I WAS at a barn dance recently where the excellent Dartmoor Pixie Band were playing. "Ah," said a friend, "that's not really the Pixie band. I remember when Bob Cann brought the band to our village years ago but he's long gone." I had to explain that Mark Bazeley might not have the Cann name but his mother was Bob Cann's daughter. Jason Rice's dad was a founder member of the band, and Rob Murch's dad was a long-time member of the Bob Cann line-up. Mark's wife Sarah has been calling with the band since she was 16 so there is an unbroken line. This, I told my friend, was the real Dartmoor tradition. Then I noticed Sarah doing a sound check, walking round the hall with her iPad and adjusting the amplifiers through a Bluetooth connection. OK, I had to admit, this wasn't quite traditional. But then it wasn't technology taking over. The band weren't "sampling" sounds, using loopers or scratching record decks. This was technology aiding tradition. When the dancing started it was good old-fashioned musicianship and pure Pixie magic that was pulling dancers young and old onto the floor. The folk world has seen many changes since the days of Baring Gould and Cecil Sharp and arguments have raged over the years and will rage for years to come over what has been for the better and what for the worse. 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# It's time for Chris to show his hand

# A long-time associate of Steve Knightley and Phil Beer is now taking centre stage

TEVE KNIGHTLEY, no less, has called Chris Hoban the greatest unknown songwriter in Britain. And there may well be many people who hear Show Of Hands performing Katrina, The Lily And The Rose, Along The Old Lych Way or Hallows Eve without realising these songs were written not by Steve but by Chris. He is also the man who wrote the arrangements for some of their numbers and helped to put together their Centenary album.

You have probably seen him on stage with them at some time. He performed with them at their last concert at the Albert Hall and at their

Not only was it a historic moment for all concerned but it also left Chris with more time for his composing, arranging and other musical projects. And there are plenty of those.


His work with Show Of Hands is a far cry from Chris's musical beginnings as a chorister in one of London's top church choirs. His classical music background is due to his father, John, who was the choir master at Brompton Oratory in London, from 1971 to 1995. Chris, who was born in 1967, and his brothers all sang in the choir. Chris describes his father as quite conventional in many ways — a bowler-hat wearing, World Service listener. But John Hoban was also an innovator, introducing a girls' choir to the Oratory in 1973 — a move as radical and shocking at the time as introducing women into morris dancing.

Back then Chris was being directed towards a very different musical future. "I was destined to be a cellist," says Chris, "but I developed back problems. Bending over the cello wasn't feasible so I had to find something else to do. I grew up writing music — my mother wrote down a song I made up when I was three years old and I've been doing it ever since."

His back has improved and he has managed to take up the cello again but it is no longer his main instrument. As a teenager he got a guitar and started writing songs with it – he describes his early efforts as rubbish. The guitar has led many people to folk music – often via Dylan, Donovan or Steeleye Span. But Chris's guides were the classical composers Vaughan Williams, Butterworth and Percy Grainger who had all turned to British folk music for their inspiration. He also became interested in the folk tunes used in John Gay's *The Beggars' Opera*. Then, like so many others he came across The Penguin Book Of Folk Songs and a new world opened up for him.

However, he was also attracted to writing for

the world of musical theatre and this literally took him round the globe. "I have worked in Scotland, Moscow, Australia, New Zealand and Rio De Janeiro – although I was teaching English in Rio. I went there because I love Brazilian music."

Musical theatre also took him to Africa and this set him on a new musical path. "We were taking a show to Africa about David Livingstone and I needed a portable organ. The most portable near equivalent I found was an accordion. I already played piano so I was able to learn the accordion but I wouldn't class myself as one of the better players."

You can judge the standard of Chris's playing from video clips of his songs posted on his website.

From the shows, he moved into musical education and got a job in Devon some 15 years ago. "I'd wanted to be by the sea and ended up in Topsham."

This move proved to be another life changer because his son and Steve Knightley's went to the same school and became friends. One one occasion, Steve was collecting his son from Chris's house and stopped for a glass of wine and a chat. They got talking about music and Chris happened to mention a song he'd just written about Hurricane Katrina which devastated New Orleans in 2005. Steve was impressed *Katrina* appeared on Show of Hands' *Wake The Union* album and even won praise from a writer on the crusty old Daily Telegraph (although it has to be said that the Daily Telegraph has had some good folk music writers, in particular Colin Randall).

This led to Chris being involved in Show Of Hands' Centenary album to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the start of the First World War with a mixture of songs old and new and poetry. He played piano and contributed the songs The Padre and Love Will Make The World Go Round. But he is particularly proud of his work arranging Steve's song The Gamekeeper and weaving the traditional songs The Keeper and The Water Is Wide into the mix

One of Chris's most moving songs is *The Lily And The Rose*, woman's lament for her love who was lost in the First World War. He wrote it specifically for Miranda Sykes to sing an is very proud of her performing it with Devon's Lost Sound choir. This song appears on Show Of Hands' Roots 2 album – although it doesn't feature Steve and Phil Beer at all.

The Lily And The Rose has been recycled,

along with *The Padre*, now that Chris has struck out on his own after the retirement of Show Of Hands. He has gone back to his early love, musical theatre and has been producing his own shows in the folk tradition. In 2023 he brought 1918 – *The Untold Stories Of The Great War* to the Sidmouth Folk Festival, backed by the Sidmouth Town Band. An advantage of being a classically trained arranger is that you can whip up sheet music for the big forces when you need them.

A S WELL as *The Padre* and *The Lily And The Rose*, the show also featured his songs *The Christmas Truce* and *Along The Lanes And O'er The Lea*. Chris says that the inspiration for this show were the people who did not come back from the conflict, the empty spaces in the pews in the churches.

He joined forces again with Sidmouth Town Band at last year's Sidmouth Festival for his show *Cartography*, about the relationship between people and the land and how this has shaped the English race. Chris is passionate about the land. Among other things he is a wild swimmer.

The show features the song *All Away*, a heartfelt protest against the efforts of some landowners to restrict the right to roam on Dartmoor. It is reminiscent of *The Manchester Rambler*, Ewan MacColl's anthem for the mass trespass on Kinder Scout in 1932 that led to improved rights of access to the countryside. Chris's song is even angrier.

He has also put together a two-man show. A Yuletide Ramble, with actor Martin Reeve

telling seasonal stories while Chris provides the songs and music and leads the audience in carol singing. This was performed at Topsham Folk Club in December last year. As with such seasonal shows, we will have to wait for the appropriate time, winter, to see this again.

Another show, *Riverain*, about life along rivers, is in the works.

Much of Chris's work is inspired by stories he comes across so we can expect another show now that he has been given access to a wealth of material. He has been appointed as a Cultural Fellow at Exeter University for 2025 for the project Wills as Windows onto Past Lives.

"Their history department is undertaking a mammoth project, 'The Material Culture of Wills' and I'm writing lyrics and songs inspired by the wills themselves which date from 1540-1790.

"I will be drawing from their language, place, characters, and of course their possessions. Each will is a unique, hand written document which is unmistakably personal in both intent and tone."

Enthusiasts for family history will know how much wills can tell us about how our ancestors lived so we can expect some fascinating songs.

You can find examples of Chris's work on his website Chrishoban.com. There is also a chance to buy his arrangements of his own songs and folk songs. These range from solo parts to choir settings to full-blown arrangements for brass band.

# Duo celebrates 30 years of harmony

# Kathryn Roberts and Sean Lakeman have come a long way since meeting at Sidmouth

THE Wisdom Of Standing Still is a song by Kathryn Roberts and Sean Lakeman but it's not advice they are heeding at the moment. In March, they set off on a tour round Britain that takes them from the wild west, Truro to the far east – Colchester – then north to Scunthorpe and beyond before eventually heading back to their home in West Devon. The tour is to celebrate 30 years of working together, first as bandmates then as duo and happily married couple.

Just before they began their tour, I managed to chat to Kathryn, writes John Foxen. Sean was knee-deep in tedious admin work. It's certainly not a glamorous job being a folk artist. "Mornings are for answering and writing emails," Katherine said. "With local newspapers closing down, we rely so much on social media for publicising gigs. Sometimes you feel you are nagging people, sending email after email saying 'come and see us'. Especially at a time when money is tight."

Their afternoons are given over to the proper job for musicians: rehearsals. But they also have to fit in looking after their twin daughters who are fast approaching 18 and their A-levels. One daughter plays piano, the other guitar and both sing. They have even performed with their parents on stage at Sidmouth and the Beautiful Days festivals.

The family live at Horrabridge, between Tavistock and Plymouth. Sean was raised nearby at Buckland Monachorum, which must have something in the water as it has produced three outstanding artists in him and his brothers Seth and Sam. Kathryn hails from Barnsley, which can also be proud of its local talent. It's the home of Kate Rusby as well. Yorkshire folk are fiercely proud of their county so how does Kathryn feel about Devon? "I still love South Yorkshire. The countryside around Barnsley is lovely but once Dartmoor gets into your soul, you can't imagine living anywhere else." Her

love of the area is shown in her song *Pew Tor*, dedicated to that beauty spot just a few miles from Tavistock. "Between Pew Tor and Vixen Tor there is a place where we always hear the first cuckoo of spring."

Katherine is now part of Horrabridge village life. "I told the manager of our local pub, The Leaping Salmon, that if they got a piano in there, I'd come and play Christmas carols. They got a piano and now it's become an annual tradition. I play carols and the locals sing. It's wonderful to hear people singing. It's so good that there is a resurgence of community choirs."

There is a strong choral tradition in Yorkshire but Kathryn did not grow up with that. Her parents were both morris dancers and she grew up in the folk world. "After a dance session it was off to the pub and I'd fall asleep hearing the old songs."

ATHRYN became quite a nifty dancer herself, performing clog and Irish dancing to a high level. She and Kate Rusby formed a dance side that they took to the Whitby Folk Festival years ago. "We did some rapper which was looked down on by some people as rapper wasn't seen as dancing for women back then."

But despite her dance expertise and her love of Devon's moorland, Kathryn has never been tempted to enter the Dartmoor Step Dancing Championships. "We go to the Dartmoor Folk Festival, I've tried the workshop and I love watching it but I'm afraid I'd be far too flamboyant for the competition."

Kathryn and Kate Rusby joined forces to produce an acclaimed album. Their touring took them to Sidmouth in 1993 where they bumped into the three Lakeman brothers who were also creating quite a stir on the folk scene. "We started hanging around together because we were around the same age," said Katherine.

The musical mix was good and they formed the band Equation. The name comes from the initials of the five members: SL3 + KR2. It's a far better equation than those dreadful quadratic ones that were the terror of maths lessons at school. In fact, it seems to be the formula for love.

The band toured very successfully, with a few changes along the way. Kate Rusby left to be replaced by Cara Dillon, who married Sam Lakeman. Kathryn moved down to Devon, initially because it was easier for rehearsals and Sean was her best friend. In time, as we know, he became so much more and when Equation eventually broke up Kathryn and Sean started touring the folk club circuit as a duo.

Sean is, of course, Devon born and bred—although his father, the redoubtable Crane duet concertina player Geoff, is still a proud Cornishman, despite years of living in Devon. Sean is an impressive guitar player but that can have a downside. "He's always bringing new guitars home," says Kathryn. "But he always tells me that each new guitar has a specific purpose." I point out that you would not expect a carpenter or mechanic to turn up for a job with just one screwdriver. "Don't give him an excuse to get another guitar," cried Kathryn.

But she has to admit there is an upside. "It

can be tricky working with a singer, especially finding the right key. Folk fiddlers like to play in D,G and A but sometimes I need a key like Eb minor. That can be hard on the guitar but I'm lucky that Sean is a real master of the guitar and the capo and always so adaptable. He will always find a way to make a song work."

As well as being a fine musician, Sean has an impressive CV in the recording studio. A notable achievement was his brother Seth's breakthrough album, *Kitty Jay*. Seth remembers it being recorded in the kitchen but the album went on to be nominated for a Mercury Prize in 2005 (as recounted in What's Afoot 137).

Now Sean has an impressive home studio and recently he produced the new album by Tavistock-based duo Suthering, *Leave A Light On.* Heg and Julu of Suthering have high praise for Sean. "He thought of so many things that we didn't and they made the album so much better," they said.

Sean's studio work helped keep things going when Kathryn stopped touring for a while to concentrate on raising the family. But Kathryn and Sean came back with a bang, winning the best duo titles in the BBC Folk Awards in 2013 and 2016. Kathryn said: "This really helped with getting bookings because even if people

haven't heard of you, the awards are a real seal of approval from a trusted source."

The folk world is littered with married couples who performed together then split up. Performing with the person you love can be the biggest thrill ever but little niggles can grow into big problems when amplified by the pressure of life on the road.

To give an example, an amateur musician friend who performs with his wife recently told me: "I've just spent a month struggling to learn a Bert Jansch song that I still can't play and now she tells me she doesn't really like it! I wish she'd told me a month earlier."

There's no chance of that couple breaking up but the story does illustrate one the problems that duos can have. I asked Kathryn how she and Sean deal with such artistic disagreements.

"We know each other well enough to be honest. If one of us suggests a song but it doesn't tickle the other's fancy, we can discuss it reasonably and frankly. If we can't agree then the deciding factor is: what would a member of the public think of it?"

Public approval is vital to Kathryn and Sean. But Kathryn pointed out that it's not for commercial reasons. "The whole point of being up on stage is reach the audience. You asked us about the highlights of touring together and the highlight of any show is when people come up to you afterwards and talk about how they were moved by a particular song – because music can comfort you, make you laugh and even make you cry.

"It's wonderful to think that someone needed to hear you sing that song tonight."

F THERE is a song by Sean and Kathryn that you really need to hear, their tour is coming back again to the West Country and there is a chance to see them at the Minack Theatre in Porthcurno on April 23 or at Calstock Arts on April 24.

During their tour they will be promoting their new live album *Another Day At The Circus*. Ten tracks were recorded while they were providing the musical entertainment at a musical walking holiday run by the Dorset folk duo Ninebarrow. The other six tracks were recorded at other venues, including a gig in Den Haag, Netherlands. # Mum's the word

RODERICK DENLEY-JONES tells how he helped to revive an old custom

WHEN I moved to Buckfastleigh from Wales two years ago, I wanted to continue my involvement in the folk world. I have spent 40 years dancing, leading and teaching Welsh Folk dancing, with a 10-year interlude living in Greece. It did not seem right to start a Welsh folk dance group in Devon. So, what to do?

I had always been interested in other folk traditions and had briefly participated in a mummers play in Wales as well as Maypole dancing. I had also been instrumental in helping to revive the Welsh tradition of the Mari Lwyd in Pontypool. This custom involves a "grey mare" – a man under a sheet holding a horse's skull on a stick – going from door to door in a village begging for food and drink.

While working as a volunteer in the Valiant Soldier Museum in Buckfastleigh, I came across a photograph of some mummers performing in the town in Edwardian times. There was no information relating to them and they were not connected to any other group of the time so far as we could discover. However, I found mummers plays in Dartington and Ashburton and other places further afield.

I formed the Buckfastleigh Folk Tradition Group which has developed into the Valiant Mummers of Buckfastleigh. We meet every Monday evening in the Valiant Soldier Museum in Buckfastleigh.

We performed our first Mummers play at Easter 2024. It was an adaptation of several plays but all in the tradition. We decided to perform all year round and adapt the play accordingly. We also wrote a new play about harvest and utumn time called the "Valiant Harvest", a play about death and renewal in relation to the land at harvest time.

One feature of all our adaptations has been our local hero the Valiant Soldier – John Prettyjohns. Born in Dean Prior adjacent to Buckfastleigh, he won the first Victoria Cross awarded to a Royal Marine during the Crimean War. At the battle of Inkerman he led a division to clear out a cave of enemy snipers. The Valiant Soldier appears as a character in many plays of this type, but John Prettyjohns is ours.

In the Dartmoor Border Morris mummers play, their local hero, Sir Francis Drake replaces St George and fights the King of Spain. John Prettyjohns, does not replace our St George but features in the second fight sequence and chases the Turkish Knight home.

The group has gone from strength to strength and we have branched into performing a mystery play for next year as well as other Christmas traditions such as "Hunting the Wren" and adding a Grey Mare to the Wassail. In the spring, we teach Maypole dancing.

Since we formed, we have performed in local pubs, the Scorriton Show and our town Christmas Fair. You can see us at Buckfastleigh Town Hall on Saturday May 3. The play will be out spring version with a Green Man replacing Father Christmas. We will also be performing at the Tredegar House Folk Festival, Newport, on Saturday May 10.

Closer to home, there is another chance to see us on Sunday May 25 at the Woolfest on the Millennium Green, Buckfastleigh. We will

be Maypole dancing at the Buckfastleigh Summer fair on June 29. Our Valiant Harvest Play can be seen at Scorriton Show on August Bank Holiday Monday. The final session of the year will be at our Buckfastleigh Christmas Fair, the full Christmas version.

Reviving and demonstrating old folk traditions adds to the rich tapestry of our culture after all: "Folklore is passed from one generation to the next to teach us about our past, if we lose it, we lose the links to our past."

If you fancy reviving the mummers play in your area, a good source of information is Colin Andrews' book **Devon Mumming Past & Present**. It contains details of mumming groups across the county and numerous scripts, traditional and new. See Colin's website www.bonnygreen.uk for more details.

#### Refining a young tradition is hard work

F YOU are starting a traditional mummers side, there are plenty of sources to fall back on and adapt where necessary. But if you are taking the mummers tradition into a whole new realm of interactive entertainment then there's a lot more thinking to be done.

Back in 2017 the Dartmoor village of Sticklepath took on this task, creating its own

Grey Mare event. There is a Tom Pearse in the graveyard and the villagers insist this really is the man who lent his grey mare to the seven revellers who wanted to go to Widecombe Fair — with disastrous results for the poor beast. Every year around Halloween the ghosts of the mare and its ruthless riders return to the village to delight the children — and adults.

There is a showbiz saying that you should never work with kids or animals. The Sticklepath event has both (OK the mare is an elaborate giant puppet with a human inside) so a lot of planning is needed and every year the event is altered and refined.

There is some way to go before Hallowe'en but Derek Moore, the event's guiding hand, and a few of his team met in February to examine what went right and what went wrong in previous years.

Derek says: "The event started out with the children hunting for the ghost of the Grey Mare. They went round the village meeting in turn each of the ghosts of the seven riders who would direct them on to the next ghost and eventually the Grey Mare.

"On the way they called at certain selected houses where they would get instructions and soul cakes. Somewhere along the way witches not part of any tradition – got involved. But they have proved a welcome addition."
 Then Derek and his team found the event

worked better if the children followed the Grey Mare around Sticklepath, hunting for the ghosts. "The whole point of the exercise is for the children to find the ghosts and get them to apologise for their thoughtless and cruel

behaviour. It is a good life lesson to drum into the children as well."

But guiding a mass of children through the dark village streets can prove a problem and at the planning meeting a lot of thought was given to making the exercise as safe as possible.

Last year a pub car park was used as one of the places where the children meet the ghosts. However, one of the team pointed out that with cars coming in and out and children running around – as they do – it was a bit of a safety hazard. Sadly, the team had to rule out the car park as a meeting point.

Because the event is being held on Hallowe'en night this year, the team also need to ensure children

don't detach themselves from the main group and randomly knock on doors to go trick-ortreating. Some people welcome Hallowe'en visitors but some prefer peace and quiet.

Special lighting effects along the way were also discussed. Originally songs had been planned but it had proved too difficult to get the children – and some of the cast – to learn them. They have been dropped and could be replaced with a simple slogan for the children to chant along the way.

There will be more work and refining before the big event on October 31 but Derek is confident that it will be all right on the night.

# Club's £9k aid for Ukraine

Folk on the Moor members send vehicles and medical supplies to the war zone

OLK on the Moor organisers and club members have raised nearly £9,000 to help embattled Ukraine. Another event – a concert on April 13 – might push the total to over £10k.

The cash comes from a series of concerts held since 2022. The first, organised at the Moorland Hotel in Wotter by Folk on the Moor stalwart Anton Horwich, featured two lovely young Ukrainian singers Liza Verona and Masha Mazhnikova and brought in £1,100.

The fund-raising became focused when Nightingales UK, an aid organisation dedicated to helping embattled Ukraine, was formed in Milton Combe in 2023. Anton, also a member of Nightgales, has rallied Folk on the Moor behind the charity.

He said: "A concert in Milton Combe and another last April in St Andrew's Church in Buckland Monachorum, with club resident singers and the Ukrainian Singers of Plymouth, raised a combined total of just under £3,000. Generous donations from Folk on the Moor club members amounted to a further £5,000. So in total, Folk on the Moor singers and members have raised more than £9,000 for aid to Ukraine, a fantastic achievement for a small folk club."

The concert on April 13 will feature songs by Liza Verona and Masha Mazhnikova as a duo and also as members of the Ukrainian Singers of Plymouth. Snacks prepared by the local Ukrainian community will be served. Entrance to the evening will be by a suggested donation of £10 a head. All proceeds will be donated to

Nightingales UK. Anton will give a presentation at the concert about Nightingales.

He said: "I will include video clips from trips to Ukraine, where we deliver long-wheelbase 4x4 vehicles (big enough for a stretcher) full of medical aid. Since the 18 months from our launch in August 2023, we have driven nine such vehicles to Uzhhorod, some 15 miles into Ukraine from the Hungary/Ukraine border. We then hand the 4x4s over to trusted contacts, who travel for almost 24 hours from Dnipro in the east to collect them. They are then used as emergency response vehicles on the frontline, taking both injured soldiers and civilians to hospital. We fly home from Kosice in Slovakia.

"We also have a donated transit van and have delivered three van-loads of humanitarian aid to Koridor UA, our excellent partners in Prague, who can deliver it where it is needed most. In late March, we will be delivering a further van-load and have decided the van would be used more often by an aid organisation based in Ukraine, so we will be driving it and leaving it there.

"Another trip is planned for April."

# Orchestras unite to help fight motor neurone disease

ASHBURTON Community Folk Orchestra and Moorland Mandolins joined forces to raise £1,539 for the Motor Neurone Disease Association.

Jasmine Tanner, a leading player in Moorland Mandolins, was diagnosed with the debilitating condition two years ago. To help fund research to find a cure for MND, the two orchestras gave a concert in St Andrew's Church, Ashburton, in November. Jasmine was able to attend the event which began with a set from the Ashburton Community Folk Orchestra.

The orchestra has more than 30 members who play a wide range of instruments to perform folk tunes from the British Isles and beyond.

In the second half, the 18-piece Moorland Mandolins played a variety of popular pieces drawn from both their classical and contemporary repertoire. Both orchestras were conducted by multi-instrumentalist David Faulkner.

There was no entry fee for the event but a raffle and donations from the public raised the substantial total.

In January Philippa Knox attended a rehearsal of the Ashburton Community Folk Orchestra and was presented with a cheque for the MNDA by Nick Hanbury, the event organiser. Philippa works for Plymouth NHS Trust and is also funded by the MNDA. She provides help and care for patients throughout South Devon.

Ashburton Community Folk Orchestra is an open and welcoming group and you can join at any point during the term. It meets from 10.30am to 12pm, on Thursdays at Ashburton Arts Centre.

"And a good old natter with friendly company,


"Without this comfy centre we would be at a loss

#### **HUNTING OF THE EARL OF RONE**

#### Combe Martin May 23-26

A STRANGELY garbed character, the Earl of Rone, is hunted through the village streets and shot several times before being cast into the sea. Legend claims the victim was the rebellious Earl of Tyrone who fled Ireland in 1607 and was shipwrecked on the Devon coast where he was hunted down and shot. In fact, the Earl of Rone came nowhere near Combe Martin and escaped to France – but don't let that spoil a good story.

The re-enactment of the false legend took place annually until 1837 when it was banned for being too rowdy. It was reinstated with the help of the late Tom Brown and others. Now it is an annual fixture involving the whole village. The ritual is carried out four times. Friday sees a procession with drums only, on Saturday the children's procession, on Sunday the full procession and on Monday the procession with the Earl of Rone.

# Bassless rumours turn out to be true

YOU can't rely on anyone these days! In the last issue of What's Afoot we lauded Miranda Sykes as "the Ace of Bass". Then we find this review of her concert with Jim Causley on Sunday February 23 posted on Facebook by Topsham Folk Club.

NO DOUBLE BASS?! The sell-out audience piling into Matthews Hall last night to see Miranda Sykes and Jim Causley on their Devon home ground were rubbing their eyes as they looked at the stage. It was true. Instead of a night of traditional song with Miranda's double bass, as suggested by the duo's Sabine Baring-Gould tour last year, we were suddenly at a brilliantly orchestrated mixtape evening of songs from some of the finest contemporary British and American songwriters.

Miranda and Jim's travelling playlists from 2024, the motorway belters, turned out to be a shrewd and committed selection of thoughtful, funny, wry, heartfelt songs from the likes of Alison Krauss, Ed Pickford, Chris While, Karine Polwart, Cindi Lauper and Roger Wilson. Jim's keyboard skill is well-beloved and beyond doubt, and Miranda did wonders with an array of guitars, including of course (hooray!) a small but formidable acoustic bass.

Harmonies, though? Oh yes indeed, and a rockout to close the first set. A standout was Gillian Welch's *Lowlands*, their voices blending powerfully in a starkly percussive song that had little to do with a drowned sailor — and if last night was anything to go by, their post-tour recording session is going to create wonders.

Our thanks to Topsham for another fine review. Keep them coming.



But it could be better if the editorial side was run by a team.
