Local Treasure : Muriel Forrest

Woodcraft Folk, Hobby Horse classes, dancing, calling at eighty-eight, not out ! Muriel Forrest talks to Melanie Henrywood.

Share with us a little of your background

I was born in Exeter in 1920. I married Harry during the War and we had three children. I now have six grandchildren and six (seven soon) great grandchildren. I worked at Digby Psychiatric Hospital as a hairdresser and I have always liked dancing.

How did you first become involved with folk dancing?

When my son was doing folk dancing for one of the Woodcraft Folk 'badges' in the 1950's. I joined in, along with other parents. Later I became a Leader, got to know a lot of dances and ever since I have been teaching folk dancing in Woodcraft Folk. My aim really is to try to get the children interested in folk dancing because in the folk dance world we're all getting old, I'm eighty-eight now but I will keep going as long as I can!

Tell us more about Woodcraft Folk

Woodcraft Folk is a national children's educational movement started in 1925. The aim is to give children an awareness of local and global issues through games, drama, discussion, projects, crafts, singing, dancing, activities and camping. There are local and national events. We have eight groups in Exeter; Woodchips for the under sixes, Elfins from six to nine, Pioneers aged ten to twelve and Venturers from thirteen to fifteen. Older ones are called District Fellows and they organise themselves and help the younger groups.

What are your other folk dance interests?

In New Zealand we started a Woodcraft Folk group and an English folk dance club. I ran a Hobby Horse folk dance group for children in the community up until a few years ago. I joined Exeter Folk Dance Club and became Chairman for over twenty-five years. I was on the EFDSS Devon District Committee and from there I was voted as a representative for the South West. I call for Exeter, Sidford and Exmouth clubs. Every week I go to Woodcraft Folk, Playford and Exmouth Club and I go to Exeter Club monthly. I also call throughout the season for various clubs.

In which festivals and events have you participated?

The Exeter Folk Dance Club ran the Devon District Christmas Dance for all the clubs in Devon annually at St George's Hall until the 1990's. My husband Harry and I were involved with a big

folk dance in the High Street at the end of Exeter Festival for many years. I had a demonstration team in both Woodcraft Folk and Hobby Horse who performed at local fetes and shows.

Did your dance teams have costumes?

The boys in the Woodcraft Folk dance team wore a green sash with the badge of the organisation on them; the girls wore summer dresses. The Hobby Horse group wore white shirts with the girls in blue cotton skirts.

Describe for us your proudest moments

In the 1970's my Woodcraft Folk team were invited by the Mayor of Exeter to dance at his garden party which was very nice. I felt really pleased to be made a Life Member when I gave up being Chairman and Secretary of Exeter Folk Dance Club.

Are any of your family involved in folk dancing?

My husband didn't dance as he was rather selfconscious, but he helped and encouraged me. I have two children in New Zealand, my son goes to ballroom dancing and my daughter is a Scottish dancing teacher. My other daughter in England has recently joined a society. Years ago in Devon our two youngest children used to pile into our van with their friends and follow caller Ted Berry around to his dances.

Do you have a set pattern for your calling?

If I do an evening I do longways, I always put in a couple of Playford dances, I do squares, short dances like three or four couple dances and the circle dances. I do a variety and we have a good time at our ordinary folk club evenings. I don't call with any band regularly, but I have called for Pete Mac. Generally we have taped music because at clubs we don't have bands very often. I do take a lot of time preparing.

Which are your favourite dances?

I've got several favourite dances, but I like Winter Memories because of the music. Dunham Oaks is another, both of them are Playford and they're both lovely dances. The first square dance I ever called was The Trail of the Lonesome Pine and it is still one of my favourite squares. For

a Woodcraft Folk international camp I wrote a dance called the Friendship Dance.

Can you share with us a few memories or anecdotes?

At the annual Christmas dance I always remember that Philip Worth from Hope Cove would donate a draw prize of a bag of spuds which everyone wanted to win! We have had some hilarious evenings doing sword dances with everyone getting in a muddle, or me doing a broom dance in a long skirt. Sometimes I do dances for fun like Ninepins when you have to grab a partner when the music stops. I do try to lighten up the Playford sessions a bit because most of them seem so serious!

Have you had any other pursuits or hobbies?

I have visited New Zealand many times. I go to a couple of local organisations for coffee mornings and talk shows. I get involved with world affairs – I'm a bit of a rebel I'm afraid! In the CND days I was a protester, I've been to Trafalgar Square and on several of the Aldermaston marches. I was against the war in Iraq. Years ago I was involved with the local Labour Party and I stood for Council once, but I am not a supporter now. I think when you are old, once you give up you have had it.

You've got to keep going to keep young and keep your interests going.

Would you like to see any improvements in folk dancing?Generally speaking the people who go folk dancing in Devon are good dancers; there are a lot of folk dance clubs in Devon around the area and obviously it still has a pull. I feel that clubs do better in villages and in very small places than in towns. The folk dancers at all the clubs you go to all wish that it could grow a bit. We're trying hard to find ways and means, we advertise and we try to encourage it. I have tried to push folk dancing as well as try to give the children an enjoyment of it. I ask young ones why they don't go to the ordinary folk dances as they all seem to enjoy a ceilidh. If you get to dance a little bit better, the folk dances are better - they are lovely to do. A lot of people think folk dancing in England is Morris; they don't think of the ordinary folk dances. It is a shame that some festivals have got so professional and expensive that people can't participate so much. Folk dance is a community-based activity and it encourages friendship. I think friendship is the main thing really. I feel that we ought to try hard because that is all part of our heritage isn't it?

Soundbeam Update

Remember the Soundbeam Appeal? Patricia Reid reports on how the specialist equipment purchased by Devon Folk is being used by the recipients.

In 2006, many of you were involved in raising money to buy Soundbeam equipment. We didn't know how much would be raised or how many Soundbeams we would be able to purchase & donate. We set our sights high & after the splendid response from so many of you involved in folk activities throughout Devon, over £8,000 was raised. We were able to donate Soundbeams, together with the appropriate training sessions, to Bidwell Brook School, Dartington, Rowcroft Hospice, Torquay, & Sound Waves South West, based at Bude. A magnificent result thanks to all your imaginative efforts.

After an enquiry asking if we had received any feedback from the recipients, I got in touch with them all & have made a couple of follow up visits.

I visited Bidwell Brook School in early November & was invited to watch a "Soundbeam session" in which children of varying ages & abilities took part. The Soundbeam has been incorporated into their sensory curriculum & I found it rewarding to watch the obvious pleasure the children experienced while using it & to note the educational value the equipment can offer at a variety of levels. This is a very complicated & versatile piece of equipment & the members of staff admit they are still finding new ways to develop its use in school. However, it is already proving to be a valuable resource in the development of motor co-ordination, communication & language skills. It is also being used to enhance short stories with the children using their imagination to provide accompanying music. It is quite apparent that the children enjoy being in full control of the music making themselves. The members of staff are looking for ways to incorporate the equipment into the Drama & Music curriculum. Sheila, a Teaching Assistant concerned with communication through music, will be using her violin as a means of introducing instrumental music to accompany the children's music making. Jake, the IT Technician & one of the original members of staff to receive training back in 2006, is totally involved with the

staff & children to find the best way to make this equipment work for the school. He commented, "We have already experienced some remarkable & surprising results."

I am extremely grateful to the staff at Bidwell Brook School for allowing me a glimpse of their ongoing work & hope they & the students will continue to enjoy working with this versatile equipment.

Following this visit, I met with David Holmes, Music Therapist at Rowcroft Hospice. David moved to the area from London to take up this position in June 08. He was not familiar with the background information of how the Soundbeam came to be one of his resources & was interested to learn about Devon Folk's fund raising. David's work very much concerns providing palliative therapy & offering a means of "finding a musical voice" to enable residents, through musical expression, to come to terms with their situation. He has discovered the Soundbeam provides a useful resource for those no longer able to use more conventional musical instruments. He told me of his work that day with a gentleman in his early sixties with motor neurone disease. He is very fragile, with limited motor control & confined to a wheelchair. He had struggled to try & manipulate any of the musical instruments & had grown frustrated with the effort involved. David introduced him to the Soundbeam & he immediately showed an interest in the technology & wanted to know how it worked. He found that by using the smallest of movements, he was able to produce sounds & express himself musically while David accompanied him on the piano. This was the start of a valuable musical relationship between patient & therapist. It is early days for David, who is still discovering the remarkable potential of this piece of equipment. However, he is already seeing it as a valued resource that he can incorporate into his therapy sessions in a variety of ways.

The third Soundbeam was donated to Sound Waves South West, a Music & Music Therapy Trust formed in 1998 by Judyth Gwynne. There have been changes in the staff here also, but new appointments have now been made. Simon Sheridan, from Co. Wicklow in Ireland, will be working mainly with special units attached to Bude schools & Carine Kelley will be working in the Launceston area.

The Soundbeam is permanently situated at a unit attached to Bude Junior School where it is readily available for a Music Therapy session.

In March, 2009, Simon & Judyth are giving a presentation, "On the Beam with Soundwaves South West" to the Bude U3A during which they will show a video of the various uses of the Soundbeam & invite audience participation in a practical demonstration of this specialist piece of equipment.

A picture of a Soundbeam in use is included in the information leaflet for Sound Waves SW with an acknowledgement of Devon Folk's donation. More information about the Trust can be found on their website, www.soundwaves-sw.co.uk

I hope, after reading this article, you will all agree our efforts during 2006 were well worthwhile.

Melodeous Boxes

In the previous issue, Colin Andrews described the various types of concertina. In this issue he looks at the melodeon, or diatonic accordion.

A melodeon is an instrument which looks a bit like a small accordion with buttons which give a different note on the pull from the note on the push. In its simplest form it has just one row of buttons on the right hand side that will play a couple of octaves in one particular key, much the same as a simple harmonica. The left hand may just have two levers, giving 2 chords, one in each direction of the bellows, or possibly four buttons, which allow for a third chord. To find the key in which the instrument is pitched, push the third button down from the top of the instrument, and compare it with a known note on a piano or pitch pipe. One-row melodeons in the key of G or C are the most common, and while they are never fully chromatic and thus may appear to be limited in scope they can be very versatile and dynamic in the hands of experienced players, such as Katie Howson. These instruments are also very popular for Cajun music.

As soon as a second row of right hand buttons, and four more bass buttons, are added, the number of different variations in fingerboard layout increases considerably. Amongst Morris musicians and melodeon players in folk dance bands, the most common two-row boxes are in D (outside row) and G (inner row). Again, pushing the third button from the top will usually identify the key. The bass chords available will normally be G, D, C (this on both push & pull), A, E minor and B minor. In theory, similar two-row melodeons could be produced with any corresponding relationship in pitch between the outer and inner rows (and corresponding bass chords) but in practice a C, F box is the only other common arrangement, though occasionally one comes across an A, D, or Eb, Ab, or even F, Bb.

On many two-row boxes of the above pattern, the topmost buttons on the right hand side are 'accidentals', i.e. they are not notes in the scale for the rest of the row but will play the 4 notes missing from the chromatic scales in which the instrument is pitched. While not rendering the instrument fully chromatic over more than one octave, it nevertheless allows greater flexibility, and the possibility of playing some tunes in certain other keys (in A and C, for a D,G box).

Both one and two-row boxes may have up to four knobs or buttons on the top of the instrument, which will allow a combination of up to four different reeds for the same note, giving various tones. In some multiple reed instruments, notably the Hohners, the reeds are tuned 'wet', i.e. for a given note, the second and third reeds will be tuned slightly flat and sharp respectively, to give



a slightly mushy musette or tremolo effect. Some instruments with two or more rows may also have a button or knob on the bass side to remove the minor or major third from the chords.

A variation on the two-row described above is the 'club' system, favoured by the late Bob Cann, in which one note (a key note) on each row plays the same on the push and pull, and thus requires slightly different fingering when playing most tunes. It's not uncommon for two-row melodeons, particularly 'club' system, to have an extra 'short row' with the various accidentals to give a chromatic range.

A very different instrument, in terms of fingering and playing style, is a two-row in which the rows are just a semi-tone apart, for example, a B,C or C, C# box. These are very popular for Irish music, and typically less use is made of the bass buttons. The instruments are fully chromatic, and the playing technique involves more cross-row fingering to play a particular scale.

Add a third row of right-hand buttons and the opportunity for playing cross-row increases, since many notes will be duplicated, and thus available on either push or pull. An A, D, G box certainly allows some full scales to be played pushing or pulling, though it is still not chromatic unless the 'accidentals' are present. With more bass buttons, there the possibility of 'bass runs' is also extended.

The more rows, the closer the instrument becomes to a fully chromatic accordion in the way it can be played. Indeed, the English Button Box, favoured by John Kirkpatrick, has a melodeon style B,C,C# three row right hand, with an accordion style array of bass buttons. In playing the Tyrolean style four-row melodeon, it's common for the musician to use the thumb as well, a technique alien to the less well endowed boxes.

Though its appearance is quite distinct from either the melodeon or the concertina, a bandoneon has a number of features in common, particularly the diatonic scale. The older instruments are wooden-framed, large, square-ended, with three rows of buttons (up to five in later models) on each side, most of which play a single note (different

on push and pull) but some playing chords. There are different fingering layouts, which may take a bit of working out. Apparently these instruments are popular in Argentina for playing the tango !

The original purpose of this and the previous article was to help people unfamiliar with squeezeboxes to identify instruments that they may have inherited, found in an attic or bought on a whim at a junk shop. Of the 'old' instruments which come to one's attention in this way, concertinas, one or two-row melodeons or piano accordions are the most likely acquisitions, but other button/key free-reed instruments with bellows not described in these articles certainly exist. Some may be valuable and benefit fromn restoration, others may be worthless. Do seek advice before embarking on expensive repairs or just putting the machine out for the refuse collection.

FOOTNOTES

WELCOME OR WELCOME NOT

With a change of ownership at The Globe, Clifton Street, Exeter, the live music sessions, of all genres, which took place on most nights of the week have ceased, at least for the time being, but the omens are not good. The traditional song session hosted by Barry Lister and friends was last held there in December in a chilly upstairs room with no bar service. In January it relocated to the Twisted Oak, near Ide, on the 2nd Friday, and although there were one or two teething problems, it is hoped that it will become established as the regular venue. A new venue for the music session formerly held on the 4th Friday at the Globe is still uncertain, though the First and Last, at the top of Cowick Street, is being mentioned as it already hosts fortnightly Irish sessions. The Royal Oak at Nadderwater is another possible venue, or indeed it may end up at the Twisted Oak along with the song session. Check the Devon Folk website for updates.

While some landlords seem to be turning away from live music, others are keen to welcome it. The London at Plympton St Maurice is looking to set up a music session, provisionally on the 2nd Sunday. On the 4th Sunday the White Hart, Colyford, is a new venue for an acoustic, mainly instrumental session. (Details: 01297 553201). Also in East Devon, Janet Sawyer (01395 239181) is looking for someone else to run the Acoustic Cafe in the Village Hall, Farringdon, on the 2nd. Friday. For something a little different, try the Klezmer and East European folk music at the Barrel House, Totnes, on the 3rd Thursday. The informal Sunday afternoon music sessions at Yarde Cafe (Tarka trail south of Torrington) have continued throughout the winter, usually on the last Sunday (but check on 01837 810566 it sometimes happens on the third Sunday !), from 12.30 ish. Tradewinds will be returning to the Tradesman's Arms, Scoriton which has reopened

Devon Folk News

Twenty six musicians took advantage of the opportunity to attend the **Playford Music Workshop** at the end of November, 2008, at Kingsteignton. **Dave Brown** put the musicians through their paces in the morning using a selection of tunes in the style, both old and new. In the afternoon, **Jean Foster** walked the dances through and called them so that the dancers who turned up were able to enjoy dancing whilst the musicians put their morning's work into practice.

As Dave Brown is already too fully committed next year to lead another similar enjoyable day of music and dancing for us in Devon, musicians will have to be content to wait until the following year when he has suggested the focus for the day could change to **American Contras**. Broader bandwidth ?

Perhaps it's an example of Sod's Law, but one may go several weeks without an enquiry for a band booking, and then three or four come along within a couple of days, either for the same date, or for the one date months ahead for which a booking has already been accepted. In such circumstances I'm always happy to pass on contacts for other bands, and I know that this action is also reciprocated. Even so, it must be quite frustrating for a person wishing to book a band for a function to make possibly a large number of unproductive calls.

I wonder whether it would be advantageous to all concerned for the many folk dance & ceilidh bands in Devon to co-operate in setting up an 'availability' website to which potential customers could be referred. It may even help a band find a last minute substitute should they be forced to cancel through some emergency.

I'm not suggesting an agency that would take a cut of the band fee, or charge customers, though it is possible that there may be some cost in constructing and maintaining a website. If this were the case, then a nominal 'registration' charge might be appropriate.

My initial thoughts on how it might work would require bands to notify the webmaster (for want of a better word!) of dates when they were available and/or already booked. To keep it manageable, only Saturday (and Friday?) dates would be considered, certainly in the first instance. Users of the website, i.e. potential customers, could log on and select a particular date to find which bands were available. Telephone and/or email contacts and links to individual band websites could be included. It would of course, require a regular flow of information to the 'webmaster' and frequent updating of the webpage. Is it a service that Devon Folk/ What's Afoot could offer?

I'd be very interested to have feed back from as many people as possible about the feasibility, desirability, mode of operation, etc. of such a website.

Reviews

PROPER JOB Dartington Morris Men

As anyone who has been present at one of their Friday summer evening forays into the South Devon countryside will testify, Dartington Morris Men have a great reputation for lively apres-Morris song and music sessions in the pub. In September, 2008, they hosted a meeting of the Morris Ring. As part of the celebrations, the Dartington Men, with their strong core of singers and musicians, recorded this 'souvenir' album.

While they would be first to agree that they would not expect the recording to have the finesse of professional singers or musicians, the quality is actually surprisingly good. The odd rough edges in presentation capture the atmosphere of a live Dartington experience, and give the whole CD a delightful spontaneity. There's a good balance between instrumental sets (not by any means exclusively Morris tunes), traditional songs, recitations and the odd story.

Many Morris sides offer enjoyable all-round folk entertainment, and Dartington Morris Men are particularly good at it. They're good dancers too!

INITIAL VARIATIONS

Ken Nicol

MVS CD018

Presented with a solo instrumental album from such an internationally acclaimed performer as Ken Nicol, I scarcely knew where to start on the review. His music covers a wide spectrum from blues, through folk, jazz, ragtime to rock, and he has a enviable reputation as a songwriter. To the folk world he is probably best known for his work with the Albion Band in the late 90s and more recently with Steeleye Span.



The sleeve notes, and the tune titles (if just two initials of people who have influenced his life for each of the ten tracks can be called such), gave little clue as to what was on offer, so, with no preconceived ideas I gave it a spin.

Very interesting! Most tracks feature Ken on the guitar playing compositions in which many different influences from his musical background can be detected vet defying categorisation into any one particular genre. Only the fourth track, with American style banjo, and the final gentle number on mandolin, could be described as folky. His undoubtedly unique style, however, holds one's attention; forget about settling down with a book and pint with this playing in the background - just put the book aside and enjoy your pint to the intricate melodies, chord sequences and rhythms which this album presents. Bland and boring it is not, but neither is it intrusive, leaving me at the end of the album with a pleasant sense of fascination.

COOL & NICOL Phil Cool & Ken Nicol MVS CD020

More familiar as the rubber-faced stand-up comedian, Phil Cool is also no mean singersongwriter, as demonstrated on this joint album, with Ken Nicol.

This is not, as I first thought on a partial play through, instantly forgettable contemporary material, but features well-crafted and often thought-provoking songs showing Phil's serious side. The style and singing reminded me a little of early Simon and Garfunkel. *England You're Gone* is quite dark, *Voices in the Wind* poignant There're a couple of Ken Nicol's instrumentals, and in the final two tracks Phil returns to his zany humour in *Ode to My Fylde Guitar*, and to biting satire in *Oil Man*. Of all the titles, *Old Man's Lament* was the only one I recognised, but it wasn't the antiwar song once popularised by the Ian Campbell Folk Group. A good song from Ken, nevertheless. This is a CD well worth listening to.

Reviews

AMYCROFTERS AT HOME Amycrofters Band

For the last few weeks I have been listening to and using the AMYCROFTERS' CD, recently recorded by Andrew and June Mycroft. For me it has been a delightful experience as it has taken me back to the days when Andrew and I worked together as resident musician and caller at the Meriden Annexe Folk Dance Group and to the many occasions when I called to his previous band, The Four Oaks Country Dance Band. Although Andrew's accordion playing takes me back to those days, June's keyboard has definitely added a useful new dimension to the sound.

I have put the CD to good use at a number of dance clubs and barn dances. The lift that is given to the atmosphere is always immediately apparent and even the most staid of dancers has been heard to start to sing along! Equally apparent is the effect on the dancers' ability to follow the phrasing; a feature of Andrew's playing was always to play the music as if it were punctuated and even the least gifted dancer will struggle to start a move at the wrong moment.

The CD contains nineteen tracks, all of which are useful and useable. There is a good selection of "general purpose" tracks and also some useful "special tunes". There is a very rare recording of *Mony Musk*, whilst *Little Man in a Fix*, with the lead alternating between Accordion and Keyboard, is a delight. The two sung squares, *Tavern in the Town* and *Swannee River*, are always favourites for barn dances and the recordings of Tavern seven times through and Swannee with the alternative music for various turns of the figure add to the entertainment whilst keeping the caller alert.

The sleeve notes make it clear that the recording was made at home and has been transferred to CD without any studio editing, dubbing or other enhancement. One or two critics have commented that the sound is "all a bit the same" and the accordion perhaps rather strident. I would not disagree with the comment and even wondered whether there had been some incorrect application of EQ during the transfer to CD. I can certainly confirm that when heard live the duo sound even better so as far as I am concerned the CD serves its primary purpose of introducing you to the AMYCROFTERS whilst at the same time providing some very useful material for those of us who cannot always use live music for our dances.

Reviews

STILL SPINNING Mick Groves

For someone whose singing career spans some fifty years, many with one of the legendary groups of the folk revival, choosing just 20 of his favourite songs for this album cannot have been easy. However, former Spinner, Mick Groves, who now lives in Exeter, has made a creditable selection which includes several wellknown songs, such as Greenland Whalefishing, Derby Ram, and Gentleman Soldier, as well as some less familiar material. Mick carefully balances a fair degree of nostalgia with some new arrangements with additional vocal and instrumental accompaniment from Becki Driscoll, Jackie Oates, Mick Burch, Jim Causley and John Philips.

Santy Anno, in 'traditional' Spinners style, and songs composed by fellow group members Hughie Jones (*Marques*) & Cliff Hall (*Women Sweeter Than Man*) bring back memories, for me as a teenager, of being smuggled into one of their Liverpool concerts by an uncle who worked at the theatre. *Mary Anne* is a song I've not heard since I picked it up back in my university days at Cardiff without ever knowing its Canadian origin.

Anyone listening to an album of the performer's favourites will, of course, find a track or two which has particular personal appeal, for whatever reason. For me, the two songs, neither traditional, which stood out were *D-Day Dodgers*, and *Flowers of Manchester*. The first I've heard many a time, but something about Mick's straight forward delivery, with harmonica backing, really worked well. I was unfamiliar, however, with *Flowers of Manchester*, Eric Winter's moving account of the Munich air disaster which claimed the lives of so many of the 'Busby Babes'.

Like so many of his songs, Mick has stood the test of time, and, with 50 years of experience, still has the voice, presence, and ease of delivery to hold audiences both new and old.

MORRIS: A LIFE WITH BELLS ON

Reference has already been made, on page 3 editorial, to this recently released film, a featurelength comedy drama, in documentary format, that follows the fortunes of the (ficticious) Millsham Morris and its avant-garde leader, Derecq Twist (played by actor and script-writer Charles Thomas Oldham). Though a low-budget movie, it nevertheless features many prominent actors, including Sir Derek Jacobi and Ian Hart (Professor Quirrell in a Harry Potter film). So far it has been shunned by the mainstream cinemas, playing instead on the community and village cinema network, but it is attracting increasing media attention. Great Western Morris Men are believed to be looking into the possibility of a screening in the Exeter area. MORRIS AS AN ART FORM?

One of earliest written records of Morris (or Moresque) from the mid-fifteenth century concerns a legacy of goblets with engravings depicting such dancers. **Plymouth Morris Men** are now staking their own claim to immortality through a series of paintings by Plymouth artist, David Folley. He has spent some considerable time going along to their weekly practices, observing many public performances (including Plymouth Hoe at 5 am on May Day!), and attending a Fools and Animals weekend. His first series of paintings are now on display, and work on a second collection is under way. The Western Morning News, on Saturday, 3rd January, published a double-page spread on the project.

SOMETHING FOR THE BAG.

Contrary to what some people may think, the coins of the realm traditionally cajoled from the public, with claims of good luck, health, wealth and fertility, do not end up in the coffers of pub landlords. Many sides have long made generous donations to charities, but increasingly, it seems, they are featuring a chosen charity on their publicity and printed programmes. **Plymouth Morris Men's** 2009 programme, for example, lists donations made over the past few years (most recently to Macmillan Cancer Support). Last autumn, **Winkleigh Morris** presented a cheque for over £600 raised for Parkinson's Society at a ceilidh organised by John Blackburn for the same cause.

BIG WEEKENDS

Winkleigh Morris host their biennial Franken's Night Weekend from 15th - 17th May, with visiting sides from all over the country. The name of the event comes from an old Devon legend which refers to late frosts in May as Franken's Nights, and it is hoped to perform a mummer's style play about the legend at the Saturday evening ceilidh.

Exeter Morris Men host a Ring Meeting over the weekend of 24th - 26th July. Based in Topsham, there will be several tours by coach (and probably boat) around the area during the Saturday, and a massed display outside the cathedral on Sunday morning. For further details, see the display advert.
