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

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# What's Good For A Song

Continuing the series of articles featuring local songwriters, Sylvia Watts describes how she got inspired.

So very many years ago, there were few females actually singing from the floor, let alone writing their own songs! My first foray could be viewed as an act of self awareness, but no one has ever heard it. It was a bit jazzy and bluesy, and used the allegory of a predatory spider for womankind. It was a start.

Going to folk clubs was a revelation. How could everyone know everyone else's songs and choruses? Not only that, how could they harmonize without dots? I slowly learned what they all knew, and enjoyed the process. The guys in Berkshire were very much into their shanties. I cut my teeth on The Watersons, the Wilsons. Crows, Isca Fayre, and not least, the Young Tradition. All these and more, permeating my brain, memory, psyche. Then one day I decided to write a song with a chorus that would lend itself to harmony, and that expressed my ideas. The few short poems in my 'opus' seemed to focus on the natural world so there was my theme. When I told a friend he said 'So-andso sings a song called that'. My ignorance was an advantage in some ways - no chance of plagiarism – so I merely tweaked the title to 'The Seasons of the Year'. I think it has now reverted to Seasons Turn. This song has been a good friend to me in that it has introduced me to many other friends, some of whom have done me the great honour of singing it. When occasionally I also sing it I'm delighted to hear the harmony coming back.

I have always tried to adhere to what I call the 'John O'Hagan Five Verse Rule'. Cockersdale were singing at Reading Folk Club, and John waxed passionately about self-penned songs that are overly long. I have since heard others refer to this 'Rule'. Nothing wrong with a girt muckle ballad though.

Since childhood I learned from my mother a love of birds, birdsong, and flowers of all kinds. Having been born into a post-war frugality I had few toys. I do remember fondly a wooden pram - no doll, but a green and yellow elephant. I

was often sent out to pick different grasses or the smallest wildflowers to make a miniature arrangement. If I was bored and it was after dark I would be told to lie on the grass and count the stars! These, and other memories of childhood experiences, bear on my songwriting, as in Flowers of England, or Rise Like Larks. The latter is a memorial to my mother; the middle of the five verses is about her.

Occasionally a phrase will echo in my mind. I was browsing through a school text book when out jumped the words 'Everyone suddenly burst out singing'. Many months later, after I had moved back from Shetland, I eventually wrote a song interweaving themes of friendship, birdsong, and singing. I was pleased yet again that other people liked it enough to learn it and sing it out. When I decided to research the phrase that had inspired me I was amazed to find that the poet, Siegfried Sassoon, had a similar theme. Here is my chorus and his verse. Honestly, I had not read it before - EVER.

### My Chorus:

Everyone suddenly burst out singing Filling the room with a warm delight Sing like birds who've found their freedom Rise like larks at the break of light And their singing will never be done.

### **Everyone Sang by Siegfried Sassoon**

Everyone suddenly burst out singing; And I was filled with such delight As prisoned birds must find in freedom, winging wildly across the white Orchards and dark-green fields; on- on- and out of sight.

Everyone's voice was suddenly lifted; And beauty came like the setting sun: My heart was shaken with tears; and horror Drifted away... O, but Everyone Was a bird; and the song was wordless; the singing will never be done

Other themes that have called to me are drinking cider, out of which came Cider for Me. It's good to have a song I can do at cidery events, and at wassails. The chorus was the starting point for



this, and grew out of the necessity I felt to read the whole of The Bible from cover to cover. And which words did I recall long after? 'Comfort me with apples.' (Song of Solomon, 2:5) The middle verse, however, is lifted from Thomas Hardy's poem Great Things, after a friend suggested

it would fit the tune. I'm not sure what the copyright laws are on these matters, but as I have never made a groat out of songwriting I am not bothered.

I usually wait a very long time before singing a song out. At the moment I have one called England Wait for Me. It is autobiographical - about the places I have lived overseas, and been glad to leave for various reasons.

Maidenhead folk club still run a songwriting competition which I was happy enough to win twice. Those two songs made socio-political statements about matters I feel strongly about. The Singer Cried considers the idea of carpe diem, the oppression of the weak by those who should know better, honour and truth, and freedom of speech. All of that in four verses... J O'H would be proud of me.

### The Singer Cried

Dance while you may till daylight goes, and the last lean note decays

The blight of age is on the rose, the dew all blown away

And yet we hear fine and clear the drift of a song long ago

Sing it we will till time is still, forever and a day, Forever and a day.

Strong bind the weak, rich bleed the poor and those who dare to defy

To the glory of God or in the name of the law they made the song of the people to die

But memory holds though hopes lie cold, harmony ebony hard

Sing it we will till time is still forever and a day Forever and a day

On our island hills we stand in pride, proclaim

that we are free

Free to run, free to hide, from the fools we've come to be

Truth not lies will take the prize, our song will not be denied

Sing it we will till time is still, forever and a day Forever and a day

So dance while you may till daylight goes – sing and dance and play

On a sandy beach a river flows and slowly seeps away

Damn the tide the singer cried, voice bitter as sloes

Sing it we will till time is still forever and a day Forever and day Forever and a day.

Another song in this genre was written in the 80's at the time of famines in Africa, and environmental summit meetings. It is sobering to realize progress is not being made

### The Winter of the Earth

From spring's unfurling leaves to the flaring heat of summer

Reap the year's promise on a golden day Wrap it all around to ward off the winter The winter of the earth is well on its way:

We have converted the cornfields to a cash crop of housing

Secret fields of orchids lie beneath the clay Copses and dewponds have vanished forever Forget the flowers and hedgerows. They don't pay.

The winter of the earth is well on its way.

The grey ribbons run from the northland to the southland.

Tangling the cities. Strangling all the towns.

The free land between – diminished and degraded,

As slow streams of nitrates seep into the ground.

The winter of the earth is well on its way.

And our green northern oceans, swelling still and sparkling.

Surf pounding south seas on beaches clean and white.

From the herring to the coral, life's dying and sinking.

The seas of the earth are losing the fight. The winter of the earth is well on its way.

The hawk can see as it swoops down on the sparrow

The marble of ages decaying in the haze. Who cares if the dove carries the olive? If our time be numbered in days. The winter of the earth is well on it way.

But there are those who endeavour to work towards a future.

Hope lives on while there still is life.
Success to our friends who fight to save our
Mother.

Without Her the children never will survive – the winter of the earth. It's well on its way.

Annoyance at despoiled areas of countryside inspired me to write Life of a Traveller. It has more than one viewpoint, my own being in the last verse. Whilst regretting the loss of a way of life for travellers all over Britain, I am not sympathetic to the wannabees who are not of any traveller or Romany stock. I don't sing this too often either as it can be misinterpreted and I do not wish to cause offence.

Under the hedge lies a tangle of scrap And the blackbird is guarding his nest The breeze blows the plastic festooning the branch

O this is the life, oh give me the life. This is the life of a traveller.

And we're eager to move further west

Leave now the field where we've passed a few weeks

While we hoped for a change in our luck Leave now the geese and the stream full of trout

And what's left of an old flatbed truck

Into the town, to earn a few bob Keep a look out and you'll get your pay Where we used to sell flowers and heather and pegs We have found a much easier way

Gadgo and diddikai don't get the respect That was due to the Romany Rai They say what's mine's mine, and what's yours is mine

It's easy and free, and we say..

Me grandad's Daa was the last go about A man of no fixed abode How I'd loved to have been there to follow the gry

My heart still leaps when I take the road

I have been asked about, and have discussed in workshops, my process of writing. After the idea there is a prolonged thinking time. A few phrases will jotted down maybe. Before setting pencil stub to paper I will decide on the form and metre, as this will govern the tune, to come much later. There may be a structure to work to also, as in Seasons Turn where there is one verse for each of the seasons. So I will work on what is, I hope, a poem. I change and edit until I think it's done. It's difficult to start, and to know when to stop.

So the words will hang around the house for a while until I decide to sit at my piano and create the melody. And this I do love. That's why I have set some poets' work to tunes, for example Kipling's 'Patteran'. I do write down the tune on MS paper. I have to, as when I am learning a song I visualize the tune. That goes back to childhood again - years of piano lessons! So there is the progression – inspiration and idea, form/metre /structure, words, tune, learn and finally, sing. I intend to continue to write, mainly in the footsteps of the ancients' bucolic and pastoral work, but occasionally making a detour into the bawdy. If you want to hear the Ballad of Upper Dicker you will have to come and hear me sing it.

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# In With Both Feet

Greetings everyone - I hope you're enjoying the start of the festival season. As I write this my wife is off performing at Chippenham, and it's half term so whilst I have lots of time to write I also have two over-active children to contend with.

Some thanks first: Many of my gigs involve calling for inexperienced dancers, and whilst I love doing the job, it's nice to occasionally get to call for some people who know what they're doing. Last Saturday I had the pleasure of calling at the Winkleigh Morris Weekend of Dance with the ever popular (for more than 40 years now) Bloatertown. Thank you to Colin Andrews for the opportunity, to Bloatertown for their wonderful music, and to the dancers for giving it their all after a full day of Morris Dancing.

Apart from EIFF (already gone), I'm not doing any festivals this year, and as I was wondering why, I realised that I don't enjoy dancing as much as I used to. As I contemplated this it occurred to me that one of the reasons is because I'm now a caller. Further musing made me realise that a number of things change when you become a caller, so I thought I'd share my thoughts on this with you. Prepare yourself for "A Caller's Perspective"...

### **Watching Other Callers**

As a caller, I set myself very high standards, and I'm always trying to improve. Part of this process is "benchmarking" (to borrow a buzzword from business). This does not mean, as many think, "scoring" myself against other callers, but looking at what other callers do and trying to decide if I like it (in which case I ask "will it work for me?") or not ("do I do that? Stop it right now!"). This means that I'm concentrating on the caller, not the dance experience. Another unfortunate side effect is that if a caller is doing something really badly (or only slightly badly but still a "sin" in my eyes), then I get cross at them for letting the dancers down, which again affects my dancing experience.

### Having to Shut Up (and Failing)

As many callers will tell you, the second worse people to have in a crowd of dancers are other

callers (in case you're wondering the worst are teachers - they just won't listen!) Callers in the crowd are quick to spot your mistakes and generally poor at keeping quiet about it. It is something I know I struggle with - keeping quiet when I know the caller's gone wrong.

### **Higher Expectations**

The more you dance, the more different dances you do, and the more you get to appreciate the really good dances as opposed to the just good ones. As a result your expectations get raised, and you find yourself being disappointed by a perfectly good (but not superb) dance. As a caller you get to experience an even greater variety of dances, which only serves to exacerbate the problem. I have so far called over 200 different dances for the **E**xeter Contra series alone (yes, I do keep records!) Another aspect of this is that hardly anything is new.

### The Beauty of the Dance

I find that I prefer calling to dancing. Things I love about dancing include the patterns, the shapes, the flow, the inherently mathematical nature of it all. As a caller you get to not only see this from the point of view of every role, but also for the dance as a whole. I have written a couple of dances where the whole dance has a flow or pattern to it that the individual dancers cannot see, only someone looking "from above" gets to appreciate it.

### **Getting the Choreography Right**

There are times when I write a dance that works really well (I have written over 60, of varying quality!) The pleasure of seeing dancers walking through, understanding and finally "getting" it as they dance with massive smiles on their faces is unbeatable.

### And finally (on another topic):

I have been interviewed by the BBC twice recently (only local radio but even so), both times in relation to my Gender Free dance series. Gender Free Calling seems to be becoming quite the thing in the folk dance world, and it's nice that the rest of world is taking an interest.

## **Obituaries**

### **MURIEL FORREST 1920 -2017**

One of Muriel's great passions was folk dancing. She could be seen at dances throughout the area, and eventually, without too much persuading, took over the leadership of the Exeter Folk Dance Club - the oldest folk dance club in Devon. Muriel was Queen Bee of the club and it ran very successfully for more years than we care to remember. With her committee she ran monthly dances in Exeter, and for many years organised a Christmas dance in Exeter on behalf of the former Devon District of the English Folk Dance & Song Society. Dancers came from all over the county and beyond. Although her husband Harry did not dance, he supported Muriel one hundred per cent. He could always be seen on the door selling entry tickets or doing whatever job he could to help. She and Harry were instrumental in helping to organise an annual street dance on behalf of the Council during Exeter Festival Week.. The High Street was filled with happy people, many enjoying a one-off experience to the calling of Dick Witt. Muriel became a caller herself, visiting many local clubs, and particularly Sidford, enabling that club to keep going during a period in the doldrums. She also made sure she passed on the dance traditions to the young people in Woodcraft Folk, - her other great passion.

Muriel loved to dance with her friends, and there were many hilarious dance evening in her large basement room at the family home in Portland Street, as well as 'special birthday' dances in the local hall.

She was still managing the odd dance and calling the odd dance or two at Exmouth Folk Dance Club until shortly before her death.

A great character and a great friend. We shall miss you, Muriel.

### **KEN HINCHLIFFE 1939 - 2017**



When Ken and his wife, Jan, moved to Morchard Bishop in 1997 they soon became established as regular performers on the local folk scene, particularly at the Pennymoor and Sticklepath singarounds. Ken's interest in folk singing had started back in the 1960s in his native Sheffield, partly influenced by his father's cousin, Frank Hinchliffe, who was known as a singer of traditional songs. In Sheffield Ken had also been a member of Escafeld Morris Men and Grenoside Longsword, and in Devon he re-established his connection with morris as a musician for Winkleigh Morris.

Even before Ken and Jan moved to Crediton he was showing some loss of confidence in his singing and playing, and shortly afterwards he was diagnosed with Alzheimer's. Since last year he had been living in a care home but it was to pneumonia that he finally succumbed.

With remarkable foresight, Ken had been recording his songs and tunes over a number of years, to listen to when he was no longer able to sing or play his concertina or Scottish small pipes. Jan arranged for these recordings to be released on CD (reviewed in WA 113), with proceeds going to Alzheimer's Research UK.


We have been missing Ken on the folk scene for some time but listen to the CD and he'll be right there with you. Always in our fond memory.

# Festival Round-Up: Dartmoor

THERE will be a celebratory feel when the 40th anniversary Dartmoor Folk Festival takes place in the foothills of Dartmoor at South Zeal, near Okehampton, from Friday to Sunday, August 11, 12 and 13.

It was 40 years ago that the festival was founded by the late Bob Cann, who lived in the parish of South Zeal. He had the dream of a folk event on his doorstep that would help to revive and preserve the music, song and dance traditions of Dartmoor.

Thanks to the efforts of Bob Cann, his family and friends, and lately his descendants and a strong committee, with the support of an army of volunteer stewards, the festival has grown into one of the top family-friendly folk events in the South West.

This year it will include a packed programme of events and activities suitable for all ages, including a hugely successful children's festival which will run alongside the main event.

There will be concerts, a ceilidh, craft

displays, dances, dance displays, a Dartmoor Fayre, music hall, pub sessions and music, song and dance workshops and competitions.

Free events include a starter's song session, a folk club, a ramble on Dartmoor, a church service and a youth music session.

A rich crop of local and national artists will take part during the weekend, and there will be a return for many of the favourite artists who have attended previous festivals.

Guests will include Fay Hield and The Hurricane Party (Friday), Rob Heron and

The Tea Pad Orchestra, The Jim Causley Trio, The Siobhan Miller Trio, Jackie Oates (photo), Gadarene (Sunday), Keith Donnelly, Geoff Lakeman, The Valiant Dance Band (Friday), Ramsley Minors and the Dartmoor Pixie Band (Saturday and Sunday).

Dance teams will include Bampton Traditional Morris, Mayflower Morris, Hook Eagle Morris, Cogs and Wheels and Tinners Morris

Children's Festival entertainment includes Entertainingly Different, Dan the Hat, Magic Martin (UK Family Entertainer of the Year 2017) and Furringers Puppet Theatre.

### **CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Hotly-contested competitions will include the Dartmoor Broom Dance championships and Dartmoor Stepdance championships. Dartmoor Broom dancing involves dancing with a broom, or rather over a broom, and is for primary school-aged children.

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The Dartmoor Step dance sees dancers step on a 15-inch square board showing the different steps to try and outstep the previous dancer, until a final champion is decided upon. Adult and junior champions will be selected.

Classes to teach both broom dancing and step dancing are held during the festival and anyone is eligible to take part.

The Dartmoor Fayre, from 2.15pm to 5pm on Saturday, August 12, will include an afternoon of family entertainment. It is free for children and £4 for adults. The Sunday afternoon programme of events, from 2pm to 4.30pm, is similarly priced and will also include a programme of entertainment.

The Dartmoor Fayre will be opened at 2.15pm by Wendy Beard, wife of the late Tony Beard, who compered the Sunday evening Music Hall for many years. Tony Beard was well-known as an entertainer, was titled "The Wag from Widecome" and was a favourite presenter on BBC Radio Devon.

Wendy Beard will open the Dartmoor Fayre in the presence of the Mayor of West Devon to honour Tony.

Tony and Wendy's grandchildren, Oliver, Edward, Heather and Jeremy will appear in the Music Hall performing, along with other tunes, "Blackbird", which they played at Tony's memorial service at Exeter Cathedral in January this year.

To celebrate the 40th anniversary, there will be an historical display marking the history of the annual event.

The festival will also include a duck race, craft marquee, stalls and refreshments will be available.

A campsite operates (more than 200 pitches last year) and many people attend from across the UK.

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

# **Taking Steps**

Lisa Sture, featured on the front cover, is four times winner of the Dartmoor Step Dancing Competition. She is Project Coordinator for a new initiative to find out more about this local tradition.

The organisation Traditional Arts Support in the Community (TASC) has just embarked on a new project on Dartmoor called Taking Steps. Working in partnership with Dartmoor Folk Festival, it will research the Devon step dancing tradition, talk to its exponents, and run workshops and community events. Recent years have seen a growing interest in regional stepping styles, and people are curious to find out more. We hope this will go some way to meeting that curiosity.

Today's competitors perform on a small board of 15 inches square (though another school of thought prefers an 18 inch board) placed on a wagon. The musician playing for the dancers has his back to them so there is no favouritism. It is a very friendly event, which encourages everyone to have a go, and the numbers entering have grown considerably.

The Dartmoor Festival was originally set up by the famous Dartmoor musician Bob Cann, with the help of family and friends, to preserve the linked traditions of song and dance, crafts and music, on and



around Dartmoor. Key players in keeping the festival running are Mark Bazeley, Bob Cann's grandson, and Jason Rice whose grandfather, Jack Rice from Chagford, played harmonica and piano accordion, and was a judge of the dance competitions. Another member of the family, Les Rice, ("Great Uncle Les") was a noted step dancer. There are many other dancers that are recorded, but we don't have much information on them – yet!

The Taking Steps wants to find out all it can about the steps and tunes of the area, and what it meant to those taking part. We are interested in your memories and photos. The fieldwork will be co-ordinated by Lisa Sture, herself four times step dance champion, and linked to an education programme from Spinningpath Arts under the direction of Jenny Read, the 2016 competition winner.

So, we need your help! Do you remember seeing step dancing, or do you have an elderly relation or neighbour who does? Do you have any photographs of stepdancing, older or more recent? We are interested! If you would like to help at one of our events, or can put up posters or distribute leaflets, we would love to hear from you.

All of the information gathered, along with some newly filmed step dancing lessons, will be available on a new website that is being created as part of the project. This is the year we invite you to join in the fun and learn to stepdance.

Exeter Morris Men and Glory Of The West are planning to hold another taster session at the Chapter House of the Cathedral in October, as they have done for the past two years. Winkleigh Morris are going to try a number of taster sessions at other centres of population within about 15 miles of Winkleigh, though details aren't yet finalised.

Folk dance and ceilidh clubs usually take a break during the summer, certainly in August but sometimes also June and July. They too will be starting up again in September and will be pleased to welcome new faces. Whilst there are several dance clubs along the south coast of Devon, a couple in Bideford, and long established clubs at Willand and Tavistock, the middle part of Devon between the Moors is largely devoid of any regular folk dance activities.

Apart from the listing of a rapper sword group at Exeter University there now also seems to be a dearth of sword dance teams in the county. While some morris sides may include rapper or longsword as part of their repertoire it would be good to see this traditional form of dancing also better represented in the county. No matter that the dances have their origin in the North-East - Appalachian, North West, Cotswold and Border Morris aren't exactly indigenous to the county either!

Whatever form of dancing takes your fancy, give it a go this autumn. It's good exercise, good fun - and you'll meet some very sociable people.

# The Miss Varwell's Throwleigh

In 1938, Emmie Varwell had a book published entitled Throwleigh - The story of a Dartmoor village.

Emmie moved to Throwleigh from Brixham, with her sister, in 1909, as an unmarried ladv of independent means. She was interested in the landscape, nature, local history, the people and their way of life and concerns. But, as an incomer herself, she was particularly fascinated by the 'characters' she encountered and their stories, sometimes of events long ago. Her book reflects a way of life centred around the church, that would have been typical of many other contemporary villages, both on Dartmoor and beyond. When the book was written, Throwleigh had changed little in comparison to the social revolution that would occur in the mid and later twentieth century, and describes a way of life that was soon to change forever.

Last year (2016) an idea was conceived, to attempt to bring some of the stories back to life as a stage production in the village hall, by interpreting Emmie's writing quite freely to develop a script. This was read by the 2 principal characters. Emmie and her sister, with other people mentioned in the book brought to life from time to time. In addition, a wide variety of over 20 tunes and songs were incorporated. Some of these were specially written using words from the book, whilst others were drawn from

the English folk and ecclesiastical traditions, together with some contemporary popular songs mentioned in Emmie's book. These were performed live by a choir of 10 and a band of 6 local musicians. Holding everything together was a large screen, centre stage, displaying many images from the Throwleigh Archive collection, carefully selected to be relevant to the current goings-on. The music and song created a powerful atmosphere for there was humour and fun but also some sad moments, none more so than near the end when the two sisters left and passed back into history in the churchyard.

The whole performance was an unqualified success, with 100 seats sold out for all 3 nights, over a week in advance, and the dress rehearsal was opened to the public to meet the demand. As one reviewer put it: It was really an astonishing achievement. I doubt if many of the larger towns of Devon have ever put on something to match it. A wonderful remembering of a time gone by. But in truth it was itself a magical moment that will be remembered long into the future by all those of us who were there. Great stories, wonderful songs and moving music. A triumph.

Throwleigh Archive had the 1938 book reprinted and for sale at the show, and is now available at £15 plus postage. A video recording of the performance was made, (not very high quality as lighting had to be low for the slide projection) and this will be available to order, at £5. ### **Ideas That Blossomed**

Sow the seeds of a good idea and they may in due course grow and blossom.

While on a camping holiday with his brothers and friends on Dartmoor, a young William Keble Martin made a detailed and accurate painting of a wild flower he had found, and added its name underneath. A friend commented that it would be wonderful to have a book with colour pictures of every flower in Britain with their Latin and English names.

Keble Martin, who was born in 1877, developed an interest in flowers and the natural world as a child and went on to study Botany at Oxford. Like his father and grandfather, however, his calling was to the church. In the many different parishes across the country in which he served as curate or rector he continued to follow his interest in flowers, carefully drawing and painting every new flower he came across to add to his collection.

The Reverend Keble Martin came to Great Torrington in 1934 and served there tirelessly as Vicar through a very difficult and stressful period. Even so, he still added further flora to his collection of illustrations as time allowed. He moved near to Teignmouth in 1943, before resigning at the age of 70. After his wife died in 1960 he continued to work on his drawings, with the intention of getting his work published. His second wife, his former housekeeper, helped him with the correspondence. Publishers were reluctant to take on a project which required so many colour plates. but when HRH Prince



Philip offered to write a foreword, having been sent a draft copy, Keble Martin, at the age of 88, eventually saw his lifelong work published. The Concise British Flora sold over half a million copies, with new editions in 1969 - the year the author died - and 1974. A new edition, with updated information and again a foreword by Prince Philip, was produced in 1991.

In 2015 Torrington based botanist and folk singer, Colin Porter, had the idea of putting on some kind of event to celebrate the life and work of Reverend Keble Martin. Other singers and musicians at the Royal Exchange sessions were supportive of the idea, and over the early months in 2017 plans began to take shape for a concert which would incorporate an account of his life, interspersed with songs and tunes with a floral theme. Faced with far more suggestions than could possibly be included, Colin worked well to produce a workable, informative and entertaining programme.

The concert took place in the parish church in Torrington on Friday, 16th June. Opening with a verse from the song English Country Garden, a set of morris dancers processed up the aisle and performed a simple stick dance to the same tune. The first episode of Keble Martin's life followed, then the morris tune Ring of Bells was played - appropriate since during his time at Torrington, the church bells were returned, after being recast. Several songs and tunes featured roses - Bright Blue Rose, Red Is The Rose, Don't Neglect The Rose (as if we could!) - and other flowers -Lavenders Blue and Edelweiss (not found in an English garden but some poetic license was taken). The penultimate musical item was Ye Banks and Braes, sung by Gwyn, with bagpipe introduction and ending, and the whole show was rounded off with Wild Mountain Thyme, in which the audience were invited to join in.

The singers and musicians were Colin Porter, Phil Heming, Mark Knott, Ian Holleran, John Golightly, Matt Bluge, Lou Knight, Ned Morgan, Rob Darch, Colin Andrews & Gwyn. The morris dancers were Colin Andrews, Phil Heming, Susie Golightly, Amanda May, Peter and Bella Knott.

# Festival Round-Up: Teignmouth

Though I'd corresponded via email with Ollie King and heard a lot about his reputation as a musician and singer, it wasn't until he appeared as a guest at Bideford Folk back in February that I had actual heard him perform. I was suitably impressed to buy both his albums.

Diffractions is his second album, only released in February. I must admit that I prefer the instrumentals since he is truly amazing on melodeon and duet concertina. The opening track features Haydn's *Austria* (actually the tune for the German national anthem) and Holst's *Thaxted*. I like his innovative use of chords of the melodeon. Classical composers Handel and Purcell are also the source for a pair of 3/2 hornpipes, which include the well-known tune *Hole In The Wall*. *The First of March*, composed by Ed England, is I suppose what one might call

experimental - a very openly structured piece that doesn't stick to a particular key or metre. A bit wierd on first listening but it did grow on me.

On this album, at least, Ollie seems to go for the quieter slow-paced songs, including the traditional Sweet Lemeny and the setting by Vaughan Williams of the William Barnes poem, *Linden Lea*. He is joined in the vocals by Tom Wright and Rosie Hood, while further instrumentation is provided by Tom Kitchen on fiddle and Al Simpson on trombone. Ruins By The Shore is a very moving song from the pen of Nic Jones. I had not heard it before.

If I have any criticism of this album it is in the decision to put three very slow tracks at the end - the Nic Jones song, the powerful but depressing song Winter Odds by Lal Waterson, and Arthur Sullivan's tune *The Long Day Closes*. Though they are all good I was left with a rather 'let-down' feeling. I like happy endings! I would also have liked to have had more instrumental tracks.

### HADELIN Chris Foster Green Man Productions

Chris Foster is a subtle and expressive guitarist with a gentle, heart-warming voice. Originally from Somerset and now living mostly in Iceland with his partner, the singer Bara Grimsdottir, he released two highly regarded albums in the 1970s. Lavers and All Things in Common. He was then involved in other artistic projects, with a few more albums of mostly traditional songs appearing over the next 30 years. His latest, Hadelin, was produced by Jim Moray and in collaboration with several other musicians and singers, including Grimsdottir, Jim Causley, John Kirkpatrick and Jackie Oates (who worked with Grimsdottir on her album Lullabies). Foster says in the sleeve notes that the songs he has chosen 'refer to the natural world, the rhythm of the seasons, birth, life, death, love, betrayal, the ebb and flow of the struggle for justice and human rights' - the subjects of traditional song, in fact!

This is a CD which grows on the listener – it begins with the song of the nightingale and a lovely version of 'The Seeds of Love', and ends with the only song Foster has written so far, the up-lifting 'Spring Song': the chorus runs: 'Hail the hum of hedge and hive, Hail the hope that new growth brings, Hail life's wild diversity, It's good to be alive'. Other traditional songs include 'Rosie Ann', a version of the Lucy Wan ballad, 'The Trees They Do Grow High' and 'The Gardener'. On many tracks the gentle lilting sound of Oates on five-string viola really makes the song work. There are three songs by Leon Rosselson on the CD: one of these, 'Once When I was Young', I confess to finding quite dreary in its delivery, but another, 'Who Reaps

the Profit, Who Pays the Price?' with its powerful chorus, could not be more timely. The singers Foster has gathered together create a really strong and up-lifting sound, especially in the chorus of 'The Trees They're All Bare', a song recorded in Sussex in 1960: Chris says he based the arrangement on the style of the Coppers from Rottingdean — which is probably why it is my favourite track!


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# I AM THE SONG: the children's poems of Charles Causley. Jim Causley and Friends WGS

Jim's latest venture, after the success of the beautiful Cyprus Well and Forgotten Kingdom. his Devon-based album of self -penned songs, was produced as part of the centenary of the birth of his 'distant relative' Charles Causley. His friends include Nick Wyke and Becki Driscoll, members of The Jim Causley Trio, Anahata and Mary Humphries, Matt Norman, Keith Kendrick and Mick Ryan, who harmonise beautifully with Jim on 'One For the Man', a song about smuggling. This is one of the poems set to music by Jim which I would say are not necessarily for children: others of this kind are the haunting 'A Mermaid from Zennor' and the ballad 'Lord Lovelace', both of which recall the quality of the songs on Cyprus Well.

But as Jim says, this is not a Cyprus Well 2: Causley's 'Collected Poems for Children' had just been re-published, and so Jim decided to use his residency at Charles' old house in Launceston to create an album of his poems for children set to music. These poems are wonderfully comic, surreal, sometimes satirical and often locally-based: Causley was a primary-school teacher, of course, and a musician, and his poems often use ballad or nursery-rhyme metre. Jim has come up with an amazing variety of tunes for these verses, entirely in keeping with their humour and the bizarre events they recount, including the



well-known Colonel Fazackerly and his haunted castle, and 'I Saw a Jolly Hunter' which rejoices in the accidental self-shooting of the hunter of a hare. 'Python on Piccolo' lists the instruments played by a list of unlikely animals and 'Tabitha Tupper' tells of what happens to children who eat bizarre mixtures of disgusting foods. These poems are already a gift to teachers who want to encourage children's inventiveness and their love of rhythm and rhyme, and this CD will add hugely to children's enjoyment of the poems - there are a generous 21 on the CD, which ends with the wonderfully celebratory I Am the Song: 'I am the man, I am the mountain, I am the fire whose light burns long, I am the water in crystal fountain, I am the singer I am the song.'

# PAINTED CONSERVATOIRE FOLK ENSEMBLE

The UK's biggest folk band, led by Joe Broughton, celebrates its 20th Anniversary with this new album. The material is drawn from world-wide sources and influences, with the occasional title that you might recognise. Initially you might even recognise a tune, like *The Fairy Dance* until it gets the full 50-strong big band treatment with all kinds of innovations and experimentations. The opening track, a very attractive Irish style jig, *Banish Misfortune*, unfortunately also suffers the same fate.

There is evidentally some very accomplished musicianship on the album but on playing it through I soon reached for the volume control and almost on one occasion pressed the off button. Frenetic and raucous are words used on the accompanying notes to describe some of the offerings, and I can't disagree. Soothing the music is definitely not. However, despite first negative impressions, I persevered, and while I would be reluctant to go as far as saying the album really grew on me, there are actually some pleasing tracks, of which the gentle song, *Rain and Snow,* is by far the best. *William Taylor* is sung in a similar style, though the melody was unfamiliar.

If you like a big band sound, if you like your folk music jazzed up with intricate arrangements and experimentation with rhythm and percussion, then you'll have a field day with this album.

# HERE AND NOW MORAI WGS 421CD

The members of the trio, Moirai, are all well-known as accomplished performers in other groups; Jo Freya in Blowzabella, Token Women and Fraser Sisters, Sarah Matthews with Cupola and Melanie Biggs formerly with All Blacked Up. This is their second album, and as before,

offers a pleasing variety of songs and tunes, both traditional and more recently composed.

There are no tracks that disappoint but some that particularly stand out. Jo's song, Rolanda's Grandmother, is very moving and poignant. I love their version of The Bedmaking - the euphemistic Cuckoo's Nest by another name - with instrumental interludes that include one of the other many versions of the Cuckoo's Nest tune and Coleg y Brifysgol Abertawe (University College Swansea) from Pat Shaw. Jo's tune, Muna and Mimi, coupled with Steve Fisher's Lament from Mel Briggs are a couple of attractive mazurkas, while The Black and Grey, discovered in archives at Halsway Manor, and The Green Ship really get one's feet tapping.

Look out for Moirai at folk festivals or at a folk club. In the meantime, enjoy their latest album.

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# WE HAPPY FEW THE DRYSTONES

'We Happy Few' is the third album from this (still) young energetic and musically accomplished Priddy based duo, Alex Garden and Ford Collier. For the last 2 years they have been at Universities at opposite ends of the country but that doesn't show in this excellent CD. Unlike a lot of young performers, they resist the urge to play fast and frenetically and instead produce a sound which exhibits their skill as musicians.

The album comprises eight sets of tunes and three songs. I would have preferred more songs, but maybe that's because I am a singer. Having said that the tunes are varied and the accompaniment is good and solid throughout without being overpowering. I was impressed with the use of the whistle on several tracks and the fine fiddle playing. The clarity of the percussion is also notable. My favourite track must be the first song 'My Son John'; an updated version of an old traditional anti-war song. The almost Phil Spector-like driving wall of sound behind the vocal makes for a powerful presentation. I think the other two songs, Man of Words and Katy Cruel are pitched a bit low but nonetheless are well sung. The Purcell tune 'Hole in the wall' is a haunting hornpipe which is well placed before the final set of tunes which starts and finishes with 'More Nyah,' written by Ford, it is the closet we get to frenetic! A good finisher to this excellent album.

#### **BLACK OUT IN THE OPEN**

From time to time the custom of 'blacking up' adopted by many Border and some Molly sides, comes under public scrutiny. Whilst some exponents may regard it as an imposition of political correctness on a long-established tradtion, there is nevertheless an obligation of morris sides to comply at least with the spirit of the law, as set out in the Equality Act of 2010. The Morris Federation has published guidelines in a circular which has also been adopted by the Morris Ring and Open Morris. In short, it recommends sides which do black up to consider either using a different form of disguise or a different colour face paint, to avoid the possibility of being excluded from certain events or the risk of litigation.

We have a number of excellent border sides in Devon. Some whom I have seen recently have already introduced changes to their facial appearance.
