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Alive & Kicking in America

Julie Page tells of her group's recent visit to America, the result of a chance encounter at Dartington.

It's Sunday, 13th April, 2003, and Alive & Kicking Appalachian Clog group from Exeter are on a jet bound for the U.S.A.

Only eleven months earlier, I had been sitting in the sunshine at Dartington Cider Press Centre, keeping an eye on the instruments with Jackie, another of our dancers, when we heard American voices exclaiming over our poster advertising our Appalachian Clog dance display. We got into conversation and discovered they were with a party of sixty American dancers staying at Dartington for a course of English Renaissance Dance workshops. Two days later we met Peggy Leiby, a driving force of Fiddlekicks, an American Appalachian Clog group who dance the Green Grass Cloggers' style, most popular with Appalachian dance groups here in the U.K. Steps, ideas and, most importantly, email addresses were swapped.

... Now nearly all of our team of eight dancers, one reserve (who used to dance with us before she went to college) and four musicians are en route to Philadelphia, where we were to stay as guests of Fiddlekicks, swapping dances and steps, performing with them, and attending workshops led by Appalachian Dancer, Tom Hinds, and Cape Breton Dancer, Malke Rosenfeld.

About four hours into our flight Frances decides that we cannot let the opportunity of joining the 'mile high dance club' slip by, so I join her on a three foot square space outside the loos where we manage to perform our 'couple dance' to a hummed accompaniment - our first mid-Atlantic performance! Our spirits were still a mile high when we were met at the airport by Fiddlekicks, and whisked away to stay with our various hosts around the city.

Monday 14th April and Peggy's wonderful barn, 150 years old, freshly spring-cleaned and complete with raised wooden floor donated by an Irish dance group, was the venue for our first dance swap. Americans generally only have two weeks paid holiday a year, so only a few Fiddlekicks dancers could join us at the beginning of the week, but everything was video-taped for the absent members. We were careful only to teach our own choreographed dances, feeling rather shy about teaching Americans an English 'take' on an Appala-

chian Dance, but they loved it!

That evening both groups started to get to know each other at a 'bring a dish' supper, followed by an impromptu dance in Peggy's barn. The A&K Band loved the acoustics and the dancers were all still as high as kites just to be there - only jet lag eventually stopped us dancing!

Tuesday 15th April was our sight-seeing day. Some of our hosts drove us to New York where we crossed the Hudson on the Staten Island Ferry and toured Manhatten on an open-top bus.

Wednesday 16th April saw more step and dance swaps in Peggy's Barn, and in the evening A&K danced a short display at an English Country Dance. This is the type of dance we learn at primary school, and our hosts could not believe that we don't all dance it habitually at home. Some of their regular musicians were away, so Sue, one of our fiddle players, joined the band for the evening, to play English Country Dance for American aficionados and Appalachian Clog Music for the mad English.

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Thursday 17th April started with some huge sandwich making operations and a quick recap of dances for our reserve dancer. Louisa, as one of our team was ill. A convoy of cars then took us to the Grand Opera House, Wilmington, Delaware. We were given a guided tour of this wonderful building by Anya Ward, the Director of their School of Dance, and then allowed the use of a huge and beautiful studio where we learnt a Fiddlekicks dance, the ending of which we would dance with them at Friday's concert. After lunch we danced a forty minute display with Fiddlekicks in the studio for an audience of children from a local Montessori School, both teams accompanied by the A&K band. Eileen Walsh from Fiddlekicks gave the children a short dance workshop, followed by a question and answer session. The children were great, and some wanted to touch us as we were English!

That evening A&K gave a display at the Glenside Contra Dance. Contra is very popular in America, and is a bit like ceilidh dancing done in sets of four arranged in long lines down the hall. It is danced with a fast walk, so you are not so shattered at the end of the dance that you have to sit out the next one. Both this and the previous night's dance were 'dry' events in terms of alcohol, apparently traditional in Pennsylvania, but this didn't stop Glenside being enormously popular, and the large hall was bursting at the seams. The A&K four piece string band was invited to join a massive twenty-five piece pick-up band called SPUDS, which filled the stage and created a wonderful sound to dance to. SPUDS play together about seven times a year, so we were really lucky to hear them that night and join in the big band experience.

On Friday 18th April we all met at the Allen's Lane Art Centre for the opening workshop of the two-day Spring FeetBeat event organised by Fiddlekicks as a focus for our visit. Tom Hinds, a teacher and performer of Appalachian Clog from West Virginia, began with a masterclass for both groups. The evening saw our highlight performance at the Arts Centre concert, along with Fiddlekicks, Tom Hinds, Sharon Gouveia, who danced some inspirational Appalachian Flatfooting, and Malke Rosenfeld. Malke is a full time dancer and musician who performs and teaches traditional percussive styles, including Cape Breton, old time clogging and flatfooting. She spent two years touring with Footworks Percussive Dance Ensemble, including the London run of Riverdance - and she still only looks about twenty-one! After the concert, Tom Hinds gave the audience a 'taster' Appalachian workshop followed by a couple of square dances. A personal high spot was the A&K fan who had seen our display the night before and presented the team with

home-made orange ice-lollies after the concert. The evening was rounded off with a reception for all dancers, musicians and their friends and families, complete with a huge iced chocolate cake

Saturday 18th April and we were back at Allen's Lane Arts Centre for the second day of workshops. The bagels and cream cheese on arrival set us up for a continuation of Tom Hind's workshop, followed by a percussive dance workshop, 'drum with your feet', for all levels by Malke. After lunch Tom gave a Flatfooting workshop aimed at beginners, and we then all enjoyed Malke's Cape Breton Workshop. I say all, but Heather, our guitar player, took the opportunity to slip out and buy a fabulous new guitar, which had to sit in first class on the plane home. Heather christened it that evening at an Old Time Music session, an opportunity for the A&K musicians to jam with the locals.

Sunday 19th April and our week was up!. Some of the team took the evening flight home, while others had a few days personal holiday, and a couple stayed with Peggy, learning all they could, before the rest of flew home on Thursday.

For all of us it was a brilliant and memorable trip. We have come back with new steps, chunks of dances and music to enrich our repertoire, and lots of ideas for our day of dance workshop* on a Saturday to be arranged in the autumn. Best of all we made many new friends in Fiddlekicks, who will be joining us next Summer when we return their hospitality. Look out for them in 2004!

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WREN TRUST ADVERT (Baring-Gould Festival)

The Baring-Gould Folk Festival

Following the discovery of hundreds unpublished folk songs from Devon and Cornwall collected by Sabine Baring-Gould, the traditional and community music organisation. Wren has been busy with a programme of publishing, recording and teaching to interpret and promote the work of this important son of Devon. One of the most immediate and potent strands in this programme is the organising of live events, allowing the songs to live and breathe in just the way they did when Baring-Gould collected them.

The centrepiece of this activity is the **Baring-Gould Folk Festival and Study Break** which takes place over the Autumn half-term each year, based in the villages of Bridestowe, Bratton Clovelly and Lewdown. This short article goes behind the scenes of the festival and sketches some of the thinking and significant growth points which have led to this being it's 5th successful year.

The Background

The first Festival proper was in 1999, but its origins could be said to be one year earlier in November 1998, when Wren ran a celebration day at Lewtrenchard House to mark the re-publishing of the complete collection of songs on microfiche and the releasing of the CD Dead Maid's Land to celebrate this occasion. The aim with this CD was to polish the rough stones of songs which Sabine collected in the field and make something that would take a lot of playing in people's front rooms and car stereos. For this, we took a dozen or so of the very best musicians, mix with committed and skilful singers and involve a record label with high production standards. The result has indeed been endorsed by singers and listeners alike in just the way we hoped.

The Festival Itself

We didn't want to run another green-field site large marquee and pack 'em in type Festival; not that those aren't legitimate, useful and very enjoyable. We wanted to create something of quality in an appropriate scale to the locality. Using existing local venues and getting close to the community has always been the aim rather than imposing a festival from outside. We also move around from village to village over the weekend. This means a lot more work in terms of setting up and staffing events with volunteers, but locals tell us they like having a quality performance visit their door-step

RUMPUS ACVERT and visitors say it gives the Festival a unique feel - something which has a sense of place and belongs to where it is.

One of the very special things about the event is its smallness, cosiness and friendliness linked with quality performances. The Festival specifically reflects the work of Baring-Gould in several senses.

Strong songs

First, it has a very strong song thread reflecting the fact that over 90% of Baring-Gould's collecting centred on songs - as distinct from dance tunes. This has meant maintaining a strong thread running through the festival around the very best traditional singers of English material both locally and around the country. John Kirkpatrick, Frankie Armstrong, Tim Laycock, Chris Foster have travelled from Slightly further afield while superb singers like Vic Legg from Cornwall prove that not only is this repertoire hugely popular, it's also grounded in the area, too.

Wren then wanted to give people a chance to develop their own skills by learning from such

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experience and putting it's own considerable musical resources and experience into the mix. The basic drive for this harks right back to the critics group founded and run by Ewan MacColl and Peggy Seeger which had long been an inspiration. Paul Wilson and Marilyn Tucker co-founders wanted Wren to allow contact between singers and between teacher and pupil that basically involved us learning off each other.

This basic format of a few people listening to a performance and offering constructive criticism is still one of the most popular, life changing things about the study break - comments like "I've learned more in these 4 days than I have in 40 years" renders the tutors humble and the learners inspired. Other places do this, but we do it with song and we do it one-to-one. We aim always to have someone around to inspire and get really close to - this year's new tutor is Martin Carthy. Rumour has it that Frankie wants to come back as a student!

Small IS beautiful

Second, it links physically with the buildings and landscape that Sabine knew - we use his own family home as a venue for some festival events and pack into pubs and community halls around the area - just the kind of venues where he would have heard some of the singing. Reading accounts of Sabine's collecting he was riding on horseback from pubs to cottages with amazing energy over what for us seems quite a small geographical area.

More than this, the songs he was after - the story-songs in "the old Gregorian modes" have been developed and enjoyed an environment on just this domestic kind of scale. The Festival sells out on 120 tickets and in some ways we wish that could be even smaller, but we need to have a critical mass to run financially.

The special Saturday evening event, the largest of the whole weekend is the Feast, rather than the more common folk dance or ceilidh. We have developed this specifically to echo the old-fashioned harvest suppers where food, entertainment and sociability would mix in a heady cocktail. The event sits right because the entertainment is song-based - "party pieces" the order of the day.

Developments and Inspirations

Third, it draws on Sabine's own life as inspiration for the artists it books and the kind of programme it presents. As far as we know we were the first folk festival to book an Icelandic quartet of performers, reflecting Sabine's visit there in 1861 as a relatively young man. In 2002, a Breton woman who sings for dancing, echoes Sabine's jottings about fiddler William Andrews where he says the dancers would sometimes sing to accompany their own dancing.

This year's festival

This year's festival starts on Hallowe'en and features four musicians direct from Transylvania. The study day is bulging with black dogs, bats and the darker side of folklore. Connections and inspirations? Sabine wrote the definitive book on werewolves, taught with a pet bat on his shoulder at St. John's College, Hurstpierpoint and gave us the stunning image of Lady Howard's black dog in the song My Lady's Coach. In addition we have ballad-singer extraordinary Martin Carthy, favourite Tim Laycock and 4-part harmony stunners Regal Slip as visitors.

From small beginnings

DOWN IN A VICARAGE GARDEN

If you enjoy singing to folk songs and if you like country dancing or morris, the chances are that you are using material collected by Cecil Sharp (1859 - 1924). This year marks the centenary of Cecil Sharp's first folk song collecting in the village of Hambridge, Somerset, where he heard the vicarage gardener, John England, singing 'The Seeds of Love'.

At the time Sharp was a teacher of music in Hampstead Conservatoire in London and Ludgrove School in Hertfordshire. He had already published a book of songs for home & school use, some of which were folk songs from Baring-Gould's collecting. When he heard John England sing, Sharp was staying with his friend, the Rev. Charles Marson, vicar of Hambridge, and during the following weeks they collected a further 41 songs from in and around the village. Cecil Sharp went on to collect some 1500 songs in the county, many published in five volumes of Folk Songs From Somerset, as well as collecting many Morris dances, English sword dances and country dances.

The centenary of Cecil Sharp's first folk song collecting is being celebrated in Somerset in three ways during **August**:

From Wednesday 20th to Friday 22nd an international conference, 'English Folk Song - Cecil Sharp in Context' for folklorists and folk song enthusiasts is to be held at Dillington House, near Ilminster, under the directorship of Eddie Upton and Derek Schofield. (Cost £38 per day, £90 for 3 days, non-residential).

On Saturday 23rd and Sunday 24th a Community Festival will take place in Hambridge village, with workshops, performances, concerts, exhibitions and a community play. The line-up of artists includes Waterson-Carthy, Dr. Faustus, New Scorpion Band, John Kirkpatrick, Gina Le Faux, Shirley Collins, Eddie Upton, The Stanchester Choir & many others. (Cost £25 for the weekend or pay as you go per concert).



On Thursday 21st a new book 'Still Growing: English Traditional Songs and Singers from the Cecil Sharp Collection' will be launched at the conference. Published by EFDSS in association with Folk South West, the book will include 50 songs from Sharp's collection, edited, set and annotated by Eddie Upton & Steve Roud, images from his photographs and papers co-ordinated by Malcom Taylor, an authoritative essay on the man himself from Vic Gammon , and biographical notes on the singers, compiled by Bob & Jacqueline Patten. UP AT THE CONNAUGHT GARDENS

With the Sidmouth Festival just upon us again, Aileen Wills asks how many readers recall its beginning nearly 50 years ago.

The EFDSS was looking for a new venue to replace the long running festival at Stratford upon Avon. At a staff conference, Sidmouth was suggested. At that time local bands were playing in the Connaught Gardens every Friday evening during the summer season and dancers from the Salcombe Regis Group and the Sid Valley Square Eights led holidaymakers in a couple of hours dancing with various M.C.s, including Dick Witt.

So, in 1954, Margaret Grant, the South West Area Organiser for the Society, approached Sidmouth Council with a view to hosting a week long festival. They agreed, and work began. Margaret, accompanied by other staff and myself, had meetings galore and made block bookings at hotels and guest houses. In 1955 the Sidmouth Festival was born.

Dancers from all over the country applied, and if they didn't want to make their own accommodation arrangements we did it for them. Some applied as couples, some singly. We matched people up to share twin-bedded rooms - single sex only, of course, then !

They all met up at the Manor Pavilion on Sunday to be matched to a partner if they hadn't brought one. The application form gave us some details of ages and ability to help us to do this. The Festival Directors, Margaret Grant and Nibs Matthews, devised a display show and dancers were put through their paces. Any not up to scratch were found other jobs as programme sellers, collectors

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and even hobby horses! Every morning there was a practice and every afternoon, and some evenings, a display in the Connaught Gardens or on The Ham. The band was made up of invited musicians, including Wyn Humphies from Sidbury, under the leadership of Jean Forsyth. It was almost exclusively English dance, with Morris and Sword teams made up from the festival corps - men only in public in those days - and the odd song spot. There was no charge for spectators, just a collection, and the spectators were encouraged to join in general dancing at the end. When I counted the money for banking at the end of the day, it seemed a lot, but just a drop in the ocean today

And so the Sidmouth Festival continued, with the exception of 1959 and 1960 when it moved to Exmouth at the invitation of the Council. This was not a successful move, so back we went to Sidmouth, the festival getting bigger and bigger and bigger - a festival now unrecognisable from those genteel events on the sea front.

I'm sure many people with have memories of Sidmouth over the years - mine only go back to 1968, when the only camp site was opposite the old railway station, and the toilets were primitive, to say the least! But even by then the festival had changed quite significantly from what Aileen is describing. With Sidmouth's golden jubilee approaching, Derek Schofield has already begun collecting material about the early days. He can be contacted at derek@dschofield.demon.co.uk

The participatory workshops on choruses, song technique, songwriting, collecting, songs of Devon, folk on the internet and West Gallery were of high quality and well-supported, thanks to their leaders, Sarah Morgan, Jacquie & Bob Patten, Lucy Burrow, Roger Bryant, Bill Murray & Alan Weeks. The evening concert, nevertheless, was something really special; the whole audience quickly warmed to the New Scorpion Band and the hall was filled with singing from the first chorus. Those that still had a voice after the concert managed to catch the end of the singaround in the pub skittle alley, hosted by the Pennymoor singers.

Are we doing it again next year? I think we'll rest on our laurels for then but perhaps in 2005?

Singin'Spring - Children's Folk Choir

Children in Mid-Devon, aged 8(Year 3) - 11, had the opportunity to join a Children's Folk Choir which performed during the afternoon of Singin' Spring, the day of song in Morchard Bishop on Saturday, 29th March. The workshops and performance leading up to this, were sponsored by the National Foundation for Youth Music, Folk South West, South West Arts and Devon District Folk Committee. The workshops took place in the Mid Devon villages of Copplestone, Morchard Bishop and Sandford, commencing with halfa-day in each village during the February Half-Term, subsequent workshops were held after school. The sessions were led by Jacqueline Patten who has extensive experience in the Arts, including music, and of working with children and Alison Jones, a former teacher who is now working as a free-lance musician, singer and teacher

During the course of the workshops thirty children attended with twenty attending nearly all the sessions. At the last minute three of them were not able to take part in the final concert because of other family commitments. A number of parents said that SATS and music exams precluded their children participating at this time but that they would be interested at a later date, if others were held.

As well as warming to the material, the children's singing improved greatly over the weeks as they learnt and understood more about singing technique. As they gained confidence as a choir the number wanting to perform solo items increased and they also wanted to learn additional material: consequently the performance was twice as long as originally anticipated. Over the weeks, the children from all three villages mixed and formed new friendships as well as enjoyed additional time with friends from their own village. At the final performance they did exceptionally well, singing out with confidence and obvious enjoyment. The solo items were performed with enthusiasm. The audience responded very warmly and the comments afterwards were extremely encouraging. The support of the parents was important for the success of the project, as, as well as encouraging their children, they were willing to ensure that they could attend the sessions. On 29th March they obviously felt that it had all been

SPEKE OF MAYPOLE

Over the last three years, with support from Awards for All, two Exe Valley villages have been reanimating their community through a Spring Festival. This year Upton Pyne and Brampford Speke suggested hand-making their own Maypole. Wood artist James Bond was commissioned to lead workshops and Stuart Luxton volunteered a tree from his farm. A Spring Saturday saw anyone that wanted to become a maypole maker meeting early outside Brampford Church, with sensible footwear, clothing, and a picnic. By 2 pm, after due ceremony, the tree (named 'Ashley') was felled, carved into, and ready to be dragged back to the village.

James provided training with his hand-tools, he is insured to work them with up to 8 people at any one time. It was a day to remember. Hauling a 22ft pole back demanded a bit of adult teamwork. Interestingly, it was mainly the girls from the villages' school who became involved, and their parents helped, flexing their muscles for the afternoon shift.

On a very blustery Saturday May 3rd, the Pole was painted and crowned with a decoration of hawthorn blossom and ribbons, a hole was dug, the children were asked to make a wish and drop a stone for the pole to stand on. A rope was fastened through one end, and with lots of muscle, shouts and energy it was hauled upright and held firm while soil was compacted around the base.

Members of the Devon Folk Committee have been wonderfully supportive, teaching and encouraging the joys and skills of dance in the village primary school. Accompanied by gusts of chill windy weather and warm feelings of delight, this new and beautiful Maypole was justly celebrated. The dances were perfect, despite apprehension on all sides. Alan Luxton had cleared the pasture of cow-pats (no slip ups), the rain held off. The wind demanded that the ribbons be held tightly, and the children did their stuff so well that some of the adults were prepared to have a go and dance. Carol Griffiths, who had worked with great energy within the school, managed to instruct an unfit bunch of not-so-young adults into a whirling (and puffing) approximation of a dance. The day rounded off with a Ceilidh and barbecue in the Village Hall.

Following an old tradition, the Maypole, will be used to celebrate community events throughout the year in both villages, not just Maytide festivities, and the intention is that gradually more dances will be learned (very energetic exercise) and not just by the very young.

Stuart Luxton remarked on the fun involved in creating "community events, where people get together and do something a bit silly." Andrea Foxwell, a local cultural performance artist, has made use of the group opportunities available by Lottery Arts funding, to bring to life unusual projects that contribute

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gradually to the collective memory and heart of the community.

PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT

There is more than a degree of uncertainty over the outcome of the controversial new Licensing Bill before Parliament. With a number of sensible amendments in the Lords being overturned in the Commons political ping-pong is possible, or with the current parliamentary session fast drawing to a close, the whole Bill could fall by the wayside. This would be a pity, since the Bill actually has the potential to scrap the current nonsensical "Two-in-a-Bar" law; all we ask is that our traditional right to sing and dance is not smothered by petty or punitive bureaucracy. PUBLIC LIABILITY ARE YOU **INSURED?**

Brian Chappell describes the recent changes for EFDSS members & affiliated clubs.

Until 1st April this year affiliation to EFDSS had given many individuals and organisations a measure of security so far as Public Liability Insurance is concerned because the level of cover provided met requirements. However since that date things have changed in as much that not only has the Idemnity Limit been reduced from £5m to £2m, the only events covered by the EFDSS scheme are now subjected to a maximum attendance of 50.

Given that many local authorities still require £5m worth of cover and many events attract more than 50 people, organisations must now apply for extended cover at an additional cost. Also, individuals will have to apply for extended cover, especially if acting as MC at events arranged by organisations not affiliated to the Society. If extended cover is required application should be made to the Musicians Insurance Services at 312 High Street, Harlington, Middx. UB3 5BT. (0845 345 7529).

EFDSS maintain that as a consequence of a dramatic rise in Public Liability Insurance premiums, the cost to the Society of providing the same level of cover this year, as in the past, would mean them paying a vastly increased premium, a premium that could cause the Society to make a large loss and resulting in a substantial rise in membership fees.

Committee members have only recently learnt of the changes to the level of cover now to be provided and have raised the issue of the attendance limitation with the Musicians Insurance Services with a view to increasing the figure to at least 120. It is understood that negotiations are in hand but until anything further is known the revised Public Liability Insurance, as now provided by EFDSS, may no longer meet your needs.

'UPPARDS !' NORTH COUNTRY MONOLOGUES John Cocking Veteran VT 143CD

To many people, the name John Cocking may not necessarily mean anything but John is not a stranger to the South West having performed as a duo with Will Noble at Sidmouth and Dartmouth festivals in 1995 and 1999.

John was born in Marsden, near Huddersfield in the South Pennines sixty-five years ago and has lived there all his life. His first introduction to the folk scene came in 1983, when he and other local singers, Will Noble, Barry Bridgewater and Ernest Yates, were invited as the 'Holme Valley Tradition' to sing at the Holmfirth Festival.

This is John's first solo recording and there are a total of fifteen monologues on the CD, which are all north country focused. It is the north country aspect of the monologues which, with John's appealing South Pennine accent, makes, for me, the whole recording a pleasure to listen to. Come to think of it, that's probably the very reason that Colin asked me to review the CD.

Of the fifteen tracks there are monologues written by Marriott Edgar (of Sam Small and Albert Ramsbottom fame,) Kevin Collier, Elsie Houghton and William Beaumont. I personally like Kevin Collier's writing - an Otley lad - and in particular his monologue 'Grandma.' It is very much a monologue of more recent times and one which I'm sure many of us can relate to in some way or another. Though having stated my preference for 'Grandma,' could Peter Brough and Archie Andrews be the butt of Kevin's humour with the track 'Trooper?' ' In all instances the recording is in front of a live audience, which gives further colour to John's well executed presentation.

We all remember those evenings at whichever

folk club. Three to four hours of unrequited love, death by umpteen means, the exploitation of one group by another and not to forget the destruction of the environment, etc. You arrive home and can't decide between a cup of cocoa or an overdose. Well, this recording by John is the perfect antidote. Stick it in the player, opt for the cup of cocoa and have a good laugh.

From beginning to end, the CD is delightfully entertaining. It has been produced by Simon Ritchie and John Howson, whose involvement in the recording is a recommendation in itself.

KEEP DANCING EFDSS in collaboration with HertfordshireFolk Association

In these days of national curriculum, SATs, league tables, performance management and inspections it is often hard to find the time in school to simply have fun. This CD offers the wherewithal for those times when the QCA documents fail to inspire!

I know from experience how hard it is to find appropriate music to fit the faded dance notation that is begrudgingly passed down from one retiring teacher to another who is nearing exhaustion - so this latest offering from EFDSS is a real find. It's a CD for a start and therefore fits the sound system in school, no need to go rummaging around for the old tape recorder and amplifier. The notation is clear and concise without too much jargon to confuse those who are unfamiliar with folk dancing and it is simple to follow so that you can 'call' it while the music is playing. How lovely to see notation for maypole figures too.

I particularly liked track 6 - *Moonstruck* - as it got the children's feet tapping giving them an incentive to learn the dance. Clapping games are still an integral part of playground behaviour and I found several children teaching the clapping sequences of this and other dances to their friends at lunchtime in the playground - much to the delight of the dinner ladies! Track 7 - *Muffin Man* - appealed to the younger children (KS1) and they also learned the song. The dance was simple enough for them to learn as well. The variety of steps included in the dances was challenging too; stepping, marching, stephop, jig, reel etc. I'm glad the notation explained them.

If this CD isn't used for learning dances then it is still very easy on the ear. There are a variety of tunes, tempo and instruments. I particularly liked the use of whistle as this is something the

children can learn to join in with. The bands do not sound dated but lively and modern, especially with the use of percussion, which appealed to the children I played it to. Many of the tunes are very familiar and I found it useful to see the names of the tunes included on the cover notes; very handy for musicians learning to play tunes for themselves. Having the duration of the music enables forward planning in a teaching situation and they are all quite short (no time for boredom to set in); not so sure about the metronome speed but I'm sure someone must find this invaluable.

My only criticism is a very superficial one - the cover is boring! It strikes me as the sort of thing teachers are supposed to find 'politically correct'. It certainly doesn't represent me or the children I teach, or our lives and I certainly wouldn't have picked this from a catalogue or even off the shelf. If any of the children had seen it I fear it would have turned them off the whole idea of reviewing a CD. Why does folk dancing have to 'look' so old fashioned I wonder.

CATCH ME IF YOU CAN Songs from Cornish Travellers VT119CD

I've known my old friend Vic Legg for many years and I have often wondered upon the source of his many great songs. Well, I can tell you now that quite a few came from the singers featuring on this latest Veteran CD or to put it another way, from his very own family. Songs, some of which have been passed down through generations of travelling people as a living tradition have been included and then there are also less ancient items that the family have added to their repertoire in more recent times.

Betsy Renals, Charlotte Renals and Sophie Legg were recorded by Pete Coe in 1978 when respectively, they were 78, 77 and 60 years old. Many of the 28 tracks have appeared previously on Veteran cassettes but according to the notes, there are seven that have never previously been released.

Gipsy songs sung without musical instruments are not everyone's cup of tea but no one could deny that the singers put their hearts into each of their songs and the clarity of the words was the first thing that struck me. The ladies voices are less harsh than some of the Gipsy singers that I have heard in the past - more front room than campfire and it makes for pleasant listening. They sing each song individually without any harmonies or unnecessary embellishments, a tradition must have protected the quality of the tunes and as the CD progresses the individual characteristics of the singer's voices become apparent.

The ladies are a part of the Orchard family so well known in our area and it was no surprise to me to find that some of the lengthy family ballads had been included on the CD. The responsibility of singing the ancient ballads, such as The Farmer from Leicester, The Dark Eyed Sailor and a version of The Outlandish Knight, has been entrusted to Charlotte. The more recent songs that include the Bonny Bunch of Roses, Van Diemans Land and Sophie's version of Jim the Carter Lad (not sung to the usual tune), have been shared almost equally between the three singers as have the music hall ditties with Betsy singing Just Beginning to Sprout and Charlotte singing Oh Where, Oh Where has My Little dog Gone?

If you are interested in the songs of the travelling people and especially those of South West England, then you should buy this CD. The production is excellent when you consider that the recordings were made in 1978 and the accompanying booklet of notes, compiled by Pete Coe and Mike Yates is of great interest.

AN EVENING WITH OLD HARRY

Recorded live at Horsham Folk club December 2002 by Dick Streeter and edited and mastered by Harry's son William Mousdell. Old Harry was apparantly unaware that this recording was being made!

Who is Old Harry? Well, ask any folk singer or dancer in almost any part of Sussex and they will know him. He has been around Sussex since 1958 and has been calling for dances and singing in folk clubs and pubs ever since. He has also danced the Morris with Chanctonbury Ring Morris and the Broadwood Morris men. A keen cyclist and walker he has toured the world since retiring some years ago. Well what of the record? No sanitized recording is this. It is a gutsy warts and all recording at Horsham folk club. Harry belts out his songs in an unso-phisticated manner, tells anecdotes, dances his jig doll and even calls a dance to create a delightful atmosphere at the club. It is (and I am being controversial here) perhaps what folk music is really about. I love these varied

evenings, a scratch band, good songs and plenty of rapport with the "audience". Plenty of tradition here too with mention of old singers like George Belton and Hary Holman. Thanks Harry I enjoyed this

THERE'S A CLEAR CRYSTAL FOUNTAIN Songs from Southern England" Gwilym Davies Forest Tracks FTCD 205 www.forest-tracks.co.uk

Gwilym Davies is one of the tireless band of people without whom the rest of us who sing and love traditional English song would have poor fare indeed. By collecting from singers who would otherwise leave no record of their songs and variations they enrich the whole folk community. This CD contains 20 songs Gwilym has gathered from singers in the South of England and I would argue makes Gwilym himself an important "source" singer for future generations. He sings the songs straightforwardly without any audible processing to the voice, some unaccompanied, some with melodeon (there are a couple of tunes in this selection). If you like your music arranged and your taste is more Artisan or Steeleye Span this simple production may not be for you. If you are a singer wanting unusual material or a lover of traditional song then do not pass this by - there are some real gems here.

I find it takes time to "tune in" to a singer's voice, especially for the first time, and really the only criticism I would make is the choice of the first track - Fathom the Bowl from which the title is taken. This variation differs in words and tune from the well known version you will hear at every singaround, but only in a few places, and I found it unsettling while I was acclimatising myself to Gwilym's delivery. Indeed, if I just picked this CD up and started it playing I might not have got past this first track, and then I would have missed such delights as the gentle innuendo of Shooting Gallery, the insight into harvesting in All amongst the Barley or the licentious Ledbury Clergyman. My favourite is the second track Box on her Head, a lovely full story of the girl outwitting the Highwayman and getting herself a husband by her marksmanship.

Many of the songs will be familiar but these were passed onto Gwilym with all their odd twists and turns of phrase preserved so they ring so much more true than the usual versions found in song books. *The Fox* here contents himself with a brown duck while the *Three Men went a-Hunting* discuss haystacks, hedgehogs, donkeys, cowpats and a black pig. This is an interesting selection of songs, a great resource and a valuable contribution to our folk heritage from someone who has spent years enjoying the company of vernacular singers in the South of England

This is an own produced CD (recorded at the Arial Music Centre) by a singer/songwriter with a guitar. As such it joins thousands of other similar offerings -so what is it that makes this recording so special? And believe me, I do think this is quite special. It's quite hard to put your finger on why, perhaps it's because the songs are about real things and gives us glimpses into Richard's life (which appears to have been more interesting than most of ours). Perhaps it's because some of the songs address real concerns and issues, but always with a nice twist of wry ironic humour. Perhaps it's the tunes and arrangements, which have a freshness and drive that set them apart from most in this genre. Paul Carpenter on guitar and Bill Harvey on fiddle complement Richard's guitar accompaniments and add greater dimension to the songs. I love the driving arpeggios on Travelling in Disguise; the tropical sensual rhythm of Market Street with sultry fiddle or the laid-back feel of Other People's Houses.

There are too many little insights to list here,

mean you don't miss a word. Lines like "Sitting in a bar reading the stars in the eyes of the European section as well! clientele" opening Refugees or "If I were the book upon your shelf - you could read between my lines all by yourself" which starts *Saltwind*.

TEMPLE RECORDS - A 25 YEAR LEGACY THE BEST OF THE BATTLEFIELD BAND 1977 - 2001

Temple Records COMD2091 double CD

As well as being a writer, musician and collector, Robin Morton was a founder member of Boys of the Lough, is proprietor of Temple Records and has been manager of the Battlefield Band since 1980.

The Temple Legacy CD is a compilation of 25 tracks from 25 CDs and features some of the best Scottish songs and tunes available. The songs are sung in English and Gaelic, while the instruments played include pipes, fiddles and harps as well as more familiar contemporary instruments. Robin Morton founded Temple Records to bring the best of Scottish music to a wider audience at a time when even some of the specialist labels demurred at the prospect of albums devoted to a solo instrument. Alison Kinnaird, his wife, is a harpist who has a track on the album.

The Battlefield Band has just one track on the Legacy CD, but the other CD is devoted to them. Compared with the diversity of the Legacy CD, the sense of continuity on the Battlefield Band CD is striking: Alan Reid, Brian McNeill and Robin Morton, have been with the band for the full time 25 years, while other personnel have come and gone: seventeen present and past members have their photos in the sleeve notes. Not only have the Battlefield Band been producing great music for 25 years, but they have also been a developing ground for numerous other groups and solo artists.

With such a wealth of talent it is impossible to select favourite tracks as they change depending on the time of day. This double sampler is such excellent value musically and will bring many hours of pleasure once you have invested in it.
