

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EDITORIAL

By coincidence two of the main articles in this edition feature folk on film. One is archive material of Dartmoor musicians and singers which is being given a new airing, while the other is a new short fiction film featuring a well-known Devon morris side. Generally speaking our traditional folk music and dance gets virtually no exposure in the cinema and hardly any more on the television., except for the odd local news clip during Sidmouth week and the occasional coverage of an event that happens to have a folksinger or morris dancer in the background. Morris dancers on the Antiques Road Show or in an episode of Midsomer Murders (no deaths yet from morris sticks!) - is there a hidden message? Perversely when I was in the Isles of Scilly last autumn a French TV crew thought the folk session in the pub was worthy of coverage - even though the material performed was not Scillonian! How do we get more meaningful media coverage? Do we actually need it?

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The Dartmoor Entertainers

Bill Murray gives a new lease of life to the vintage film from 1979 by Westward Television

The late John Bartlett said in retirement that this wonderful film about the music, song and dance traditions on the north-east slopes of Dartmoor was one of the finest achievements of his long career as a director and producer of regional television programmes.

Having been introduced to John Bartlett and Westward Television by Cyril Tawney in 1970, I worked on the arrangements for the 'Mayflower 70' celebrations at The Barbican in Plymouth and then later in the same year, on 'Sing Inn' which was a series of six televised folk programmes that, even after nearly fifty years, many of us still recall with glee. The Exeter Jolly Porter contingent managed to drink the full allocation of beer on the first evening of filming.

John and I remained in contact and in the mid-seventies we recorded for Westward Television, 'A Jan Stewer Evening' at Fingle Bridge, Drewsteignton.Some of the performers had anecdotes to tell to the audience about the Jan Stewer (A J Coles) that they remembered and others sang his wonderful songs or read recitations from his books and newspaper articles.

In 1979, I again contacted John at ITV Westward Television to remind him about the wonderful traditions that were being preserved by the wonderful folk musician Bob Cann on the northeastern slopes of Dartmoor. Bob was later in life,

awarded both the British Empire Medal and the Gold Badge of the English Folk Song and Dance Society for this work.

John responded immediately and he asked Bob Cann and I to come down to Plymouth to discuss the proposals.

'The Dartmoor Entertainers', which was recorded in just two days, is centred on an evening of Dartmoor entertainment at the delightful Gidleigh Village Hall. Bob Cann is the everpresent backbone of the film. He interviews the various characters and he introduces them to the audience on the night of the show. His easy manner and his wonderful Dartmoor dialect are both visually and audibly perfect for the situation. Nothing was scripted, John simply allowed Bob to take the lead. He was well acquainted with all the participants and he knew exactly the right questions to ask.

The length of the film is fifty-five minutes, there is never a dull moment and it is full of humour and emotion. Away from the Village Hall, we visit The Northmore Arms at Throwleigh, The Three Crowns at Chagford, Edna Dunning's farm at Hittesleigh during milking time and the Scott's farm at Fairhaven for some very adept goose plucking. Later in the film and in appalling weather the production team travel toRichard Prince's farm high up on Dartmoor where the sleet lashes down whilst he and his farm worker feed the stock from his tractor and trailer.

There is an absorbing parade of young children all dressed up for Halloween and carrying lanterns made from hollowed out mangle wurzels with music from The Dartmoor Pixie Band. Stories about the dances at Gidleigh Village Hall in years gone by, come from Uncle Frank Webber and Monica Alford.

The musical performers and singers include Charlie Hill from Drewsteignton, Gordon Ching from Crockernwell, Will Hannaford from Gidleigh and Jimmy Cooper from South Zeal. Step dancing and harmonica playing are demonstrated by Les Rice and Jack Rice both of whom live and work in Chagford. The Dartmoor Bone Rattler, David Alford rattles his bones with perfect timing and rhythm and during his interview, he also

demonstrates how to play the spoons.

The Kelly Quarry Blasters (right) give lively entertainment and humour towards the end of the film and The Dartmoor Pixie Band provide the music for the circle dances with Bob Cann himself calling the steps. Bob's grandson Mark Bazeley (aged 7) renders a faultless 'Daisy Daisy' on the anglo-concertina. (below)

Last and not least we listen to Ned and Martha 'Annaford, a wonderful pair of old Dartmoor characters who many of you will remember from their hilarious performances in The Music Hall at The Dartmoor Folk Festival, Martha does



most of the talking. telling stories in the Devonshire dialect that fill the hall with laughter. Ned just sits and listens with his leg propped up on a stool 'to help the circulation'.

It is nearly forty vears since this film was made. The



years have passed and there have been many changes. New people who have come to the area have little idea about what was happening all those years ago up on Dartmoor. For those of us who were around at the time, the film provides a wonderful reminder of how things were and of the characters who provided our local entertainment and amusement in 1979.

In December of last year at Gidleigh Village Hall and with the agreement of The South West Film and Television Archive who own the copyright. I presented the film again to an audience of over one hundred. There were several people in the hall who had also been in the audience on the evenings of the filming in 1979. It was marvellous to have with us on the night Mark Bazeley who could watch himself on the film and Jason Rice and Rob Murch whose grandfather and father respectively were also essential parts of the original programme. Dave Wills and Len Harvey of The Kelly Quarry Blasters were also there to provide songs and humour after the film.

The South West Film and Television Archive are happy for me to show 'The Dartmoor Entertainers' at other village halls and events in the future. Please contact me if you would like to have more information about this.

Martin Hodge - R.I.P.

Martin Hodge, dance caller and radio presenter very sadly and suddenly died at the end of January.

Members of ceilidh bands, Spinach For Norman, Sheer Hopody, Poisson Rouge and Going Steady will join members of Phonic FM and d'Accord - Exeter's French/Breton dance club of which he was an active member - together with the many musicians and dancers he worked with and his vast number of friends in expressing our condolences to his family.

Martin was a caller for at least 30 years and worked on and off with my band, Spinach For Norman, from its very first gig way back in the 1980s. During that time he became known for his demonstrations of dances, especially the 'solo basket', where he demonstrated the popular basket figure which occurs in some English and Irish dances and also for his one man circle dance. He was a gentle, quietly spoken man who could nonetheless get a crowd of dancers organised into dancing all the ceilidh dances with great aplomb.

Apart from his skills as a caller he taught in circle

dance groups in and around Devon, was a TEFL teacher, radio presenter on Phonic FM Exeter's community radio station, presenting such shows as The Respect Show, Hot Pebbles and of course Roots and Shoots, which he and I started at the inception of the radio station. These shows were music shows and included folk and roots music from around the world together with music made by local musicians and this fitted in with Martin's love of the diversity of human cultures and his enthusiasm for new music especially acoustic music. He was at the forefront of organising the annual Exeter Respect Festival and also a great champion of LBGT culture and rights being a prime mover in the Exeter Pride annual celebrations including the Pride Ceilidh at which I had the honour to play at, with the band especially formed for the occasions, 'Going Steady'.

Martin will be sadly missed by a huge number of people - a great character, a lovely man and a great friend.

Something Old, Something New...

So what makes for a good dance / festival? Yes of course good music and good dancers, but what about the programme?

As I write, IVFDF (Inter Varsity Folk Dance Festival) is coming up soon in the lovely city of Cambridge. A weekend of dance, dance and more dance with a bit of music and other folky stuff thrown in, and lovely people. And I'm not going.

I remember my first IVFDF - everyone does. So much to do, new things to try, it was like being a kid in a sweetshop with everything free. The second one was almost as good - I could do the things I missed out on last time. I was hooked for life!

But now I find IVFDF tedious and repetitive. The same workshops, often taught by the same people, with many of the same attendees. I find it no longer worth the effort of going away.

IVFDF seems more repetitive than most. I appreciate that it's an ideal introduction for newbies, and as such will always feature the same core, but there seems to be less and less variety. The survivors' ceilidh will have all the same old dances (or variations of): CherkessiaK'Fulla, The Willow Tree, Bottoms Up, Cumberland Square 8... Even ceilidhs at festivals will have the same dances popping up again and again. Old Swan Gallop, anyone?

I find myself less inclined to go to Sidmouth this year as well. I found Tom Hinds' workshops



brilliant, with many new dances, but Carol Ormand's less so. This year we have Seth Tepfer, who I'm sure will be excellent, but the newness and excitement of a full morning's American workshop has faded.

This brings me to the local dance scene. I am reminded of an occasion at a local dance when during a walkthrough the caller gave one instruction, but everyone did something else. I queried this with another dancer who said "oh they've [the caller] got it wrong". It took a moment for the import of this to register. They knew the dance so well that there was little point in the caller even being there. I suppose Scottish Country Dance is like that - no caller so you must know the dance. Does that add to the experience (no walkthroughs, more time dancing) or take away from it (nothing new)?

There is a Devonian "ethos", particularly prevalent in rural areas, where people do the same thing every time - and enjoy it. I've seen it in dancing, bell ringing, festivals, sessions... Yes it's tradition, but it's also stagnation. On the other hand, I went to a Mrs Midnight's ceilidh with Mike Boston calling, and was pleasantly surprised by the variety of the dances he called, a number of which I'd never come across. Still too many hopsteps though!

So what do you like? New dances?Old, familiar dances?A mixture? What's your favourite type of folk dance? Ceilidh?Contra? Square? Tea Dance? What's your favourite dance?

Moving on... the first Gender Free Dance was a roaring success - so much so that we're having another one. 1st April 2017, at the Phoenix. Put it in your diary.

Finally, Martin Hodge, who sadly passed away recently, was a great help and inspiration to me when setting up the first Gender Free Dance. Thank you Martin –you will be greatly missed.

Folk is Broad Church

I have sometimes heard the comment, 'That's not folk' about a particular activity, to which I may be tempted to reply, 'Depends what you mean by folk." And giving an unambiguous universally accepted definition of what is meant by 'folk' - folk song, folk dance, folk music — has proved to be beyond the capabilities of many an academic far more qualified than I.

Folk is what you make it. In song clubs one may well hear an unaccompanied ballad with a pedigree stretching back a couple of hundred years or more followed by a sixties Beatles number or a social comment offering scribbled on the back of an envelope the previous day. At a dance club a stately Playford dance, a 'traditional' village dance and a recently composed contra or square may feature on the same programme during the evening. Folk dance band repertoires and folk music sessions often feature old and modern tunes without any distinction of provenance, whilst relatively few morris sides claim to perform only those dances collected by Cecil Sharp and his contemporaries. 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John Purser 01237 424286 bidefolk@gmail.com is acceptable to those participating in the wide range of folk song, dance and music events on offer. However, slow English polka won't be appreciated at an Irish session, guitars might not be welcome at an unaccompanied singaround, nor American patter calls at a Playford dance club. In Devon we are fortunate to have venues catering for specialised interests as well as ones which offer a broader experience.

The borders of folk music, however vague, are always being tested and expanded; when does one step over the line between folk blues and rhythm & blues? When does folk rock drop the folk element? Where does a contemporary folk song become indistinguishable from a modern pop song? When does a steam-punk variation of morris no longer become recognisable as morris?

Does it really matter? Folk is a living 'tradition'. Participants in folk activities come from all backgrounds and they will bring with them their involvement and interests in other forms of music, dance and song. Inevitably there is likely to be some degree of cross-fertilisation.

There is one area of music and song which appears today as rather on the fringes of folk but nevertheless has very strong roots in the living traditions of everyday folk. For two hundred years until about 1860 village musicians and choirs would play and sing for church services - the West Gallery music, popularised in Thomas Hardy's novels. Many manuscripts survived the purge of Keble's Oxford movement and the genre is very much alive and healthy in the West Gallery choirs across the country. Workshops and informal sessions take place as part of Sidmouth Folk Week. Devon has its own West Gallery Quire, which meets fortnightly in Crediton. (details in listings). Furthermore, remnants of local 'folk' carolling traditions survive in Devon - on Exmoor and at Bratton Clovelly in particular, though they are perhaps less well known amongst the UK folk community than those from the Sheffield area.

The Bradninch Acoustic Music Club

This was first started in April 2009 by Colin Wilson, Jerry Cahill and Mike Leonard to provide a platform for young and new up and coming artists to practice and hone their performance skills in a concert style atmosphere and to try out new songs and instrumentals.

The clubs ethos is to support, nurture and promote all those who want to perform in the public arena and have the skills and confidence to play at their very best, as well as having a fun musical night out.

Shortly after the Club started it developed the "Young Voices of Music" project. Its ambition is to provide a platform for young performers under the age of 25 and provide support, advice, guitar skills, transport and expenses — especially for those from the rural background. It also attracts adhoc awards to young performers based on progression; from a set of strings to half a days recording in a local studio.

The project received a major boost when Roger Woodward, the internationally renowned concert pianist, stopped off in Bradninch on a world tour and donated all proceeds from his

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concert to the fund.

The Club now has a regular special stage at the Bradninch Music Festival where we invite several young performers to pitch for 30+minutes – styles cross all genres of music including traditional, contemporary and folk. These showcases are not an informal Open Mic' style – they are fully promoted events and all the youngsters get a fee for their commitment and effort.

Over the last few years we have showcased almost 30 young stars and offered further appearances to many at Bradninch Rocks, Chagford and more.

In 2014 we started our "Featured Young Artist" club nights to offer further opportunities to perform. The project has attracted much interest and support from out of county with young performers coming from Bristol and Bournemouth

Amongst the artists who have enjoyed the opportunities were: the then 11-year-old Sam Newman who went on to appear on a new BBC TV programme Young Musicians with Gareth Malone, Ruby May Spenser who appeared at two further festivals and Jay who went on to support Kings of Leon. So many are now following university courses in Music.

2017 looks to be another exciting year with two new young bands booked to perform – one is very local and very young. We also have two amazingly talented solo artists to add to our programme of young musicians at the 17th Bradninch Music Festival.

We are especially grateful for the continued support from Devon Folk and for their faith in our project.

Hell's Bells

Ken Hudson reports on how Dartington Morris Men became film stars

Last March Dartington Morris Men were invited by Luke Jeffery, a local filmmaker based at Newton Abbot, to participate in a short film about Morris Dancing. A meeting with Luke followed, and when the film script was read we agreed to support the project.

Assistance with costumes, sticks, and wavers for the initial photo shoot in March was offered, and we were informed that the lead part would be taken by Josh Fedrick, who had the star role in a recent London theatre production of 'Billy Elliott'. A Press release followed at the end of March, and some both historical and current information of our own Side, was provided to highlight our involvement.

Luke and his production team were invited to our May morning event at Totnes Castle, so he could obtain a full impression of our dancing, our costume, and our music, and he was so delighted, that he joined us again for our first Summer Season outing of the year at the 'Tally Ho', Littlehempston a few days later, taking more film and recordings

This latter venue proved to be the first of our official film 'shoots', with the use of this Community Pub on the one day of the week when it was not open to the public, and when we had the opportunity to meet the official cast of the film. Following a buffet lunch (but sadly no beer as the Inn was closed), we then participated in some great 'crowd' scenes inside the Inn, with plenty of music, in association with other background scenes.

Our second 'shoot' for the Village Fete scene, which opens the film, took place on 2nd July at Hearn Field, Coombeinteignhead, when great support from the Side was received, possibly attracted by a buffet lunch, a barrel of beer, and an opportunity to display our dancing to best effect! Filming, and sound recording, from all



angles ensued, even from a special drone for the overhead shots.

In the following few months, leading up to the Gala Night at the Phoenix Theatre, Exeter on the19th November, we were shown film clips and trailers, giving us all an insight into this rather 'dark' production. A good number of the Side attended the Opening Night, when the film was shown on three occasions to a full house each time. An impromptu display in an upstairs Studio, to a large and captive audience



completed a very successful and enjoyable evening.

A full version of the film has now been made available to us ON LINE, but only for our OWN personal viewing at this stage. 'Hells Bells' has been entered for a number of Film Festivals, but we will soon be given an indication when we may provide copies to friends and family, hopefully before Christmas.

Director Luke and his team have thanked us all for our involvement, and professionalism, in the making of the film, which I believe has been a unique experience for most of us. We are hoping that the film will do well, and will publish the name of 'Dartington Morris Men' not just in this country, but in other parts of the world, where it is planned to be shown! Be prepared to sign autographs in 2017.

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Anyone For Harry Lime?

One evening during my last holiday in Austria a few years ago, the hotel featured a zither player. Sitting at the front with a good view of what he was doing. I thought that it was an instrument that I could get to grips with. It was the same kind of instrument played by Anton Karas in his Harry Lime Theme composition for the 1949 film, The Third Man.

A little while later I found a concert zither for sale on Ebay, and, to my surprise, ended up the highest, though modest, bidder. Apart from a new set of strings, (which cost more than the instrument!) it was in very good condition. I also managed to acquire a tutor book from America, where they have quite a following. By which time I had discovered that there were two different tunings for the instrument -Viennese and Munich.

I can't remember offhand which I've got. But it's guite strange. The five fretted strings, played with the thumb of the right hand are like a

fiddle or mandolin, in fifths, from the centre to edge, low G C. D and A. And another identical A string. The 32 open strings, played with the fingers, cover three octaves, from top F, with adjacent strings an interval of a fourth

apart. I suppose there is a kind of logic but

it's not obvious.

on the fretted strings, apart from the fact that, unlike a guitar, fiddle and most other stringed

> instruments, the highest pitched string is closest to one's body. I managed, too, to play scales in most keys on the open strings and pick out the odd two or three note chord. Putting the two actions together was another matter entirely. Even when learning the piano as a child, getting my left hand to do something other than copy what my right hand was playing was a skill I never quite mastered. Getting

my thumb and fingers of one hand to work completely independently on melody and counter melody or accompaniment was even more mind-bending.

Getting competent on any instrument of course depends on how much time one is prepared to practice. The concert zither is not the sort of instrument I would take out to pub sessions

(not in this country at least) when I can happily ioin in with most tunes on melodeon, anglo or guitar. So it's usually in the run up to Christmas that it comes out of its case; each year I declare the intention to play 'Silent Night' on it at one of the seasonal song sessions my wife and I do for local W.I.s. Each year I have to remind myself where the notes are on the open strings. Each year I make a little progress, but



No problem really in picking out a melody

never enough for a live performance in front of an audience.

Ideally it would be good to get together with someone else in the county who plays one of these instruments for a bit of hands on instruction or mutual encouragement. Please get in touch with me if you are such a person! In the meantime, I think Harry Lime remains in very safe in the hands of Anton Karas.

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Concert Review

GADARENE: Album launch at the Old Timer's in Exeter.

Back in November, electro-Folk group Gadarene performed at the Old-Timer's in Exeter. Though the music was dynamic and energetic, as were the musicians, the crowd remained depressingly dormant.

Putting their own, very unique spin on traditional folk tunes (such as an "Ibiza club remix" of "An Italian Rant), the band filled the room with stirring melodies thickly infused with exciting drum beats.

Gadarene are comprised of drums, violin, flute, mandolin, and occasionally clogs. A fairly average folk ensemble, surely? Far from it. The way the band use their instruments to inject a new lease of life into the tunes they play is quite extraordinary. The violin is often warped to sound like a stadium synth. The mandolin can be heavily distorted to the point were one could mistake it for Hendrix. The patterns put out by

the drum and bass sound as though they would be more at home blasting out of a huge boom box than off of a small stage in an Exeter pub.

And yet, despite the rich force of movement than runs throughout the tunes, the majority of the crowd wouldn't dance. This is because around three quarters of them were OAPs, but that surely begs the question: "Why are more young people not interested?" The music that was being played was so deeply similar to today's mainstream EDM hits.

The concert was peppered with humorous highlights. From delightful anecdotes about the tunes between pieces, to the drummer conducting from behind his kit when he had nothing to do. Gadarene certainly know how to put on a show, and I highly recommend you attend one of their performances as soon as you possibly can. But please, when you attend, dance your socks off.

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JACKIE OATS & MEGAN HENWOOD

Jackie Oates and Megan Henwood, together with double bass player Pete Thomas, have recently been playing together at the Nettlebed Folk Club, and this beautifully produced EP is the fruit of their collaboration. Singer and guitarist Megan Henwood was new to me: her voice duets beautifully with Jackie's and she is evidently a gifted songwriter: her song Bettystown has a lovely American alt-folk lilt. This style of song, like the first track, Love Vigilantes, is something of a new departure for Jackie: The Setting of the Sun, her version of the well-known story of Polly Vaughan, provides a more traditional contrast. Wings, the title track, is a lovely song by Brian Bedford about love and freedom, asking 'why do people cage the things they love the most? And what's the use of wings if you can't fly?'- and here the voices of Megan and Jackie intertwine with lovely lyrical poignancy. The final track, Kris Drever's Ghosts, is a moving song about the plight of refugees and migrants, and their children: 'Sir I was born here, so where would I go?' - a timely reminder, and a powerful climax to this excellent CD.



The title implies that Geoff surprisingly has not made a CD before, maybe pressure from his well know family and friends had something to do with it. Well good for them and not before time. I have seen Geoff many times, a master of the Duet Concertina with a good voice and tremendous stage presence. He is a performer who can draw the audience in, few can match him.

To the CD itself. A lovely range of material, 13 tracks in all with 4 traditional, 9 contemporary of which 3 are his own and a tune written by Mairtin O'Connor. I must also add that the sleeve insert and cover are beautifully done and very informative. To single out a few tracks of my choice *The Green Cockade*, a Cornish version, and *Ye Lovers All* would be my two favourites and *Don't Bring Your Doggie Down Here*, written by Geoff, would even make the odd cat smile.

Every track includes Concertina, three with just Geoff on his own and for the rest he has help from his sons Seth, Sam & Sean and some backing vocals from Cara Dillon, Kathryn Roberts, Sam Kelly, Jim Causley and Jamie Francis - quite a line up!

I am sure this CD will appeal to all folkies and no doubt to a few others and I would strongly advise you to see him perform live — a true master and this CD is a little gem.

THE CAT'S RAMBLES

Veteran VT160CD

The subtitle to this album is music from the Sliabh Luachra tradition, which I readily admit doesn't mean much to me. No matter, the album is a delightful collection of Irish music played on the piano accordion, with fiddle or guitar accompaniment on some tracks.

Although Michael Sheehy hails from Manchester, his father came from West Limerick, where he was brought up in the music of this tradition, and played the melodeon with local bands. Michael learnt many of the tunes from his father, but mostly the playing was done within the family home. Only when Michael moved to London to work after college in Kent did he take up playing again regularly in Irish sessions in pubs. More recently he has relocated to East Anglia and continued to contribute to the Irish music scene.

It almost goes without saying that almost all of the polkas, reels, hornpipes, slides and jigs on the CD are unfamiliar to me, with the exception of the Fairy Reel — a variation of the Fairy Dance, and one other that I vaguely recognised on hearing but certainly not from the name. Whilst I can often pick up an English tune after hearing it through two or three times I'd struggle to do the same with these, attractive as they are. I'd need the dots and then listen to the tracks again.

The style of playing piano accordion is interesting - whether this is Michael's

own style or typical of the tradition from which the tunes come I don't know. It's very accomplished, very notey, but with the treble melody line very dominant and the bass intermittent chords rather than a continuous 'oom-pah' vamp. It's very similar to Irish music I've heard played on C/C# (or similar) melodeon, where the limited bass chords only fit the melody on certain phrases. Perhaps Michael transferred his father's style over to the accordion.

If you enjoy good, unadultered foot-tapping Irish music I recommend this album.

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KEN HINCHLIFFE LIFE'S JUST A LAFF

The Winter edition of What's Afoot featured a report on the evening of song and music held at the London Inn, Morchard Bishop, to celebrate the launch of this CD. As was reported then, Ken recorded many of his songs and tunes several years ago so that he would be able to listen to them should the time come when he was no longer able to perform. Sadly Ken has been suffering from Alzheimer 's for a couple of years and is now in full-time care. This CD was the brainchild of his wife, Jan, who produced it with the help of Dick and Ross Henrywood to raise money for Alzheimer's Research UK – and, of course, to keep Ken's songs and tunes in our memory.

Considering that the original recordings were done on fairly basic home equipment over a period of time, the reproduction is remarkably good. It's absolutely delightful — all his old favourites like *The Beautiful Boy, Girls Up Glossop Road, Rawtenstall Annual Fair* and Graeme Miles' *Yarm Fair*. Shut your eyes and you think Ken is standing next to you at the Devonshire Inn, Sticklepath or one of the other singaround venues he frequented. There are also some of his own compositions — tunes played on the Scottish small pipes — similar in many ways to the Northumbrian small pipes.

At the time of writing well over £400 has been raised for the Alzheimer's Research. Copies of the CD are still available from Jan Hinchliffe, 92, Western Lea, Crediton, EX17 3JE

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THE FARRELL FAMILY

THE WILLIAM MORRIS SONGBOOK

Don't expect to find a book of this name on the shelves of folk stalls at Sidmouth or even among the on-line book retailers — it doesn't exist! William Morris — the famous designer of the nineteenth century whose iconic wallpaper and fabrics are still well-known today — was also a revolutionary socialist. He spent the latter years of his life travelling, lecturing and writing on socialism, as well as continuing to run his business. He often employed songs for social comment, and wrote several himself. He and members of his family were musicians and embraced the music and songs of the English and Scottish tradition.

The imaginative concept of a 'William Morris Songbook' comes from the West -country based Farrell family. Eddie, Frankie and Catie Farrell have put together a double album of social comment songs which they like to think he may have sung or, in the case of those composed after his death, would have appreciated if he had still been around.

In agreeing to review the album I must admit I was a little bit daunted at the thought of having to listen to ninety minutes or more of political and social comment. I need not have worried. Although there is of course that theme linking

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the two dozen songs, they are well chosen to give a good variety of presentation and content. The Farrell family are also very good singers and musicians, and without exception all of the songs make for pleasant listening – enjoyable too, though perhaps not the most appropriate epithet for lyrics which are thought provoking and sometimes disturbing. . Some songs are unaccompanied, some in harmony, others with instrumentation – guitar and banjo certainly were in evidence.

To comment on all the tracks would take far too much space in this magazine. The sleeve notes, however, presented together with the album in a William Morris patterned cover, are very comprehensive. The traditional Cutty Wren, the Child ballad Clark Saunders and an early political song You Noble Diggers All are three offerings which could well have been known to Morris himself. From among an array of wellknown contemporary songwriters we have Eric Bogle's anti-war classic, Willie McBride, Woody Guthrie's Plane Crash at Los Gatos (which seems particularly poignant as we enter a new era of American politics), Ian Campbell's Old Man's Lament, and Steve Knightly's Country Life. No social comment album would be complete without at least one Ewan MacColl song - and The Farrell family give us Dirty Old Town and Go Down You Murderers. Many other titles will be familiar to folk club regulars - The D-Day Dodgers, for example.

The album has been available for a couple of years now, but it certainly deserves wider recognition, for its concept, its content and the performance.
