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Editorial

An article in the previous What's Afoot ("One Bar Too Many") alerted readers to a White Paper which set out proposed changes to the Public Entertainment Licensing Laws.

The Bill, which is now before Parliament, contains new regulations which, if passed without amendment and implemented rigorously, would have a disastrous effect on almost all forms of live performance - not only in folk dance and song, but across the whole spectrum of music and drama in the community. Many such activities would for the first time require a licence (at a cost!) and penalties for non-compliance would be severe, though public pressure has already caused the Government to remove some of the dafter new regulations affecting churchess, schools & village halls Few people should now be unaware of the very real threat to our traditions, due to campaigns in the local & regional press, features in the national press, and petitions supported by the E.F.D.S.S., the Morris organisations and the Musicians' Union. If you value our folk traditions, please ACT NOW by writing to your M.P. & the Minister for Culture (!), Dr. Kim Howells, or, at the very least by signing a petition.

It would indeed be a crime if sensible reform of Licensing Laws was smothered by un-necessary, expensive, restrictive, punitive bureaucratic nonsense!

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Bideford Folk Dance Festival

The first North Devon Folk Dance Festival will be held in the Bideford Sports Ground or, if wet, in Bideford Pannier Market on 21st July. The Festival will be purely social and non-competitive as the object is to bring together Folk Dancers and all those interested in Folk Dancing from all parts of North Devon. Although the closing date for entries and fees is not until May 31st, the Hon. Secretary would be glad if those teams wishing to enter would let her know their approximate numbers as early as possible.

Teams taking part in the Festival may wear a uniform but fancy dress is prohibited. Rubbersoled or heel-less shoes must be worn by all dancers.

If you want to book for the above festival, you will only be 70 or so years too late. The above notice and programme was taken from archive material

held by the present Devon District Folk Committee. The material also includes signed by Maud Karpeles certificates, awarded, for performances at Folk Dance Competitions in Exeter in the 1920's and 1930's. (One such certificate is framed and on display in Abbotsham Village Hall.) The various documents will be passed to the West Country Studies Library in Exeter for safe-keeping, with copies to the Margaret Grant Memorial Library at Halsway Manor.

The North Devon Festival, held on the afternnon of Wednesday, 21st July, 1926 in Bideford Pannier Market, was a great success according to a report in the North Devon Gazette of 27th July 1926.

All the charm and grace of old-world country dancing were reproduced when about 850 performers from all parts of the district gave a particularly spectacular display.

An interesting point was that it was the first occasion an orchestra has been able to accompany the dances....

was a sad thing the way national costumes were dying out.

The Mayor, opening the proceedings, expressed his sympathy towards the English Folk Dance movement He believed in the revival of these customs. There was something very grand about it. He understood folk dancing went back as far as the twelfth century...

Three - quarters of a century further on from this newspaper report folk song and dance is still thriving in North Devon as in other parts of the county, though the form and content has certainly changed. Any competitive element let alone prescribed 'syllabus' is rarely seen at festivals, and, except in Playford circles, most of the dances would not be familiar to many involved in popular ceilidhs and folk dance in schools. Conversely, The Keeper is still quite well-known as a good chorus song in folk clubs. As to the Morris and Sword, Kirby Malzeard is one of the less commonly performed longsword dances today, and Tideswell seems to have yielded to its Derbyshire cousin, Winster, as the processional that all Morris dancers should be expected to know.

.....When the Puritans came on the scene they thought everything that was practised by our forefathers was very wrong. Even in his early life (the Mayor) knew some of the old people who said it was a crime and a sin to dance. He was thankful to say that had now passed away.

Ironically, if the new Licensing Bill now before Parliament is passed without amendment, we could once more face harsh penalties for dancing and singing

WREN TRUST CELEBRATES 20 YEARS

It's 1983. We're knee deep in envelopes in the front room as another Folk Arts project spins into life. Shall we have tea before posting this lot? Could the kids help with sticking the stamps? NO . . . they've got homework. In the end, we walk the letters into the village after tea and round a table in the Oxenham Arms pub make plans to get the work out of the house a bit more

It's 2003. Wren now has 8 employees (6 full-time), 3 vehicles, 4 small office-rooms and a store in Okehampton, holding 40 instruments for workshops. The story in between is one of hard work, ridiculous hours, blind optimism, occasional capsizes but mostly a steady strengthening of vision and working plans.

Throughout the 20 years, the vision has remained remarkably constant. Wren gets people active in making and performing their own music and songs, based on traditional repertoire, sometimes using this as a starting point for other work, but always seeking to build confidence, enhance self esteem and strengthen a sense of identity. To us, it feels as though the world has "caught up" and changed round us so that this type of work is now much more central to the thinking of promoters, teachers and funding bodies.

Finding the name "Wren" was a big part of that early sorting out. We knew the kind of work giving people access to folk instruments, songs, researching customs, making music and images, promoting events - but we needed a good strong symbol to gather round. The folklore and ornithology of the Wren may be well known, but it seemed to fit the kind of outfit we had in mind: singing very loudly for its size, full of Englishness, building several nests, flying higher than the eagle, a symbol of good luck in various communities and, the final clincher, connecting with the poll-tax protests during the peasant's revolt.

So, after we've set up youth music projects, folk choirs, open access folk orchestras, after we've written hundreds of songs, dozens of tunes, community plays, and finale projects, after we've performed, recorded, researched and taught, after we've provided numerous articles, speeches and conference presentations, after

we've employed, deployed and reployed our resources throughout Devon, the South West and beyond, what extra are we going to do to celebrate our double decade of existence?

The answer seems that we'll go back to the basics of our stock in trade - we're promoting a concert series in Okehampton, mixing Wren artists with local contributions with visiting guests. These will run on the last Saturday in each month from March to October 2003, finishing on the last night before our week-long annual Baring-Gould Study Break and Festival.

Wren staff musicians David Faulkner (English bagpipes) Marilyn Tucker (voice) Paul Wilson (accordion) Nick Wyke (fiddle) will be joined by local musicians. Visiting artists are likely to include Frankie Armstrong, Tim van Eyken, Vic Legg, Kathryn Roberts and Sean Lakeman (confirming as we go to press).

They'll be held at the Octagon Theatre, Okehampton (a fully accessible venue) with an outside bar by the Plymouth Inn (Real ale a speciality) a set of theatre lights, a warm atmosphere and lots of good music, seems to us the best way to celebrate 20 hard and successful years inspiring people to join traditional music projects of all kinds.

Song & Dance in Cartoon

Clare Penney reports on the Pennymoor Singaround visit to Rathdrum, Co. Wicklow in October 2002. Many of the sessions took place in the Cartoon Inn.

It is perfectly possible to go to Ireland and never find the musical experience you are looking for. The same is, of course, true in Britain, but we are altogether more 'organised' and 'predictable', with advertised clubs and sessions which, generally, we turn up at! In Ireland it appears to be much more spontaneous, and sessions are often arranged between friends at short notice with no hard feelings if they don't happen! When they do, they have all the advantages of freshness and enthusiasm - a one off experience that is not expected to go beyond the 'here and now'. So music doesn't happen in a social void, it has a context.

The Anglo/Irish/Breton gatherings attempt to create a social context for the enjoyment and sharing of 'music' (in its broadest sense) by providing an environment where it can flourish. The holiday atmosphere, the 'guest and host' roles, the meeting up with friends, cultural differences, exciting new musical styles and material and the bonding which inevitably occurs when a group of people spend the weekend together are all essential ingredients.

All these ingredients were present when a group of thirty-eight people involved in singing, music, dancing and sociability travelled to Rathdrum, Co. Wicklow, for a long weekend last October. The town had been well-prepared by a couple of visits by a small group who talked to bar owners, the hostel managers, the tourist information 'lady' and numerous local people. In addition they played alongside local bands and supported sessions, getting to know as many performers as possible. They also provided the music at the request of the bar owner the night Ireland got knocked out of the World Cup! We had also, of course, kept in close touch with our Irish friends and acquaintances from previous gatherings who were planning to join us in Rathdrum.

Even so, no-one quite knew how it would work out when we all met the first evening at the Cartoon Inn, where we settled into the 'Coffin Room' (where traditionally the coffins had been stored, not all



vacant, in readiness for funerals). The atmosphere was far from funereal, with a large peat fire at one end and a bar at the other and, with plenty of room in the middle, it soon became the evening venue. There was room for Firestone members to dance and the Irish soon had some set dancing under way. With its high ceiling, the traditional practice of step dancing (Irish and Dartmoor) on the table soon emerged. Singers and musicians co-existed happily as did the young and old, the traditional and contemporary and the English and Irish contributors, with everyone leaning over backwards to ensure a fair balance. During the day smaller lunchtime and afternoon sessions developed in the bars and there was ample opportunity for chatting, sharing tunes and songs and forming closer ties.

It was exciting to see the weekend build as the word got round the neighbourhood and people flooded in to enjoy the sessions and make their own contributions. I was impressed by the courteous interest shown by all, even when understanding was stretched to the limit. When Tony Worthington finished his rendering of 'Tavistock Goosey Fair' the puzzled Irishman standing next to me at the bar turned to me and said, "What language was he singing that in?"

Perhaps the most gratifying comment of the weekend came from Andy, bar owner of the Cartoon Inn. When bidding us goodbye on our last day he said, "If we could have hand picked everyone of ye we couldn't have done any better."

A Tribute to Martin Bloomer

Barry Lister and Dave Lowry pay tribute with pleasure and pride to Martin Bloomer who was their friend for more than thirty years.

In 1969 we (Barry and Dave) were already singing partners when, on a booking in Newton Abbot, we met with Dave Griggs and Martin Bloomer. They joined us for a song or two, and suggested we might join up together. Thus "Isca Fayre" was born, and was to last eight and a half years.

We became part of the residency at the Exeter Traditional Folk Song Club at the Jolly Porter. Club and festival gigs followed, from the South West to the Midlands, including radio, T.V. and also the Royal Albert Hall. In 1976 and 1978 we toured British Forces Bases in Germany, most of the arrangements being made by Martin, as he did for our record released in 1976. Martin was the group's 'organiser', and he was meticulours in his planning. No song was ever performed without unanimous consent as to its merits.

Martin also served on the Devon District Committee of the English Folk Dance and Song Society, which at the time appeared to neglect the song side, so when the magazine was re-launched (Martin's project) he suggested it might be called "Foot and Mouth" to redress the balance. This was an example of his wicked sense of humour. The idea was not well received by the rest of the Committee, however, and was amended to "What's Afoot".

After "Isca Fayre" folded , Martin sang with "Hollinmoor" (Martin & Alison Bloomer, Sean O'Shea, Barry Lister) from 1978 to 1983. In 1979 "Isca" was asked by Bill Rutter to reform for Sidmouth Festival's Silver Jubilee in a special West Country evening at the Arena, along with Cyril Tawney, Tony Rose and The Yetties. After this we would get together occasionally for an informal sing, but nothing serious until what was to be our last professional sing at Topsham Folk Club on 15th September, 2002.

Martin died on 28th November 2002. He was 55. He was the consummate professional in all his endeavors, and his sense of humour, generosity of spirit and friendship was very special to us all. He will be greatly missed.

Saturday Hops

When dealing with enquiries for a folk dance band and caller for PTAs, weddings, parties, and other 'one-off' events, I am often asked whether it should be described as a folk dance, barn dance, country dance, square dance or ceilidh. I am inclined to just answer "yes" (though I do go on to describe the kind of music & dance we provide), since the terms, whilst not exactly synonymous, are reasonably interchangeable, at least in the eyes of the general public.

It does depend where you're coming from, in terms of previous knowledge or experience of dancing. To some, a 'Folk Dance' may have a slightly stuffy image and 'Country Dance' even more so, conjuring up images of old ladies in plimsolls or enforced skipping around at primary school. At the other extreme 'Country Dancing' has been misinterpreted by other enquirers as 'Country and Western' with guests turning up in cowboy outfits and expecting a fair helping of line dancing ! A 'Square Dance' also tends to have that American image amongst the uninitiated whilst in this part of the world, a 'Barn Dance' can mean exactly that ; a dance in a barn with any kind of music! A Ceilidh (commonly misspelt word on posters), apart from obvious Irish ,not to mention Scottish inferences, is not infrequently regarded by the more staid and ageing members of the folk fraternity as either

an excuse to break up the evening with songs or to require step-hopping to everything played at great volume by an electric band,

These are, of course, highly misleading stereotypes, for whilst a folk-style' dance under any of its alternative titles may prove to be something different to what is expected, it is more likely to include a variety of dances with broad appeal. Don't be deceived by the band's name either - 'Country Dance Band' or 'Ceilidh Band', the difference may not be apparent in their music.

What is clear is that, whilst in the folk dance scene there is a wide spectrum, the divisions are largely artificial and common enjoyment is far more important. When they are in the county, try a ceilidh or country dance with the *Bismarcks* or *Bursledon Village Band*, sample the atmosphere of a Saturday night with the driving but very danceable rhythms of *Florida* or the *Committee Band* and partake of the more gentle nature of a Playford Party with *Orion's Ring* - you may be very pleasantly surprised. Even better, go along and support your many excellent local bands at the many events at which they play throughout the year.

At the AGM the President introduced the topic of the new Licensing Bill. He reported that he had been in touch with the Minister concerned and was now confident that, rather than adding restrictions, the bill would enable more live music to take place in the future.

The main topic of this AGM was the Constitution. When the Committee was formed it was still part of the regional section of EFDSS but, as this is no longer the case, the Committee wished to change the name to reflect their new status. A proposal was put to the meeting and agreed that, in future, the organisation should be called **DEVON FOLK**, with the objective of 'covering all aspects of Folk in Devon'. Various other minor changes were also agreed.

Two new members were elected to the Committee, Brian Thomas and Andrew Mycroft to replace Len Christopher and Jason Rice. Len and Jason have served on the Committee for a number of years and their efforts have been much appreciated.

THROUGH & THROUGH John Spiers & Jon Boden

Fellside FECD161

John Spiers and Jon Boden join the growing list of inspirational young performers who are injecting new vitality into English traditional folk music. Many festivals are giving them top billing this year rather than as supporting acts, and it is easy to see why. Their live performance, of which this album is a reliable representation, is a well-balanced, dynamic mixture of instrumentals and traditional songs and ballads.

John Spiers is the quieter one with rare vocal contributions but excellent rhythmic style on melodeon, whilst Jon Boden performs musical gymnastics on his fiddle, including powerful accompaniments to his songs, pitched, one initially thinks, too high for comfort, but there's no falsetto or false notes. Although the musical arrangements are polished and innovative - you never quite know what's going to come next - they give added drama rather than detract from the rendition in such fine ballads as *Earl Richard, The Golden Glove* and *Banks of Green Willow*. There's an up-tempo (one could almost say upset tempo) version of *Adieu Sweet Lovely Nancy*, well-hidden from premature recognition in the musical introduction, but they do allow you to join in, with a return to conventionality during the last verse. Reflecting their Oxford home base, some tunes have a Cotswold Morris flavour to them - *The Quaker, Brighton Camp, Laudanum* (sic) *Bunches*, and John's composition, the *Gooseberry Bush*, complete with 'slows' for appropriate capers should you wish to make up a dance to fit. Amongst more familiar tunes such as *Three Around Three* and *Oswestry Wake*, John also includes some of his other tunes, the slow air *Red Kites*, and *The Three Footed Chestnut*, one of a set of 3/2 hornpipes . If you like traditional music and song with attitude, you too could enthuse over this CD.

SWEETEST THAT I KNOW **Gareth Hedges CD GDH 301**

Gareth Hedges is a guitar player and singer based near Tavistock who plays a wide range of blues, ragtime, jazz, and great tunes. He works extensively in the USA and has played with many wonderful musicians during his career. This CD would probably broadly classify as Blues with Gareth playing songs by Big Bill Broonzy, Blind Willie McTell and Mississippi Fred McDowell, and if that's what you like then you need to give this a listen.

However, this CD deserves your attention even if Blues or American music is not your first choice. There are some gems here; Gareth's arrangement of the O'Carolan tune "Little Hill, Big Hill" has a freshness that delights the ear. He has the technical ability to make it sound effortless, never on this CD does the playing get in the way of the music. The guitar playing is always relaxed and crystal clear and never feels rushed, even when Gareth's playing the kind of thing the rest of us only dream about.

I try and listen to CD's I'm reviewing in every way - in the car, while I'm working as well as when I'm relaxing and giving it my full attention. Songs and tunes that make me think, "That's great - I've got to try and learn that," keep me playing them over and over again. This CD worked for me in all these ways, as background music it's quite light and undemanding, sit back and listen and the complexity and nuances in Gareth's playing bring the songs alive.

Gareth's voice is quite light and easy to listen to and nicely complements his playing. I didn't know any of these songs previously, so this coupled with the mixture of styles, instrumentals and songs and has kept this in my CD player.

With fifteen tracks space doesn't allow too much detail, favourite instrumentals for me are the O'Carolan tune and Gareth's own "Cotton Picking" and "Belt Buckle Rag" while his "Tell me, tell me, Baby" and Doc Watson's "Deep River Blues" are great songs. "Spitting on the Sidewalk" is the one that I'll probably try and learn, but that probably tells you more about me really. A nice touch for guitarists, Gareth lists the key for each track. It's good, it's local, give it listen.

Well-known for his music with Wild Thyme over almost two decades, Dave has in recent years been exploring different styles of folk dance music, and currently plays with ConTradition, Grumbling Old Men and the Dave Brown Band. He has that key quality in a folk fiddler - the ability to make his instrument sing and inspire the listeners. On this CD he goes not just one stage further, he plays all the instruments (violin, keyboard, bass guitar, rhythm guitar, mandolin, recorder and programmed drums) in a multi-tracked musical experience. Furthermore, many of the foot-tapping tunes are Dave's own compositions.

The whole album is a delight to listen to, but this CD is meant to be used; the twelve tracks provide club callers with the range of rhythms and lengths (all clearly indicated on the sleeve-notes) required to almost cover a whole evening's programme. Folk Dance Clubs could well invest in a copy, whilst callers working with recorded music would find this a valuable addition to their collection.

To those who have been involved in Playford style dancing for many years the two musicians will need no introduction. Their arrangements, on accordion and fiddle, of eighteenth century dance tunes from the Apted and other collections were originally released on vinyl LPs by the EFDSS between 1978 and 1981 and have practically become the 'standard' works.. The original recordings have now been digitally re-mastered and made available on a double CD (sponsored by Claygate FDC), which is bound to give a new lease of life to these dance classics. Even if you do not dance, the fiddle and accordion make for very pleasant listening. The double album is excellent value at £15 for 35 tracks (+£1.50 p&p). The Apted book

GOWN OF GREEN Jane & Amanda Threlfall WBCD002

This is pure magic if you like traditional songs performed in seamless close harmony as smooth as liquid honey. Jane and Amanda's voices blend so well together that even at a live folk club performance I wasn't always sure who was singing which part. Their delivery live, as on this album, is unforced almost deceptively quiet, yet I could hear every word at the back of the room. Their voices unaccompanied would be more than enough to hold one's attention, but that would be grossly unfair to Martin Ellison on melodeon and Roger Edwards on guitar and anglo concertina who provide imaginative yet sympathetic accompaniments. Indeed, one could be equally captivated by the music without the songs and there are actually two instrumental tracks - the Winster Morris Reel and Athens. Put the singing and playing together and you have an album as near perfect as one can get.

There are some of my favourites in *The Black-smith* and *April Morning*, two songs from the Coppers and two collected from Joseph Taylor. I appreciated the well-crafted arrangements and consistently high quality performance, even in songs such as *Horncastle Fair* which form part of my own repertoire.

THROUGH THE GROVES Mary Humphreys and Anahata

It's not fair! I've run out of superlatives, such is the variety and quality of CDs received or acquired for review in this issue. I actually bought this one at their recent gig in Bideford.

One of the attractive features of this CD is that it manages to capture the feeling and obvious enjoyment which Mary puts into her songs and ballads. Whilst her banjo style is reminiscent of Shirley Collins, the unusual counter melodies which Anahata provides on cello, or his accompaniments on melodeon or anglo blend with Mary's confident delivery in a distinctive yet effective way. Her voice, powerful when required, gentle at others, has a slightly unpolished 'natural' quality ideally suited to the traditional material which she presents.

Like the Threlfall's CD, several titles may be familiar - Bonny Light Horseman, False Bride, Unquiet Grave, to name a few - but Mary has made the versions very much her own, drawing on her research into different sources of words and tunes, so that each track has something to make it stand out from a version one may have heard elsewhere. Through The Groves, the title song collected by Vaughan-Williams in South-ampton, and a close relative of the more familiar Holmfirth Anthem, is one I've known for years, but never heard elsewhere - a pity, because it's a great song, fuller than its Yorkshire cousin, and rendered well by Mary.

Anahata does not sing (not on the CD at least) but his anglo rendering of a duet concertina piece,. Springtime in Battersea, is superb believe me, it's not an easy transposition!

Mary comes from a Welsh speaking family and includes one song in Welsh, Aderyn Du. Many of her early folk song influences were from the time she lived in Manchester, but she and Anahata are now based near Cambridge. Look out for them at festivals or when they're next in Devon

HARMONICA AND FLUTE Mat Walklate

One of the independently produced albums received for review, the artist, Mat Walklate, is looking to have the CD released through an established label.

The bare title hardly does justice to what is on offer since, as the cover sleeve shows, Mat uses many different harmonicas and a range of flutes and whistles often double or multiple tracked. The uillean pipes, and accompaniment by guitar, mandola and bodhran feature on some tracks.

The content is unashamedly Irish, with a selection of traditional style reels and jigs, and the occasional polka and hornpipe. Some of the tunes amongst the eighteen tracks were composed by Mat, as well as one of the two songs featured, 'Paper and Tin'.

As a promotional recording, the CD succeeds in demonstrating the breadth of Mat's talent as a performer and composer. For commercial release it has a few rough edges which could be left to give an air of 'traditional' authenticity. or smoothed out to give a more rounded sound for 'easy listening'. To the latter end, the guitar backing in particular could be used on more tracks, a few of which come over as rather stark. In one or two medleys the change from one tune to another doesn't always gel. With regard to the songs, whilst I have no criticism of Mat's voice or rendition, I think the album would be better as a whole either as completely instrumental or with a more even balance between music and song.

There are certainly tracks which stand out; the 'Up and Away' set and the haunting slow air 'Stan' are particularly good. Overall it has a touch of 'field recording' it, which conjures up images of rural Ireland rather than Mat's Manchester home.

top when you can probably get away with neither!) Traditional songs have already stood the test of time on this account. The tune is perhaps the easier of the two attributes - a catchy, memorable melody can be a vehicle for quite banal words, whilst an unusual musical experience can at least attract the attention of the audience. Words are more difficult - you really have to listen, and this may mean perservering through an unremarkable tune & accompaniment to appreciate the sentiments and message the songwriter is trying to express.

The three albums reviewed below all feature singer/songwriter duos. All succeed in meeting both the criteria described above, but their styles are very different.

THE ARMS OF THE ENEMY Patty Vetta & Alan Franks SEA GREEN The Machine Breakers MUSIC OF TIME Mad Rush

THE ARMS OF THE ENEMY (nothing to do with military conflict!) is the third CD from Patty Vetta and Alan Franks. It does seem that that there are lots of good acts out there that don't get the lucky break into national recognition, and I am surprised that this couple are not more widely known, for this album has everything! Superb lyrics (supplied on the sleeve notes with the occasional discrepancy with the performance) carried on tunes which hold one's interest without being over-fussy or convoluted. There's quite a mixture of styles, too, from C & W, jazzy, bluesy, ragtime numbers, through mock musical hall, to the beautiful but short unaccompanied song, 'Late September'. Patty's clear, warm voice leads on most tracks, and is equally adaptable to blues or ballad. Alan, who composed all the material,

except the only instrumental, 'End of the Day' (the hymn also familiar to folkies as 'The Lakes of Colephin') leads on some memorable tracks the tongue-in-cheek 'This Love Affair of Ours' is reminiscent of some early Miles Wootton compositions, whilst 'Things Get Lonely Now' is a moving, poignant song about the reflections of an ageing ex-pat facing the end of his life. Other reflections of what has been and what might have been and personal relationships feature prominently in the subject matter, though there is much wry humour, inspired imagery and a touch of double entendre. I could easily go into detailed appreciation of many of the songs, but I'll mention just one more, 'Four Beaks in a Bar', a delightful 2 verse ditty inspired, I suppose, by sparrows sitting on telephone wires like musical notes on a stave.

Patty and Alan are supported on the CD by a whole range of musicians and instruments guitars, accordion, bass, fiddles, saxophone & drums and more. Obviously in a folk club setting, there would only be Alan's guitar, but the quality of the material and the artists would still prevail. My 'acid tests' for a CD of contemporary material, are whether I would go to see them perform live and whether I would be tempted to perform any of their material myself. I can answer both affirmatively!

At live gigs, the singer/songwriter of The Machine Breakers, Julian Pollard, gives a few words of introduction to his compositions. It would have been very useful for a few words, or, better still, the full lyrics to have been included on the CD's sleeve notes, since the bare titles of the songs would convey very little to someone unfamiliar with the group. Even the link between the title song, SEA GREEN, and a facsimile of an inscription by one of Cromwell's soldiers on a Burford church font is not at all obvious. It's therefore far more important to actually concentrate when playing the CD, in order to fully appreciate the social comment and irony inherent in the songs. There is a distinctive, earthy quality in Julian's voice which is a very effective vehicle for his material. At a less demanding level of attention, the accompaniment by Julian on guitar, and by

Simon Othen, the other half of the duo, on guitar and mandolin are intricate, but melodic and sympathetic to the lyrics. Additional backing on whistle, harmonica (very effective on the last track, What You Do In My Name), lap organ and bodhran appears on individual tracks, whilst Devon's Paul Downes gives vocal support on others

The opening and title track, *Sea Green*, has, for me, the most effective accompaniment of all, and the song tells of the personal reflections of one Anthony Sedley, one of a group of Cromwell's soldiers trapped in Burford church in 1649 after refusing to fight against the Irish. It would be interesting to see how different songwriters approached the same historical scenario.

The nature of personal relationships and destiny is a theme common to several of Julian's songs, which one could not really classify as 'folk-rock' or 'roots', though definitely 'contemporary'. It's the Machine Breakers doing their own thing - and doing it well! Look out for their live gigs on their website.

MUSIC OF TIME, the second Album from Plymouth based group Mad Rush, is an altogether more rounded production than their first CD, How Well I Remember, which itself received good reviews. Ned (guitar, bouzouki) and Denise Couch (accordion, piano, whistle & percussion) are augmented by Geoff Horne (bass) and Chris Wolfe (guitar, bouzouki, banjo), and, on some tracks by guest musicians Mike O'Connor (fiddle) and Terry Williams (mandolin). Apart from excellent traditional material (including the *Bold Dragoon* and *Canada-io*), George Harrison's *When My Guitar* Gently Weeps and Barry Gee's Tell It To Your Face, the majority of the songs are original compositions from Ned & Deni. Their subject material is mainly historical with a strong local flavour. The title track, *Music of Time*, tells of an old man reliving the turbulent wartime years when he danced on The Hoe with his love, whilst The Sabbath Day recounts the seige of Plymouth in 1643, and The Quarryman is the story of the end of a local industry.

Despite a pronounced leaning towards modal &

minor melodies, also present in their first album, there is a good variety of styles with excellent accompaniment to Deni's beautifully melodic voice and Ned's more down-to-earth delivery. The close harmony on some tracks gives added interest and a traditional 'feel' to the songs. In addition to the title track, I particularly liked the words and arrangement of *The Quarryman*, and *For A Bygone Time*', the latter about the coming of Christianity to the Celts.

Ned & Deni are residents at the Hyde Folk Club, Plymouth and are strongly involved in the Plymouth Folk Festival. Mad Rush are available as a duo, 3 or 4 piece group, and, even before this CD, have been making a strong impression on the folk scene. This CD can only further their wider appeal.

THE HEART GALLERY Hen Party WGS311CD

A few years ago I was asked to review an album by Hen Party and was immediately captivated by their style of singing: it is female a capella at its best. I was, therefore, very pleased to be asked to review The Heart Gallery, and was full of anticipation. I have not been disappointed, in fact, if anything it surpassed my expectations.

The opening track, Come From The Heart, is a perfect start, expressing the sentiments:

Sing like you don't need the money Love like you've never been hurt Dance like nobody's watching.

Throughout the album, they sing as if they mean it. The material is varied with traditional material represented by such songs as All Things Are Quite Silent, William Taylor, Greenwood Laddie, The Blacksmith and Blanche Comme La Neige, a French-Canadian song collected by Maud Karpeles. The humour of *How Do I Look?* by Claire Chapman and Chocolate Song by Martin Turner, adds a lighter note: both are sung heartily with evident enjoyment while Ray Noble's Love Is The Sweetest Thing and the music-hall song Now I 'as to call 'im Father by Ada Jones endorse their versatilty, both are delightful. Other tracks include songs written by John Warner, Bob Davenport, Rick Kemp, Walter Robinson and Richard Thompson. There is one solo item, Keep You In Peace, one of Sarah Morgan's own compositions, inspired by a traditional Celtic blessing: she sings it beautifully.

Sarah Morgan, Alison Muir and Heather Bradford have been singing together for some time and the ease with which they blend their voices is apparent. When I reviewed the first album I had not had an opportunity to see them live. Since then I have seen them several times, as well as Sarah Morgan as a solo performer. If you have not seen them, do. Meanwhile buy The Heart Gallery.

If you would like an opportunity to sing with Sarah Morgan, she will be leading workshops during Singin' Spring: a celebration of singing in Devon, to be held on 29th March, in Morchard Bishop(for details contact the Editor of What's Afoot).

Plymouth Morris Men hope to visit Tavistock's twin town, Celle in Sanony during May, and a festival in France during August.


