981 and 1986, together with 8 unreleased tracks that were recorded for radio broadcasts. The result is a nostalgic trip down memory lane for everyone who appreciated their vibrant singing over their ten years of performing, and an unexpected gem for those who have come to enjoy the folk scene more recently.

Mick has, of course, since established a solid reputation as a songwriter and composer of 'folk operas' but some of his early songs are featured on this CD - The Antelope, and the title song, Time To Rise. Although there are a couple of other contemporary songs, the album overall has a traditional song feel to it, from the opening numbers, Bold Wolfe and Coast of Peru, to Napoleon's Farewell to Paris and Two Magicians, among others. I was quite expecting When This Old Hat Was New (a song I've never quite got round to learning) to be given the full vocal harmony treatment, but was surprised, pleasantly, to hear a superb solo rendering from James, to a gentle and sympathetic accompaniment by Ralph and Dave. The harmonies really go to town, however, on the southern methodist hymn, Northfields. Wonderful!

Congratulations to WildGoose for giving this superb material a new lease of life.



Reviews

DEVON PUBS: A Pictorial Retrospective Andrew Swift & Kirsten Elliott £15 Akeman Press. ISBN 978-0-9560989-8-6

Now this is not a book about folk music, but, since many folk activities such as morris dancing, song and music sessions are centred around pubs, it is likely to be of interest to many of our readers. Over ten years in compilation, this attractive book catalogues in alphabetical order of location a very large number of hostelries both past and present, with archive photographs and a well-researched history of each inn. There is also a chapter on the lost breweries of Devon.

I can confess not to have yet read the whole book from cover to cover. It's more of a book to dip into when you are intending to visit a particular town or have enjoyed a pint at some old-world village inn. One finds fascinating snippets of information, like the association of the Anchor at Exebridge with R.D. Blackmore and the highwayman Tom Faggus, and the extract from Baring-Gould's reminiscences about inebriated singers in the Oxenham Arms, South Zeal. Some of these establishments appear to have changed little from the earliest photographs of around 1860 to the present day. Old photographs of two of my favourite pubs, the Bridge at Topsham, and the Tom Cobley Tavern at Spreyton, grace the cover.

The list of pubs is by no means exhaustive my four nearest pubs, in Morchard Bishop and vicinity aren't there. Perhaps some are being saved for a second volume. Sadly, even many of the pubs featured in this edition are no longer with us, having been converted to private houses or other businesses, or abandoned. Many more across this county and the country as a whole are facing a very uncertain future. I hope we never come to the situation where a young child asks, "What was a pub, Daddy?"

NINEBARROW Bow Village Hall, September 23rd

Those who made it to Bow on September 23rd experienced something very special. Ninebarrow are a duo from Dorset, Jon Whitley and Jay Labouchardiere, blessed with beautiful voices which blend together in spine-chilling harmonies in performances of traditional and self-penned songs, many rooted in the landscape, history and archaeology of their native county. Jon is also a skilled player of ukulele, mandola and piano: these instruments, plus the subtle drone of a reed organ, weave magical accompaniment to many of their songs. Two of my favourites were Winter King, based on the tradition (now hopefully extinct) of the hunting of the wren on Boxing Day, and Coming Home, written by Jon's father Bob Whitley, a veteran of the Dorset folk scene and the reason why Jon and Jay became folk musicians and singers. Traditional songs such as Dark-Eyed Sailor, Bold Sir Rilus and a chilling version of Three Ravens were also highlights of their set. Their engaging presences, haunting songs and beautiful harmonies made this an evening to remember. Ninebarrow are now recognised as one of the most impressive new acts on the folk scene and there will be other opportunities to hear them this autumn as part of the Villages in Action programme. So don't miss them!

SWEET LIBERTIES Folk by the Oak QRCD002

I was very pleased to be able to review this CD, and can understand why I was asked. I really enjoy the variety in pub singaround sessions in West Devon, but I came to folk music through Woodcraft Folk. We also used folk songs from around the world, many with a political message or with stories of struggles to inspire and challenge young people. Then I realised this CD was part of a commission by those pillars of establishment, EFDSS and the UK Parliament. Both may have been criticised at times for conservatism and elitism. And now the wider. national zeitgeist also embraces cynicism; for example towards the membership of collaborative and representational institutions. If we accept that many human rights and liberties are at risk of erosion or are taken for granted, this CD reminds us that most were hard fought for – outside the tent then inside it. This project was intended to reflect key moments in history when a campaign or fight was initiated, or when a change was eventually legislated for.

Nancy Kerr doesn't outline the rights enshrined in the Magna Carta, but brilliantly reflects on the ownership of land for profit, and loss of natural ecology. She weaves the Human Rights Act into the vellum/skin on which Acts are written. Sam Carter uses the Slavery Abolition Act 1833 to imagine a transatlantic journey to

freedom. Sleeve notes on the 14 tracks concisely explain the issue the writers chose, and how these themes developed. Characters such as Nye Bevan are famed by Martin Joseph for managing change or, like Dic Penderyn, raised high for his part in the 1831 Merthyr Riots.

If Parliament expected the collective to utilise their archives to eulogise democracy and past progress, they underestimated the well-worn tradition for protest songs. Sam Carter has written 2 wonderful anti-slavery anthems but also that *Dark Days* are upon us again. I had not come across Maz O'Conner before but her 4 songs are clever, grounded (e.g. for *Broadwater Farm*) and can poke fun at the house sharing, post-war consensus in *This Old House*.

Within the spirit of targeted songwriting groups, there is both variety but also a sense of collaboration across subject matter, age of performers and experience. The project was timed for Parliamentary anniversaries last year, with a run of concerts now completed. However, on Youtube you can view all of the launch concert in the lovely oak panelled hall at Cecil Sharp House. The CD production is good and the beautiful, well crafted songs are well worth having. Having been mistaken for the grizzled Jeremy at public events, I should guess that he would be more roused by this CD/project than others may.
