For clubs to survive and indeed to flourish, a regular influx of new members is important to replace the inevitable loss through relocation, conflicting interests, and ill-health, for example. Song clubs may be less vulnerable since one can have a jolly good singaround even with only a few people, but dance clubs require a minimum number of participants to remain viable.

While fortunes of a particular Morris side may fluctuate, it can cling on to existence in difficult times with just a few committed individuals. For folk dance clubs, however, the situation is not so easy; they require a caller and attendances in single figures can severely restrict the variety of dances the caller could use.

One sees quite a healthy prospect at some dance clubs, and there is certainly a lot of enthusiasm among the younger generation for folk dancing at ceilidhs, weddings, birthdays and general 'village hops'. It is the more specialised interest dance clubs, such as the Devon Playford Club and the Isca Allemanders American Square that are perhaps more at risk from falling numbers. Now there's a great opportunity for folk dance enthusiasts and up and coming younger callers to try something different!

THE MAN THEY COULD NOT HANG

Colin Andrews tells of folk song and drama based on a real event which took place in Devon over a century ago.

It has often been said that truth is stranger than fiction, and I doubt that even Agatha Christie could have come up with a murder mystery so intriguing as the story of John 'Babbacombe' Lee.

Elderly spinster Emma Keyse was found brutally murdered at her home, The Glen, on Babbacombe Beach near Torquay early in the morning of 15th November, 1884. Her throat had been cut, her head bludgeoned with a heavy object, and an attempt had been made to set her body on fire. It appeared to the police that her butler, John Lee, was responsible. He already had a criminal record and was believed to be the only man in the house at the time. On circumstantial evidence he was arrested, convicted of murder and sentenced to hang at Exeter jail. On the 23rd February 1885, the day of his execution, three times the hangman's trap failed to open beneath him, and his sentence was commuted to life imprisonment by the then Home Secretary. He served twenty two years before being freed on appeal. So much is fact.

Almost from the outset, there was speculation about what really happened on that fateful day in 1884, and whether the police really had got the right




man. There was speculation, too, on the course of John Lee's life after he was released from prison, some people believing he died in the South-West while others placing him in America or even on the other side of the globe. A well-researched book* by Mike Holgate and Ian David Waugh re-examines the whole evidence, and produces more than enough suspects with credible motives for the murder to tax even Poirot's little grey cells. Add to that the likelihood of conspiracy, probability of incompetence and certainty of prejudice and you have all the ingredients for a first-rate pot-boiler.

The botched execution alone guaranteed John Lee a unique place in history, giving the convicted murderer almost cult status as a folk hero. This year Fairport Convention are restaging their complete folk opera, Babbacombe Lee, which was originally produced in the early 1970's. His life has also been the subject of various articles, books, television documentaries and even (in highly fictionalised form) a movie.

It would not have been surprising for John Lee's story to have attracted the attention of broadside balladeers of the day. Working in North Hampshire in the late 1960s & early 1970s, folk singer and keen collector, Gwilym Davies, was shown an old family notebook by a Mrs Hunt, of Graywell, Hampshire. In it were the words of a ballad telling of the 'death' of John Lee, and this song, along with others Gwilym collected, was published in 'A Hampshire Garland'.

The John Lee ballad certainly would not have won any prizes for literary merit, but, coming across it again many years later, I did some research on the topic on the internet, and decided to rework Mrs Hunt's words with other information I had found on the internet into a new song, with a new tune. The words and tune are given here, and the song may also be found on my CD, 'Gleanings'.

The latest re-incarnation of John Lee is in the form of a project at the Exeter Phoenix, who have secured £7,400 worth of funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) as part of their Young Roots scheme. The project, which will last for six months, began in January 2011, and involves young people meeting regularly to research the story and produce an exhibition and performance based upon it.

"Our project will enable us to look back at the story of John Babbacombe Lee and present it to a modern day audience in a variety of ways, through visual art and performance art," says Clare Saunders, Education Manager for Performance and Music at Exeter Phoenix. "One of the major attractions of this project for young people is that it will be free to take part in and they will be able to work with and learn from professional visual and performance artists."

The performance piece they create will be performed at a number of different venues in and around Exeter.

Pat Kenworthy was a very private person who loved her dancing. She was devoted to the EFDSS and the Devon District where she held the post of membership secretary from 1982 until 2010.

Pat did her teacher training in the Lake District and taught there for several years before moving to a girls private school in Bude.

I recently found, among her effects, a newspaper cutting telling of how she rescued two boys from drowning on a local beach.

The only relative she had was her mother with whom she lived until she died 9 days before her hundredth birthday. By that time Pat was teaching in a special school for boys with problems.

She had joined the Bideford Folk Dance Club in 1961 and regularly attended the Playford club in Exeter. Latterly, she added line dancing to her activities. The many people who attended her funeral is indicative of the high regard in which she was held.

Her loyalty and friendship over many years will be greatly missed.

Local Treasure: Cyril May

After thirty-four years with the Dartmoor Pixie Band, Cyril retired in December. Melanie Henrywood and Jason Rice visited Cyril and his wife Hazel at their home in Crediton.

1.Can you tell us about your early days?

I grew up in Spreyton and went to the village school, followed by secondary school in North Tawton. I then worked in Spreyton before going to do my National Service; that was a good experience as I was a Staff Car Driver and I met a lot of 'society' people, such as those I drove to the Duke of Kent's passing out parade at Sandhurst. When I came out I joined Hazel in Exeter and worked for Woodman & Son, builders. We were married in 1957 and moved to Crediton in 1959, where we have lived in the same house ever since. Carpentry was my trade and I continued to work for Woodmans' for twenty-six years.

2. How did your own playing start?

Because I always had reasonable timing, I would set up the beat at school on an old-fashioned glockenspiel. When I was about twelve I was given a mouth organ for Christmas; I got interested so I gradually bought a couple more – I still have the C chromatic from those days. I played a snare drum with my School Master and his wife who played fiddle and piano, until I was about fourteen, when I realized my mates were getting all the girls on the dance floor and I was missing out!

3. When did you first join the Pixie Band?

Hazel and I always liked folk dancing and we went to lots of different dances, such as the one at the Civic Hall when the Jolly Waggoners came down from Bristol and Ron Smedley was Caller. In 1974 we went to a dance at Whiddon Down with Bob Cann's Band. I was listening by the

stage and the banjo player, Tom Barriball (who taught Rob Murch to play) threw me a G mouth organ and got me to join in. Bob encouraged me to go along to their next dances and so I started by playing mouth organ with Bob, Tom, Bill Murch and Roy Parish, the drummer.

4. What part did you play in the history of the Band?

Bob turned professional in 1977 and called himself 'Pixie Bob', which is how the Dartmoor Pixie Band name evolved. It got bigger as we went further afield. Both Bill Murch and I progressed from the mouth organ to playing the melodeon. We went to Sutton Bonington near Nottingham for the National Festival and got involved in doing some BBC recording for Jim Lloyd in Derbyshire. When Roy Parish gave up drumming, we had a lad called Ian Kielly for a few years who was very good, but he decided to give up quite suddenly. Bob knew I had done some drumming so he suggested I should give it a try. I put together a drum kit which was like something from Tin Pan Alley; I was so nervous that I didn't play very loudly until Bob encouraged me to make more noise, as no one knew there was a drummer on stage! So my banging and crashing up there now is all Bob's fault we laughed about that many times and my nickname in the Band became 'The Mad Drummer'. I bought Ian's drum kit when he sold it and I had that for at least ten years, until about seven years ago when I went into Exeter and bought a full set of kit, including two specially selected cymbals to give the right sound for folk music. When Bob passed away in 1990, Mark took over and the Band became something bigger, with us doing festivals etc. I enjoyed every minute of it.

5. What have been the highlights of your playing days?

Playing for the BBC at Pebble Mill when they used to have different bands on each week on the radio and being invited to play for the Cyril Tawney Memorial Concert 'Celebrating Cyril' at Cecil Sharp House in April 2007. We have done lots of festivals too – Towersey, Shrewsbury, Wadebridge several times and, of course, Sidmouth and Dartmoor.

6. Have you had other folk interest or involvement?

I have done all sorts with the Dartmoor Folk Festival for thirtyfour years; I was a founder member with Bob for the first one at Wood Country House when it rained and we worried that no one would come! It got a name and moved to South Zeal after three or four years; I have been Chairman and am a Step Dance judge. I started doing my bit of nonsense with stories, songs, music, dressing up

and duets at the Cartwheel Folk Club that used to be in Crediton. Bob used to run a folk club in what was the Cawsand Beacon pub and then he moved to the Seven Stars in South Tawton. It was daft things like Bill Murray and me doing a version of *Out Come Mother and Me*, with me in pigtails.

7. Have you got a favourite tune?

I enjoy playing *My Grandfather's Clock,* doing the sound effects on the drums and I like *In the Toyshop*, but my favourite is quite a modern tune, put together by the boys, called *Westward Ho!*

8. Is any of your family involved in folk music?

Our daughter Karen was always interested in folk music and dance; she did some Calling for the Pixies and different bands. I try to goad her back into it sometimes, but she is a career girl with the Bank.

9. Can you share an anecdote with us?

I have always been known as the joker of the Band. For Bob's 70th birthday out at Longdown I built a two-tier birthday cake on a pallet with me inside it and seventy electric candles. The idea was that four chaps would carry me in and on the signal, Bob would blow out the candles, I would pull the electricity supply inside and then I would burst out with his present. Unknown to me, they set me down the wrong way around and when I came out I was facing the back of the hall instead of the stage!

10. Is there anything you would like to change on the folk scene?

I don't think politics should come into folk; I like to keep the folk scene 'light'.

11. What message would you send to your 16-year-old self about playing folk music?

Don't just fiddle about; be more focused – a more educated, better musician.

12. Now you have reduced your commitment to the Band, who has taken up the drums?

Thomas White, who is Bob Cann's great-grandson and Mark's nephew. He sat on my knee when he was three years old, learning the beat from my feet. On my retirement evening we reversed the roles, with me on the knee of a now strapping seventeen year old who plays rugby for Devon! The Dartmoor Pixie Band drumsticks have passed into good hands and the tradition continues.

Jim Sanders

Owen James Sanders, 1921-2011

I have yet to meet anyone (other than his close family and his Dr.) who knew who Owen Sanders was. Yet here was a larger than life character known across Exmoor and beyond, but everyone knew him as "Jim"Sanders; he also liked to be known as PPF, and he was, to the extent that I have seen Birthday cards delivered with the address PPF, Barbrook, Exmoor.

Jim was born to a farming family and spent his whole life farming "a section of the finest farming land", - on Exmoor?, in his case, so it was; he took on Southstock farm in 1945, and the spread was known for his meticulous management of the land, the hedgerows and stock, along with his farm garden. "Well, I thought I might keep a few chickens". Woe betide the errant weed that planted itself at Southstock! Jim kept a diary of the daily workings of the farm, which provides us with a fascinating insight into yesteryears farming and moorland life. Here we can also find entries referring to moorland entertainment, for Jim was also known to the hunting fraternity, and he was renowned for enjoying a good sing.

No one would say that Jim had a good singing voice, but he had a wealth of old songs, sung in his inimitable style, with a voice developed by hollering at livestock across the valley. *Poor Poor Farmer, Mortal Unlucky Ol' Chap, Exmoor Hunt song, Blackbird, Todays Monday*, and many others, for sure reasonably well known, but not

as Jim sang them. Once seen, never forgotten, as many visitors to the Brendon village sings would agree. To this day the Brendon sing is still referred

to as Jim's sing, nowadays held at the Staghunters, and years ago at the Rockford, where Jim, and his neighbour and sparring partner Dick French (who went on ahead some years ago) held court and welcomed singers.

He was always most at home on Exmoor. He loved the moor and its traditions, and was conscious of times changing. Jim instigated the recording of old Exmoor carols remembered from his youth, and it became tradition to sing these at the December Christmas sing. He could occasionally be persuaded to travel further afield, visiting various folk clubs, the song and ale, etc, but my abiding memory is of a visit we made to Ireland, staying in a posh Hotel in Killarney, full of american tourists at breakfast, when suddenly the double doors burst open, and there's Jim, in trousers and vest, with braces dangling, and carrying slippers, and announces himself ... " I WOKE UP IN THE MORNING", the restaurant fell completely silent, a voice said "what time was that then", and came the reply "funny you should ask 'cause as a rule I dont get up in the morning"... He just loved the attention that singing provided him, and even as he became frail would break into song, in the Doctors waiting room, in the hospital ward and so on.

Jim made a great contribution to the Exmoor Folk scene, and will be sadly missed, but fondly remembered. Our condolences go to Eileen, Kathleen and (young)Jim.

Outside the square ? - Then come on in!

Go along to to your usual Saturday night ceilidh or folk dance and the chances are that you'll do a fair mixture of dances incorporating common formations and familiar figures such as swings, heys, stars, chains, strip the willows and many more. Depending on the caller's preferences, the dances may be drawn from traditional English, Scottish, Irish, American sources with perhaps some Playford and European dances included for good measure, and possibly some of the caller's own invention.

At a club night, the dances may also be from mixed sources but perhaps more complex. Some clubs specialise in a particular style - for example, the contacts section of What's Afoot lists Playford, Scottish, Irish, and French dance clubs or classes. Surprisingly, hitherto it has not included any club specifically devoted to American Square Dance.

It was only when I was recently contacted by Brian Bradford, of Isca Allemanders that I



realised that there existed a whole folk dance scene in Devon previously undetected by the What's Afoot radar

The Isca Allemanders, one of several American Square Dance clubs in Devon, was formed thirty years ago by John & Marion Greenaway. It met originally at Exwick Middle School, but after several changes of venue over the years and a recent unfortunate change of club night, it now meets every Tuesday at the new Kenn Centre, in Kennford. Early in its history the club became affiliated to the BAASDC (British Association of American Square Dancing Clubs - see web site at www.uksquaredancing.com). John Greenaway was the regular club caller until he retired in 2009, since when, in order to continue, the club has relied on recordings by top callers worldwide.

Brian is proud that the club has always had a very friendly atmosphere, with a good mix of dancers of varying levels of experience, from relative novice to advanced. However, through various circumstances such as change of night, increased travel costs for those living at a distance, and some retirements from active dancing, the club numbers have fallen from the seven or more square sets per night that it used to enjoy. Brian is very keen to attract new dancers - and potential callers - to the club, and he is planning to run some 'taster' evenings and beginners' sessions.

There is a grading system in American Square for the complexity of the dances but many clubs operate up to Mainstream level with the figures well within the capability of those already involved in other forms of folk dancing. Indeed, many figures will already be familiar - *dosado*, *grand square*, *ladies chain*, possibly *California twirl & box the gnat*, and thus should not deter the uninitiated from having a very enjoyable evening. If you really catch the bug, the more advanced levels await you! Leave your stetson, spurs and toy six-shooter at home - just go along and have fun.

Tribute to Ryan Roberts (1941 - 2010)

He met Zina through mutual friends, married and had two children. An early interest in ballroom and square dancing led into his passion for Folk Dancing. He was a regular at Willand, Gittisham, Aylesbeare and Honiton Clubs. Two of his favourite dances were Wibsey Roundabout and Nottingham Swing.

From calling for his first individual dance at Truro, Ryan developed a wide knowledge and experience. He called at many clubs, from Minehead to Exmouth, Weston-super-Mare to Tavistock. He introduced folk dancing to many new people at weddings and functions with Petronella and Lucy Lastic Bands, as he had the knack of making people feel able "to have a go". Ryan gave pleasure to an enormous number of dancers, and will be greatly missed. Zena would like to thank everyone who contributed to his retiring collection as £1000 was split between Hospice Care and the Dartmoor Rescue Group.

Devon Tradition Project February 2011 On February 3rd, Wren Music, Devon's folk and community arts development charity, launched an exciting new resource, bringing thousands of West Country songs into the public domain. The Devon Tradition project, administered by Wren Music, has published the Baring-Gould Folk Music collection on the EFDSS archives website, making it part of a growing national folk archive, and highlighting the exciting collaboration going on across the folk world.

The collection of over four thousand images contains hundreds of songs from the West Country collected in the late nineteenth century, catalogued and searchable, with colour images of the original pages.

The project was launched with a highly successful event in Plymouth Library on 3rd February, home to a selection of the digitised manuscripts. Reviews

FOLK SONGS AND BALLADS Mark T Circle of Sound COS326CD

This is a strange album. The title and woodcut cover illustration suggest a very traditional offering from this singer from Berkshire. Even the list of tracks abound in classic ballads such as *Lord Ronald, Lady Maisrie* and *Hughie the Graeme*.

Mark T. is not conventional in his treatment of traditional songs, however, with some interesting variations of tunes, rhythm and words. He's not got a fantastically strong singing voice, and indeed I feel he would have been best to keep to an imaginative guitar and bouzouki backing rather than attempt *Emma* unaccompanied. His vocal delivery actually comes over best on the upbeat, bluesy style rendition of Whiskey Johnny. Among the tracks there are a couple of very pleasant instrumentals *Veritas Arpie* and *Packington's Pound*. On some tracks he also uses harmonica and harmonium.

At only £4.99 it's got to be good value if you enjoy a srather unusual take on familiar material.

DIAMOND JOE Depot

Mat Walklate's earlier albums reviewed in What's Afoot featured Irish music, but in this new 7 track CD the style is very different - acoustic blues. As a former British Blues Harp champion, the Celtic influence is still there, and he also plays uillean pipes, flute & guitar in an exciting crossfertilisation of genres. In Depot he is joined by Faul Bradley (vocals, guitar), Anthony Haller (double bass), and Koulaty Kabo (percussion, vocals).

Apart from the title track and *Candy Man*, there are arrangements of lesser known blues numbers and some original compositions from the group. Powerful stuff !

STILL WATER

Jon Harvison

This is the 5th album from Yorkshire-based singer/songwriter Jon Harvison, although the first I've received for review.

For me, various elements are essential to make someone performing predominantly their own material stand out from the crowd. Interesting subject material, good lyrics, attractive tune, strong delivery and appropriate backing are all important, though not necessarily equally so. Several of Jon's songs really tick all the boxes but the title track, Still Water, comes pretty close, taking as its theme the tragic drowning of Chinese cockle pickers in 2004.

The instrumental backing, including Jon's guitar, is excellent throughout, (Masha Kaestner on piano and harmonium is particularly good). Jon's voice powerful and confident, and his ideas good. It's a pity that the sense of outrage at the Chinese authorities in *North Face of Everest* and at Tony Blair's government in *Gates of Eden Closing* is slightly diminished by either repetitive lyrics or uninteresting tune.

As on all his previous albums - which also feature an impressive line up of guest musicians there are some traditional offerings. *Scarborough Fair* has attracted some very high profile singers but Jon makes it his own with a very sympathetic rendering and accompaniment.

Despite my odd personal niggles, Jon's album is a very creditable addition to the contemporary folk music scene.



THE KEYS OF HEAVEN: the Life of Revd Charles Marson, Socialist Priest and Folk Song Collector David Sutcliffe Cockasnook Books ISBN: 978-0-9557460-7-9

Charles Latimer Marson was Vicar of Hambridge, Somerset, from 1895 until his death in 1914. By the time of his appointment his close friendship with Cecil Sharp had led to them collaborating on a number of projects together. While on a visit to Marson in 1903 Sharp heard the gardener, John England, singing The Seeds of Love. This moment is credited with being the catalyst for the ardent collecting of folk song for which the traditional music world has so much to be grateful.

Ninety years later, the Vicarage had become a nursing home and David Sutcliffe, the author of this biography, was the manager. To commemorate the anniversary of Sharp collecting The Seeds of Love celebrations were duly organised involving the local community. The Old Vicarage was a focal point. This, too, was a catalyst: it led to David becoming a member of Taunton Deane Morris, leading two community choirs, and undertaking research into Sharp's singers and the life of Marson. He found that he was related to one of the singers who gave Sharp songs, and, now retired, has written this definitive biography of Marson, after many years of diligent research.

Marson was the archetypal 'turbulent priest' whose Christian Socialist principles stopped him from rising above the level of Vicar of a relatively remote Somerset village. A journalist described him as "being born to be misunderstood except by children and the common people." He came to traditional song long before Sharp did and has been listed as one of the most influential early socialists, Anglo-Catholics and social reformers. The book very well describes the hot-house atmosphere of the Edwardian era, with alliances and splits and a host of charismatic characters.

One of David's great achievements was to locate a draft biography written in the 1930s as well as the surviving Marson Papers, which are now housed in Somerset Heritage Centre. This is the

first published biography of Charles Latimer Marson, and it is difficult to believe that it will not also be the last, it is an excellent book.

NIALL TEAGUE AND THE FAST COMPANY FCM001CD

Niall Teague and the other accomplished Galway based musicians in the group have produced a CD which contains among their original compositions a curious mixture of genres, perhaps reflecting their versatility.

The song *Borrowing Florins* and the instrumental *Cave Hill Climb* have a conventional Irish atmosphere to them, but in *The Heist* ragtime piano gives a new twist to an Irish style reel. Some songs like *Address* have an almost country & western feel There are also some gentle reflective numbers like *Enterprise* and *For You*.

Strangely, what could have turned into a real dog's dinner of widely contrasting material actually works very well. Good vocals, good lyrics, good instrumentation - and definitely variety ! It's an album that grows on you each time it's played.

INSTRUMENTALS VOLUME 1 The New Scorpion Band NSB06

This is a compilation CD of instrumental tracks taken from New Scorpion Band's previous albums. Although most of the music is dance music, this is a CD to which to listen rather than one to which to dance: there are jigs, reels, hornpipes, strathspeys, and schottisches interspersed with airs and laments. Worthy of note is the outstanding consistency of quality and variety over a number of years.

Of the twenty six tunes included in the twelve tracks, two will be familiar to most readers of this publication, the polkas *The Girl with the Blue Dress On* and *The Jenny Lind Polka*. Of the others many will be new to people or only familiar from performances by NSB. The arrangements are all superb with hauntingly beautiful tunes on the pipes, such as *Ships are Sailing*, renditions with a sense of fun such as *Fairy Boy* and *The Fairy Hornpipe*, medleys that gather momentum such as *Rodney's Glory* (slow air) to *Out on the Ocean* (jig) to *The Sailor's Reel* (reel), as well as the upbeat polkas mentioned above.

New Scorpion Band comprise Brian Gulland, Robin Jeffrey, Tim Laycock, Sharon Lindo and Robert White, five very talented musicians with a range of instruments between them that number about twenty. The sensitive arrangements often prove that less can be more, a contrast to those in which all the band feature and play with verve and vitality.

SPRING TIDE RISINGPaul & Liz DavenportHAT

For those who like their folk songs presented in an honest straightforward way uncluttered by intricate instrumental interludes or clever harmonies then look no further than the latest album from the Davenports. In my opinion it's their best yet.

For the most part, the songs are traditional, either unaccompanied or with simple but effective 43

guitar or melodeon from Paul. Even when they sing together, it is in unison - quite unusual these days.

Liz has quite an earthy quality to her voice, rather like some of the early material from Norma or Lal Waterson, particularly in her rendering of *Stowe Brow*. One almost feels that had she been born a generation or so earlier she would have attracted the interest of folk song collectors.

Although there are several familiar songs among the 19 tracks, such as *The Blacksmith* and *Young Hunting*, there are some little known gems. *Judas* gives the maligned disciple a very different image, while *All On A Falling Tide* is a haunting song with origins in a Child ballad. Paul's own composition *Davy Cross* is a moving tale of a drowned sailor identified and returned to his home port by the pattern on his knitted sweater. He also composed the opening title track about a Suffolk village at the mercy of the advancing sea.

My favourite track must be Jess Arrowsmith's *Pilgrimage*. Although I've heard her sing it with Crucible, it's an intensely poignant anti-war song, reminscent in its structure of *Hunting the Wren*, and far more cutting than *Where Have All The Flowers Gone*. Well sung, too.

Of the very varied crop of creditable albums I've reviewed in this issue, *Spring Tide Rising* is one of the best.

HAPPY OUT (SUGACH SAMH) Niamh Ni Charra Imeartus IMCD002

Here's a refreshing and thoroughly enjoyable album from a champion concertina and fiddle player and vocalist whose name may not be familiar to us on this side of the Irish Channel. She has toured world wide for sveral years as a soloist musician and dancer with the popular Riverdance, and was awarded Best Traditional Music Act in 2008 by the Irish World newspaper.

The album features a number of delightful hornpipes, jigs reels and slow airs on concertina or fiddle, with additional backing on some tracks from guitar, bass, piano, and shakers. The opening waltz, *Limerick Redowa* is particularly attractive, and in some ways sets the tone of the whole album, with gentle melodies underpinned by a depth of feeling and expression. Both traditional and modern compositions, including Niamh's own, are featured.

Although most of the tracks are instrumental, the three songs (two in Gaelic and one in English) admirably show off Niamh's beautiful soft, clear lyrical voice. *Paddy's Lamentation* is set during the years of the famine and mass exodus to America. *Se Fath Mo Bhuartha* is of someone separated from a loved one, and features Niamh's father on zither - an unusual instrument for Irish culture, but actually well suited to the tradition with its harp-like sound.

Irish music doesn't have to be fast and furious to make an impact - as this album well demonstrates.

Reviews

THE LEAVES OF LIFE Songs and Tales of Christmas and Wintertime Mellstock Band

Music from the Mellstock Band is invariably wellcrafted, and this album is no exception. It offers a mixture of tunes and songs interspersed by readings. The title is taken from one of the tracks, and is an absolute gem.

The first track is a good introduction with two highly compatible, crisp and lively tunes, *Persian Dance and Waterloo Dance*. All the music has a bright and breezy appeal. The serpent, however, can give a very clipped sound, which is not always terribly satisfying. Many of the tunes are recognisable as either songs or tunes known by other names.

The songs are very arranged and some would have benefited, I feel, from standing alone and being sung unaccompanied - *Bitter Withies, Arise and Hail,* and *Down In Yon Forest* are such examples.

The readings nicely join up the material and give a Christmassy feel to the whole thing.

Whether or not you are acquainted with the West Gallery style or just want to listen to some less well-known Christmas offerings, this is a CD that can be enjoyed by all. Definitely one to dust down each December to get you into the Christmas mood.

New CD now available

THE FOX AND THE HAREHarry Green & other traditional singers fromEssexVeteran VT135CD

There must be very few, if any, traditional singers and musicians from East Anglia that have not been featured by John Howson on his Veteran albums. Indeed, John and Katy Howson are about to be awarded the gold badge by the EFDSS in recognition for their tireless work for Folk Music, of which the recordings are just one part.

Harry Green, whose songs make up over twothirds of the tracks on this CD, was ninety-three when he was recorded by Fred Hamer in 1967. Even then he delivered a repertoire of ballads, country songs, and recitations in a strong, rich voice. He was Essex born & bred, and much of his singing was done in the Rising Sun pub at Duton Hill. I was interested to hear the song *Oh Joe The Boat Is Going Over* since until very recently I had only been familiar with the tune, which itself is very common among East Anglian musicians.

The other Essex singers featured on the album are Ernest Austin, who offers another attractive version of *John Barleycorn*, 'Sugar' Bailey, Stan Walters with a little parody *When Irish Eggs Are Frying*, and Lorna Torran whose *Herring Song* is of the *Herring's Head* family.

As with all of the Veteran productions, the sleeve notes are copious and very informative. Whether one's interest is just in listening to traditional singers no longer with us, or using their songs as a source of inspiration for one's own performance, this album would be most welcome.


