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# **EDITORIAL**

AFTER an excellent Gidsong session at Gidleigh village hall, I asked farmer and raconteur Tich Scott if there was a specific Dartmoor accent, different from the rest of the county. "When I was a boy," replied Tich, "every village round here had its own accent. When a man opened his mouth, you could tell if he was from South Zeal, Sticklepath or Throwleigh."

And that shows my problem as a "blow in" trying to get to grips with the Devon folk world. The county has so many different faces. It can't be defined by just one of them.

Since taking over editorship of this magazine, I've been introduced to such amazing events as the Ottery St Mary and Hatherleigh fire festivals, the Whimple wassail and Combe Martin's hunting of the Earl of Rone as well as many different versions of old songs. I've found a pride in the local heritage – although of course there is that inevitable moment in any session when someone announces: "I've just downloaded this Steeleye Span song from the internet."

Can an outsider ever hope to understand fully the Devon folk world? It's a mammoth task but I'm encouraged by the knowledge that one of the great songs about Devon, The Oggie Man, was written by a native of Hampshire.

# **Oggie Man: gone**

In 1959, Cyril Tawney was walking from Plymouth's Blue Monkey pub to his lodgings. He'd just met a BBC producer who'd asked him to write a song about the Oggie Man who used to sell pasties to sailors outside the dockyard. It began to drizzle and the line "The rain's softly falling" leapt into his head. BILL MURRAY takes up the story of this beautiful, timeless ballad

T WAS in May 1959 that Cyril Tawney took his discharge from the Royal Navy to settle down in Plymouth as a professional folk singer. Soon afterwards, with the rain softly falling, the words of *The Oggie Man*, which he rated his best song, seeped into his head. Later he recalled: "It is a rare night indeed when I do not get at least half a dozen requests for it from the audiences who probably can never understand fully what the song means."

An explanation is given in the notes to the CD re-release of his 1969 ARGO LP, A Mayflower Garland, a collection of songs from Devon and Cornwall offered as a tribute for the 350<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower. The words of *The Oggie Man* seem quite straightforward to me. It is certainly not as loaded with Naval jargon as some of his other songs. *Chicken On A Raft* with its dabtoes for'rd and the dustmen aft comes immediately to mind.

The song is a real Plymouth anthem. On his now defunct website, Cyril wrote: In the old days, you could buy oggies at many places in Plymouth, but sailors coming back to the Dockyard last thing at night were most likely to patronise the man who sold them from a box outside the Albert Gate.

"I first heard his vendor's cry on the radio during the war, long before I went West myself. A Plymouth sailor serving overseas had written in to a 'Sounds from Home' slot requesting the Oggie Man's cry. That's how famous he was. The Oggie Man was a permanent institution synonymous with the Royal Navy itself, or so everyone thought.

Well, the rain's softly fallin' and the Oggie

I can't hear him callin' like I used to before I came through the gateway and I heard the sergeant say

"The big boys are coming, see their stands across the way."

Yes, the rain's softly fallin' and the Oggie Man's no more.

What happened to the Oggie Man? Cyril Tells us: "Before the war the Oggie Man had no competition, simply because there was no room for any. The Blitz, however, cleared a space right opposite his pitch, and in the late Forties first one, then two or three, caravan snack bars appeared on this bomb site, selling a variety of snacks, not just oggies. It was only a matter of time before the Oggie Man, as such, disappeared, either to retire from business or to get his own caravan and join the others. In the song, this change has taken place while the sailor has been away."

It was here that she told me when she bade me goodbye.

"There's no one will miss you one half as much as I.

"My love will endure, dear, like a beacon in a squall

Eternal as that Oggie Man beneath the dockyard wall."

Well, the rain's softly falling and the Oggie Man's no more.

I first met Cyril in 1967 when we booked him to host a series of six Saturday evening folk clubs at The Burton Hall Hotel in North Tawton, Now

bearing in mind that neither Cyril nor his wife Rosemary could drive, in order to get to North Tawton they had to take the train from Plymouth to Exeter and then another train to North Tawton Station from where we collected them and then make the return journey on the Sunday morning. It was therefore not surprising that Cyril, on Rosemary's advice, called it a day after three visits.

They were great folk nights and we received a lot of support from other folk clubs especially The Jolly Porter in Exeter who took on the hosting of the monthly sessions following Cyril's departure.

When I left school in 1968, I went to work on the construction of Drake Circus in Plymouth and Cyril and I had regular encounters as we clutched hold of the various lamp posts up North Hill, staggering home towards Mutley Plain after late night sessions in the City.

He invited me to The Cabin folk club in Elliot Street and I sang a couple of songs that I had learnt from the old chaps in North Tawton. We became good friends and he later became a resident singer at a folk club that I started with friends at The Ham Street Vaults in Ebrington Street until he moved to Lancaster in 1972.

Cyril died in 2005 but his legacy goes on, particularly in his songs, many of which are still sung in folk clubs today. Next year, both Dartmouth and Plymouth will have celebrations to mark the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the sailing of the Mayflower and I have no doubt that Cyril's songs will feature in the programmes for these events.

Two songs from *The Mayflower Garland* are, for various reasons, rarely sung these days. Cyril wrote *Beacon Park* in response to complaints he and Rosemary received from the residents of that area in Plymouth following late night singing sessions at their home. It does have some



wonderful lines.

Beacon Park is a peaceful place,

If a dog should bark it's a shocking disgrace, And don't you dare cough when the sun goes down

We're sensitive people on Beacon Down."

The other track is the Second-Class Citizen's Song, which did not go down too well in our neighbouring county because of its chorus of:

A second-class city, A second class town,

From the heights of the Moor to the depths of the Sound,

Our last gift from London was the Citadel Wall,

'Cos we live on the highway to nowhere at all.

If you were involved with folk singing in Plymouth in 1970 then I am sure that like me, you will remember it as a very good year.

Most of us were involved with the

Mayflower Celebrations and a stage was set up at The Mayflower Steps on the Barbican for performances. Cyril was very much at the forefront of these events and he was also a familiar face on Westward Television. He ran a series of three Folk Revels at The Lower Guildhall which were all sold out well in advance.

The other tracks on *The Mayflower Garland* are in Cyril's words "a miscellany of traditional and contemporary material connected in some way or other with the counties of Devon and Cornwall. Some are regional versions of folk songs heard throughout Britain, others are uniquely local, such

# The Carpenter's Wife

# As sung by Cyril Tawney

IT SEEMS appropriate in this issue to focus on a song from Cyril Tawney's repertoire, the ballad The Carpenter's Wife. Not only was the song collected in Devon but he also recorded it in our county.

Cyril wasn't considered a ballad singer. He said that not having the mental concentration of Louis Killen or Ewan MacColl, he tended to stick to the shorter lyric pieces or sea songs. But in 1965, sitting in Plymouth Central Library's Scott Lecture Theatre with a small bottle of whisky, he recorded what he considered the cream of the great traditional ballads from the South-West.

He drew inspiration from the fact that the very next room housed the Baring-Gould manuscripts and all but three of the 10 songs he chose are from the Reverend's collection.

The result was The Outlandish Knight, an LP issued by Polydor, 50 years ago. The Carpenter's Wife, is track number three on side one. There are many versions of this song, often known as The Demon Lover, but this one is stripped of the supernatural element. The sea captain may be devilish but he is no devil. The song is also known as The House Carpenter but in this version the unfortunate husband is a ship's carpenter.

Cyril writes in the sleeve notes that the earliest printed form of the words, dating from about 1685, names the wife as Mrs Jane Revnolds, living near Plymouth.

In his opinion, this tune, which Baring-Gould collected from agricultural labourer Joseph Paddon in 1889, is one of the two finest. The parson noted it in the key of A Minor but that may be too high for many folk so we have transposed it down to E Minor.

Joseph, who would have been about 66 when Baring-Gould visited him, also gave Baring-Gould the song Dead Maid's Land.

# Get set up for a singaround in Sidmouth

A VERY popular event at the Sidmouth Folk Festival is the afternoon singaround that has been run for many years by What's Afoot's former editor Colin Andrews and his wife Sonja.

It's usually held at the Royal Glen Hotel from 2.30pm and 4.30pm from Sunday to Friday and probably will be this year (but check the festival programme just in case there is one of those last-minute changes).

Colin says the room gets pretty full but usually every singer gets a chance to sing – and some of the early arrivals may get two songs. This is a free event but there will be a collection to help boost the funds for the next festival.

The sessions all have a different theme so here's a sneak preview of what's afoot at the Royal Glen to give you a chance to search out a suitable song or to concoct an ingenious explanation about why your favourite song can be shoehorned into a particular session.

**SUNDAY** For King And Country: Patriotic songs, any song concerning royalty or a country or serving one's country.

**MONDAY** Down Under: Songs of mining, underground, anything buried, under the weather, or connected with the other side of the world

**TUESDAY** Ales And Ailments: Songs about the pleasures or consequences of drinking, or mentioning any affliction, disease or disability

**WEDNESDAY** Lucky Dip: Pick two cards from a bag. Each card has one word (e.g. Soldier, Animal). Sing a song related to the word on ONE of the cards – be imaginative! Card swapping permitted.

**THURSDAY** Time And Tide: Any song involving a clock, specific time or date or related to the sea

**FRIDAY** Heads or Tails: Any song about heads (body, state, etc) or tails, or about dilemma, chance, luck or gambling.

# Dancers' 800-mile charity bike ride

HERE'S proof positive that music and morris dancing keeps you young.

Grimspound Morris men Richard Bartlett and and Gilbert Gill are both of mature years – well Richard is 80 and Gilbert is 78 – but they are tackling an epic bike ride that might daunt many a younger person.

The friends from Shaldon aim to ride some 800 miles through France and Spain – from Bilbao to Roscoff – not just to prove that they can do it but also to raise a bit of cash for cancer charities.

There's a personal note to this. Richard has survived non-Hodgkins Lymphoma and Gilbert has come through prostate cancer. But to show there is life after illness if your spirit is strong, they are going on a journey that dwarfs Will Kemp's legendary nine-day morris dance from London to Norwich (and he kept taking breaks in between the stages).

As this issue was going to press, they flew out



from Bristol on June 20<sup>th</sup> for Bilbao, taking their bikes with them. The 800-mile journey will take three to four weeks, depending what interesting things they find en route.

And no, they haven't go a support team running after them. This is a strictly two-man operation (a bit like a *Cuckoo's Nest* dance but a hell of a lot longer and more strenuous).

Gilbert is a long-time dancer but Richard took up the noble art at the tender age of 60. He danced for 10 to 12 years then damaged his Achilles tendon. So he took up the melodeon although he had never played a musical instrument. Now arthritis may force him to move to the tin whistle.

Richard told us: "Now the begging part, we hope you will support us. If you see a Grimspounder you can press money into their sticky palm or into this bank account: 40-64-20 11918614."

# Songbooks shed a new light on past

# TOM BROWN tells how a farmer's favourite airs were rescued by a chance encounter

ACK in the 1990s a chance meeting in the churchyard at Brendon on Exmoor, led to the discovery of two handwritten manuscript books, dating from around a century earlier. One contained songs reportedly then sung at harvest homes and sheepshearing gatherings. The other, in a different hand, contained eight hymns/carols also sung in chapel at that time.

Retired teacher David Ramsay and his wife

Nicki had recently moved to Cranscombe Farm, just above Rockford. In Brendon churchyard one afternoon, Nicki met an elderly couple tending a grave. They were brother and sister Victor and Ivy Lock who had both been born at Cranscombe Farm (Ivy 1915, Victor 1928). She invited them back to the farm for a cup of tea and to revisit the place where they had been and raised.

David interviewed both Ivy and Victor in depth

and their biographies have been published in Volumes 1 and 2 of David's series of *Unforgotten* Exmoor – four books of interviews with elderly Exmoor residents. The beauty of the books, for me, is the way David leaves all the text to his interviewees - the interviewer never interferes. The lives of both Ivy and Victor are detailed in these books and there is no point in repeating them here. This article confines itself to the content of the two manuscript books.

T EMERGED that Ivy still had her father George's handwritten manuscript books of songs. David took photographs of the books and their pages, some of which appear in this article. The books had deteriorated over the years. Several pages were missing, out of place or damaged at the edges.

The texts also tended to be spelt phonetically, suggesting they had not been copied from a printed or written source. David sought someone who might be interested in looking at the books and the songs but only to look at: they would never leave Ivy's possession. Eventually, David's search led to Barbara and me. Having been through the photographs David had taken and established what

songs there were, we were keen to meet Ivy and Victor to ask them about the songs, their father as a singer and, as there were no tunes in the books, whether they could remember the tunes. Courtesy of David Ramsay, we arranged to visit Ivy and Victor who then lived independently in sheltered houses just north of Bridgwater.

Ivy, the vivacious elder sister, bright as a button rarely let Victor get a word in edgeways. But she could not hold a tune in a bucket. When she went to the kitchen to make some tea, Victor shyly offered a few tunes that, although not brilliantly sung, were enough to give us the local tunes for The Cockfight and Strolling Round the Town. Other songs, such as *The Farmer's Boy*, *At Trinity* Church and The Ship that Never Returned were confirmed as being sung to the standard tunes.

In conversation it became apparent that George's informal repertoire had included standards such as Rosie O'Grady and I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen although these were not in the books.

#### BOOK 1:

A book of songs from sheepshearing and harvest home gatherings, it is an eclectic mix of familiar folk-songs, classic music-hall songs contemporary popular songs.

found in the book, neither Ivy nor Victor could remember their father ever singing some of them, which begs the question whether, although they were undoubtedly sung at gatherings, they were necessarily all in George Lock's repertoire. George had, locally, been a well-known semi-professional singer – much in demand at local concerts and social evenings, but he would have had a distinct repertoire for such occasions much more in a classical or parlour style.

The Book 1 list comprises:

I Can't Change It: a song popularised by the Music Hall singer George Beauchamp (1863-1901).

**Strolling Round the Town:** Written by Harry Castling (aka Nat Maceo & S.V.Fordykern) (1865 -1933) in 1893. Sung in the halls by Harry Castling & Charles Deane (1866-1910).

At Trinity Church (I Met My Doom): Performer/writer: Fred Gilbert (1849-1903) in 1894 (also wrote The Man Who Broke the Bank at Monte Carlo). Also performed on the halls by Tom Costello.

The Dark-Eyed Sailor (Fair Phoebe and her Dark-Eyed Sailor): Broadside: earliest date, before 1809

The Punch Ladle (Fathom the Bowl, Give Me the Punch Ladle): Broadside: Written between 1817 and 1844. Published by J Pitt @ Seven Dials. The Farmer's Boy: Earliest text 1832 in Catnach broadside estalogue (The Lyndy Farmards Poxy)

broadside catalogue (The Lucky Farmer's Boy). Became an Agricultural Worker's Union anthem by 1890s.

**The Ship That Never Returned:** Written by Henry Clay Work, 1885 (also wrote: Grandfather's Clock and Marching Through Georgia).

**The Cockfight:** Broadside printed by Harkness between 1840 and 1866 and Cadman between 1850 and 1855.

**The Handsome Cabin Boy:** Broadside printed in Dublin by Nugent between 1850 and 1888 and Birmingham c 1867.

**The Old Soldier's Daughter:** Words by WH Bellamy, music Joseph Philip Knight. Broadside by Taylor of Brick Lane, Bethnal Green, London. Printed by Such and Harding between 1863 and 1885.

**The Crocodile:** Published by J Pitt (London) 1819-44. Performed by Walter Passmore (1867-

1946) and Charles Tree (1868-1940).

**She's My Little Ray of Sunshine:** Sung in the halls by Katie Lawrence 1870-1913 (Words and music not traced).

**The Culbone Anthem (A Bag Pudding):** First published (as a nursery rhyme) in Halliwell 1843.

Nellie (I Think I'll Get Wed in the Summer): Written by Harry Lauder who recorded it in 1902.

**Dolly (Where's My Dolly Gone To?):** Patter song. Written by GW Hunt in 1870. Performed in the halls by George Leybourne.

We All Have to Go Through the Mill: Not traced. A Woman's Work is Never Done: Not traced.

# **BOOK 2 (CAROLS/HYMNS) LIST COMPRISES:**

My God My Creator: Text found in American Brethren Christians Forum. Text attributed to EL Schlicht.

With One Consent, Let all the Earth: Possibly *The Saviour's Will* (Taylor 1850-1870). Not the *With One Consent...* set to Old 100<sup>th</sup>.

Let Heaven and Earth Rejoice and Sing: Also collected in Cornwall.

Arise Ye Nations Shout and Sing: Not traced.

While Shepherds Watched: Standard. According to Ivy, sung to *Winchester Old* in church and to *Lyngham* in chapel.

Come Let Us Join the Host Above: Not traced. The opening couplet also opens *The Lord is Risen* from a supplement to the *Psalms and Hymns of the Presbyterian Church* (Philadelphia 1861) - otherwise not the same.

O Come All Ye Faithful: Standard.

**Rise Wandering Shepherds:** *Rise Wondering Shepherds*! In Hayes (1855) and Bawden (1844) mss. both from Exmoor.

Together, the songs give a window into the popular repertoire in the agricultural community of Brendon in the early 20th Century. Sadly, both Ivy and Victor died, unbeknown to us or the Ramsays, within a couple of years of our interview and, as they had no living descendants, their possessions, including George's song books, had been disposed of and lost to posterity. David Ramsay's photographs remain the only record of that repertoire.

# A rabbit that ran round the world

It's a relatively new dance but Tinner's Rabbits – created in Devon – has achieved international popularity. STEVE GILL gives us its history

HERE'S always a morris man eager to point out you are not doing a dance the "proper traditional way". But Martin Gosling, as squire of Grimspound, had to laugh when he was told his side was doing Tinner's Rabbits incorrectly. After all, he is the man who wrote it.

It's not surprising that there is sometimes confusion over the "correct" form of the dance. Although it was written not long ago, Tinner's Rabbits has spread not only across the length and breadth of Britain but also across the globe and it is now used by many sides to introduce the public to Border Morris. However, many of those sides who picked up the dance at a festival or from a visiting side do not know its origin.

It actually dates back to the early 1990s, when six brave men got together with one musician to form Grimspound Border Morris. Our idea was to perform some of the remaining Border dances and also to write our own with a Devon theme. The kit was, and still is, of black, green and purple, the colours you find on Dartmoor.

The name Grimspound was taken from the 3,500-year-old hut circle on Dartmoor near to the Golden Dagger Mine.

Martin Gosling, the Squire, wrote Tinner's Rabbits and he agreed with me that we needed a Devon tune. We decided on the *Hopscotch Polka*, which was a good tune I found on a recording from Pete and Chris Coe from the repertoire of fiddler Fred Pidgeon from Stockland, Devon. As the

dance spread, so the tune changed. Down in Tavistock, for example, Lodestone use *Buttered Peas* while just across the border in Cornwall, Wreckers step out to *Click Go The Shears*. Cross into Somerset and Enigma play *Rochdale Coconut Dance*. By the time you get to Christchurch in New Zealand, you'll find Nor'west Arch dancing to *Uncle Bernard's Polka*.

For Grimspound, Fred's tune is the original and suited the style it was danced in. However, we are delighted the dance has now spread far and wide as other sides asked for it and we were only pleased to pass it on.

Tinners was originally written for three people,

then later six, nine, 12 and so on. The biggest combination so far is 369 dancers when it was used to achieve the Guinness world record for the biggest mass morris dance at the Potty Morris and and Folk Festival in Sheringham, Norfolk, in July last year.

The stick movements – passing the clash around the set and hitting the ground – were all supposed to represent hammering tin ore, the way it was done in Devon and Cornwall. Gilbert Gill thought of the name when he saw in a church a sign of the three hares or rabbits in a circle, joined by the ears and knew this was also used on the flag of the Tinner's Company, a Devon army that fought in the English Civil War.

We are also keen to correct the assumption of some that the dance is Cornish – Devon had tin mines as well and three Stannery Towns of its own where the quality of the ore was determined and mining disputes were settled.

There is proof that the dance has now reached

California, Alberta in Canada, Australia and even Hong Kong – see the box below for examples of the international sides that perform it. This is a real living tradition, well done Martin.

# Tinners, the Grimspound way

THESE notes are taken from the side's website, grimspoundbordermorris.org. If you use them to teach the dance to your side, please credit the dance to Grimspound when you perform it.

This dance has many versions; three dancers, six or nine are standard. More are also be possible. The majority of the dance is done in sets of three with the larger set being one at the end. The six formation is:



With nine dancers, the set-up becomes more complicated with 1, 4 and 7 in the middle with their backs to each other in a triangle and their sets outside this facing them. The sequence is:

1 (and 4 and 7) reels; CHORUS;

Three star;

CHORUS; 2 (and 5 and 8) reels;

CHORUS:

Rabbit snares:

CHORUS;

3 (and 6 and 9) reels;

CHORUS;

Rounds (if 3 or 6 man), Circle and Star if 9 man (1,4 and 7 star while others circle around them in opposite direction - anti-clockwise).

Lead off in single line.

These are:

Reels - Two dancers dance on the spot while the other goes between them, left around one, back between them and then right around the other. He then goes between and around the first again before returning to place.

Three star: A three-man star, gripping left forearms and turning anti-clockwise.

Rabbit snares: All turn left to face in a clockwise circle. Sticks held in right hands held in at waist height to form a triangle. Dance round.

Rounds: if six dancers - 2, 3, 5 and 6 are already there, 1 follows 2 and 4 follows 5 to make the circle, clockwise.

CHORUS: The stick clash is passed around the set, 1 to 2, 2 to 3, 3 to 1 etc. for 12 beats; the clashing being one two-handed clash per beat. This is followed by three beats on the floor by all, rising for the next move on the last beat.

# ANDREW MYCROFT

# ACCORDION PLAYER AND DANCE CLUB ORGANISER

ANDREW MYCROFT, the accordion player with the Amycrofters Folk Dance Band, has died aged 74.

He and his wife June also ran Honiton Folk Dance Club for 10 years until 2013, providing live music at every club night, even organising a reunion dance for members of the club from the 1950s.

Subsequently, they ran Jurassic Folk, a music and song folk club, for five years in Seaton.

Andrew discovered the joys of folk dancing at the University of Bangor North Wales, where he learned to call and chaired the University's Folk Dance Society.


After leaving university and starting a teaching career in Bradford, he decided to learn an instrument to play for folk dancing, choosing the piano accordion and teaching himself.

While he was living in the West Midlands, Andrew gained a great deal of experience playing at the Meriden Folk Dance Club.

He also set up the Four Oaks Band and enjoyed many years playing for local club nights, weddings and other occasions.

After relocating to Honiton in 2002, Andrew was





keen to get involved in the local folk scene, first playing at Salcombe Regis Folk Dance Club. Other bookings soon followed.

He then formed the Amycrofters Folk Dance band which initially comprised Andrew on the accordion with a guitarist and fiddle player. In subsequent years, the line-up changed and June joined him in the band playing guitar.

They would often perform as a trio with guest musicians and in more recent years regularly performed as a duo, with Andrew on accordion and June on keyboard and banjelele.


As he had undertaken many charity fundraising events over the years, it was fitting that Andrew's last gig in Honiton was a fundraising dance held in aid of Hospiscare Honiton.

He was delighted to be able to return to play at Meriden Folk Dance Club in the West Midlands just a short while ago.

Andrew passed away on May 9, this year. He was, and will remain, a much loved husband, father, grandfather, friend and accordion player. He brought humour and warmth to every event that he played at.

When talking of playing with the Amycrofters, Andrew said: "We get pleasure if we can give pleasure to other people" and many have shared their appreciation of the pleasure his playing gave them.
