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The question of Public Liability Insurance has always been one which festival organisers have had to address, and many folk bands & Morris sides find that they may be required to produce evidence of such cover in order to perform at some venues. As individuals organising or performing folk activities either solo or in a small group on an occasional or part-time basis, this issue may not have even entered one's consciousness. This lack of awareness could have serious implications if some unfortunate accident occurred.

Members and affiliates of EFDSS do have some public liability cover incorporated into their membership benefits, but this is limited, and the conditions may render it woefully inadequte for a particular situation. Members of Devon Folk, which is affiliated to EFDSS, would also have some limited cover but only if assisting with a Devon Folk event.

The message, therefore, seems very clear. If you are involved in organising or performing folk in any way, be sure to check that you have adequate public liability insurance. Far better to pay a few quid extra than be faced with coughing up thousands !

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## Local Treasure: Dennis Darke -Musician and EFDSS Executive,

What's Afoot No. 61, Winter 1999 featured 'Farewell to The Greensleeves'. Ten years on Melanie Henrywood went down Memory Lane with musician and founder of the band, Dennis Darke. (Right: Dennis Darke 1938)

Dennis was born in Exeter in 1921 on 22 November – St Cecilia's Day (the patron saint of music) and Cecil Sharp's birthday; so he believes it was inevitable that he would become a musician and gravitate to folk! He went to St Nicholas and John Stocker schools and his musical education started at the age of 12 when he had some piano lessons.

Dennis's father Tommy had a tremendous repertoire of Victorian, Music Hall and First World War songs on the piano, but could not read music and always played in the key of C. He played at the local pub to great acclaim – it was the folk music of its day. Dennis inherited a 48-bass accordion from his uncle when he was about 14 and would play along with his father in their front room every Sunday afternoon. He knew enough from his piano lessons to busk and to teach himself, so he soon moved on to a 120-bass instrument. In the 1930's the piano accordion had the same popular music status with youth as the guitar has had in recent decades and there were accordion bands and clubs. The first time Dennis ever performed was at the old Theatre Royal, Longbrook Street. He played for his sister's dance club, accompanying their teacher who played 'The Dance of the Tin Soldiers' on the xylophone.



In 1936 Dennis joined the Post Office as a telegraph boy at Exeter Head Office and before the War he played in the Post Office Concert Party and in his first stage band, 'Bertino's Accordion Serenaders'. He went on to form his own band called 'The Collegians' who played for ballroom dances and social clubs. During the War Dennis was with the Royal Engineers in the Army and served in North Africa and Italy. In 1939 he joined the On Parade Concert Party, entertaining the troops. He didn't play much during his active service years, but had the opportunity to experience marvellous music – he saw Yehudi Menuhin and heard his first Grand Opera. He did buy a second-hand accordion in Italy, but found it was a full tone out, which was a challenge!

Until 1946 Devon had four branches of the English Folk Dance & Song Society (the EFDSS) in Exeter, Plymouth, North Devon and South Devon with their own locally paid teachers. In the 1920's Cecil Sharp's daughter was the Exeter Branch teacher and lived at Longdown and the legendary Margaret Grant was appointed to Exeter in 1932. At the time, musicians would play for ballroom and Playford dances; there were dance manuals and fiddle tune books, but no country-dance bands or orchestrated traditional music (and callers had no microphones – they would demonstrate from the floor). Post-war, the EFDSS restructured into Districts and Regions with salaried staff paid by Headquarters. Country-dancing was then popularised; through the EFDSS, local folk dance classes and clubs were established and folk dance was given a boost in 1952 when the Queen visited Canada and danced an American Square.

Dennis had married in 1948 and first came to play country-dance music shortly afterwards through the EFDSS organiser Margaret Grant who arranged a community dance with his wife's church - his musical and busking skills came in handy again as the piano and accordion were a tone out! Dennis continued as musician for the EFDSS teacher Irene Harcourt at weekly evening country-dance classes in Exeter and at numerous EFDSS residential events. Soon the 'Greensleeves Country-Dance Orchestra' became established with piano accordion, piano, violins and drums. In the latter years, Dennis's son, two granddaughters and other young people also joined.

Dennis became a member of the EFDSS in 1954 and was Secretary of the Devon District from 1963 to 1975, on the South West Regional Council for 25 years and the National Executive until 1981. Many sing-along, folk song and country-dance books were published while Dennis was Chair of the Sales and Publications Committee, including some of his own composed tunes and dances, many of which are still played and danced. Dennis also wrote and edited the music for the book 'Band Call'.

In 1959 Greensleeves auditioned for the BBC and went on to record atmospheric programmes in villages around the south west, which were then broadcast in the Home Service 'Country-dance' series until 1968 when the BBC reorganised to form Radio 1, 2, 3 and 4. They also recorded and released a number of EP and LP records on the HMV and EFDSS labels.

'The Devon Folk Company' was established in the 1960's and incorporated country-dance, folk song, Morris, a Mummers' play and sword dance. There were shows in Exeter, Paignton and North


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Devon and an annual cabaret on an American liner at Plymouth. The first half had Gwyn George (folk song), Exeter Morris Men (Flamborough Sword), a circle dance, John Bailey (Morris jig), Bob Cann (Dartmoor Stepping) and Dick Witt (Bradninch Broom Dance). In the second half there were American Squares, the Sidmouth Mumming play, Morris dances and Bob Cann with Sailor Jack. Over the years Dennis learned how to play for Morris and for various types of sword dance.

Dennis always loved playing for children and, through the growth of the EFDSS classes, annual children's festivals were established in Exeter, Barnstaple and South Devon. In 1973 to celebrate the Centenary of Church of England Schools, 1500 children from all over Devon took part in two days of song and dance at the Cathedral. Dennis recalls the highlight of his career when all the children joined in singing when the band played the newly released 'Lord of the Dance'. It became the Greensleeves signature tune for future broadcasts and events.

During the 1970's and 1980's Greensleeves recorded over 120 of the very popular 'Barn Dance' broadcasts, the first from Willand Village Hall. These were on Radio 2 monthly on Friday evenings for an hour, featuring traditional tunes and popular songs, leading to the 'Barn Dance Sing-Along' LP which was particularly successful in schools. The band went on to record cassettes and instruction books which were sold world-wide. Other memorable events included Dartington Summer Festivals, Albert Hall performances, tea dances at Cecil Sharp House and Friday night dances at Connaught Gardens, Sidmouth. Greensleeves played their last performance at Christmas 1999 at Willand.

After 45 years working at all grades with the Post Office, Dennis was awarded the Imperial Service Medal for service to the Crown. He is now 87 and still plays piano for a weekly Senior Citizens Club, but finds his piano accordion too heavy. He has a significant collection of books and music which he hopes will go to his grandchildren and to the Cecil Sharp House Vaughan Williams Library. For his service to folk music Dennis was given the Devon Folk Award twice (in 1966 and in 2000) and was also recognised in 1966 with the Sidmouth International Award.

## **Take 6 Archives Website Goes Live!**

#### ENGLAND'S HERITAGE OF FOLK SONGS 'GIVEN BACK' TO THE NATION

## From a small room in London's Camden Town, a treasury of England's folk songs is made available online.

In 2007 the Heritage Lottery Fund awarded £154,000 to the English Folk Dance and Song Society (EFDSS) for its Take 6 project. The aims of the project were to:

Catalogue, conserve and digitise six of its major manuscript collections of England's folk songs – those collected by Janet Blunt, George Butterworth, Francis Collinson, George Gardiner, Anne Geddes Gilchrist, and the Hammond Brothers

Make the collections freely accessible to all through a dedicated website

Give the songs back to the areas where they were first collected in the early twentieth century through projects with primary schools in Lancashire, Hampshire and London

Develop an interactive website designed especially for children to explore and learn folk-songs from the EFDSS archives, with additional tips and classroom materials for teachers (to be launched Thursday 2nd July 2009)

Raise community awareness of Take 6 and the songs and music collected in Lancashire and Hampshire through leaflets, displays and events

The EFDSS is delighted to announce that 9th June 2009 sees the launch of a dedicated website for these six manuscript collections – a first in the field of folklore in the UK. Access to 22,000 images of the actual documents, notebooks and letters of six major fieldworkers at the tips of your fingers, fully indexed and searchable.

What inspired George Butterworth's masterpiece, The Banks of Green Willow?

What did William 'Binx' Walton tell the Lady of the Manor about Morris Dancing and Christmas Carols in Oxfordshire?

What do Andover, Portsmouth and Preston Candover in Hampshire all have in common?



## SING AND PLAY WITH WREN MUSIC

Devon's folk and community arts development charity Wren Music is based in Okehampton, and runs a wide variety of music and singing groups and activities across the county. Since its establishment by folk singers Marilyn Tucker and Paul Wilson in 1983, it has grown steadily and now more than 30,000 people of all ages take part in Wren Music projects each year. Wren Music is supported by Devon County Council, Exeter City Council and Arts Council England South West, enabling the charity to provide opportunities for local people to take part in music-making with professional folk artists and educators.

Wren Music open-access adult workshops run from 7.00 - 9.00pm, and all start in the week of 21st September - but people are also welcome to come along any week during the ten week term if they wish.

**Music workshops** are for players of all instruments, whatever their level of ability, over the age of fourteen. They focus on learning and playing traditional tunes from South West England and beyond. The tunes can be learnt primarily by ear, although written scores will be provided if desired. There are no auditions, and no prior experience of playing folk music is necessary - just a desire to have fun playing music with other people.


## NEW ON THE MENU FOR NORTH

They may be a new name on the barn dance band scene but the three members of **Full English** have many years of experience between them. With thoughtful and interesting arrangements to new and traditional tunes they expect to appeal to both listeners and dancers, and as such offer wide appeal to everything from the full-on English ceilidh to weddings, school PTA events, and other social events. The line-up of Full English consists of Lisa Sture on fiddle, David Robinson on button accordion and melodeon, and Tony Penneck on bass and occasional cello mandolin.

Though not a native Devonian, Lisa is well-known in the county, playing in the early days with Dartington Morris, and local traditional musicians 'Pop' Hingston, Les & Jack Rice, and Bob Cann. She's won the Dartmoor Step Dancing competition on more than one occasion ! During a spell in London she was a founder member of Stomp, and also played with Melons For Ecstacy, while since returning to Devon, she has played with the Oggle Band and Marisco, and, currently, with Babelfish.

Since he began dancing with Bath City Morris in 1968 Dave 'Butty' Robinson has moved around the country quite a bit, always becoming involved with Morris and ceilidh bands in whatever location. In London he danced with Hammersmith ('The Smiffs') and was a founder member of the North Circular Accidental Band. Several years in Cheshire followed, where his interest in researching English folk dance began. His previous activity in Devon, some twenty years ago, saw him dancing with Great Western and Flaming Morris, and playing with Off The Rails. Subsequently he's also been with West Somerset Morris and Wessex Morris Men, started Earl Graze Frolics Band, and published four books for folk musicians. He now lives in Hambridge and Bristol.

Tony Penneck will be familiar as the long-serving bass player of the Committee Band, but he also



plays with Wossname, and, like Dave Robinson, was formerly a member of 'The Smiffs' and the North Circular Band. During his band career he's performed at all sorts of venues, from the big festivals such as Cambridge and Sidmouth, to little tents in back gardens and castles in Germany !

The trio call themselves 'Full English' because most of their tunes are English, and the ones that aren't wish they were ! It's got nothing to do with breakfast, Really !

Their first gig was at the Lantern Centre, Ilfracombe, at the end of June, with Chris Jewell calling, but it's pretty certain that Devon's dancers will regularly have their feet tapping to this exciting new line-up in the months to come.

## **FOOTNOTES**

#### FEEDBACK

Cliff Jones, of Hips & Haws Band, responds to the suggestion in the last issue of setting up a band availability website for the general public.

The difficulty is in keeping it simple and cheap, or free. I'm strongly in favour of each band's admin having a password that allowed them to edit their own entries. A page per band would probably be easiest but not best for a person looking for a band.

Thinking from their point of view, I envisage: - A Home Page explaining what the site is and how to use it, and containing a lot of key words for the Search Engines to find.

- A Bands Listing Page - just the band names, phone numbers and links to their own site. -A Calendar, again just band names against each date with available or unavailable (plus possibly public dance with a link to more info.) However, this get very bulky with having every band on every date & whether to include Fridays, etc.

The other more practical alternative is that we only post dates as 'unavailable'. That way not every date /Saturday in the year would necessarily be recorded, but the odd weekday or Sunday would be shown. The person searching would just know which bands not to contact. By restricting the site to 'unavailable' holidays, key absences would be covered, and probably make us all look busier.

Further comment/ suggestions welcome !

#### Long serving committee members retire

After a combined total of over 50 years, Euphine and Alan Bromell have retired from the Devon Folk Committee (previously EFDSS Devon District Committee). Originally Euphine attended as a club representative before being elected in her own right, and Alan joined her shortly after they married. Over the years she willingly undertook the roles of Secretary, Vice Chairman & Chairman. They both served for many years on the South West Area Council where Euphine latterly became Chairman.

#### Workshop and AGM

Pete & Nicole Mac organised a well-attended and successful afternoon Music Workshop prior to the Devon Folk AGM at Budleigh Salterton on 25th April. Pete used the occasion to launch his new book, 'Band Time', from which much of the music was used by the 55 musicians who attended to prepare for playing at the evening dance. 17 musicians stayed on to join the Pete Mac Band in the evening, which was so well supported that even Budleigh Salterton's Public Hall seemed too small. #### **Devon Folk Award 2009**

Anne Gill, Devon Folk Chairman, presented the award, together with a specially commissioned plaque by Bideford potter, Harry Juniper, to Tom and Barbara Brown on Saturday, 23rd May, at the Castle Inn, Combe Martin. They have been engaged in furthering folk activities in North Devon for 40 years. In particular they were responsible for the establishment and continuation of the ceremony of the Hunting of the Earl of Rone, and were the driving force behind the formation of the North Devon Mummers. They run the Shammick Acoustic Folk Club in Combe Martin, and are in demand as fine singers and musicians at clubs and festivals, while Tom also calls for dances.

#### Young Folk

Elsewhere in this issue (and on-line) there are details of the day of activities Devon Folk are organising in Newton Abbot on 26th September for young folk. The core of the day is provided by the National Youth Folklore Troupe of England (NYFTE), who will be taking workshops, giving a performance and playing for a dance (to which all are welcome). 

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### WHY DANCE ?

A comprehensive resource for traditional country dancing

## Jane Downes & Pat King, with the Catsfield Steamers

Over the years there have been a number of books and recordings produced to support folk dance activities with children, but none quite as comprehensive as this latest package from Jane Downes and Pat King, who are based in Sussex. Although between them they have many years of experience of working with children, as teachers and callers, the material is also very appropriate for anyone organising an event with people of any age with little previous experience of country dancing.

The book, A4, ring-bound, is clearly laid out in a logical manner, beginning with introduction to the nature of folk dance and the music and the place of this activity within the framework of the national curriculum. It goes further, in giving advice on appropriate matching of music and dance, various practical points to be considered in actually organising a dance event, and clear explanation of the terminology used by musicians and callers. Although some things may appear blatantly obvious to experienced callers and dancers, for those people for whom this book is intended, actually mentioning them could make the difference between a successful new venture and an off-putting experience.

The book gives detailed instructions for over sixty simple dances – more than enough to run several dances sessions without repeats, if necessary. Almost every dance notation includes a diagram showing the starting formation, and a reference to the appropriate music on the accompanying CDs. The dances, some traditional, others gleaned from a number of well-known callers, rely on a limited number of simple figures, circles and stars and such like, with a grand chain and strip the willow being the limit of complexity. From personal experience I find it's not necessary to include even ladies' chains and right and left throughs to have a very successful evening with novice dancers, and the authors I think have chosen the dances to ensure that the target audience can experience the fun of folk dancing without getting bogged down at the start with technical challenges.

I'd be tempted to buy the package just for the two accompanying CDs, though they are intended as an integral part of the package, each track specifically linked to specific dances. However, the discs could easily stand alone, either just for listening or for use as recorded music by callers for other possibly more advanced dances. The style of the Catsfield Steamers is more in keeping with the ceilidh scene rather than traditional country dance bands, but all the better, in my view, to get those young feet tapping! Unusually, on the majority of the tracks the melody is banjo led, with fiddle & melodeon support, backed by strong rhythm on drums, bass and guitar. There is a good selection of traditional tunes (English, Scottish, Irish and French) as well as some original compositions, quite a few of which I hadn't heard before, covering a range of rhythms. Some surprises, too - I'd never have thought of playing Mona's Delight as a slow schottische, but it works.

All in all, 'Why Dance?' is an excellent publication.

## SUSIE FAIRWGS361CDMaggie Sand & Sandragon

I came across Maggie Sand, with Mark Powell, when she performed as Alquimia, and I reviewed her album Forever Acoustic in a previous issue. Two songs from that album, *Bushes and Briars*, and *Dance To Your Daddy*, also appear on this new CD, with a different arrangement.

Most of Maggie's material is largely traditional English, but she manages to make the songs her own, with her distinctive, clear voice which has guite a haunting guality at times, and some unconventional arrangements. The instrumental accompaniment that includes guitar, harmonium, hurdy-gurdy, recorders, crumhorn & percussion, etc., intentionally gives the whole album a mediaeval flavour, or even a sound more closely associated with French music. Indeed, there are two French pieces: A La Porte Au Palais is a nonsense song intended to be sung to accompany a dance - I loved the snatch of In The Hall of The Mountain King in one of musical interludes. Les Garcons De Montagne is a tune from the Massif Central.

The treatment of familiar traditional songs such as *If I Were A Blackbird, Rosebud in June,* and *Rigs Of The Time,* might not appeal to the purist, but personally I thoroughly enjoyed the songs and the music. It shows that there are a variety of ways in which our wealth of traditional material can be well presented with quality and skill. I'm in favour of innovation and experimentation if it can produce a album like this.

For the record, the musicians on the album are Mark Powell, Malcom Bennett, Antha Kharana, Will Summers, Will Hughes, and, of course, Maggie Sand.

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### WHERE THE CANAL BOATS WENT Life and Times (Barry Goodman & Graeme Meek) WIX052

For those who are interested in canals and their history, this is a must. Barry Goodman and Graeme Meek have painstakingly researched the history, tradition and people of the canal way of life, from the creation of the canals to their current use for leisure purposes. Each of these periods is brought to life via authentic. traditional-style songs, though all but a few songs are actually composed by the band. The CD takes a chronological journey through the building of the canal network, the life of the working people (and animals) on the canal, the neglect of the canals as railways took over, and the projects (in our lifetimes) to resurrect them. The songs' lyrics tell an enthralling story and the songs are sung with verve. Enjoy the expert melodeon playing and some beautiful violin countermelodies to some of the gentler songs. There is a dance-y feel to the up-tempo songs. Those Morris dancers among you who are scratching their heads (as I was!) about where you have heard *Finest of them All* (track 12): the excellent Bedfordshire side Redbournstoke dance to Barry's singing of this.

## REVIEWS

### **BENEATH THE BLACK TREE** Nick Wyke & Becki Driscoll

There is a melancholic thread running through this CD, which is probably why I like it. In parts, it has a kind of Spiers & Bodenish feel to it.

Whilst not being the fiddle's greatest fan, it is nice to hear the full potential of the instrument exploited by two truly proficient musicians.

Track two (*Edward*) starts with the plucked strings producing an eerie background theme to the song. This is also the case with track four (*Barnstaple* to Umberleigh), my favourite perhaps because of it's experimental qualities.

Nick & Becki complement each other perfectly, and the arrangements are intelligent and atmospheric, executed with the precision one would expect from classical music / musicians, yet retaining the fluidity that is the folk fiddle.

I really like this CD for lots of reasons, but mainly because of the inventiveness and originality. The use of interesting instruments (french horn & glockenspiel) also made a great impression on me. (I love track nine, *The King of Poland*)

Nick has a great voice too, though someone said to me that he had a bit of a 'Yankee twang'. (Surely not, Nick) Kate Nye

### THE NAVVY'S WIFE WGS360CD. A Musical Drama by Mick Ryan.

I have always maintained the opinion that Mick Ryan's musical outpourings are of the highest quality and reliability. *The Navvy's Wife* has unquestionably endorsed that belief. *The Navvy's Wife* is a mammoth work. An outstanding piece of musical creation.

Quite clearly Mick Ryan, through the writings of Ultan Cowley and Terry Coleman, has thoroughly acquainted himself with the subject matter. Some years ago, I too read 'The Railway Navvies by Coleman and can seriously recommend reading the book in conjunction with *The Navvy's Wife*.

The Irish navvies (navigators) came to England for many reasons. Not least of which was to escape the Irish potato famine (1845-51). Or they were simply encouraged to make the journey, purely as a source of cheap and expendable labour. Whatever their reasons, I'm sure that they all hoped for a better life. The hardships, misery and uncertainty experienced by them are well documented but we know relatively little about their womenfolk; the misery and unimaginable indignities which they suffered.

To give life to his considerable creative talent, Mick Ryan has assembled for the making of this double CD, a company of musicians and singers all highly respected on the Folk circuit. The company being; Jackie Oates, Paul Downes, Judy Dunlop, Heather Bradford and Roger Watson. The entire recording of two CDs, comprises 30 tracks, some of them spoken word but mostly of song. Every track brilliantly written and perfectly performed!

I found the songs and spoken word, very emotive and meaningful. But because of and thanks to each artist's quality performance, never morose. After all, it is supposed to be a musical drama not a melodrama.

It is so obvious from the vibrant performance of entire company, that they all felt a personal affinity with the song lyrics and the spoken word. We must at the same time be mindful of Mick Ryan perceptive casting of the company. Typecasting is an often an unacknowledged skill. And certainly for *The Navvy's Wife*, his casting is intuitively correct.



### MASTER MARENGHI'S MUSIC MACHINE The New Scorpion Band NSB05

The title of the new album by The New Scorpion Band, Master Marenghi's Music Machine, sets the tone perfectly. It is full of interest, variety and fun. The band comprises five very talented musicians and performers, all of whom are noted as individual performers. They have been playing together in the band for a number of years and the symbiosis between them enhances their performance to an exceptional degree.

The mix of tunes and songs on the album is wellbalanced. Some of the songs will be familiar to people who do not follow traditional music, many will be known to people who regularly attend folk events, while people who have attended performances by The New Scorpion Band will have heard several of the band's favourites a number of times and may be surprised that they have not been included on a previous album. Among the songs are Donkey Riding, Bridgwater Fair, The Derby Ram, John Barleycorn, and Spanish Ladies. Lesser known ones are It's a Rosebud in June, Ye Tyrants of England, and a wooing song by Thomas Ravenscroft. The tunes include two polkas, The Girl with the Blue Dress On and The Jenny Lind Polka, and a set of pipe tunes

The polkas provide the opening track, an excellent way to lift the spirits of the listener in a trice. The vitality of the performance, superb instrumentation, and the excellent arrangement, are captivating. The next track, the song, *The Painful Plough*, is a complete contrast: a simple, reflective arrangement, in which the words provide the focus. These two tracks form the pattern for the album, a sympathetic blend of poignancy and fun, which provokes thought, smiles, or laughter at every turn. The final track is an old favourite, *Spanish Ladies*, thus the band leave the listener with raised spirits, as they began.

There are many devoted fans who will be delighted to add another album from The New Scorpion Band to their collection without even looking at the track list; however high their expectations, they know they will not be disappointed. At the same time, the band continues to reach new audiences and its reputation reaches new heights. If you are one of the former, you may already have this CD, so tell a friend; if you could be among the new audience, buy it and enjoy a treat; if any of you fall between the two, it is highly recommended, do not hesitate.

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

#### **Artension CD502**

For many years now Gwilym Davies has been scouring various and numerous counties and every possible corner for remnants of our English oral tradition. With this CD his concentration has been on music and songs of Travelling people. As you would expect, his source is from a variety of location, e.g. Gloucester, Stow Horse Fair Buckinghamshire and the New Forest.

It is a most delightful recording of eleven tracks, i.e. three tunes and eight songs. All of which are performed by Gwilym, who is an extremely fine melodeon player, with a voice eminately suited to the songs.

I enjoyed all of the three hornpipes, Lemmies Hornpipe, God Killed the Devil-O and Another Hornpipe. But I strongly recommend to those musicians looking for new material, Lemmies Hornpipe. A seriously jolly, foot-tapping tune.

The songs are, shall I say, thought provoking. Thought provoking, as you would expect, from the sense of being subject to the vagaries of our oral tradition. All of the songs are well performed and very listenable. But three of them are quality material, Appleby Fair, Step it Away and Romany Rai.

### Pete Mac

The sequel to Pete's Band Swing, the format is the same, with chorded tunes clearly written and organised by rhythm type, and tune length clearly shown. There are compositions by Pete, Sheila Sibley and others, as well as familiar offerings. The 48 bar *Oyster Girl* is a pleasing inclusion, and simpler versions of several tunes is particularly helpful for inexperienced musicians. Suggestions for matching tunes to dances are also valuable.

All in all, an excellent, practical book for band musicians of all standards.

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### COLD FEN WGS 362CD Mary Humphreys and Anahata

With this, their 5th album (and 4th with WildGoose), Mary and Anahata continue to focus on tunes and songs from East Anglia. Mary gives warmth and feeling to her songs, which are always well researched. She still manages to find unusual and interesting versions, sometimes combining a tune from one source and tune from another, to whit the title song, *Georgie*, and *Rosemary Lane*, a lovely bouncy variant of *Home Boys Home*.

The accompaniments are always sympathetic, with banjo and English concertina from Mary, and melodeon, anglo, cello, and small pipes from Anahata. Particularly pleasing are the instrumentals, some, like *Brandon Waltz, Bury Waltz* and *La Poole Quadrill* from the recently discovered William Clarke manuscript.

I enjoy seeing this couple perform live, but this CD is a very satisfying substitute.

### **GLEANINGS**

**Colin Andrews**

I felt quite honoured when Colin asked me to review his new CD. Colin is an important part of the bedrock of our living folk tradition in Devon, a fine singer, an accomplished song writer, an experienced country dance musician and caller, a Morris foreman responsible for a whole tradition's worth of new dances, Editor of What's Afoot and an active member of Devon Folk. Now he offers us nineteen tracks from his collection of interesting, witty and beautiful songs and tunes that he enjoys singing or has written.

The first song, *Billy Bones And His Dancing Cat* is a delightful tale full of gently irony and very rarely heard elsewhere, while Colin's added verse to *Young Collins* rounds the story nicely. Colin discovered *Young Collins* in the archives of the West Sussex Gazette. Sung in 1865 but now given a new lease of life I sure it will be taken up by Morris sides who dance to the well-known tune. *There's A Good Time Coming* is as relevant today as it was when first sung and exemplifies all that is good about this CD. Beautifully sung in his lovely, rich, melodic voice we must thank Colin for rescuing such a great song from obscurity.

The unusual cadences of his tune *Froghopper* have an Eastern European flavour, even though danced by Winkleigh Morris, here complemented by another of his tunes, *Below The Belt*. A chilling but again unusual tune from Colin, is the perfect setting for *The Death of John Lee*, the man they couldn't hang. Found in a notebook in Hampshire this story of Exeter prison makes a great addition to any West Country singer's repertoire. The songs and tunes on this CD benefit from repeated listening, as there are so many subtleties to be discovered. Even in songs that are well known there are unusual versions or tunes, all from the tradition, to make us notice them anew.

The recording and production are understated and the notes about the songs are adequate to give their background. This CD is not trying to compete in the music industry but is instead a rich seam of gold in the tradition, and as such a very fair reflection of Colin himself.

### MORRIS, A LIFE WITH BELLS ON Director: Lucy Ackhurst, producer, writer and actor: Chaz Oldham

This off-beat comedy is not on general release yet, so I was one of the lucky few who actually got to see it when it was screened in a limited number of venues as part of a Dorset rural film scheme. The makers are still trying to get the film released nationally.

The film is a spoof documentary on larger-thanlife Morris men: Derecq, squire/foreman of the fictional "Millsham Morris" team, is totally dedicated to Morris dancing. However, he tries to innovate a "jump too far" and gets thrown out of the prestigious Morris "Circle". He rebels and goes to America where his style is lapped up by a (very) camp team of Californian Morris men and it all ends happily.

There is a laugh every three minutes for the general public, a laugh a minute for Morris initiates (tuning the bells with a tuning folk, the Morris "Circle" with offices in the City of London - nice phallic shot out of the office windows) and a few extra sources of amusement for Dorset folk (scenes at "Dorchester International Airport"). However, sometimes the spoof gets a bit out of hand and you are left thinking: "What ARE they on about?"; e.g. the interviews with the "expert" on Morris dancing - a load of waffling and pseudo information - when I had the distinct feeling that the audience was bored And which selfrespecting Morris team would practice regularly, in kit, outside, on a Saturday morning, for five hours, dancing to a CD player??? Fortunately, there weren't too many such scenes.

Generally, jokes come hard and fast and in every guise. I found the sequence set in America the highlight of the comedy, and watch out for the Derek Jacobi twist at the end.

A film well worth watching whether you Morris dance or not. Let's hope the makers will get their distribution deal. In Dorset the film was a sell-out – and the icing on the cake: Cinema goers had the opportunity to watch real Morris dancing in front of the venue! Mecki Testroet


