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EDITORIAL

How do you reconcile the folk factions?

IT'S always fatal to mention that you once ran a folk club. Immediately the pressure starts: "Well why don't you start one here?" I've made that mistaken confession and now friends and acquaintances are gently nudging me to get a club or a session running in Tavistock. The problem is that I'd have satisfy a lot of different needs. The folk world is not homogeneous. We are a loose sometimes very loose – collection of different tribes. I have friends who are die-hard session fans. They like to turn up with their instruments and belt through tune after tune with everybody (even spoon players) joining in. Then there are the unaccompanied singers who revel in the old ballads, the longer the better. The shantymen (and women) also fall into this category. The more choruses, the better. But I also know a lot of open mic people who like to take it in turns to perform and prefer the audience to listen quietly and respectfully to what they are doing. Finally there are those who like to see guest artists and are prepared to pay a few quid to get good acts. And some of them, if they've paid good money, don't want to see a local lad or lass get up and sing a song indifferently. I've got a foot in all these camps and fear that if I set up a club or session, I'm going to offend one clan or another. Suggestions please. . JOHN FOXEN, EDITOR

The last man standing

'Just look at Cyril May on the mouth organ – ninety years young and the only one in the band standing up to play.' JASON RICE tells us how the Dartmoor Pixie Band's former drummer defies the years.

CYRIL MAY, who lots of readers will know as the "the Mad Drummer" with The Dartmoor Pixie Band for many years celebrated his 90th birthday on December 15, 2023, in the only way he knows how: by hosting a party followed by a "wingding" – his name for a folk music jam session.

As always he was right in the middle, playing his mouth organs or "gob irons" as he calls them. He was joined by some of his old Pixie Band friends: me on piano accordion, Mark Bazeley on melodeon and Rob Murch on banjo.

When we change tunes, Cyril often has to swap harmonicas so Mark and I call out the keys. G and D are to easy to mishear. That's why you'll hear us calling "Grass" for G, or "Donkey" for D so he gets the right instrument.

Cyril also invited Richard Helston, a fiddler from Dorset whom he got to know through his friendship with The Yetties. Bonny Sartin of The Yetties was invited too and was looking forward to it. Unfortunately he had to withdraw at the last minute due to getting Covid.

Cyril drummed with the Pixies until his late seventies. Even when he "retired", he would still dep for us from time to time. I would drive him to the gigs and help unload the drum kit and set it up. It's only fair. When I started in the band at the age of 21 he would pick me up for every gig.

I found a Facebook post from 2017, recording one of the last times he played drums for us. His wife of 66 years, Hazel, says after that gig, it took him three days to recover so that's why he sticks to the mouth organ. However, if there had been a drum kit at the party, I'm sure he would have given it a go.

THE party was organised by his daughter Karen, who used to call for the Pixies occasionally, and son-in-law Peter, at the Waie Inn, Zeal Monachorum. For many years Cyril has lived in Crediton with Hazel, and they married the day before his birthday. He often refers to their marriage as his birthday present that year.

It was in 1974 that Cyril joined Bob Cann and the Dartmoor Pixie Band, originally playing both mouth organs and melodeon. That was the year the band played at a New Year's Eve party at Fingle Bridge, near Drewsteignton, a

picturesque location at the bottom of a deep valley on the edge of the moor.

Several inches of snow fell and the band and all the dancers were stranded there for two days. Fortunately, only about half the guests had made it due to the weather so there was quite a lot of food left over after the dance.

This incident didn't put Cyril off one bit and in 1981 he took over as drummer. His style was absolutely perfect for country dancing and gave the music plenty of "Lift" which is just the way Bob liked it.

Playing with the band took Cyril and Hazel to nearly every village hall all over Devon and Cornwall, and further afield, even making an appearance with the band on the BBC Pebble Mill programme.

Cyril loved to dress up and often used his skills as a carpenter to build fancy sets for the stage or a practical joke such as a pretend cake that he would jump out of in front of an unsuspecting audience.

I remember Sarah Bazeley, Mark's wife and the Pixie Band's resident caller, often telling the band before the next tune "not to play too fast". Cyril would say in jest to the other band members in a quiet voice: "Go like hell!" Of course, Sarah has long forgiven Cyril for this "insubordination" and was at the party to wish him well.

Cyril also tells stories in dialect, sings

songs and tells jokes. He's a star. If we in the Pixie Band see him at festivals and concerts – particularly the Dartmoor Folk Festival – we always invite him up on stage to play mouth organ with us. Cyril is amazing but so modest. He often says after he has been playing with us: "Thank you for letting me 'spoil' your music".

He never lowers the standard of the music, he only ever enhances it, and everyone who knows him hopes that he continues "spoiling" the music for many more years to come!



Come and sing into Spring

A FTER a break of sixteen years, the Mid-Devon village of Morchard Bishop will once again be hosting a whole day of folk activities, organised by Devon Folk. In 2003, 2005 and 2008 the "Singing Spring" day, as it was called, focused on various folk song activities and featured nationally known guests such as Crucible, New Scorpion Band, Sarah Morgan and Eddie Upton, as well as local performers.

The Devon Folk Day in March, 2024, will follow a similar pattern, with three sessions of three concurrent workshops during the day, a lunchtime pub session, and both a concert and ceilidh in the evening. The scope, however, will be much wider and workshops will include not only song topics but also folklore, storytelling, mumming and morris dance.

The evening concert will feature the popular folk band, Gadarene, whose members will also

Traditions

Trick-or-treating in the old Devon style

RE you one of those people who grumble that trick-or-treating is an American import that has no place in good old England? Are you glad to see the back of those little darlings in the neighbourhood who turn up at your door dressed as zombies, vampires or even Disney princesses while holding out their bags and demanding candy – and looking very disdainfully at what you put in it?

If you are and you hope to be left in peace until next October 31 then you will have to hope the local kids don't read Mark Norman's new book *The Folklore Of Devon*. For in this extensive study of the county's traditions he points out that this is very much an old Devon custom – but not for Hallowe'en.

The literate lads and lasses could appear on

your doorstep again with their begging bags on Tuesday February 13.

Shrove Tuesday, Mr Norman writes, is not just for pancakes. This was a hungry time of year for labouring folk as it was a long way from harvest and the time of year when food supplies were running low.

Out of this need grew a custom, known in Devon as Shroving or Lent crocking. The hungry would go from door to door on Shrovetide, the evening before, or on Shrove Tuesday morning, to beg for food.

Mr Norman quotes an old song – sadly without music – from Bridestowe, near Okehampton:

Lean crock, give a pancake,

Or a fritter, for my labour,

Or a dish of flour, or a piece of bread, Or what you please to render. I see, by the latch, There's something to catch; I see, by the string, There's a good dame within. Trap, trapping throw, Give me my mumps, and I'll be go.

With luck, the hungry might get their "mumps" (which the Devonshire Dialect Dictionary – a splendid resource now available on the Devonshire Dialect Facebook page – tells us are the alms begged by children and not a disease).

At the least they might get a morsel or two or at least some ingredients. If they didn't get a handout then here's where we find the

similarity to today's trick-ortreating. The punishment for householders who did not give food was originally the throwing of stones at the door. As an old rhyme warns:

Give a cake, for I've none; At the door goes a stone, Come give, and I'm gone.


come give, and 1 m gone.

In some cases some cases shards of pottery were thrown instead of stones.

And what of Shrove Tuesday pancakes?.

Mr Norman tells us tossing pancakes was a part of the old Shrove Tuesday celebrations, and this time was treated as a holiday by farmers, who ensured that their staff had plenty of pancakes. Everyone would gather around the fire and would have to toss their pancake before eating it.

However, those who were not so skilled at this would still be told to eat theirs, even if they failed to catch it and it fell into the fire, much to everyone's amusement.

Time to wake the trees

It's a custom that's been going on since time immemorial – or in some cases just a year or so: gathering in orchards across the county to make as much noise as possible to ensure a good crop of apples this year. Be warned: Most of these wassails – with the honourable exception of Whimple – feature morris dancing. Here are the wassails we've been told about

JANUARY 1 CORNWOOD

SHAKE off any New Year's Eve hangover with this event. From 3pm there will be dancing by Dartmoor Border Morris outside the Cornwood Inn followed by a procession to the community orchard for a wassail. Come prepared to make plenty of noise.



with dancing and a mummers play from Dartmoor Border Morris. Unless you are a National Trust member. there will be a charge to enter the grounds. From 1pm.

SATURDAY JANUARY 6 ASHGROVE FARM

LODESTONE Border Morris will be helping to wake up the trees at the farm on Crowndale Road, Tavistock, PL19 8FF, from 12 noon.

TALATON

THIS wassail debuted only last year (see What's Afoot 130 for details on how to create a wassail). Meet at The Talaton Inn at 5:30pm. Bring your pots and pans and a torch. Tale Valley Folk Sessions will run a music session in the pub after the procession.

BRIDFORD

MEET up in Bridford Woodland Park at 5pm. Grimspound Border Morris will be there, hopefully with their amazing dancing bear.

SUNDAY JANUARY 7 BUCKLAND ABBEY

SATURDAY JANUARY 13 COMPTON VALE

MEET at the Orchard in Lower Compton at 6pm. As well as the wassail, there w8ill be stalls, live music and dancing from Dartmoor Border Morris.

JANUARY 17 WHIMPLE

THIS wassail, in the village that was once the proud home of Whiteways Cyder, dates back for well over 100 years (See What's Afoot 118 for its history). It is very traditional with a

procession to the Whimple wassail tune but no morris dancers. Jim Causley, Whimple born and bred, says: "They have plenty of other opportunities to dance but this is our wassail." Gather at 6.30 at the New Fountain Inn.

JANUARY 19

HALSTOW

MEET at the Grays Devon Cider Halstow Farm, This is another of our newer wassails helped into life by Jim Causley. See What's Afoot 128 for details and his song that praises cider-making bacteria.

SATURDAY JANUARY 20 STOKE GABRIEL

THIS begins at 4pm with a procession, led by children from Stoke Gabriel Primary School with their willow and paper lanterns, through the community orchard. This is not for those of a nervous disposition as the The dramatic finale is the firing of shotguns to wake the trees from their winter slumber and chase away any evil spirits which might be lurking in the branches. After the procession entertainment will be provided by Elfic the Jester, Beltane Border Morris Dancers, the Bovey Tracey Mummers Players, bands and the Wassail Singers. Story telling will take place in the Old School Rooms on Church Walk with Paul Sharman.

SATURDAY JANUARY 20 SANDFORD WASSAIL

GATHER outside the Lamb Inn 7pm. Wassail song and music session upstairs at the Lamb from 8.30pm. Exeter Morris will be there.

BERE FERRERS

Behind The Scene

Calstock's folk act booker is moving on

CALSTOCK Arts Centre, just across the Tamar, has hosted some fabulous folk acts as part of its highly varied and always top quality programme. Now the man who over the past few years has brought such artists as the Askew Sisters and Seth Lakeman to the venue, is stepping down from the job.

Steve Hunt has been

involved in booking folk acts for 40 years and was press officer at Sidmouth Folk Festival. He is also a talented singer and instrumentalist who has performed and recorded with Alan Burton, The Saboteurs, Leski, Dalla, Corncrow, Neil Davey and numerous others.

He and his wife Carmen are also heavily involved with Cornish folk dance and other projects. Steve says although he has thoroughly enjoyed his time with the arts centre, which is run by volunteers, he has only time for so many things. He also feels that it's time for fresh blood at the centre, especially if his successor is from the younger generation.

A LTHOUGH he is proud to have brought Seth Lakeman and his trio to a tiny venue like Calstock, Steve has got most satisfaction from introducing audiences to acts that other venues aren't booking. "These acts are not being booked because they're not good but because they are still under the radar of a lot of promoters," he says. "I know I'm going to get a good audience for Lady Maisery or Cara Dillon or Sean Lakeman and Kathryn Roberts but the real thrill is bringing artists the audience don't know. Like Janice Burns and Doran who were astonishingly good. In three or four years time everyone will be raving about them."

Steve, 61, was born in the Isle of Man but moved around Britain a fair bit before settling in Liskeard. He got into the business by chance when he started going to the Load of Hay folk club in Uxbridge back in 1983. "The booking secretary for the club, Terry Silver, talked me



into taking over from him. So I became that rare beast – a folk club organiser in his twenties. Not long after that I also got involved in putting on shows at the Windsor Arts Centre which is where I met my wife Carmen.

"When I ended up in Cornwall 23 years ago, I became a stalwart of the Bodmin Folk Club and

was involved in booking acts for them."

He also worked as an MC for the Cornwall Folk Festival and this led to an invitation to MC at Sidmouth. At the time he was working for fROOTS folk magazine (the printed edition is long gone but it continues as a podcast), having taken over the reviews from Sarah Coxson. She became press officer for the Sidmouth Festival and when she moved to Wales, suggested Steve should take over. And her suggestion was accepted, much to Steve's astonishment.

Says Steve: "I thought 'Do they realise I'm out of my depth here?' but you learn how to do it. It worked well mainly because the performers at Sidmouth were all incredibly accommodating. For BBC Spotlight I was able to line them up with Ralph McTell and Billy Bragg and it was wonderful to do.

"I would still love to be doing it today. But when fRoots ended, it became necessary for me to get a proper job and I couldn't get the time off in the summer to do all the festivals."

He is keen to see young people taking folk clubs and venues such as Calstock but adds: "We old people say we want young people to take over and then we lay down the ground rules and say, 'You have to do it the same as us', which of course they don't. They can do it exactly as they like."

But he would like to see more folk clubs being run by performers as they often were back in the Sixties and Seventies. "You had the Watersons' folk club in Hull and the Spinners in Liverpool and Tony Rose in Exeter. If you

had good singers in charge of the club, you were always sure of a good night. And they would bring in their mates to perform.

"With costs of touring and hotels and I would very much like to see a return to that DIY way of doing things, away from this constant push to professionalism which is not financially sustainable for most people."

Steve is very hopeful about emerging talent. "There's a 15-year-old lad in Padstow, Finley Bray who's an extraordinary instrumentalist: tenor banjo mandolin guitar – anything with strings. He's already released a first EP that's had a bit of radio play. Another great performer from Lostwithiel, Martha Woods has put out a Christmas EP. She's a good composer and has already had one of her tunes picked up by Kathryn Tickell, which isn't bad going."

In Devon, he's impressed by Suthering and Windjammer – "although they're young but not as young as Finley and Martha".

As What's Afoot went to press, there was no word about Steve's successor. However, by the next issue we should be able to tell you who will be flying the folk flag at Calstock.

Pudsey and pals push past the £2k barrier

THESE may be the hard the hard times of old England but the good folk of Tavistock are still willing to put their hands in their pockets for a good cause. The annual morris day of dance for Pudsey back in November managed to raise a record £2,062 for Children in Need.

This was well up on 2022's record total of just over $\pounds1,800$.

A total of 16 morris sides descended on Bedford Square for the event organised by Dartmoor Border Morris and their enthusiastic performances were well received by the majority of the townsfolk. The sides, who came from as far away as Penzance (or Pensans as they like to call it) and South Petherton in Somerset, enjoyed themselves too.

The day was due to end with one one mass dance with as many sides as possible joining in. But the dancers still found the energy for at least three more and would have gone but a concerned council official had to ask them to disperse (very nicely) because a wedding was due to take place in the town hall.

Those who were still feeling energetic went

back to the Stannary Arms whose wonderful staff had allowed the back room to be used as base camp for the day.

They had even allowed the sale of beer donated by Dartmoor Brewery - all proceeds going into the Pudsey funds.

A song and music session quickly developed and there was even a solo jig in the crowded room. Then the landlady came in and asked the musicians to move on - not into the street but into the main bar because she thought her regulars might enjoy the music. And they did.

So here's a special thank you to the StannaryArms in Market Street. At a time when many pubs are closing or turning up their noses at folk music, it is heartening to find an inn that welcomes our music and dance.

Credit for the success of Pudsey Day has to go to Mark Tregaskis – better known as Treggie – the indefatigable bagman of Dartmoor Border Morris. He spent most of the year trying to organise the event and will no doubt already be working on the 2024.

Troubles for Treggie came thick and fast last

year. With 16 sides taking part at least three dance spots are needed and one of those was cancelled by the council. This had Treggie frantically searching for new venues or facing the prospect of scaling down the event.

Fortunately, the council came up trumps and and three spots were available in Bedford Square, outside the Guildhall and in the Pannier Market.

Then there were a couple of late cancellations by sides who had said they would come. Timetable troubles came when some sides needed to be paired up spots because they shared musicians and/or dancers.Things could have got very fraught for Treggie without the support of his long-suffering wife, Kath, who is now foreman for Dartmoor Border Morris.

In the end, everything came together and lobbying has already started from sides who want to be invited to this year's Pudsey Day.

The sides who attended this year were: Pensans Bordering on Morris, Catseye Morris, Winkleigh Border Morris, Black Bess Border, Glory of the West, Otter Morris, The Old Town Twelves, Tinners Morris, Plymouth Clog, Cogs & Wheels Ladies Morris, Boscastle Morris, Lodestone Border, Enigma Morris, Grimspound Border Morris and Wreckers Border Morris

An exhausted but happy Treggie commented: "Many thanks to the kind people of Tavistock who donated £2,062 to the BBC Children in Need appeal. Thanks also to Dartmoor Brewery for the free kegs of charity ale, Bob's East End Cafe for the free hot drinks, the Stannary Arms for the use of their function room, Tavistock Market for allowing 200 morris dancers and musicians to perform and of course the BBC for allowing Mr Pudsey Bear to attend."

Pudsey Day is seen by many the last big "gathering of the morris clans" of the season in the South-west. The next big "gathering" in the county will be the Green Man Festival at Bovey Tracey hosted by Grimspound on Saturday April 27. See the next issue of What's Afoot for more details.

The Months Of The Year

AT THE beginning of 2024 it seemed appropriate to pick out a song that takes us right through the year. It comes from Sabine Baring Gould's Songs of the West and the parson noted in his 1905 edition that it was still popular with labouring men in Devon. He collected three versions of the song from South Brent, Belstone and Postbridge and settled on the air sung by J Potter, a farmer at Merripit in Postbridge.

Baring-Gould noted that there were other versions of the song. A far shorter Carol of The Months from Cornwall can be found in the book Canow Kernow.

Reviews

Strandline

TRUMPET, concertina and double bass seem the most unlikely combination you could ever come across. The trumpet is certainly not an instrument most people would associate with the British folk scene.

So an immediate reaction Strandline's lineup might be: this is not going to work. But consider how well Howard Evans's trumpet worked with John Kirkpatrick's squeezeboxes in Brass Monkey and how brilliantly Annie Whitehead's trombone paired with Alistair Anderson's English concertina in Northern Lights. It all depends on the musicians.

Fortunately the three musicians of Strandline are well up to the task of blending together. Trumpeter Claude Lamon has a classical and jazz background – as well as playing for Otter Morris – and is never intrusive. Sometimes his muted trumpet is reminiscent of Miles Davis at the master's mellowest.

He provides some splendid counterpoint to Kat Blockley's English concertina and Lizzie Pridmore's double bass and violin.

Kat and Lizzie share the vocals on the mostly self-penned tracks which celebrate the life and history of Devon and Cornwall. My immediate favourite is *Cookworthy Knapp*, a tribute to the landmark "homecoming tree clump" just outside Lifton.

I was also very taken with the more elegiac *The Sun Still Rises* and the jaunty *What Changes.*

The artists are Devon-based (with Cornish connections) so you should have plenty of opportunites to see them this year. In the meantime, check out their album on Bandcamp.

It was good to be reminded of some of our best loved songs and this shows they are still worth singing, and I know my elderly friend from the States, John Blane will be as delighted as I am with her choice of material as he thinks no one is singing the old songs any more.

Many of the songs are unaccompanied and others backed by her husband Gavin on guitar and melodeon.

The Turtle Dove and The Tanyard Side are my two favourite tracks but there is nothing on the CD that I felt didn't work well. As a box player myself, maybe I am being hypercritical in saying the accompaniment was a little too predictable and I personally feel he could have held on to the chords longer.

Julie has a very clear voice with excellent diction and phrasing, possibly she has had training.

A well-presented package with excellent details on each of the tracks.

In Memoriam

Euphine Bromell

CUPHINE BROMELL, a former director of Halsway Manor and accordion player with the band The Devonians, died on Saturday October 7, 2023. She was 77.

Born in Seaton, Devon, she first became involved with folk dance through her school, Honiton Secondary Modern. There she became a member of the folk dance team which performed at Sidmouth Folk Festival and at the Albert Hall.

She had piano lessons from the aTed Farmer

We are sorry to hear that the Devon ge of seven but gave up when she was 14. Her interest in music was rekindled when she married her first husband and they moved to Plymouth.

In an interview recorded at Halsway Manor the national centre for folk arts, she recalled: "My first husband and I were desperately broke at the time and we saw a dance club advertised. It was only $10p \operatorname{each} - 20p - \operatorname{and}$ we could just about manage that.

"We hadn't been out for a long time and we decided we'd go.

"Then they roped my husband in as a morris dancer and I went back to social dancing."

Around that time she took up the piano accordion and went round the folk and dance clubs "picking the brains of other musicians". She said that through her piano lessons she could understand the right hand but at first the left hand basses were a bit of a mystery.

Euphine got involved with Halsway Manor in 1972 when Hugh Rippon organised a "young people's weekend" there. She recalled: "It was for people up to 29. I was 27 so I was one of the oldest of the young people."


This started a long relationship. She eventually became one of the directors, retiring from the role in 2014. She said that she was amazed so much had been achieved for so many years by volunteers like herself.

From Plymouth, Euphine moved to Week St Mary in North Cornwall. Her funeral was held in St Mary's Church there on October 24.
