

Zale Fayre steps in to keep Dartmoor dancing

DARTMOOR Folk Festival may have been cancelled for the second year running but many of the event's favourite activities will appear as part of Zale Fayre.

For this year only the Fayre has changed its July date to August 7-8 and will host many of Dartmoor FF's top activities, including the step dancing and broom dancing competitions and music from local artists. All events will be held at South Zeal Recreation Ground.

There will be dance workshops on Saturday morning and aspiring performers will be invited to enter the afternoon competition. From 5pm there will be an open mic until "dreckly". Dartmoor Festival's organisers commented: "It had always been traditional, particularly for the Step Dance Competition to be held as part of a 'Village Sports' or 'Fayre', so the combination of these two local events seemed perfect."

On Sunday, you can hear the Dartmoor Pixie Band and there will be morris dancing from Tinners, Winkleigh and Otter Morris and Cogs & Wheels.

All this and a village fair, too! What more could anyone want?

Weekly singarounds will continue on Thursdays but there will be monthly special guest nights: the fine singer, concertina and mandolin player Steve Turner on September 23, and the mighty Moor Music will give a Devon Evening on October 28. There are no plans yet to restrict the audience but the chairs will be laid out with a bit of extra distancing. Guest nights at Bideford usually start at 8pm. We advise you to arrive at 7:30pm to be sure of a seat. There's no singaround on guest nights, support performers are invited in advance by the MC for the evening. The club doesn't charge for tickets but passes the box around. The organisers ask: "Please consider how much you might pay for a public concert then contribute at least the cost of a drink. All club events are financed by the collections.".

GIDSONG is resuming its monthly sessions at Gidleigh Village Hall on September 7. Hosted by Bill Murray and Tich Scott, the singarounds usually offer a wonderful array of entertainment ranging from Devon folk songs to jazz, step dancing to story-telling, reels to Ravel and so more. The only complaint I have heard is from vurriners who get lost trying to get home (What's Afoot's editor once spent an hour trying to find his way back the A30).

EXMOUTH FOLK CLUB is relaunching its monthly meetings on Sunday September 26 (the second is on Sunday October 24) from 7pm to 10pm. They are moving to the GWRSA Railway Club, next to the Leisure Centre and near the railway station. Real ales are served and there is parking and level access. IN PLYMOUTH the first Sunday sessions are resuming at the Dolphin Hotel, 14 The Barbican, PL1 2LS but August's may be lightly attended as many regulars will be at Sidmouth.

Shanty festival is rolling home

THE TEIGN SHANTY FESTIVAL is going ahead on the weekend of September 4-5. Teignmouth will host more than 40 shanty singing groups from all over the UK and overseas. Listen out for shanty legend Tom Lewis and Teignmouth's very own Back Beach Boyz, and the pirate and mermaid duo CASK.

The tall ship Johanna Lucretia will be

moored in Teignmouth harbour for the weekend and visitors will be welcome to "come aboard". The festival will also offer workshops on maritime skills such as knotting, figurehead carving and lobster pot weaving.

Events are free but there will be collections for the charities RNLI, Teign Heritage Centre, Rowcroft Hospice and the Alice Cross Centre. IF YOU missed Show Of Hands at Sidmouth, there is a chance to see Phil Beer at the Beehive Honiton on Friday September 17.

The community arts venue in Dowell Street, EX14 1LZ, says the concert will be a reduced capacity, socially distanced show: "When booking your seats, it would be much appreciated if you only leave two seats (1.5m+)between your bubble and the next party in the row." JIM CAUSLEY has joined the Heavenly Choir. He helped to open the Archangel Way, a pilgrim route that winds round the north side of Dartmoor from Brentor to Chagford, with a specially composed song.

The ceremony was held at Belstone Tor on Friday July 31. He told us: "I got involved with the Archangel Way project because the Reverend Paul Seaton-Burn of Chagford commissioned me to write a song for it. I've known Paul since he has been ministering in the area and through performing at local events such as the folk festival church service in South Tawton. Paul obviously knows of my selfpenned songs such as Pride of the Moor and St Boniface Day and I have a knowledge of this area of the moor through my dog walks and work on the Devon Unearthed project with Villages in Action."

Way this time as he had to appear at the Sidmouth Festival that afternoon with South Zeal shanty singers Mariners Away.

He had a busy time during Sidmouth week as he also appeared with Narthern (with Barry Coope, Jo Freya and Fi Fraser) and performed a solo set.

FOR years, Beltane has revelled in showing off the dark side of Dartmoor. Now the dancers have decided their traditional black face make-up could offend, saying: "We still disguise and honour our predecessors with our dances but we use mercurial colours of nature to hide our faces, rather than the black of soot. We answered a loud call to recognise the sensitivities of our times, and are happy to acknowledge present-day concerns while commemorating our history."

As we went to press, Beltane were still perfecting the new look. We look forward to featuring photographs of it in our next issue.


A voice from the past

STEVE THOMASON, who passed away in October 2020 (obituary on Devon Folk website) left a great legacy on Soundcloud of the songs that he wrote.

Several of these were based on aspects of Devon's heritage, from the time he lived in Exeter before moving back to Derbyshire a couple of years ago.

With permission from Teresa, his wife, and Jim, his son, and the assistance particularly of Anahata and John Golightly, all 42 of his songs have now been transcribed, and I have published them in a book. It includes all the lyrics, music, Steve's notes about the songs, and also reproductions of several of his own watercolour paintings. After covering the printing costs, all profits from the sale of the book will go to a hospice where Steve would have spent his last days.
