

# Soaring notes

Geoff Norman, of Uguna Flutes from Okehampton, makes and plays replicas of the indigenous flute of North America. Here he gives a brief introduction to history, construction and characteristics of this uniquely appealing musical instrument.

The Native American flute is a very ancient instrument. It is a wooden flute, played in line, with five or six tuning holes. While traces of wooden flutes do not survive for long in archaeological terms, carbon dating has shown that some North American animal- and bird-bone whistles, with and without tuning holes, are as much as 7,000 years old. Four wooden flutes, preserved in the dry air of Arizona, have been dated to between 490 and 800 AD; their lower bodies are the same as modern flutes, with much the same tuning, but they were played by blowing across the open end, as South American quenas are today. The dating of the development of the external wind-way, which distinguishes the Native American flute, is uncertain. It predates the early 1700s and the large-scale arrival of Europeans, who called it a 'flageolet', the nearest contemporary European equivalent, and there are several existing examples from the early 1800s.


The flute was played widely across North America; by young men as a courting instrument, for signalling in times of conflict, and for wider spiritual and religious purposes. Its simplest form - a whistle formed from the ulna of an eagle - is one of the most sacred objects to many of the peoples. The Sun Dance ceremony, for instance, is accompanied by continuous sounding of eagle bone whistles. Some very conservative Native Americans believe it is sacrilegious to record their sound in any way.

The term 'Native American style' is used to describe flutes made in the traditional American Indian way by non-Native Americans, and is an important distinction.


Traditionally, flutes were tuned individually, but the natural instinctive span of an octave seems to have been universal. They can conform to European musical notation and standards with no loss of 'authenticity' and now usually do so, largely so that they can be played together and with other pitched instruments. The playable range is from about C below middle C - low C - to G above middle C - high G. Low E gives a wide stretch for the fingers, and accidental overblowing can occur on the bottom note; in high G the fingers are very close together, it can be difficult to achieve a pleasing tone, and a lot of puff is required. On the other hand the sound carries wonderfully in the open - I've caused dogs to bark about three miles down a valley in Italy and have created amazing echoes off mountains.

The instrument's range is relatively limited. The generally accepted intervals are a tone and a half between the fundamental (all holes stopped) and the first note - first hole uncovered - then a single tone as each hole is uncovered in turn. The second note on a flute in G, for instance, is A#, then all the semitones are available up to A# an octave higher, with a somewhat approximate B above that possible given energetic overblowing. English folk tunes in D are playable either on a flute in high D or B, and I've sold several from my stall at the Dartmoor Folk Festival in the last couple of years.

Playing techniques are broadly similar to other whistles, though simpler. There is no thumbhole; half-stopping is possible but rare; the extended range offered by overblowing on a tin whistle, or low whistle, or the technique of stopping the lower holes and playing on the upper ones, are not available. The intricate conventional embellishments of Celtic whistle playing are neither appropriate or pleasing. A useful technique is to punctuate repetitions of the same note by flicking open one or more higher holes on the flute to add tension and lift the tune. Many songs - especially those with spiritual significance - finish with a sharp 'whoop', produced by overblowing with all the tuning holes open, to send the song skywards as a dedication to Creator.



A widely-used system of notation based on the intervals described above has been devised by R Carlos Nakai, a classically trained Navajo musician. The Nakai tablature (or TAB) indicates relative

pitch, and provides fingering charts. Apart from making and playing flutes, I also transpose traditional Indian songs into Nakai TAB. My current song book contains about forty pieces, several of which are downloadable in PDF format from my web site - <a href="https://www.uguna.dsl.pipex.com">www.uguna.dsl.pipex.com</a> - which also contains some MP3 sound files. Some of these songs go back hundreds, or even thousands, of years. Many songs change tempo several times, between 2/4 and 3/4 time, for instance; while some are suitable for improvisation others have spiritual significance and must be played in precisely the correct way.

Flute-making techniques vary from the totally intuitive to the highly scientific; given the instrument's background, I depend on intuition. Flutes can be turned on lathes, but the 'correct', traditional way is to split a block of wood, put a groove in each half, stick it back together and carve it entirely by hand and eye. This is how I make all my flutes, having been taught by two Indians in the late 1990s.

Cedar is the most typical wood used, the 'classic' material, though almost any wood will do, including sequoia or giant redwood, black walnut, fruit woods, river cane, and sumach. The eastern red cedar - a highly aromatic juniper - is probably the favoured material, possibly reflecting the Lakota (Sioux) migration out of the forests to the east of the plains; it also has widespread spiritual significance, especially for Cherokees. Western red cedar - a type of cypress - is also very common.

As mentioned above, the external wind-way - or flue - is the instrument's distinguishing feature. The flue is completed by the 'bird' or block tied on top of it to direct the player's breath across the sharp edge of the whistle - the 'labia'. Each bird is individually matched to its flute and has only one correct position. Removal of the bird enables the whistle to be dried out. The bird also has a totemic value for the player or maker. Fluties refer to the 'fipple', actually the barrier between the slow air chamber and the flute body, forming the nest for the bird.

The four mutually perpendicular holes near the end of many flutes - sound holes or 'direction holes' - represent the four sacred directions - east, north, west, south. Some traditions add the holes at either end of the flute for the other two directions - sky/up and earth/down - some recognise a seventh direction - here, within or centre - at the heart of the instrument.

Once heard, its voice is unmistakable; David Sanipass, a Micmac Indian from Maine and one of my mentors, says of his music, "Don't listen with your ears, listen with your heart."

# **Devon Squeezes**

Devon has long been associated with the best in English squeezebox playing. Bob Cann in the Dartmoor Pixie Band, Jack Rice, Les Rice, and more recently Mark Bazeley and Jason Rice in the current Dartmoor Pixie Band. Good lumpy English music for social dance, maypole and step dancing and more recently Morris dance.

When Ed Rennie, the Pixie Band's bass player and former melodeoner with The Bismarcks, got heavily involved in that Sidmouth Folk Week in 2005, he ran some melodeon workshops teaching a few basic techniques. "What took me rather by surprise was the number of local musicians that asked if I'd be doing more during the winter. I thought it all spontaneously sprang out of the granite, or culm, depending on where you live. So I put out a few feelers in the local press and on John Culf's Harberton Folk News community website asking if anyone was interested in some regular classes. The response was amazing"

Like all good ideas, it soon took on a life of it's own. Ed met with a group of like-minded folk and community music enthusiasts, Annie Rennie, Mark Bazeley, Colin Andrews and Alan Quick and together they formed the Devon Squeezebox Foundation with the aim of promoting the learning and playing of music, primarily from the English tradition, on squeezeboxes of all kinds. Their launch was fittingly at the 2006 Dartmoor Folk Festival, a festival started 29 years ago by Mark's Grandfather, Bob Cann.

One of their first moves was to successfully apply to the National Lottery, through Awards for All, for a grant to fund the running of some workshops and to buy 10 D/G Hohner Pokerwork melodeons to rent out to those who wanted to learn how to play but didn't have access to a melodeon. "We got the rental idea from Katie Howson and the East Anglian Traditional Music Trust. It means we can offer lessons to a wider audience than just to those who have boxes already. It's proved very popular"

Currently the Foundation is running 1st and 2nd Squeeze (Beginners and Improvers) workshops at five different locations around the county, Great Torrington in the North, Harpford in the East, South Brent in the South, South Zeal in the West and Poughill, nr. Crediton, in mid Devon. The idea of hosting the workshops in the regions, rather than at a central point, was to make them as accessible as possible to would be squeezers. "We've got in excess of 40 folks coming to the workshops every

month. It's really amazing, and quite loud at times"

The Foundation is already looking into the future. "Well, to start with we're planning to have a stand at a few of the Agricultural Shows around the county. We'll take the hire melodeons for people to have a go and hopefully get the message spread to a wider public. Then we've got our first Big Squeeze Day in the autumn (provisionally September 29th) with visiting tutors and a nice concert. We're very pleased that this event is to be supported by the Devon Folk Committee, which is a real boost. We are looking to forge links with other organisations in Devon and throughout the West Country and this is a very encouraging start"

"Into the autumn and through the winter we'll run a further series of melodeon workshops, plus our first series of piano accordion workshops on similar lines. Almost from the word go we've had enquiries about piano accordions." And in the more distant future? "Eventually we hope to cover concertinas of all kinds and then who knows? You may yet be able to enjoy the All Star Devon Bandoneon Band."

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## Best in the Book

Richard Thomas Witt, known to everyone as Dick, died on the 7th November 2006, aged 89. He will be long remembered as a great personality, a fine dancer, and, for forty years, one of the very best callers in the Country Dance movement. Dennis Darke reviews Dick's life.

Traditionally a Cockney is a person born within the sound of Bow bells and Dick was actually born in Mary le Bow Church on 11th June 1917 during a Zeppelin air raid on London. The eldest of five brothers, he moved with his parents to Kent when still young, the beginning for him of a life-long love of the countryside which saw only a brief return to London against his wishes. He worked in the hop fields, becoming proficient on walking on the stilts used in the work. He later moved into fruit growing which became his main occupation. It was in Kent that he met Joan, who persuaded him to come to a local country dance, though he agreed only if he could stay on the door and take the money. However, like he was to do to many other people later in life, he was encouraged to take to the floor, and thus began his love of Country Dancing. Joan & Dick married and had a son, Richard, then because of fears for personal safety living close to an airfield in wartime Kent, they moved to Devon where Dick became manager of a fruit farm at Broadhembury. Agricultural work was one of the reserved occupations during WW2. After the war, their daughter,

Helen, was born.

Early in the 1950s Dick met Dick Davey, a keen country dancer and folk singer, who had established a forestry business in the nearby village of Plymtree. Together they joined the newly formed Exeter Morris Men, where Morris and sword were expertly taught under the legendary Bill Leaker. Dick became an expert performer of the Bradninch Broom Dance, and, using broomsticks, the English version of the Scottish sword dance. He sometimes danced these as a break at private country dance engagements.

In the mid 1950s Dick was one of the Exeter Morris team which performed the then recently resurrected Sidmouth Mummers Play at the E.F.D.S.S. National Gathering. He attended a number of E.F.D.S.S. residential courses at Killerton House, under Margaret Grant, and the annual Barford Week with Ken Clark, Bicky Maclain and other American callers. It was there he learnt not only country dances but the American singing square calls for which he became so well known.

Following the original Sidmouth Folk Festival in 1956, a local committee was formed to promote weekly Friday night dances for holidaymakers during the summer months, to take place outdoors in the Connaught Gardens. Having moved to manage a fruit farm at nearby Woodbury Common, Dick was asked to MC the evenings, with music from the Greensleeves and Rakes Bands. Dick's ability to handle crowds of dancers and non-dancers came to the fore. His personality, unconscious humour, and what is now called "catch-phrases" in his announcements became his trademark for the next

In the early 1960s Dick was a dance member of the EFDSS Devon Folk Company which gave indoor performances at the larger Devon towns. He was by this time a very active caller not only in the South-West but in the Midlands through his friend Harry Labbett, whom he had met at Barford. He gave up fruit farming and became a full-time Caller.

Dick was engaged by Butlin's Holiday Camp at Minehead to take Country Dancing on Monday evenings throughout the summer season. He did this for many years with music provided by the Turmuts, a small band from Taunton. Once again his ability to handle very large crowds of non-dancers and give them a happy evening was evident. He travelled with the young Yetties to call at their song/dance engagements and undertook many dances over a wide area with his great friend, Dartmoor musician Bob Cann, and also with the Weston Country Dance Band led by John Brock, and the Greensleeves Country Dance Band.

Dick sometimes went astray with dates, and once travelled to call for the Minehead Folk Group only to find it was the wrong week, and later, with Bob Cann, he went all the way to Southampton only to find it was the wrong year! For several years in the 1970s he called for dancing on the last evening of the Exeter Festival Arts Week. Exeter High Street was closed and thousands danced in the road. In the early 1970s with Dennis Darke, Mick Pearse and Chris Darke providing the music, Dick called for evenings of dancing at the Palace Hotel, Torquay, for delegates and wives attending National Trade Union and Business Annual Conferences. There were some very well-known entertainers providing acts during these evenings.


In 1974 came the climax of Dick's career as a caller. The BBC radio channels had been reorganised, and in came Radio 4 and Radio 2. "Country Dancing" had been broadcast throughout the 50s and 60s on the former Home Service, produced by Brian Patten and EFDSS staff member Irene Harcourt arranging the recording venues. In discussion with Brian in 1973 she suggested a programme with wider appeal, to be called "Barn Dance". A trial recording was made with Dick as caller and Greensleeves providing the music. Brian had the programme accepted in the "BBC Radio 2 Ballroom" series.

It became part of a rotation for an hour early on Friday evenings of four different types of dances, Old Tyme, Scottish, Modern, and Barn Dance, the latter proving a great success with a listening audience of around three quarters of a million. It ran for ten years until 1984.

During his life Dick gave so much pleasure to thousands of dancers and non-dancers. It can be summed up in his own catch phrase, used sometimes for the next dance, for he was certainly "The Best in the Book".

#### THE DARTMOOR CANTATA

Classical composers from Dvorak to Vaughan-Williams have been inspired by folk tales and music, and Lustleigh composer William Carnell is no exception. For one of his millennium year works he collaborated with writer Alexa Romanes on a community piece, 'The Green Man', and now they have produced together a cantata based on the weird and wonderful legends of Dartmoor.

Alexa, a folklore enthusiast and a member of Cogs and Wheels Ladies' Morris, has set her lyrics against the backdrop of Warren House Inn, where a traveller arrives to warn himself by the legendary fire that never goes out. With the other drinkers he shares stories of the Moor, for which William Carnell has woven a rich musical tapestry. from the dark ferocity of the Wish Hounds to the pathos of Snaily House and the grim humour of A Widecombe Wonder

One of Alexa's favourite stories is that of the Dancing Maidens of Belstone. Cogs and Wheels always dance at the stone circle at dawn on May the first. As a comparatively new member, she has yet to find out what will happen when they dance there on a Sunday...



## In appreciation .....

#### **AUDREY LAVER 1925-2005**

A Memorial Dance was held at Bystock Manor in Exmouth, in honour of Audrey Laver, who died a year ago. The dance was organised by the Exmouth Playford Club which meets every Wednesday afternoon at the YWCA where Audrey sometimes called. During the afternoon, the dancers enjoyed a selection of Audrey's dances, called by Tricia Fay with music by Gwyn George.

Audrey was born in December, 1925. When war broke out, Audrey & her younger sister, Valerie, were evacuated from Surrey to Ayr where her love of Scottish dancing began. She qualified as a teacher of Scottish dancing in her mid-twenties. In her professional life, Audrey was an Associate of the Library Association, working in positions of authority around the Croydon area of Surrey.

Shortly after her retirement, Audrey moved to Sidmouth. The attraction had been the Sidmouth Folk Festival, but she settled most happily in the area & felt she had found her true home. She continued with her much loved Scottish dancing for as long as she could. However, it was her love of Playford dancing that brought out her creativity & while living in Sidmouth, Audrey composed 2 books of Playford style dances with some Scottish influences. With the assistance of Steve Hunt, of Orion's Ring, who composed many of the tunes for Audrey's dances, 2 books of dances were published with a third book on its way.

Audrey believed that dances should flow well & that no dancer should be standing doing nothing for long in a set. These are the main elements of all her dances & together with the Scottish influence, her trademark.

Sadly, Audrey died in December, 2005, a couple of weeks before her 80th birthday, but her legacy will continue to give pleasure throughout the years.

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## 'THERE I AM' Jim Reynolds Runner Records

Now on his seventh album, Bristol singer-songwriter Jim Reynolds inhabits a world of wistful melancholy that occasionally breaks into joyful choruses before returning to a position of firesidelike nostalgia, opening track *Time of my Life*, being a case in point

Some of his songs wouldn't seem out of place if they were sung in a broad Irish brogue, while elsewhere his styles encompass whiskey-bar blues in *Slow Down* and even a hint of jazz in places while firmly using modern folk as a base from which to take whichever direction he feels like heading off in.

Oddest of all is closing track Only Up To Go, which seems some virtuoso guitar picking, something that pops up frequently throughout the album, played underneath Eric Idle-style vocals - indeed the song could quite easily be a less daft, more folky companion to Always Look On The Bright Side Of Life.

If there is one small criticism it's that Reynolds sometimes spends a little too much time showing off his, admittedly highly skilled, guitar skills. Whilst these work fine on the instrumentals, his songs are much more effective as tight, three minute tales and don't always need to be fleshed out, even if the solos are of high quality.

Other than that Reynolds' voice is always a delight to listen to and his lyrics are curiously comforting, even when downbeat, creating an album that wouldn't be out of place for gatherings on a balmy summer's day, or a cold winter evening. It's folk Jim, but not as we know it.

#### **STRANDED**

Craig Morgan Robson

RVRCD08

It was in 2003 that Moira Craig, Sarah Morgan and Carolyn Robson started singing together: three fine singers each with a wealth of knowledge and great enthusiasm for the traditional songs of their native countries. Since then they have performed throughout the country, gathering many followers. The arrival of their second album will, therefore, be appreciated by many.

As on the first album, Peppers & Tomatoes, the majority of the songs are traditional. Within the tradition the spectrum is broad: sources include the Child ballads, the collecting of George Gardiner in Hampshire, the Copper family and a West Gallery carol, with a geographical spread from Scotland to the south of England. The themes will be familiar to devotees of traditional song, the many vagaries of human life are covered within the fifteen tracks. Some will raise a smile, some will touch the heart, while others will bring memories of a particular time of year. To name just a few is difficult but for those who appreciate it favourites include: Twa Magicians, Polly Vaughan, The Wonderful Sucking Pig., & Christmas Song. The contemporary songs have been chosen with discernment. Songs in keeping with the general genre have been carefully selected. These include two from Mike O'Connor, Wassail The Silver Apple and Summon Up the Sun, The Easter Tree from Dave Goulder, the author of what has become a favourite throughout the country, The January Man, and a setting of Tennyson's Crossing the Bar.

The arrangements are a joy for those who enjoy harmony singing at its best. The use of close harmony, solos, different leads, tempo and tone is subtle, appearing effortless. Careful consideration has been given to the contrast to give a pleasing blend for the audience throughout, creating an album that is an integral whole. A few tracks are enhanced by instrumentation, Paul Sartin on oboe, Nick Sowden on guitar and Sarah Morgan on concertina.

On occasions three fine solo singers fail to create a good trio combination owing to their own individual style and voice; conversely trios who attempt to perform individually find it hard to add variety and depth to their own performance. This album confirms that Craig, Morgan and Robson are masters of both. As mentioned above, they perform extensively. If you have not seen them

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this album will make you want to do so. If you buy this album as a result of having seen them live, you will not be disappointed. Either way, buy it, play it and play it again.

#### FENLANDIA WGS 340CD Mary Humphries & Anahata

As with their previous 3 albums, Mary & Anahata offer a superb collection of well-researched traditional songs, this time focussing particularly on material collected over 100 years from the Fenlands. The foot-tapping tune sets, too, have a 'local' flavour, despite the fact that some have travelled from Mary's native Wales.

I'd probably enjoy listening to any songs from Mary, whose delivery always seems so natural and sympathetic to the subject, but she has the knack of finding unfamiliar versions of well-known songs that give added interest. The Nutting Song, Hey Down Derry (An Old Man Came Courting Me) and The Cuckoo & The Nightingale (Catch Me If You Can) are but such examples on this CD. The latter, apparently, has never been recorded before. The Hungry Army, originally a broadside but reconstructed (and relocated) from fragments collected from Mrs Charlotte Dann, is a song I'd not heard before at all.

As always with Mary & Anahata, the instrumental accompaniments, with English concertina or banjo, anglo concertina, melodeon or cello, cannot be faulted, and never detract from the words. Dave & Gina Holland lend additional instrumental support on some tracks, and Doug Bailey adds a voice to some choruses!

#### NEARLY GENTRY June Thaine & David Robertson

David Robertson has been singing harmoniously for over 40 years since his Sussex University days (The Firkins) and then with The Trugs, until he moved to Norfolk where continued an active involvment in the folk song & morris scene. Under various guises June Thaine and David have sung together for the last ten years or more, equally at home with songs from traditional and more contemporary sources

This album, a long time in the planning and production, is a delightful blend of such contemporary and traditional material. On two tracks, Jon Heslop's moving Lifeboat Prayer and Mike O'Connor's equally emotional Carrying Nelson Home, they are accompanied by Mary Humphries & Anahata.. From John Tam's Sheep Counting to Sidney Carter's John Ball and Eric Bogle's Shelter, David & June have a good ear for songs which suit their clear, melodious harmonies in voices which complement each other perfectly. David's own compositions, Timmy (a ship's dog shanty!) and Far Peaceful Shore (his tune to a tribute to a hero of the Caister lifeboat crew) more than hold their own amongst songs from such prominent songwriters as Mick Ryan, Graham Moore, Bill Meek & Deve Webber. They don't ignore tehir traditional roots, however, with fine renditions of April Morning and Eynsham Poachers, for example, amongst the 20 tracks in total.

I hope that David & June can be enticed out of their East Anglian base to appear at a Devon folk club or festival. But in the meantime, I recommend that you enjoy their album.

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#### COLD IN APRIL Mat Walklate

Klate CD008

I reviewed a combined sampler CD of this and another album in the previous magazine. This is now the full version of Mat's Irish music album.

Mat plays mouth organs, whistles, flutes & uilleann pipes, and is supported on many tracks by a variety of other instruments, including guitar, fiddle, and bouzouki. Most of the sixteen tracks feature jigs, reels, and other tunes, some traditional, others self-penned but all having an authenic Irish feel about them. There're a couple of songs, *P Stands For Paddy*, sung by Matt Fahey, and *Come By The Hills*, both pleasantly performed with no fancy over instrumentation.

For Irish music, Mat may not have the same high profile as Last Night's Fun, whose album is also reviewed in this issue, but, for relaxing listening, I actually preferred this one.

You won't find any big names on this album, but many of the performers will be well-known as singers to regulars at folk clubs around the Devon - Somerset border. As at the clubs, there is a wide variety of material, from contemporay & self penned compositions such as Susannah Billeter's The Reason Why, to traditional songs in harmony, including The McGuffins version of Low Down in the Broom The Briar & The Rose from Pete & Jenny Sometimes dubious acoustics of folk club venues may not do justice to a performance, even of a professional artist, but the studio recording does indeed bring out the best of our local singers. It's a pity therefore that live folk club recording of A-Roving was included as a 'bonus' - it actually ends the CD on a far inferior level to the rest of the album. Nevertheless, at a fiver, it's good value and supports a worthy cause.

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### HAMPSHIRE DANCE TUNES

Country dance tunes from the Pyle family manuscript 1822 Reseached by Bob Shatwell

WildGoose WGS 325CD

Richard Pyle (1808 - 1880) was a farmer from Nether Wallop, Hampshire, who began writing down country dance tunes, together with a few airs, song accompaniments and hymn settings in a manuscript book at the age of 14. It is not known for certain what instrument he played, though probably a wind instrument such as the flute or oboe.

Many of the tunes Bob Shatwell found in the manuscript book (in Winchester Records Library) were unfamiliar, and even extensive research failed to reveal much information about some of them . The results of Bob's work can be found in a book, Hampshire Dance Tunes, published by Hobgoblin, and on this CD, which contains a selection of the tunes in 16 tracks, as well as midi files of all the tunes in the associated book.

The CD is an abolsute gem, particularly when one thinks that some of these tunes may not have been heard for over 150 years! It's not only a great album for the tunes, but also the variety of top musicians that bring them to life, in robust, Southern England style; Paul Sartin (co-editor of the book) & Saul Rose, Tim Laycock & Colin Thompson, Mat Green & Andy Turner, Will Duke & Dan Quinn, and the Bursledon Band, with Roger Watson, Paul Sartin, and Bob Shatwell (no mean fiddler himself!) The combinations of fiddle and squeezeboxes - various types concertinas and melodeons - provide added foot-tapping interest, and make you want to get up and dance, and, in my case, reach for the squeezebox to try the tunes for myself.

It's hard to pull out any sets of tunes for particular mention since they are all very listenable, and in only a few cases, such as *Waterloo Dance, Morgiana & The Triumph*, are the names recognisable.

Bob Shatwell has been living & playing folk fiddle in North Hampshire area for many years, though formerly lived in Sussex (He played with Chanctonbury Ring Morris Men at my wedding!) All credit is due to Bob and to all who have contributed in bringing this long-forgotten material to life.

THE ISLAND OF APPLES Mick Ryan & Pete Harris **WGS 339CD** 

LIVE FROM THE MAC LNF Records LNFR006 Last Night's Fun

Two very different CD's; but with so much in common. Both are arguably among the best of their genre performing in the UK (which is why we have booked both for Bideford Folk Festival!) Both CD's are consistently excellent, so if you are already a fan then I can guarantee you will be delighted. Both in concert have reduced me to gasping for breath with laughter at their between-song banter and repartee.

In performance and on this CD Mick Ryan's voice alongside Pete Harris' sweet harmonies and rhythmic musical arrangements provide a perfect setting for his powerful, thought-provoking songs. Songs with tunes full of unusual turns and corners and words that evoke the full range of emotions sorrow, joy, pride, anger, regret and affection. Here we have seven of Mick's own songs, many from his folk plays, alongside the traditional Cupid's Garden and The Banks of the Bahn. In addition there are two of my favourite Graham Moore songs - Tolpuddle Man and Tom Paine's Bones and the powerful The Labourer's Cause from Mick's collaboration with Graham Moore. The Song Goes On written for a Sidmouth concert in memory of Cyril Tawney reminds us why we sing - so that "the singers who have gone before us will be singing once again".

Chris Sherburn, Denny Bartley and Exeter's Nick Scott appear to effortlessly take each tune to another level with inter-weaving counter melodies set against Denny Bartley's challenging, exciting guitar. Denny's interpretations of the songs are always unexpected - Whiskey in the Jar - so powerful with a real edge -Guthrie's Tom Joad and McColl's Moving on Song (sadly as relevant now as when written). His Next Market Day is by turns sinister and erotic - is he just using her or will he be true? Eight tracks listed but really nine with one minute of their verbal byplay as Nick introduces Brendan O'Regan's Autumn Child. This builds from Nick's Uilleann pipe solo to an explosion of melody and rhythm with triplets firing from Denny's guitar that left me exhilarated and exhausted.

Two fabulous CD's - buy them both - or better still see them in concert and then buy their CD's.

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## TRAVELLER'S JOY

Songs of English and Scottish Travellers and Gypsies, 1965 - 2005 Compiled by Mike Yates EFDSS ISBN 0854182004 £18.50 + £2 p&p

EDFSS staff have collaborated with Mike Yates to bring to a wider audience an important collection of songs from travelling people across the U.K. A bonus is a 20 track CD of some of the field recordings of singers from whom the material was collected.

While it is quite possible to dip in for casual browsing or access to specific songs, it is for the full notes on the contributors, musical notation, reference numbers of Roud, Child & Sharp and for much other supplementary information that the book is so valuable. It is quaintly amusing, however, that a Mick Ryan composition, *The Widow & The Devil*, became assimilated into the 'traditional' repertoire of Duncan Williamson from Fife. This has been Jerry Bix ackowledged on EFDSS website & will also be corrected in subsequent editions.

## Morris Matters

The late pioneering Social Psychologist, Professor Michael Argyle, who conducted numerous happiness studies, showed that among the things that make people happy are sport, music, and best of all, dancing.
