Local Treasure: Gladys Cann

Dancer Gladys Cann receives the Devon Award

On 20 January 2010 nearly forty people gathered in the Fennamore Room at Saltram House for tea to honour Gladys for her lifetime of sharing her enjoyment of English Country Dance. Melanie Henrywood joined them.

Terry Underhill, Devon Folk President, opened the occasion with a tribute to Gladys. Terry recalled that during his own childhood, like Gladys, he had the pleasure of learning from a teacher who loved folk dancing and folk music. He acknowledged that Gladys was also of this mould, having spent many years teaching and instilling in others this wonderful thing. She had been a catalyst, enabling many people to belong to a big 'family' and to have a wonderful group of friends. He said that we wanted to say a special 'thank you' to her as she had done such a lot and brought enjoyment to so many over the years. Terry then presented Gladys with the Devon Award. The citation on the certificate (produced by Sheila Chappell) reads:



"The Devon Folk Award for 2010 is presented to Gladys Cann in recognition and appreciation of her special contribution to Folk Dancing in Devon. Gladys is well known in the county as a former Chairman of the Devon District Playford Club, a regular local county club caller and an excellent dancer. Gladys also taught sword, country and Playford dancing to many groups, young and old, in the area. For many years Gladys was the caller at the Cornwall Children's Country Dance Festival held annually on the Bodmin Football Ground. Gladys took regular evening classes in Plymouth for well over 50 years and was also a popular caller for Barn Dances in the 1960s, 70s and the 80s."

Following this, **Anne Gill** (Chairman) gave Gladys the gift of a necklace and some flowers. Gladys responded in confident voice, showing her mettle despite having had no prior knowledge of the event. She said that she had started country dancing at school; that she had loved it, had been taught quite advanced dances and had loved the music too. She had joined the County Club in Exeter in Margaret Grant's day when everything had to be right! She didn't think she could dance now, but she intended to keep going as long as she could. She said it was lovely to see everyone there, that she'd had no idea about it, and that she would like to thank us all.



The event, organised by **Rhona Hitchcock** and **Pat Day**, proceeded with a delicious cream tea, friendly chatter and a queue of people wanting to congratulate and pay tribute to Gladys.

Gladys danced from the age of 8 to 88, having taught evening classes until 2008. She has lived all her life in Plymouth; now 90, she only stopped dancing (and driving her lilac car) a year or so ago. After teacher training college, Gladys worked as a secondary school teacher, ultimately

teaching Maths at Stoke Damerel High School for Girls where she had herself attended as a pupil. Her transition from dancer to teacher came naturally when her own teacher retired and she found herself taking the classes. Plymouth was heavily bombed during the War and Gladys recalls the logistics involved with organising dance venues: it had been necessary then to check which church halls still had a roof before the meeting on Thursday evenings! Gladys danced with EFDSS clubs in Exeter, Plymouth and Cornwall. She attended the County Club where Margaret Grant was teacher, who Gladys always said improved her dancing, describing her as " ... a respected lady but an awesome teacher!" This was in the days when exams were often taken and Gladys achieved the highest marks in country dancing. Gladys states she has always enjoyed dancing, teaching and calling,

Dick Little has known Gladys through the Cornwall Choughs and Devon District Playford Club since 1985.

Muriel Langford first met Gladys when she went to Exeter Playford Club in 1947. She recalled Gladys as a competent Chairman of the County Club for many years.

Margaret Anderson came up from Cornwall about 45 years ago and learned American Square dances from Gladys at Swarthmore in the 1960's.

Dell Lloyd met Gladys in 1954 when Gladys came to the Chough Club in Cornwall. She describes her as "... having a sense of humour; an absolute darling; always very calm, positive and encouraging, especially to newcomers".

Norah Bolt and friends know Gladys through the Plymouth classes in Emmanuel Church. They found Gladys amazing – everything was prepared. She was so relaxed and tolerant, they all laughed together at their mistakes. She had a gentle touch, never putting strain on people.

Bernard Polkinghorne represented the Plymouth Forum, who had nothing but praise for Gladys's teaching. This was a mixed class of about 30 retired men and women run by her from about 1990 to 2005. The group had an annual dance at Eggbuckland with Beryl Palmer as pianist and these Christmas dances would attract lots of

Beryl Palmer's mother, Gladys Bradley, was pianist for Gladys and the Plymouth Playford Club from about 1950. After she died, Beryl continued playing for the Club and made tapes for Gladys to use in her classes.

Gwyn George played the piano at venues where Gladys was caller, including the Devon Playford Club at St Thomas' School in Exeter.

Musician Rhona Hitchcock, Secretary of the Devon Folk Committee is one of many who have benefited from Gladys's experience. She is very grateful to Gladys for all the advice she gave regarding the recording of the Fallibroome Collection of country-dance music in 1980. Rhona says she is happy to do anything for Gladys because Gladys has always given so much to others.

Pat Day met Gladys in 1959 at an evening class at the old Corporation Grammar School

CECIL'S DIARIES

Cecil James Sharp (1859 - 1924) was England's most prolific folk music and dance collector. The 22nd November will mark his birthdate and Sequicentinnial (150th Anniversary). In celebration of his achievements and the impact he continues to have on folk music to this day EFDSS have announced the launch of his only surviving personal diaries. Written between 1915 & 1918 they include descriptions of his collecting experiences in the Appalachian Mountains of North America

Between the time of his first serious collecting experience in a vicarage garden in August 1903, until his death on Midsummer Eve 1924, he amassed a total of 4,977 tunes in England and North America, many of which were published in various forms in order to promote and revive what was perceived to be a fading part of traditional culture.

He was not alone by any means, following as he did the likes of Lucy Broadwood, Frank Kidson and Sabine Baring-Gould to name a few. However, his mission to revive the music placed him very much at the forefront of a movement which has attracted a great deal of attention over the past thirty years, but for which many primary sources have been difficult to access.

How on earth did this asthmatic, 56 year-old vegetarian survive in the heat and altitudes of North Carolina, Kentucky, Virginia, Tennessee and West Virginia, along with his young assistant, Maud Karpeles? How did he feel when he heard the news of the death of many of the young men of his English Folk Dance Society demonstration team in the trenches of the Great War? And what did it mean to collect 1,600 tunes from people he considered direct descendants and carriers of British cultural traditions?

The first of the series of diaries was be launched online on Sunday 22nd November, 2009 followed by announcements of more events and content over the coming months. It is also planned to add a full, annotated transcription in time for Sharp's next birthday in 2010.

Thanks to Cecil Sharp's grandchildren, Briony Jose and Richard Sharp, for allowing EFDSS to host the diaries online; to the managers of his estate, Bird & Bird, for helping us find them; to Chris Roche and The Shanty Crew for sponsoring this project.

An olympic marathon?

Terry Underhill, Devon Folk President, has some ideas for the 2012 Cultural Olympiad

Both Colin Andrews and myself were thinking upon almost parallel lines about getting folk orientated groups within Devon to be involved in a publicity and fun marathon dancing in front of pubs within the county. As we amalgamated our ideas and looked at the practicalities it became obvious that there would be a major logistic problem with pubs scattered widely and in many areas where folk activities were low, as well as there being a very large number of premises which one could call a pub.

The second idea of mine seemed much more feasible and appropriate to the UK Olympic year 2012, which was to arrange for a non-stop marathon of dancing - possibly two dancers or more at a time plus a musician to dance in relay from the North Devon coast to the South Devon coast. Perhaps the musicians could be excused from being on foot and sit in the back of a leading support vehicle, although most musicians seem able to play and walk.

Ilfracombe to Plymouth is 75 miles which at 2.5 miles an hour = 30 hours which is two 15 hour sessions. A good Summer weekend with long day-light hours.

There are usually over 35 dance clubs and over 40 ritual dance clubs listed in What's Afoot, if each club only provided dancers for a mile the distance would be covered. I'm sure that some teams would like to be involved in more than a one mile stretch. It would be nice to find a way of including some folk singing so that it is a complete FOLK event.

I would hope that such an event would not only be fun for everyone and a way of meeting up with each other but also excellent publicity and a way of raising money for worthwhile charities by collections and sponsorship.

A suggestion has been made that perhaps other counties across the UK might be encouraged to have a similar event, perhaps even the same weekend.

I would be delighted to get feedback from all clubs within the county.

President's ponderings: Devon Folk

A letter from Terry Underhill

I feel honoured to have been Devon Folk's President for a long time, and feel that once again I should point out that I would not be the least offended if the Committee and/or membership felt that it was time for a change.

In the meantime I felt that I would like to add my own comments into the debate of the role and future of Devon Folk, made without reference to the current constitution.

There is a need for an organisation to be a central point for the gathering and dissemination of information related to all folk matters within the county of Devon, a very import aspect of which, especially dissemination part, is covered by What's Afoot.

There is a need for an organisation to encourage as well as to promote folk activities within the county and Devon Folk is ideally placed for this role. Over the years Devon Folk's ability to offer grants to various clubs and events is most creditable. Likewise if it was not for Devon Folk publicity of Folk activities within the county would be virtually non existent.

The flagship of Devon Folk has to be its magazine What's Afoot, which contains a vast amount of information which is already being placed on Devon Folk's website. I believe that this is a service for which all clubs, callers, bands, storytellers, etc. should pay a small sum, with an increased sum payable for available advertising spots. Access to the web-site is obviously free, but, like Dartington Morris Men's website, there could be within it a private section, only accessible by members by the use of a personal password. If such a system took place within Devon Folk's web site then only members could have access to particular information. Within that could be another section only available to committee members. What's Afoot (Winter 2009/2010) has over 250 contact names addresses and phone numbers, 16 pages of adverts and a very comprehensive list of Diary dates. Income would come from these and for acceptance of passwords to read the electronic magazine, etc membership therefore having

different levels.. Only a webmaster and Devon Folk committee would be able to set their fee for the insertions, adverts and password acceptance

There will always be some members who want to have the paper magazine What's Afoot, although one wonders how long it will be before all previously written and published information is sent by e-mail or internet sites. I believe that it will not be long before people will have a reader device to which they can easily download their favourite newspaper and magazines. In the early stages of going computerised Devon Folk might consider making certain that the Secretary has use of a computer and is connected to the Internet. Perhaps all committee members could apply to Devon Folk for help with Internet provider fees.

Most Dartington Morris Men have access to the Internet and receive their monthly newsletter electronically. We have a section for photographs, where anyone can add pictures, but the web master is the only one able to remove or block. Our web master is introducing a couple of forum sections, one for Dartington Morris Men only, the other for the general public which allows information, thoughts and ideas to flow in and out.

Finally, I feel that if Devon Folk becomes a large organisation then care must be taken with membership and voting levels to stop the organisation being taken over by a determined group of outsiders.

(Some points raised by Terry are already due to be discussed by the Devon Folk Committee. Readers' views are most welcome - Editor).

Mind That Child!

There has been considerable controversy and uncertain, often conflicting advice over new Government proposals regarding adults working with young children whether on a voluntary basis or in a professional capacity. Faced with widespread concern over some of the more bizarre scenarios which the legislation might have produced, there has been a Ministerial rethink. As a result new guidelines are being drawn up, and a large number of people will not now be required to register.

For any person or group engaged in folk activities with young people, the following information (provided by Barbara Morris Childcare Training and Consultancy, 84 The Wynd, North Shields, Tyne and Wear, NE30 2TE. Tel: 0191 2912668) may be useful.

The Independent Safeguarding Authority has some great resources to help people to understand the requirements of the new vetting and barring register. A visit to the website atwww.isa-gov.org. uk and the section which has posters/leafletswww.isa-gov.org.uk/toolkit is recommended.

Some of these resources will be useful for those involved in dance teams where they include children (under 18 years). The ISA registration will affect groups where they have children attending on a regular basis (once a month or more). Adults volunteering with these children will need to be registered, but this can not happen until at least July 2010 and registration forms will not be available before then. These adults will ALSO need a Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) check, which can be done as part of the ISA registration.

There is no charge for people who are volunteering with children (£64 for those being paid). It will not be necessary to ISA register/CRB team members where they are visiting other organisations on an ad-hoc basis (ie display dances for school/fetes a few times a year etc) as this is not 'regulated' activity. To clarify specific issues it is best to get in touch with the ISA since they have personnel employed just to answer questions.

Like many town festivals Bideford has relied heavily on grants to cover expenses that cannot be met from sales of tickets. The organisers are working to secure regular funding that will enable the festival to become a permanent part of the folk calendar. Jerry Bix comments, "We know how much the Folk Festival is loved and hope that people will lend their support, ideas and feedback to the committee to ensure that the 2011 Bideford Folk Festival is better than ever."

Licenced to Bill?

As mentioned in the previous edition, Public Entertainment Licensing continues to be a thorny issue in the folk world, particularly with dance displays and pub sessions. It seems that while some Local Authorities use a degree of common sense, or at least turn a blind eye to certain unregulated but traditional activities, other Authorities see the regulations as an opportunity for raising revenue.

Here are some strange anomalies that have been highlighted:

Exempt: a pub promoting a stand-up comedian accompanied by a pianist.

Licensable: a pub promoting a performance by a pianist/singer supported by a stand-up comedian

Exempt: pub with pianist or other single instrument playing background music.

Licensable: pub promotes a sing-along event with pianist.

Exempt: carol singers outside a shop. **Licensable**: shopping centre organises performances of carols in a shopping mall.

A revision of the Act, presented as a private members bill, has recently been debated in the Lords, where, at the time of writing, it is due for its third reading. Its provision would exempt premises providing live music entertainment for up to 200 people, allow more live music to be played in pubs, etc. without a license, and permit limited amplification of instruments for live music out of doors

Of course, even if the bill goes through the Lords, there is no guarantee that it will be implemented, particularly as parliamentary time in the Commons is going to be limited by an impending General Election. There are on-line petitions to which you can add your signature, however, and, if there has been no change to the status quo before the election, it might be worthwhile asking all the prospective parliamentary candidates what they would do about the on-going threat to live music.

FOOTNOTES

SOME YOU GAIN, SOME YOU LOSE

New music sessions in **Exeter** have sprung up at the recently refurbished **Rusty Bicycle** (formerly the Eagle Tavern) in Howell Road, fortnightly on the 2nd & 4th Wednesdays. Another pub, the **Jolly Porter**, once home of the Exeter Tradtional Folk Song Club, has live folk music monthly on the 2nd Thursday. The informal Sunday afternoon sessions at **Yarde Cafe** on the Tarka trail haven't happened over the winter, though the proprietor, David Job, is quite happy for musicans to come along and play - check with him beforehand.

Tradewinds Club, at the **Tradesman's Arms**, **Scoriton**, is reportedly doing well after its move to the fourth Sunday. The organisers, Simon & Sue Williams, also run a session at the **Maltsters**, **Tuckenhay**, on the 2nd Saturday. TOURNAMENT OF SHADOWS Little Johnny England TECD150

Much has been praised and hyped about Little Johnny England's latest release. Even Steve Knightley has called it the "best folk/rock album in years".

Now you may think that the Show of Hands singersongwriter might be a tad biased, particularly, as the band cover one of his own songs on the album - Cutthroats, Crooks and Con-Men.

So does it live up to all this hype? Well the answer to that is - absolutely!

I am ashamed to admit that this is my first official introduction to this band, with almost 25 years of folk music upbringing behind me. I had heard various random tracks from LJE's 10 year career and, although I enjoyed what I heard, I never followed it up to listen to a full album. Maybe, one of the reasons I hadn't chose to try them out was that I just assumed that I had heard every folk/rock band that I needed too and that LJE would offer me nothing new than their contemporaries had offered.

On listening to this album part of that fear became true. They do sound familiar - a cross between Fairport Convention, Oysterband and The Albion Band. While they may wear their influences on their sleeves they still manage to make it seem as freshly exciting on the ear, as if it were Fairport's seminal album, Liege & Lief, 40 years later, with their own blend of rock meets ceilidh and "in the tradition" songwriting.

If you love their influences you're sure to love this band and, indeed, this album.

Tournament of Shadows is LJE's first album in six years and contains 12 solid tracks, blending the rock and folk influences effortlessly with the ceilidh dance framework, manifested by Gareth Turner's melodeons and Guy Fletcher's fiddles, in particular. There are many highlights - the atmospheric title track opener and the equally atmospheric album closer, The Plains of Waterloo, give the album the feeling of a full

circle, the closing ambient sounds echoing the opening track's ambience.

Other highlights include the aforementioned Steve Knightley cover, *Kenzie, Random Acts of Kindness* and *The Falling Down Man*, which features a breathtaking brass-led climax.

The songwriting is tight too and there is plenty of variety on show, with tracks like the traditionally grounded *Ginger Billy*, written by band members Mark Stevens and Phil Beer Band member, Gareth Turner, *Steeltown Saturday Night*, which is reminiscent of late 1980's Oysterband and a good 6-minute set of tunes, harking back to their ceilidh band roots

The vocals, although not perfect, fit the gruff, hard-edged tone of the album and include some strong harmonies. Some of the vocal parts recall Billy Bragg, giving some of the album a dose of punk band influence, slightly evident on the track, Steeltown Saturday Night, which may put some people off. If you generally like folk/rock, however, you'd be hard-pressed to find too much to complain about here.

To say more of *Tournament of Shadows*, would only spoil it. I'm guessing that if you're already a fan of LJE, then you're bound to love this album. If, like me, your a LJE novice, then this release, along with their "*Ten Years On*" compilation, is a great starting point.

Sometimes I think writing a review should be done in a blind test, rather like wine, i.e. one shouldn't see the label in case it influences one's opinion. Take this album, for example. The first track is a folky tune with wonderfully dry melodeon in the upper register, joined on a second tune by clarinet and percussion. Most of the other tracks have a distinctly jazzy flavour to the almost exclusively original tunes. Some are quite moody, like the *Strike The Gay Harp* set, others really bouncy and syncopated, and all great to listen to.

So, a dilemma - should it be filed under folk or jazz? Chalktown are well known as one of the country's top ceilidh bands, but as a caller, I'd need to concentrate quite hard to pick up the important 8- bar phrasing from unfamiliar tunes and imaginative variations. Followers of Chalktown will love it for dancing, no doubt, but I shall just enjoy it at home.


NATURAL AND WILD The Albion Band

TECD155

This compilation CD gathers together a selection of The Albion Band's Folk-Rock Instrumental performances and Songs to present the eco wildlife-friendly concert. The CD contains a well balanced selection of sad songs and laments over the countryside disappearing, songs on wild life in towns and a look in to the future (of the '80s so some of which is now the past), interspersed with instrumental tracks on country themes.

Following the first track of upbeat and dancy compilation of tunes, *Laura's Song* is quite a sad song about how life in the English countryside has changed in the past 100 years or so. Cathy Lesurf and Ashley Hutchings paint a vivid picture of the 19th Century countryside as exprienced by the character Laura in Flora Thompson's *Lark Rise to Candleford*. When was the last time you heard a lark singing?

Foxy Comes To Town is a children's song, a mildly funny take on the urban fox as a street cleaner, eating up McDonnald's and Chinese Takeaways that have been abandoned. Ironically

the tune is reminiscent of some fox hunting tunes. *Another World In The Night* also deals with how nocturnal wildlife adapts to town life.

With *Bird-watching*, restricted in the song to one small area, I guess I'm very lucky to live in Exeter, but the final song perhaps increases the prospects, although it didn't really appeal to me.

Woodlands of England, Tomorrow's Too Late, and the Joni Mitchell classic, Big Yellow Taxi all lament in their way that you don't know what you've got until it's gone. It's not all pessimistic, however, as See This Lake, Son? and Harvest Anthem demonstrate, while My Beautiful Bomb Pit is about nature reclaiming an area that was bombed in the war and how it has turned into a wild and wonderful place, a refuge and a light. Of course, by now it has probably been redeveloped... Naturalist Chris Baines poignantly reminds us, in I Was The Child, to remember that we've borrowed the Earth

Instrumental pieces, like *Butterfly Galliard*, give a break from the environmental messages hammered across in the songs. The lively *Gentleman's Agreement* and the slightly slower *Busy Gardener* feature some impressive fiddle playing.

In conclusion, the standard of song and music on this album is excellent throughout, but I can't really see myself singing any of these in a pub session or using them as easy-listening in the car. It's more the sort of CD one would buy to support a local fund raising project to help save our woodland and countryside.

ROCKIN' BARN DANCE The Albion Dance Band TECD154

Talking Elephant Records have re-released the 1988 recordings of Ashley Hutchings and his Folk-Rock extravaganza. The tracks contain a little bit of everything, traditional tunes with Rock-style flourishes, Dance Calling and Song.

The tracks are bouncy in the right sort of way, the tune clearly demarking the time needed for each move. The CD is suitable both for dancers, and for those who only want to listen to the music. Some of the calling is a bit unclear as there is no walk thorough or notes included. Of course, some of the dances are well known but others I have not come across at all in 20 years of dancing.

I had to guess the formation of Track 1 (Longways, I think) and you only find out that the first move is circle left at the end of the first time through because the first call is 'Off you go!'. The calling also only goes twice through before the song *Time to Ring Some Changes* kicks in. The dance itself is simple enough to dance to the song

Seneca Two-Step, is a fast paced short track, Track 3, Nottingham Swing, is still a very popular dance in the Ceilidh scene. Relax, next, or dance a Cha-Cha-Cha to the Hutchings song *I Only Wanna Dance With You* well performed by Polly Bolton

Tavern in the Town is a well known square dance here in Devon,, and Ashley Hutchings mentions learning it from Bob Cann in Devon It brings back great memories for me dancing this as child in the local village hall in the late '80s The track is made more interesting with Saxophones and Melodeons variations. It comes across that the band really enjoy playing together.

Track 6 is Ashley's Ride, longways for 4 to 8 couples, to the tune Soldier's Joy followed by a Phil Beer song, I got New Shoes. This combination of calling and song seems to work really well. I admit to being confused as to what is actually happening by just the calls for The Ribbon Dance, but the tune Hopping Down in Gwent leads nicely into the song, Welsh Girls, so it doesn't matter what the dancers are doing.

The Leaving of Wessex tune - great to listen to, but with no relationship I could hear to The Leaving of Liverpool. This track had only one call, taken so much out of context that I couldn't imagine the Coranto Dance ("and a hey from the leader").

Guest Caller Sid Kipper, walks through his four couple dance, *Dashing White Private* with hilarious explanations of variations on the standard names and what the different dance moves symbolise in his story, .Very entertaining and sounds like a fun dance too - It isn't often you hear a call of "Windowsill" in a Ceilidh dance.

There is disparity between track number on the sleeve and the disc itself. Track 10 (or 11) is the sad *Drowned Lover* song, and 11 (or 12), The *Kerry Square*, to the percussion-driven tune *Three Toed Tumbler*, with imaginative folk rock bass and electric guitar. This amazing CD ends with a simple circle dance to a jig, the music fading out, leaving me wanting more.

ARCHIVES Mick Burch Tuneflow compositions & live performances 2 volume CD sold in aid of Force

Mick is a well respected veteran of the Exeter folk scene, and his songs are always worth listening to - not something one could honestly say about some singer/songwriters.

On this double album, one disc is given over to his 'tuneflow.com' compositions. This monthly competition involves writing and recording a song from new titles set by the website. Suffice to say, of the fourteen tracks, seven were awarded first place, and four second place. The second disc features live recordings at the Barnfield Theatre, Exeter, with additional vocals and various guest musicians to augment Mick's guitar. There is some duplication of songs, but this adds interest, to hear how a 'bare' solo performance can be developed into a full-blown arrangement.

Mick's style is very easy on the ear, at times in the Country & Western genre, at others more folkrock or bluesy, and some songs in ballad idiom. Not all the songs are of romantic relationships, fulfilled or otherwise. *The Bell* is a very moving piece about a reaction to wanton cruelty and oppression, and *Revolution Dance* gives a novel take on Cuban life. One of my favourite Mick Burch songs, *One Minute To Midnight*, is on both CDs. Another, *Lucy*, perhaps his most well-known, is on neither, the only disappointment of this Archive offering. But it is on an earlier CD!

is not something you play for a soothing background; it requires listening to properly to get the best of all the nuances of the introductions and atmosphere of the pub. I found it quite fascinating to hear the 'raw' versions of many well-known songs that have subsequently had the full treatment by contemporary folk artistes.

Some songs seem timeless in their quality; Gordon Syrett, singing the *Mistletoe Bough* in 1985gives it just the same haunting drama as Jackie Oates' very recent recording.

This dual album is a wonderful collector's item.

ON THETIDE Wren CD014 Marilyn Tucker & Paul Wilson

Marilyn Tucker and Paul Wilson through their Wren Music projects, workshops, orchestras and choirs have brought traditional music and song to literally thousands of people while supporting other musicians to develop their careers so it is especially pleasing to find that they have found time to record a CD of their own. This collection of songs and tunes has the sea as a common theme, many of them linking Newfoundland to the West Country. Ably supported by fellow Wren musicians including Nick Wyke, Becki Driscoll, David Faulkner, Matt Norman, Lynn Walsh and Jenny Southam instrumentation includes fiddle, mandolin, piano accordion, guitar, border pipes and lovely voices.

The Newfoundland connection brings delights such as Paul's singing on *The Dance on Peter Street*, a variation on the maid stealing the sailor's clothes with a lovely pleasing tune and great mandolin from Matt Norman. Newfoundland fiddler Rufus Guinchard composed the fiddle tune *Skipper Lost his Guernsey* which perfectly complements Marilyn and Paul's lyrical version of the Cornish song *The Banks of Newfoundland*. Another of my favourites is *Round the Bay of Mexico* with everyone singing in a loose easy style that oozes the heat of the Bahamas. Back to Devonport for two short songs, *The Sailor's Lass* with its gentle humour about a girl's wiles to catch her a man and Paul's own *Mackerel up the Wall* celebrating those sadly lost-for-ever days when the fish were so plentiful they could be freely picked up down by the sea wall.

As you would expect from such consummate performers the singing is perfect - rich and expressive, while the arrangements support the songs with some beautiful playing. I personally find the interior design of the booklet with the song information overlaid on pictures of pebbles rather clichéd and hard to read and while the recording is perfect a couple of tracks are quieter than the others, Marilyn seems to be singing in the mid – distance on *Young Emma*. These are very small and inconsequential when enjoying this really excellent and thought-provoking CD. I really hope they make many more before too long. Go along to some of Wren Music's events and add this fine CD to your collection.

RANDY DANDY, O The Exmouth Shanty Men

If I were a member of the Exmouth Shanty Men I would be like a dog with two tails to have produced this CD. As a memento and reminder of an evening in their company it is second to none. Beautifully produced in the new style card presentation case with a booklet full of highresolution photographs highlighting members of the crew in costume. These are set against the background of the MV Provident of the Trinity Sailing Trust; the whole CD echoes the care with which they create their scenes alongside the anarchic gusto of their performances. A strong vein of humour and self -mockery runs through their performances from their crew names (Alfredo Heights - Ship's Lookout, Sam Minella - Ship's Cook, and so on) to their banter and antics onstage. But this mockery and humour is never at the expense of the songs themselves, or the lives of the sailors that created them

The notes about the songs are clear and would help anyone who was not familiar with shanties enjoy the songs more with nuggets of shanty lore. There must be hundreds of shanty CD's. and many of the songs here are well known standards, so why should you buy this one? Well, for the most part it is really well sung, produced and recorded without being too aggressive and in your face. I've whiled many hours in the car pleasantly in its company, which you couldn't say about many shanty CD's. Exmouth Shanty Men are an ensemble group, and this is their strength but also possibly a weakness. In my opinion twenty-two tracks is just too long and there are half a dozen that might have been edited. There are some anomalies; the only female voice is "Helen Highwater" singing a beautiful version of A Sailors Life. Her voice is fabulous and merits a CD of her own, but in the context of the rest I found the contrast too great and somehow unsettling. On stage they make wonderful sets that become capstans and other gear, and they have used the noises of these and fading voices to create atmosphere, but I'm not sure it really works on a CD listened to away from the stage.

and negative, the long and the short, the right and the wrong.

His economical and unobtrusive guitar style complements the songs perfectly, and his choice of accompanists is impeccable, with Paul Sartin on oboe, fiddle and cor anglais, Pete Flood on percussion, Vicki Swann on double bass, whistle and nyckelharpe, Johnny Dyer on guitar, accordion and keyboards, with vocals beautifully supplemented by the Tindalls.

The songs range in mood from The Miracle of Life a celebration of the wonderful things around us that we often take for granted, to Thieves of Innocence, a lament for the children who are forcibly used in armed conflict, to Street Life, which takes a very positive look at multiculturalism.

George's songs are personal and thought provoking without the introspection and navelgazing that is often present in the work of some singer/songwriters. My personal favourite, Hills Above the City, has a catchy tune, and takes a 47

look at the fact that distance lends enchantment.

Each of the fourteen tracks has something of significance to say, and it would do George a great disservice to play this CD simply as background music. Buy it, and by really listening to these songs without distraction you will enjoy them more and more each time you hear them.

It's a great CD, demonstrating not only his songwriting ability, but also his musicianship, warmth and performing skills. It is surpassed only by a live performance from George.

FOUR ACROSS **English Rebellion**

Of all the crop of good albums I received for review in this issue, Four Across is undoubtedly my favourite. But I would not have expected the music from a group made up of Nick & Mary Barber, Mary Humphreys and Anahata to be anything less than inspirational.

At Sidmouth, when they are not running big band workshops, Nick and Mary can often be found playing french horn, melodeon and fiddle at the Radway English music sessions. Mary and Anahata, with banjo, English concertina, melodeon, cello & anglo, are popular at folk clubs and festivals across the country for sympathetic performance of traditional song and music.

The CD gets off to a cracking, foot-tapping start with Merrry Month and Squirrel in a Tree, two jigs which sound traditional even if the first one, at least, is a recent composition. The brass really adds bounce to this, and many other tracks, not just with rhythm but taking the tune and counter melodies

Although the album includes several modern tunes, it has very much a traditional Englishness about it, even the delightful instrumental Will You Patch My Pants For Me (my favourite track!) which is Swedish tune acquired by way of the U.S.A. Mary Humphreys sings Gypsy's Wedding and Bonny Bunch of Roses-O but with the band accompanying in full swing, you could easily dance to these tracks too! Marvellous!

NO USE IN CRYIN' Rattle on the Stovepipe WGS 371 CD

This CD is truly a delight from start to finish. Never showy, never flash, its quiet understatement draws you in and fills you with wonder. To describe it as old tyme Americana would be to miss the point completely, even though that clearly is the style if a label is required. Here is a collection of songs and tunes, some very familiar, others less so. presented as fresh as if they were newly minted. I'm sure you all know the tune "Princess Royal" and many of you will have danced to it, maybe as a Morris jig. Here it could have just come down from the mountains, vet you could still dance that jig. We've all heard (or sung)"Roll, Alabama, Roll" belted out as a shanty; here their banjo, fiddle and guitar rhythms bring the story alive, same words, same tune – new song – it's magic.

Actually it's not magic, its sheer talent and craftsmanship and being at one with the music and the genre. It sounds authentic, but there are no fake American accents or strident solos to upset the gentle tenor of the whole. My personal favourites are the classic seafaring maid song, "Short Jacket and White Trousers" and the Carter Family "You've been a Friend" – one quintessentially English, the other equally American; brought together, not as strange bedfellows, but as complementary facets of the richness we enjoy in folk music.

Dave Arthur (Vocals, Banjo, Guitar, Melodeon), Pete Cooper (Vocals, Fiddle, Viola) and Dan Stewart (Guitar, Banjo) will need no introduction to many of you and this I feel is their best offering yet. Throw away any preconceptions about your taste in musical styles and listen to this CD. I promise you will be delighted and entranced. Then buy it; then play it to all your friends.

SPIRITS FLYING HIGH Beer From The Wood BW01

Under normal circumstances I would always decline the invitation to review a recording by friends or acquaintances. For no other reason than I have no wish to offend or even lose friends in the process. Well, this is one CD where, in the course of reviewing, there is no likelihood of that occurring.

'Beer From the Wood' is the collective name of the musically talented family Henrywood. They are,- in age order, I hope – Dick, Melanie, Ross and Verity.

I perceived this CD as being more than a recording but rather a performance, and a good one at that too. The selection of these eighteen tracks have clearly been well considered and well balanced, one against the other. Of that grand total of eighteen tracks, seven are the product of Dick's creative mind. Dick's image creating ability is beyond question, *The Gleaning Bell, Pierhead Painters*, and *The Loss of HMS Avenger*, are particularly good examples of this. Then at the other end of the Dick's song writing spectrum there is *Double-barrelled*. Here Dick has brought together in song form, something which we have all witnessed at sometime or another when on our travels and found extremely amusing – brilliant!

Regretfully, Verity only sings one song solo, *The Bergen*, and I would like to have heard more from this young lady. She sings with a strong awareness of the subject matter, and the maturity and appeal of her voice belies her age, (thirteen at the making of this CD). Ross is the baritone voice of the family and in terms of the family group renditions, has a very important input. Although still a young man, he sings with authority and commitment, *Echoes in the Stall*, is a prime example of those qualities.

Now I'm obliged to consider Melanie's role within this family quartet. I consider her to be one of the finest female Folk singers in Devon. She has what I can only describe as an emotionally laden quality voice – like a bit special. Melanie 49

sings on a number of tracks and her rendition of *The Gleaning Bell, Faraway Tom, Crazy Man Michael, One I Love,* and *Wild Geese,* is perfection. I'd go so far as to say that I think *The Gleaning Bell* in particular, is a classic. It doesn't get any better than that.
