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Editorial

Have you looked at the back page? What does it mean to you? Whilst this marvellous building on the edge of the Quantocks will be familiar to many of us, especially dancers, of the older generation, I wonder how widely its existence and purpose is known to the broader folk fraternity. Indeed, it has sometimes been described as the West Country's best kept secret.

Why should it concern us, especially as it's not even in Devon (though conveniently close!). I won't go into its history here, but even before I enjoyed frenetic Morris weekends there with Roy Dommett back in the late sixties, it has been a residential centre for folk activities, and still hosts a regular dance club and song sessions, and is the home of the West Somerset Morris Men.

Buildings, especially large, old ones, however, cost money to maintain, let alone any staffing costs, and there is debate about the best way to secure the Manor's future. There are those who would wish to rely on its unique appeal to its traditional folk clientele, whilst others seek a wider market for its facilities and serene location. Either way, in these times, it is a case of 'use it or lose it'. If it's hitherto unfamiliar to you, find out how you could use it. Better still, visit it, if you want to be impressed by its potential.

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Listen, I'll tell you a story

Jenny Moon has a tale to tell ...

Say just that - say 'Listen, I'll tell you a story', and people settle into listening. Say 'Once upon a time...', and those of us who were lucky are back, our minds tucked into a comfort place with the ubiquity of imagination ready to take off alongside the unfolding story. Of course, story-telling is everywhere - it is spread out like butter on bread to mimic lives in soaps, packaged in book, play and film - and it is told by one to another by the water cooler on the fifth floor, in the supermarket queue and over the dinner table. Our lives are made up of stories. We make up stories to excite our futures ('Just suppose I was to...'), to account for our pasts ('Well, I had to - because...') and to entertain others about our present ('Do you know, yesterday, I was...'). Stories are not just for children.

What is a storytelling event? It is just that - a storyteller tells a story. There is likely to be the generation of a special kind of atmosphere. There are sometimes rituals in which the teller may engage, such a chime to indicate the beginning and end of a story, a ring of candles...musical instruments or the contribution of a musician. Or the storyteller may depend entirely on the story itself. Some storytellers mime and act in the telling and use props and others just tell....

Storytellers do not read the stories. Text is fixed to the page while the oral teller can interpret and change emphases, and shape and modify a story. They do not learn stories word-for-word either. Their stories are then free to change in the telling of them so there is intrinsic value of learning stories from other tellers because it means that the tradition of story evolves, sometimes in relation to the social conditions in which story is told. On the whole, most storytellers do not tell their own stories either but I will come back to that later. So where do stories come from? Really traditional storytellers would say that they will only use stories that they have learnt from other oral storytellings. Many of us are not so purist. I am happy to rely initially on written literature. Seeking out stories for potential telling is an interesting pursuit. For a start, there may be seasonal issues like Winter story for Winter and so on. Then there may be an age range to take into account - and a situation. The story to be told in a pub will be a different one from the one to be told in a dedicated storytelling event. The choice of story is an individual matter for the teller. She stamps her mark on every choice of story that she makes. For

me the act of choice has something to do with the potential visual imagery of a story because that is what the teller hopes to generate in the listener. There is also,though, a quality of magic in the stories I choose and it is something between me and the story - and magic of that kind cannot be displayed in printed words on a page..... It has to come out in the listening.

Having said that, the magic can sometimes be in the ability of the original writer of the story. I told stories at a National Trust event at Corfe Castle earlier in the year, and they had to be Enid Blyton's own stories. There was not choice. I worked hard to find the 'right' story, but it worked. My part in the process was a selection of what to emphasise in the story.

So what is so special about oral storytelling? In listening to a story told to me, there is something special about my own passivity in being entertained by an oral story. I do not have to respond, I do not have to agree or disagree. I do not have to react. I also do not have to make effort to read. I do not, of

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course, have the images of the story served up to me may well be in the tape recorder and not the on the plate as in a film or play so, to make full pen. sense of the story, I have to supply the pictures - but I am totally free to supply whatever pictures I like. I can wander in imagination, using the bare bones of the story to guide and hint at directions. However, because I am not making efforts in other ways, I can appreciate the rhythms of language of the story and the teller. I can respond to tension in her voice, or excitement or I can drift with the flow of narrative. I notice that there are often closed eyes in a storytelling audience. They are not asleep, but watching and listening to the show inside their heads.

And you might ask - as many do - how a storyteller remembers a story. I answer with a story. I dabble with the writing of stories on occasions. There was a story that I thought I would tell orally. I had more difficulty learning that story than any other because as the writer, I had focussed on the language of the story and I could not successfully remember it by learning the words. When I 'learn' a story that I have not written, my focus is on the images on which the story is based - with sometimes a few special phrases that are particularly significant. It seems that writing a story and remembering it for oral telling are very different processes. I am still pondering on how to 'record' a story that I have made up for the purpose of telling it orally. The answer

Another way of remembering stories is to tell them often. Storytellers tend to find it helpful to meet in groups and tell stories to each other to try them out and to play with them. I am looking for others to develop such a group in East Devon area (I live near Exmouth). I am not necessarily looking for established storytellers. I am quite new to it myself, but I seek others who are interested enough to learn how to work with story. There are lots of places where stories can be told - schools, libraries, community groups, in residential care homes, at parties, at folk events, during social events...on Enid Blyton daysso there could be a lot of people who would find it a useful skill to

The Bratton Carols

The "Bratton Carols" as they've become known locally have spun back into life over the past few years through a particular chain of events. This short account is only the story so far, since more information on this particular carol collection is coming to light through church and folk song contacts as they circulate.

In the early 1990's a tape recording made many years ago - a guess would suggest 1960's from various bits of circumstantial evidence - was given to Wren by Barbara Cubbin of Bratton Clovelly. This proved to be the starting point for a new and vigorous life for these wonderful pieces. The tape was of a local band of men singing 5 carols in unaccompanied harmony and this proved a good strong reference point for style, pacing, and general interpretation.

It was a team of listeners - Jon Heslop. Paul Kemeny, Marilyn Tucker and Kathy Wallis who transcribed the words into useful, readable texts. It fell to me to unravel and transcribe the vocal parts into singable scores.

As part of Wren's traditional music development programme, we then invited a group of singers attached to the church of St. Mary The Virgin in Bratton Clovelly to perform the carols. The Bratton Singers eagerly took up the challenge and all five carols have now been rehearsed, recorded, aired on TV and radio and are regularly performed live at local events.

For the recording of the carols, the adult voices of the Bratton Singers were joined by the children from Boasley Cross Primary School for one of the pieces. Harmony and Singing Style.

The tape was of male voices, echoing traditional practice worldwide where single gender groups sing either special repertoire or use a particular pitching or an arrangement to suit the voices available.

This has an important spin-off, which those of us trying to understand and re-interpret the repertoire need to take on board. One thing that gives this kind of "folk" harmony its distinctive sound is the closeness of the voices. Mixing female, male and children's voices to include everyone in the village who wanted to sing therefore presented a unique opportunity for the community arranger if we were going to re-create this exciting sound.

The carols traditionally had strong tune singers in the middle, with typically a rough, ready, steady bass line underneath and a higher voice decorating and filling the harmonies above. I took this broad approach with re-scoring the carols, but paying really close attention to the compass of voices available and the pitching of the final version, so that the pieces sat easily in the range of those people who presented for singing. The resultant sound on the CD outstripped my expectations and still provides a strong and at times thrilling listen.

The Story Continues

Having produced the CD and broadcast on TV, several things have now happened to broaden the scope of the job in hand and continue the rise in popularity of these pieces.

Requests for the parts and scores have been such that Wren is currently engaged in producing these this Autumn to go exactly alongside the existing CD.

A further 12 carols have now emerged. Thanks go to Vic Legg for helping with the discovery of these. Researcher Bob Patten had already made a friendly wager that there were more than 5 carols in the collection since this would be very unusual.

Responses from the TV shows have revealed that these carols were sung around Kilkhampton, North Cornwall as well as having the strong link with Bratton Clovelly, so some visits up in that area are now planned.

The Bratton Singers have now joined with Red Spider Singers and become The Packhorse Singers under their leader Paul Kemeny. They now have members from as far afield as Northlew, Lewdown and Launceston!

Perhaps a fuller story and the rest of the Carols might emerge for public reading, singing and listening at some stage. Perhaps a fuller, more academic linking of these versions to others known nationally could be written up.

In the end, the great thing about these pieces is that the tape existed, presumably containing the five most popular, or most singable, carols from the larger collection.

The object of the exercise being to learn more (and thus preserve more) traditional English tunes to be played at sessions or ceilidhs.

As you are probably aware, there is a distinct lack of English music sessions, so we decided to create one. We thought that it would be nice to have a session specifically for English tunes. Dick Davey ... appreciations

Aileen Wills writes:

It is with great sadness we report the death of Dick Davey, a true supporter of everything folk for most of his adult life. Dick joined the folk circle with his friend, Dick Witt, in the late 1940's. He was a founder member of the Exeter Morris Men in 1951, and soon after took them into the Morris Ring. He served as Bagman and Squire of Exeter Morris Men over the years.

Dick was born in Newton Abbot, where his father was on the staff of the Great Western Railway. He was educated at Hele's School, Exeter. As a forester he had a reserved occupation during the Second World War, but towards the end he served two years in the Royal Navy.

Soon after my involvement with the EFDSS in 1951, Dick became part of my folk life too. He took part in community dance almost the length and breadth of the country, as well as travelling with the Morris Men to Ring meetings, festivals, etc. at home and abroad. He was a folk singer, a member of our Devon Folk Team, a member of the Devon County Club (now the Devon Playford Club), where he danced with his second wife, Ebie, and a valuable member of the Devon District Committee from 1953 to 1980.

Dick, with the children of Sidbury School, helped revive the Sidmouth Mummers Play, and with the Exeter Morris Men playing parts, he took the play to Cecil Sharp House in 1953 to represent Devon at the National Gathering, following the AGM. He also danced at the Royal Albert Hall in the massed teams from the counties.

During the 1950's and 60's Dick had a 10-seater

With his first wife, Jeanne and children Susan and Michael, we all shared many years of folk and non-folk activities. Whit Monday Morris Tours were always a special family day out.

Dick owned a forestry business and, being a country boy, was always keen to share his knowledge of trees, flora and edible fungi with us. He could always spare a Christmas tree from his plantation for his friends.

So much of Dick's life revolved around the Morris, and it was fitting that so many of his Morris friends, including the Martlets from Sussex, danced at his funeral and carried his coffin. The church was packed as the folk world gathered to remember Dick with affection.

Colin Andrews writes:

To me, Dick Davey was synonymous with the Exeter Morris Men. Even before I came to Devon in 1973, his was the familiar figure of the Exeter Men at Ring meetings, and his warm and generous nature was ever present in my past thirty years with the side.

His rendition of 'When I Come on a Monday" and other favourites from his repertoire enlivened many a pub session after dancing. On the nearest Thursday to his birthday, he invariably organised a spread of food for the Morrismen at whichever pub we were dancing

In the last few years, he had been unable to dance, and was too short of breath to sing, but nevertheless he would still come along from time to time, to winter practice sessions, and would not willingly miss a summer's evening when the Exeter Men were dancing out, accompanied by his wife Ebie, and often his grandchildren, Madelaine & Rosie with their parents Mike & Geraldine. It seems very poignant that his son, Mike, is the current Squire of the Exeter Morris Men.

Dick was out with us right up until the end of this last summer's dancing season. He'll always be with us in spirit.

IVFDF - It's back!

The original and longest running festival returns to the South West again in 2004 - IVFDF is back! It started in 1951 as a gathering of the university folk dance display groups, but has now expanded into a whole weekend festival that is now open to the general public. As we approach the 54th festival, the look and feel of the festival is almost unrecognizable from its early beginnings. The festival now starts on Friday evening and goes on to Sunday afternoon. Instead of one ceilidh we now have six; workshops fill the mornings and Morris tours and concerts have been added. However, tradition is not totally lost, since the original focus of IVFDF, the display slot on Saturday afternoon, is still there. Throughout all the changes and its 54 years, the ethos of the festival has however remained the same, providing access to a wide range of dance styles in a friendly and fun atmosphere.

Organised by a different university, and therefore committee, every year, IVFDF always takes on the local flavour of the host university. Most major universities have hosted IVFDF, most recently Glasgow, Cambridge, St. Andrews, and Sheffield.

Exeter University first attended in 1958, and first hosted the festival in 1967. There was then a long gap before hosting it again in 1989, 1995, 1999 and now 2004. Exeter University is now one of the main folk universities, providing access to a wide range of events both inside and outside the university. The type of festival Exeter puts on evidences the enthusiasm and range of interests of the Exeter University folkies. Lively, eclectic, and innovative it will be.

The 2004 committee have continued the development of IVFDF by booking some of the best artists around. Concerts from Jiggerypipery and the up and coming Jim Moray, will complement ceilidhs from The Committee Band, The Bismarcks and Pigs Might Fly. Those who like it contra style must beat a path to the contra ceilidh with Fiddling Around, while Scottish dancers can dance to the great sounds of Green Ginger. The weekend will be rounded off in traditional style with the DIY ceilidh, led this year by The Gloworms. Workshops are not neglected either, with dance workshops covering everything from Jive to Irish Step and Belly Dancing to Morris, whilst experts such as Brian Stone will be leading the music workshops. In all there will be 40 workshops, with something for just about every taste.

The festival has never been set up to make a profit,

SHARP PRACTICE

Mary Humphreys & Anahata WGS312 CD

Ever since I heard Mary & Anahata live at Bideford Folk Club and reviewed their first CD (Through The Groves) earlier this year, I have been looking forward to their new release on the WildGoose label.

There is nothing fancy or affected in Mary's style of singing, but she manages to convey her love of these traditional songs with a warmth and passion all too rarely seen amongst guest artists in folk clubs today. She has a knack of finding interesting variants of familiar songs - the opening track, The Mermaid, being one such; a delightful minor tune and a happy ending that contrasts to the lively chorus version in which everyone drowns! The Carrion Crow, collected by Cecil Sharp, is also not the most common version. The accompaniments to the songs - on banjo from Mary and with cello, anglo concertina or melodeon from Anahata - are all well thought out - sympathetic and appropriate, enhancing the song, rather than distracting one's attention. Listen to Barb'ry Ellen or When Fishes Fly (one of my favourites on this album) and the cello adds poignancy and incredible atmosphere.

Their first CD included a couple of instrumental tracks, but this album has an even split between songs and tunes, several tracks pairing the two - Young Banker, for example, leads naturally into a Dave Wallace tune, Rosie. Mary joins Anahata in various instrumentals on English concertina or keyboard. The Marmalade and Jenny Bell Polkas are great foot-tapping tunes, and the technically more tricky tunes, Dunmow Galumph & Danbury Hill are inspiring (I don't think I'll get my fingers around them for quite a while !).

I could enthuse at length on practically every track, from Child ballad (Sheath & Knife) to musical hall style, double-tracked Faithful Sailor Boy, or the other instrumentals. This album, for me, presents songs as they should be sung, and tunes as they should be played. I've only one criticism - a standard length album is not enough to satisfy my desire for more of each! Hopefully WildGoose will release another before too long.

CHANGELING Crucible

WGS315 CD

I'd not come across **Crucibl**e before I received this CD for review, but this is one of the most pleasant surprises which have come my way in this capacity over the years.

Crucible hail from Sheffield (haven't they got a theatre there?) and all four members also play with well-known ceilidh bands from the north - Gavin Davenport, Richard & Jess Arrowsmith with Hekety, and Helena Reynolds with Jabadaw. Obviously, then, one would expect a high degree of instrumentation, and there are several such tracks, all enjoyable, with melodeon & anglo from Richard, guitar from Gavin, and fiddles from the females, Helena also playing border pipes.

There're some contemporary tunes, such as the *Engagement Set*, from Simon Heywood, and a good selection of traditional material, with a morris flavour in *From Night to Morn* and the tricky (to dance & play) *Sherborne Jig* and *Queens Delight*. A Morris influence also creeps in the accompaniment to the opening song, *Bold Poachers* and in *Poor Man's Labour*

Whilst the instrumentals are very good, the songs, mostly traditional are excellent, and the material very varied. The Harvest song, in four part harmony is very similar to an early Watersons rendering, Yield Yield Ye Mighty to the Lord (composed by Simon Heywood) together with Evening Hymn would grace any West Gallery. Changeling's Lullaby, with haunting words by Gavin and tune by Jess, is sung by her unaccompanied in the manner of a Child ballad. The Devil & The Farmer's Wife is indeed re-worked from a Child ballad, and here the lead singer (Jess, I think) has a voice reminiscent of Maddy Prior in her pre-electric days.

With such a wide variety of material & styles this album could have ended up a something of a dog's dinner. It's actually quite a sumptuous feast, due to the considerable talent of the four artistes. When they're not doing gigs with their bands, look out for them as Crucible at folk clubs & festivals.

When first given the CD to review I was immediately struck by the delightful sleeve design by Bryan Ledgard. It consists of the blending of various nautical images, with a photograph of Cyril's grandfather, Steven Tawney, superimposed over them. Very tastefully designed, both appealing and evocative and I suspect very personal to Cyril.

As one might safely deduce from the title of the CD, Nautical Tawney, all of the fifteen tracks are seafaring related. The CD is a compilation of previous recordings made by Cyril, taken from his own Neptune label and spanning a period back to the mid-1980's. And at that point I wish to complement Oliver Knight for the excellent re-mastering of all the tracks.

It is often the case with re-mastered recordings made over such a period of time, that somehow the continuity is suspect, the recording does not gel as a whole, etc. But that most certainly is not the case with this CD. All the of the tracks are of the same consistent high standard and it is impossible to discern that the CD is anything other than from the one original recording.

Of the 15 tracks, 7 are unaccompanied and it is Cyril's rendition of those 7 unaccompanied songs that role to the full. which I personally, particularly appreciate. I consider Cyril's singing of Short Jacket and White Trousers, The Fireship, The Female Cabin Boy and Fare Thee Well My Dearest Dear, to be exemplary of unaccompanied singing.

Like many readers of this magazine, I have enjoyed during the past summer a number of Folk concerts and festivals. apparent. As well as Yvette Staelens and Michelle Hicks, the current duo, former members Abbie Lathe, Nigel Pope and Mitch Norman appear. The sleeve notes give the background to the history and evolution of the group and how they have managed to never quite become a quartet.

Over half of the songs are traditional, arranged by different members of the band, often collectively. The others are by a number of contemporary writers. The arrangements focus on the harmonies that create that unique sound, some unaccompanied, some with instrumental backing on guitar, whistle, recorder, lute and bodhran. The first track It's So Cruel, a song by Abbie Lathe, appropriately sees life from a female perspective as do many songs they choose to sing. It is neither upbeat such as P is for Paddy nor sombre as the final track Auchendoon and Chile and sets the tone perfectly. Others that deserve a special mention are Lady Franklin's Lament, Oxford City, Gospel Blues, Outlaws of England by D Vermont, and one that is a favourite when they perform, My Husband's Got No Courage.

If you have enjoyed their other CDs or seen them performing then you will enjoy this album. Prehistory is no relic from an earlier age but a fine example of traditional music of today. It is highly recommended.

THE GOWER NIGHTINGALE:

Ballads, songs and mouth music from South Glamorgan recorded in the 1930s & 40s Phil Tanner VeteranVT145CD

This CD is a tribute to one of the finest traditional singers of the twentieth century, Phil Tanner. With an introduction by Wynford Vaughan Thomas taken from the programme Amiable Eccentrics which was broadcast on Radio 4 in 1976, to put the singer and the recordings into context, it evokes a time when life was at a gentler pace, expectations were simpler and many of the comforts of contemporary life were beyond imagination. Phil Tanner, the "Gower Nightingale" died in 1950 aged 88.

This album is a compilation of recordings from the Columbia recordings initiated by the folk song collector Maud Karpeles under the auspices of The Folk Song Society in 1936, and Barn Owls Country Dance Band

recordings made by the BBC in 1937 and 1949. The latter are now part of the archive of the Museum of Welsh Life. Using recordings from different sources and two decades, there is inevitably some overlap with two sets of the Gower Reel, The Sweet Primroses and the Gower Wassail, but this enhances the CD as a documentary source.

Phil Tanner's voice is a delight. The ease with which he sings reflects the times and enchants the listener and, despite his age at the time of the recordings, his diction is clear. His voice brings together a West Country burr with a Welsh lilt: the part of the Gower Peninsula where he lived was English speaking and, like part of Pembrokeshire, was a 'little England'. With the exception of The Parson and the Clerk, this album features his traditional repertoire although he also sang popular and comic songs. Among the songs are Young Henry Martin, Barbara Allen, Bonny Bunch of Roses, Fair Phoebe and the Dark Eved Sailor and Swansea Barracks. Technically, the recordings have come out very well.

The 48-page booklet which comes with the CD is excellent, giving details of his life, the songs and their settings and the area in which he sang. Biographical details are written by Doug Fraser, while Roy Palmer writes about the songs and relevant customs.

This album will help to introduce another generation of singers and listeners to the singing of another era with both the historical background and the style of singing reflecting another way of life. Many people will discover that they have been singing songs that may not have survived had it not been for Phil Tanner and the people who recorded him. Veteran has helped to ensure that they are not in danger of being lost for some time to come.

RELENTLESS Whapweasel

Since I reviewed the group's earlier CD (Skirl Naked) several issues ago, Whapweasel have become firmly established as one of the foremost up-beat ceilidh bands in the country. They've also increased their line-up to include saxophones & keyboard, to add to the driving rhythm of guitars, bass and drums and the melodeon-powered melodies of Robin Jowett.

On first playing, more or less as background music, I thought, "Yes, I like this." A second airing strongly confirmed my impression, although, paradoxically, I still hadn't latched on to any particular tracks or tunes, unlike those from some other bands who feature their own compositions. I listened more carefully to each track on the next couple of times through, and indeed there are some strong melodies, but it is the arrangements which make the most impact, with jazzy sax and a solid folk rock beat. I thought one track had an pronounced oriental flavour - not surprisingly it was called *Trip to Bombay*!

Whapweasel's reputation will have surely been enhanced by their full schedule of appearances at the 2003 Sidmouth, from children's events and informal Anchor Gardens ceilidhs through to the L.N.E. revels, and this CD will please all their fans, old and new. It's not for the purists of English traditional folk music, but it's a great album to listen to, as the band push out the boundaries of dance music for the ceilidh scene.

STILL FRETTING Rob Murch, Veteran VT146CD 2003

Rob Murch has been playing the banjo since the age of eleven taught by the late Tom Barriball of Launceston. He started performing with the Dartmoor Pixie Band as a youngster and still performs regularly with them.

This CD is a selection of 16 tracks and a great wealth of instrumental prowess. Rob is joined by Mark Bazeley (melodeon), Jason Rice (accordion), Mike Redman (second banjo), Anthony Peabody (cello banjo) and Bill Murch (mouthorgan) on a number of tracks. *The Park Crescent March* by Cyril B Burnard (track 16) is a banjo duet with Tom Barriball recorded at Tom's home and included here as a tribute to him (I loved this track).

I would recommend this CD to anyone who enjoys acoustic folk music. Even for those not normally drawn to the banjo, this will be a very pleasant surprise. There is something for everyone here: Great dance tunes, sentimental and nostalgic tunes and tunes that will quite simply astound - you won't believe a banjo can sound like this.

There are some great old favourites here that, quite frankly, had me dancing round the kitchen. Tavern in the Town / Chinese Breakdown are very jolly and upbeat. Hot Punch / The Louisberg Square and the rendition of The Bluebell Polka are really bouncy with a lovely tight bass from Mark Bazeley's melodeon. Cock of the North / Princess Margaret's Fancy / Smash the Windows / The Irish Washerwoman is a lovely set of tunes where Rob's skills are complemented by his father Bill's fabulous harmonica playing (where does he get his breath from? I bet he doesn't smoke!) On Going Down South / Oh Johnny / Winkie Reel Jason Rice provides a great trebly accordion backbone for these tunes.

On Glitter of Steel by Thomas Dorward, Schaeffer's Jig by Arling Schaeffer and Queen of the Burlesque by Arthur Tilley you will experience a banjo trio. A cello banjo is sadly something of a rarity, but here it's in perfect union with it's two smaller counterparts. Track 14 is my favourite of these three tunes. Rob uses harmonics here to great effect.

The solo tracks are a great monument to the banjo as a solo instrument, as it is all too often

confined to the rhythm section. Kissing Cup Waltz written by Joe George, is a lovely waltz, and this interpretation is dedicated to Tom Barriball, and played on the banjo made for Rob by him. Zarana, from Joe Morley, is described as an 'oriental two-step' and has a distinctly foreign feel about it. It is a very complicated piece and has been performed here to perfection (this is quite definitely my overall favourite track). Return of the Regiment by Emile Grimshaw, is a Dave plays melodeon, 5-string banjo, guitar and very nice little march with a clever inclusion of a sings and is joined by Pete Cooper on fiddle and few bars of When Johnny Comes Marching Home to add to the interest. Beat as You Go, again Emile Grimshaw, Morleytown (Joe Morley), conjures images of the Wild West (or perhaps the wild Deep South, as this track has been renamed from a deeply politically incorrect title). *Rondo* by R L Weaver, is another very difficult piece. It's hard to imagine that a banjo can sound like a harp, but here it is!

This material is a feast for string players and their devotees.

RETURN JOURNEY Dave Arthur Wild Goose WGS 313 CD

Dave Arthur will be well known to many of you This CD is very consistent, personal favourites reading this review. He has had a lifetime of playing, singing and researching English and Appalachian music and for more than twenty years he edited the English Dance and Song Magazine. The subtitle of the CD - 'Old Time ballads and tunes from the British Isles and loads of information and this adds depth to your America' pretty much says it all. 'Return Journey' appreciation of the songs and tunes, I always

is a collection of songs and tunes, most of which you will know, that have "suffered a sea-change by the time they washed up in the Appalachians". The first track sets the scene as 'Shepherd's Hey' is set against the popular American banjo/fiddle tune 'Old Molly Hare' - their common ancestry is obvious.

Chris Moreton on guitar. These are consummate musicians who play this Old Time music with that gentle sense of effortless ease that allows you to forget that they are there. You can focus on the tunes and songs and they have a life of their own without being distracted by 'showy' breaks or tricks. Yet this apparently simple approach belies the subtlety going on underneath, really listen and you will hear some superb playing and beautiful musical touches.

I have to admit that I don't listen to this style of music as a rule, but I do find Appalachian music more accessible when played by English performers, and this is certainly the case here. I have listened to this CD through and through many times (and really enjoyed it) while I'm sure the "real thing" would have only had one

If you play banjo, guitar or fiddle and want to hear just how good they can sound together when there are no ego's in sight (or sound) then you ought to give this CD a go, it doesn't get much better than this.

Hartley Morris have a great reputation for sheer enjoyment whether it be for dancing, drinking or singing and they are enthusiastic at all three skills! This CD has 22 tracks of a very varied nature and some of the songs I have not heard

before although there are many old favourites. The opening track of *Postmans Knock* sets the Morris scene and Bold Princess Royal closes the disc in traditional style. The songs vary between the really gutsy chorus songs like Poor Old Horse sung by Tony Petto to the quieter mood songs such as *Buffalo Skinners* sung by Phil Burkin with his banjo. Sidney Smiths March is a welcome instrumental number on this disc. There is humour too not only in the lyrics but also the sound effects at the start of Down Below! Hartley used to be an all male preserve but now the girls have been allowed in(only for songs of course!) Jane Petto has a most unusual voice and I would love to hear her sing with a trad Jazz band. This is a good Morris CD which I feel should have been recorded live in a pub to really capture the spirit of the gutsy Hartley Morris Men.

THE PAINFUL PLOUGH Bob Lewis Foxide RUST105

Since the formation of the Folk Song Society, Sussex has produced many fine singers whose songs have been noted and recorded: in the current generation can be found Bob Lewis of Heyshott, near Midhurst. Having heard Bob sing on a number of occasions, I was aware of his talent and his extensive repertoire, for the most part learnt from his family or from singers of an earlier generation, such as George Belton, George Townsend and Pop Maynard .

It was, therefore, with a feeling of disappointment that I finished listening to this CD for the first time. Despite being recorded in his own home, Bob Lewis does not appear to be comfortable without an audience and the convivial setting of a sing-around. Whether or not the recordings were made on one occasion or several is not clear but there are times when he seems to become more at ease with the situation especially on the later tracks on the album. Over half of the songs have a chorus or refrain and this may be where the problem lies, as without audience participation the choruses lack the vibrancy to which Bob responds so well. At times it sounds as if he has not pitched the song in a key that is easy for him to sing, a room full of people often helps overcome this.

Having said that, the album is an excellent source of traditional songs and the renditions of *The Farmer's Toast, Bold Fisherman, John Barley-corn* and *Farmer Giles* are fine examples of a singer who values the material he is singing. Rarely heard songs such as *The Trees Are All Bare, A Capital Ship* (a parody of *Blow The Winds High-Ho*) and *Spread The Green Branches* will be heard by a wider audience by way of this recording. It is also good to hear this version of *The Sussex Wassail* with Bob's family's recipe for a wassail cup.

If you are interested in hearing or learning traditional songs this CD will be an ideal source. Should you want to hear the fine voice of Bob Lewis at its best, go to see him live: hopefully if he makes another album, it will be recorded before an audience.

DANCE 'TIL YOU DROP The Lucy Lastic Band BIGCD003

Tiverton based band, Lucy Lastic, have in their relatively short career established a firm reputation for lively, honest-to-goodness traditional folk dance music. They are a firm favourite at Swanage Folk Festival, and also played at this year's Bristol Mayday Festival.

Their second CD features Julia Pugsley on fiddle (replacing Richard Whiteside) along with Jane Lewis (accordion), Jon Palmer (guitar) and Susan Heard (percussion, and caller at live gigs). All the tunes are traditional, many of them familiar to dancers and musicians, and most tracks are suitable for dancing. The pace is steady, less frenetic, I think, than their first CD. Callers would need to listen to the tracks to ascertain the number of times through a sequence, as this information is not given and is not obvious from the number of tunes listed.

There are also some 'party pieces', such as *Drousy Maggie and the Morpeth Rant* set, which are instrumental for listening. Amongst the 14 tracks there are some which appear to have also been included on their previous CD. The arrangements, however, are different, though perhaps fans should ask for a discount if they've already bought the first album!

With so many folk dance bands bringing out their own CDs these days, it can be difficult to make one stand out from the crowd as offering something different or original. The Lucy Lastic Band don't do gimmicks; their music speaks for itself. Their album may not hit the top of the pops in the folk world but it should be a steady seller at their gigs and particularly where they are playing to a festival audience.

ENGLISH TRADTIONAL DANCING Various Musicians EFDSS EDCD 08

Following the release earlier this year of an updated CD of folk dance music for schools (*Keep Dancing* - reviewed in WA72), the EFDSS have now produced a new CD to accompany the reprinted dance instruction book, also named English Traditional Dancing. The CD replaces an audio cassette, and, although many of the original recordings are still included amongst the bumper 27 tracks, there are ten new tracks, from "some of the younger generation of folk dance musicians".

So, who are the musicians? The named bands are **Pesky** (the younger generation judging by the sleeve photos), **Heterophony** (which in common with Pesky features Anna Tabbush on fiddle & flute) and **Malarkey**, which also shares Chris Jewell with Heterophony. There are many familiar names amongst the line up on other tracks - Leigh Dyer, Alison Ellicott and Christine Oxtoby on accordion, Vic Godrich, Mollie Koenigsberger and Richard Smith on fiddle, to name a few. It's also good to see John Kirkpatrick given two tracks to himself.

With the exception of JK, with anglo on *Galopede* and button accordion on *Johnny Fetch Your Wife Back*, almost all of the other tracks are in a very similar style, regardless of who is playing: fiddle and/or flute, accordion or melodeon, and rhythm line mostly provided by guitar or piano. The music is, as one would expect, evenly paced for dancing, and rhythmic without being flamboyant or spectacular, but with pleasing use of counter melodies.

The tracks are assigned to specific dances, some of which have their own tune in any case, but with the length and number of repeats clearly listed on the sleeve, the CD could easily be used for other compatible dances. Particularly valuable are some 24 and 40 bar sets. There's a good selection of reels, polkas and jigs, though only one hornpipe, and no waltzes. Nevertheless, the CD would be an excellent investment for dance clubs, callers working with recorded music, and even schools wishing to extend their repertoire of folk dance. Better still buy the book as well. !

August 2003 represented the 100th Anniversary of Cecil Sharp noting down his first folk song, *The Seeds of Love*, from one John England, in Hambridge, Somerset. In the following year he went on to collect over 500 songs in Devon and Somerset alone.

To mark the Centenary, EFDSS, in association with Folk South West, have published this wonderful book, compiled and edited by Steve Roud, Eddie Upton and Malcolm Taylor, with biographical research by Bob & Jacqueline Patten, and an introduction by Vic Gammon. It's an absolute gem, with 50 songs with words and music, and biographical notes on the singers from whom Sharp collected. There're archive photographs of Sharp and the singers, and facsimilies of his field notes. For further study, manuscript references are clearly given. An essential purchase for anyone with even a casual interest in traditional song.

Morris Matters

Good News! Morris Dancing and associated activities have been given specific exemption from regulations on Public Entertainment Licenses embodied in the new Licensing Laws recently approved by Parliament.



Public Entertainment Unlicensed

After a long campaign by the three national Morris Organisations (The Ring, The Federation & Open Morris) and the EFDSS against the Government's proposal to require all public performances to be licensed, a last minute amendment exempting Morris dancing was tabled in the House of Lords and accepted by the Government. The controversial Bill had already seen several amendments from the Lords rejected by the Commons, and the prospect of a ping-pong battle between the two Houses was a distinct possibility. A deal was struck, however, in which the Lords agreed not to impede the Bill once the exemption clause for Morris dancing had been accepted.

John Bacon, outgoing President of the Morris Federation, has been able to clear up some areas of uncertainty after meetings with the Culture Ministry. Mummers will be included with Morris in the exemption, and apres-morris pub sessions will also be exempt.

A day of dance on Sunday, 2nd November in Trafalgar Square with many invited sides celebrated a successful outcome to the representations to protect at least this part of our traditions.

The situation with regard to Folk Clubs and other organised pub sessions is less clear, and it remains to be seen what guidance will be given to local authorities responsible for implementing the new laws, and how rigidly & vigorously they actually enforce the regulations.

Perhaps we'll see folk clubs featuring Morris dancers on a regular basis to claim exemption!

New Breed Seen at Bampton

The newest addition to the list of Morris sides in Devon is **Streatham Swine**, a mixed Border side based at Exeter University . Dressed in black with pink sashes, they danced out with energy and enthusiasm at a very soggy Bampton Fair, only their second performance in public. Will they go on to become as famous as a former
